Online scams proliferate in the wake of Osama's death

BBB serving the South Plains of West Texas has issued a warning to consumers to watch out for a slew of cyber-scams that have popped up in the past few days prompted by the killing of Osama Bin Laden a few days ago.

According to Kaspersky Labs, an Internet security firm, malicious Web sites and links have been proliferating on Google Images search, Facebook, and other social media

On Facebook, a fake video purporting to show the death of Bin Laden prompts users to input a malicious URL into their browsers, which will infect their computer with a virus. Kaspersky also reports that other Facebook scams lure victims to malicious Facebook Pages with promises of free airplane tickets, and other "free" offers to "celebrate Osama's death."

Consumers should also be very wary of links to Osama related Web sites that they find on Twitter, or any link with a URL that leads to an unfamiliar webpage. Often these links will lead consumers to Web sites with viruses, or forms that encourage consumers to enter personal information, which can be used to steal their identity, or for phishing scams.

new home," he said.

Renovations are underway at the Tahoka city pool, with work being sponsored by both the Tahoka A.C.T. (Advancing the Community of Tahoka) funds as well as general city funds. The A.C.T. committee, using funds generated by the half-cent city sales tax, is spearheading some much-needed renovations of the restroom facilities at the pool. New plumbing and new fixtures will upgrade the facilities, and city officials are also looking at replacing torn canvass shading with steel roofing material to provide a place for parents to sit in the shade while watching their children play in the pool.

Additionally, the city council approved funds of \$11,000 at Monday's council meeting to repair the gutter around the inside edge of the pool where the water laps over. Currently the gutter is made of tiles, which break often and can cause scrapes on skin. Council members approved replacing the gutter with stainless steel around the inside edges, which is expected to be a permanent fix for the problem.

City Administrator Jerry Webster told The News that he anticipates all pool renovations will be completed soon and that the pool should open for patrons

In other business at Monday's council meeting, it was reported that there is still no word on approval for the city's water grant funds to replace water lines beneath the city. The grant committee met May 3 but postponed approving any new projects, most likely due to uncertain funding until state legislators set funding, according to Webster.

In another water-related issue, the council approved a 20-year term payment to the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority (CRMWA) of \$33,335 per year to pay Tahoka's \$666,107 cost-share for development of a new well field to supplement declining levels of Lake Meredith, the source for water for CRMWA members. The City of Tahoka, along with the other ten member cities of CRMWA, will share the cost of purchasing approximately 211,000 surface acres of water rights currently owned or controlled by Boone Pickens and Mesa Water. CRMWA has agreed to pay approximately \$103,000,000 for this nearly 4 trillion gallons of groundwater in place.

"This is anticipated to ensure a good supply of water for the City of Tahoka for the next

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



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Neugebauer remarks on FEMA's response to Texas Wildfires

On May 2, the Director of the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) denied Governor Rick Perry's request for a Major Disaster Declaration in response to areas of Texas that were decimated by wildfires last month. Representative Randy Neugebauer (R-TX) issued the following statement regarding the denial of a Major Disaster Declaration:

"These wildfires have left a path of destruction in Texas, and it is very unfortunate and disheartening that FEMA Director Craig Fugate and President Obama do not seem to recognize the damage that has been done in our state. Over 2 million acres have been burned, 1,200 miles of fences have been destroyed and we have suffered over \$20 million dollars in agriculture production losses. Additionally, 800 electrical poles have been destroyed, leaving

thousands without power.

"Sadly, there have been many natural disasters in the United States, and all over the world, this past year. Many other states have not been left to combat an uncontrollable tragedy with only state resources. I look forward to working with the Congressional Delegation to support Governor Perry's appeal and efforts to reverse FEMA's decision. I will work with my colleagues to learn why FEMA did not grant the state of Texas a Major Disaster Declaration for the wildfires that affected thousands of people, destroyed homes and devastated lives of Texans. I am determined to get an honest answer to this question and work hard on changing FEMA's decision. Once again, faceless bureaucrats in Washington have made the wrong decision affecting hard working Americans."

ears may be used for additional protection. Coverings may also be used to protect your horse's eyes and head.

"Allergic dermatitis can result from the black fly bite," states Mays. "Antigens in their saliva can cause allergic reactions. Additionally, the black fly bite can become painful and itchy as blisters form. Therefore, protecting the face and ears from flies eliminates a major source of irritation for your horse."

Equine dermatitis will usually result in symptoms such as scratching, biting affected area, crusts, hair coat damage or loss, flaky dandruff and thickened skin, explains Mays. The itchy skin can be further irritated when the horse rubs the area (on fences or stalls) to the point of hair loss and scabbed skin. This is when secondary bacteria can enter the skin and cause infection.

"Sweet itch is commonly seen in 4 to 6 year old horses," notes Mays. "Repeated exposure to the allergen, in this case, fly bite, is required for the allergy to develop."

To help reduce the incidence of sweet itch, begin preventative measures before fly season is in full force, suggests Mays. Use a fan in your horse's stall. The constant airflow deters flies from lighting and biting. If possible, place finemesh screens over barn openings to prevent flies from entering stalls: Install automated insecticide mist systems to help control fly populations. Consult your local veterinarian for the best insecticide to use in your stables and on your horse.

Black fly, stable fly, horse fly and midge bites all can cause allergic skin reactions in horses. Corticosteroids are the most useful treatment for controlling these skin allergies, notes Mays. This antiinflammatory helps stop the itching so that the skin can heal. However, there may be steroid side-effects in horses, so they must only be prescribed by your veterinarian.

If your horse has an annual encounter with summer sweet itch, help him to manage the itch by taking preventative measures to lessen

State awards \$28,600 to regional nonprofit to help migrant farm workers

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) today announced a \$28,627 award to a Levelland-based regional nonprofit organization working to reduce the number of migrant farm-worker households living in poverty and helping them transition toward greater selfsufficiency.

The South Plains Community Action Association (SPCAA) will use the award to provide direct assistance to an anticipated 275 migrant and seasonal farmworkers through rental subsidies, utility deposits and assistance, medical and dental care, transportation vouchers, minor car repairs, and allowances for basic necessities. Case management will also be arranged for seasonal farm-workers to help access other services through a coalition of 30 partner agen-

SPCAA serves low-income clients living in Lynn County as well as surrounding counties.

through training and research. The CSBG Program assists households earning no more than 125 percent of the federal poverty guideline, which is an annual income of \$22,050 for a family of four. Funding for the program comes from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and supports a variety of direct services in addition to helping maintain the core administrative elements of
