

# Head basketball coaches hired at Tahoka School

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met Monday night, approving contracts for two new staff members in the district.

Brandon Lee, who had resigned his position as head boys' basketball coach at TISD effective at the end of this school year, due to teacher certification issues, was rehired as the head coach after passing his certification recently. Lee led the Bulldogs to the regional quarterfinals this year, where the team ended a fantastic season with a 24-6 record, and claimed the District Championship bragging rights, bypassing bi-district with a bye, and bringing home the Area Championship

Anthony Catherall was hired as head girls' basketball coach and teacher. Catherall comes to Tahoka from Anton ISD where he was an assistant coach. He will take over coaching duties from Bric Turner, who took advantage of the voluntary exit incentive package and is resigning his position here.

One staff resignation was reported. Cross-country coach Ethan Inmon resigned his position here to accept a head coaching position elsewhere.

In other business, trustees approved an agreement with the Underwood Law Firm for redistricting of the TISD single-member districts, with new population figures provided from the 2010 Census. School officials are also appointing members for a redistricting advisory committee. More information on the redistricting issue will be provided in an article in next week's News.

Also in next week's News will be an in-depth explanation about a proposed tax rate increase and tax ratification election that TISD trustees are approving, due to anticipated shortfalls in state funding. Supt. Steve Burleson will provide information to The News explaining the school district's position.

Trustees approved a contract with NCLB Title I with Vickie Luckenbach, regarding federal funds for the district. Action was tabled on approving an auditing firm for 2011-2012.

Prior to the business session, elementary students of music teacher Vivian McAfee performed a musical selection for the group. Singers included Sarah Crank, Branson Jester, Alyssa Rodriguez, Sophie Thomas, Mason Walker and Christian Watson. THS student Skyler McCleskey presented a video about the laptop computers provided to students at the high school. Certificates were presented to FCCLA state qualifiers McKenzy Forsythe, Virginia Lopez, Gabriella Pando, Cari Rodriguez, Jacob Rodriguez, Selena Tello, Dastine White and Tempest White.

All board members were present at the meeting, including Board President Frank McLelland, John Hawthorne, Cathy Box, Jim Bingham, Kent Kahl, Scott Dimak and Abraham Vega.

# **Voters mark choices** in local elections

Lynn County voters marked their choices in several elections in Lynn County Saturday. In the Lynn County Hospital District election for two directors, incumbent W. Calloway Huffaker led the ticket with 203 votes and Sharon Isham was also elected with 152 votes. Also running was incumbent Frances Truehart, who garnered 66 votes, and Bianca Baker had 55 votes.

In the Wilson ISD school board election for two trustees, incumbent Josh Isham was reelected for another term with 48 votes, and write-in candidate Oscar Ortega was elected with 43 votes. Also running were Israel Ramirez with 26 votes, Kim Steen with 18, and Terri Covington with 2 votes.

It was a close election for three seats on the Wilson City Council, with Weldon Menzer in the lead

with 43 votes, and incumbents Helen Stephenson (42 votes) and Dennis Moore (37) also getting reelected. The other contender, Jesus Mendez, carried 12 votes.

Shannon Ash Frankl led the ticket with 129 votes in the O'Donnell City Council election for three seats, followed by Lydia Loera with 77 and incumbent Wayne Mott with 48 votes for a term on the council. Two other incumbents also ran, with Harry Howell garnering 25 votes and Paul Houston getting 24.

Three candidates were seeking two seats on the O'Donnell ISD Board of Trustees. Cade Furlow, an incumbent on the OISD board, led the school election with 106 votes, and Mike Renteria was also elected, with 89 votes. Incumbent Chad Sumners had 81 votes.

IF GOV. RICK PERRY signed the bill last week, and I expect he did, Texas now has a law making it a crime to lie about how big a fish you caught.

But most of you guys who have been adding inches and pounds to the fish you've been telling me about catching need not worry. It's not against the law unless you're doing it to win money in a fishing tournament.

The bill would make it a misdemeanor (and in some cases, a felony) to misrepresent the size, weight or provenance of a fish in a tournament. It went to the governor for signature last week. It mainly addresses cheating in high-level bass tournaments, which sometimes offer high dollar prizes.

In 2009 an angler who entered a bass tournament on Lake Ray Hubbard east of Dallas put a one-pound lead weight inside the stomach of the 10.5-pound bass he had entered to win the grand prize, a \$55,000 fishing boat.

The fishermen I know don't usually enter tournaments. In fact, this one guy who tells me how great he is at fishing probably thinks a tournament is something you twist around a leg after you cut your foot on a broken beer bottle.

Under the new law, which most fishermen apparently are happy with, a violation would be a Class A misdemeanor, unless the tournament prize offered was more than \$10,000, in which case it would be a third-degree felony, punishable by 2 to 10 years in prison and a fine of up to \$10,000.

(Hey, Joe, what's this guy in here for-murder, burglary or what? Oh, he lied about the size of the fish he caught? Okay, put him in the cell with that guy who got caught tearing the tag off the mattress...)







# Gov. Perry renews State Disaster Proclamation due to ongoing wildfire threat

Gov. Rick Perry today renewed his emergency disaster proclamation for the fifth time since it was originally issued on Dec. 21, 2010 due to the ongoing threat of wildfires across the state. The renewed proclamation covers all 254 counties in Texas, and directs all necessary resources be made available to aid response efforts. Since the beginning of wildfire season, local and state firefighters have responded to more than 9,000 fires that have destroyed more than 400 homes and burned more than 2.5 million acres, an area the size of Rhode Island and Delaware combined.

"As Texas continues to suffer from one of the worst wildfire seasons in recent memory, we will continue providing all resources available to fight these fires and protect Texans' lives and property," Gov. Perry said. "I am thankful for the many brave Texans who are putting their lives on the line to contribute to this effort."

On April 15, Gov. Perry sent a letter to President Barack Obama requesting a Major Disaster Declaration for the State of Texas, which would make the state eligible Direct Federal Assistance and Emergency Protective Measures from the federal government. The Obama Administration denied the govetnor's request on May 3. The governor's office is reviewing

all options available and will continue working to secure the much-needed assistance Texas deserves to continue responding to wildfires.

The State of Texas continues to provide assistance to communities threatened by the raging fires this season, including deploying hundreds of Texas Forest Service personnel and air assets to assist with multiple fires; Texas Military Forces personnel and Blackhawk helicopters to assist fire suppression efforts; Texas Department of Transportation bulldozers and other resources as needed in the affected areas; and deploying Texas Department of Public Safety Highway Patrol and multiple communications trailers to the Texas Forest Service Incident Command Post in Merkel, Texas and other areas

across the state. Additionally, the Texas Intrastate Fire Mutual Aid System (TIFMAS) was activated to provide additional resources to fight fires. TIFMAS is a network of Texas fire departments from across the state willing to provide emergency resources to neighboring communities during the threat of disasters. The State Operations Center has been partially activated and continues to work closely with the Texas Forest Service, National Weather Service and other state and local entities to monitor this severe wildfire threat.

# Things parents and grandparents say that can cause eating and weight problems

Parents can sometimes forget that they are raising adults, not children. The goal is to equip kids with the skills and increasing responsibility for managing their lives without constant vigilance, according to Michelle May, M.D., author, board-certified family physician, and expert for TOPS Club, Inc. (Take Off Pounds Sensibly), a nonprofit weight-loss support organization.

Here are seven things that wellmeaning parents commonly say that may have unintended consequences - and what to say instead:

1. You are such a good eater! - Children want nothing more than to please their parents. While mealtime should be a pleasant time to connect with your children, eating should only meet your child's fuel needs, NOT earn your praise.

What you could say instead: You must have been really hungry today! Or, I love spending time with you while we have dinner.

2. You are such a picky eater!
- All children (and adults) have some foods that they just don't like. Some children are highly taste and/ or texture sensitive, but most will outgrow it. Picky eating becomes an entrenched behavior when we berate, beg, bribe - or worse, feed kids only what they say they'll eat.

What you could say instead: I know you didn't like it last time; tell me what you think about it today after you have one polite bite. Or, Did you know your taste buds grow up just like you do? I wonder if you like this big kid food yet?

3. Clean your plate; there are starving children in \_\_\_\_\_. - Avoid teaching children scarcity eating behaviors in our plentiful food environment.

What you could say instead: It's important to not be wasteful, so please only take as much as you think you need. Or, If you're full, we can save the rest for later.

4. You have to eat all your vegetables or there will be no dessert.Kids are smart. When you bribe

them for eating certain foods, they quickly realize that those foods must be yucky and that dessert is the reward. They also learn to hold out until a reward is offered.

What you could say instead:

I love all kinds of different foods
- some that make me healthy and
strong and some that are just for
fun. What kinds of foods do you
like? Or, Enjoy your dinner. We'll
be having dessert later.

5. Eat all your dinner or you don't get dessert. - This variation on the threat above translates to "you must overeat and I will reward you by giving you more!" Children naturally love sweet foods, so they learn to override fullness signals. As an adult, they might be temped to order a 1,200-calorie salad to "earn" a 1,200-calorie piece of cheesecake.

What you could say instead: Save room for dessert tonight!

Now I have to spend an extra hour on the treadmill. - Children are born to move. They naturally love exploring their environment, challenging themselves, and playing actively. Unfortunately, the messages they get from adults teach them that exercise is punishment for eating.

What you could say instead: 1 ate more than I needed and now I feel too full and uncomfortable. 1 think a walk would make me feel better. Want to join me? Or, anybody up for a bike ride?

7. I am so gross and fat! Or, I can't believe \_\_\_\_\_ has let herself go! - Kids learn from us even when we think they aren't listening. Statements like this teach kids that it's okay to put yourself and others down and judge people for their weight or other physical attributes. Pefhaps they also secretly wonder what you really think about them.

What you could say instead: I'm not perfect, but I do my best to make healthy choices.

And whatever else you say, remember to say often... I love you just the way you are.



# USDA authorizes emergency use of CRP acres for 27 Texas counties

USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) has announced authorization of emergency use of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) acres in 27 Texas counties. Eligible producers must request and receive FSA approval for emergency use of CRP acres before they are eligible to graze these acres.

Emergency use of land enrolled in CRP has been authorized for 27 counties including Lynn. Livestock may be tempo-

### Comptroller raises revenue estimate

(AUSTIN) - Texas Comptroller Susan Combs increased her state revenue estimate this week based on a strengthening economy

"I am raising the general revenue estimate for the next biennium by \$1.2 billion," Combs said. Maintaining a cautious outlook for the next biennium, my office estimates sales tax, oil production tax and motor vehicle sales tax will bring in more revenue than previously estimated in the next biennium. We are updating the revenue estimate after reviewing numerous economic indicators and yesterday's franchise tax filing deadline."

The Comptroller is increasing the sales tax revenue estimate for the fiscal 2012-13 biennium by an additional \$1 billion.

The state's motor vehicle sales tax revenue projection for the fiscal 2012-13 biennium is increased by an extra \$100 million.

Oil production revenue is projected to increase by an additional \$400 million for the 2012-13 biennium. Three-quarters of this extra oil production revenue, \$300 million, is constitutionally reserved for future deposit into the Rainy Day Fund and the remaining \$100 million will be available for general revenue spending.

rarily moved to land enrolled in CRP for grazing till September 30, 2011, as approved by the county office, on a case-by-case basis. A 25% payment reduction applies to the authorized acres that will be grazed. Emergency grazing is limited to the acreage physically located within the boundary of the eligible county.

The use of the CRP acreage is authorized for grazing only. CRP participants who wish to provide land to eligible producers must request approval to graze eligible acreage; obtain a modified conservation plan from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to include grazing requirements. If the participant has grazed in the past two years and grass does not currently meet the average height requirement, grazing should not begin. This will be considered a non-compliance issue. Participants must understand that livestock are to be removed the earlier of reaching the average height requirement as determined by NRCS or September 30, 2011.

CRP participants who do not own or lease livestock may rent or lease the grazing to an eligible livestock producer. However the CRP participant is responsible for identifying the acreage to be grazed and the name of the eligible livestock producer. The eligible livestock producer must sign a statement that he or she will not sublease the CRP acreage.

Grazing shall not begin until the COC has provided a written notification of approval to both the CRP participant and livestock producer.

# **Extreme drought crippling Texas agriculture**

The Texas Farm Bureau board of directors, meeting in its regular quarterly session at its headquarters in Waco issued the following statement of ur-

"As wildfires in Texas continue a rampage across more than two million acres, another major disaster is gripping the Lone Star State. Dry weather has a stranglehold on all but a small portion of Texas. Almost the entire state is officially classified in drought-much of it as extreme or exceptional. The seven-month period from October of 2010 to April of this year is officially the driest on record. May is usually our wettest month. Except for a few isolated areas, rain has refused to fall.

"Texas farmers and ranchers are in an extremely critical situation as we prepare for June and the hot summer months. Crops are shriveling in the field. Pastures are burning. Many farmers likely will have little or nothing to harvest. Some ranchers al-



### Comptroller raises revenue estimate

(AUSTIN) - Texas Comptroller Susan Combs increased her state revenue estimate this week based on a strengthening economy.

"I am raising the general revenue estimate for the next biennium by \$1.2 billion," Combs said. Maintaining a cautious outlook for the next biennium, my office estimates sales tax, oil production tax and motor vehicle sales tax will bring in more revenue than previously estimated in the next biennium. We are updating the revenue estimate after reviewing numerous economic indicators and yesterday's franchise tax filing deadline."

The Comptroller is increasing the sales tax revenue estimate for the fiscal 2012-13 biennium by an additional \$1 billion.

The state's motor vehicle sales tax revenue projection for the fiscal 2012-13 biennium is increased by an extra \$100 million.

Oil production revenue is projected to increase by an additional \$400 million for the 2012-13 biennium. Three-quarters of this extra oil production revenue, \$300 million, is constitutionally reserved for future deposit into the Rainy Day Fund and the remaining \$100 million will be available for general revenue spending.

rarily moved to land enrolled in CRP for grazing till September 30, 2011, as approved by the county office, on a case-by-case basis. A 25% payment reduction applies to the authorized acres that will be grazed. Emergency grazing is limited to the acreage physically located within the boundary of the eligible county.

The use of the CRP acreage is authorized for grazing only. CRP participants who wish to provide land to eligible producers must request approval to graze eligible acreage; obtain a modified conservation plan from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to include grazing requirements. If the participant has grazed in the past two years and grass does not currently meet the average height requirement, grazing should not begin. This will be considered a non-compliance issue. Participants must understand that livestock are to be removed the earlier of reaching the average height requirement as determined by NRCS or September 30, 2011.

CRP participants who do not own or lease livestock may rent or lease the grazing to an eligible livestock producer. However the CRP participant is responsible for identifying the acreage to be grazed and the name of the eligible livestock producer. The eligible livestock producer must sign a statement that he or she will not sublease the CRP acreage.

Grazing shall not begin until the COC has provided a written notification of approval to both the CRP participant and livestock producer.







# Lynn roadways scheduled for seal coating projects

More than 291 miles of state roadways are part of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Lubbock District's 2011 seal coat program. Roadways in 16 Lubbock District's counties will see \$11.6 million in preventative maintenance work during the summer months

Seal coat operations are set began in late May. Roadways included in this year's program in Lynn County include:


 Loop 76—from US 87 south to the US 87 access road • FM 2053—from the

Dawson County Line to US 87 "Seal coating provides a variety of benefits to the roadway," said Jim Combes, P.E., Brownfield Area engineer overseeing the project, "including a waterproof surface that prevents moisture from entering and weakening the roadbed. Seal coating also reduces deterioration and cracking of the asphalt surface, which prolongs the life of the pavement."

Other benefits from seal coating include an improved non-skid surface in wet or icy conditions and an anti-glare and increased reflective surface for night and wet weather driving, Combes noted.

# Texas Tech VorTECH simulator helps researchers better understand tornadoes

More than 40 years ago, a massive tornado tore through the heart of downtown Lubbock. It left a path of destruction a mile and a half wide, crippling the city. Twenty-six people were killed, and more than 1500 were

Since then, the Texas Tech Wind Science and Engineering Research Center (WISE) has become the leading research facility of its kind, with a focus on testing wind speed resistance in relation to storm shelters. Recently, they took their research a step further by studying how tornadoes do their damage, with the construction

Center, about 10 miles west of the main campus.

Darryl James, professor in the Department of Mechanical Engineering and WISE associate, and his team spent more than a year and a half building the device known as

of a tornado simulator at Reese "VorTECH was designed to simulate tornadic winds in the mid-EF3 range or less," James said. "Approximately 92 percent of all tornadoes have maximum wind speeds of about 150 miles per hour or less."

simulator eight large fans to suck up approximately 160,000 cubic feet of air each minute, while 64 strategically placed vanes surround the simulator to create

The force of the wind is measured by dozens of pressure sensors applied to structural models. The data collected will contribute to understanding vulnerability.

"If we can understand how the tornadoes interacts and damages a structure, then maybe we can develop building codes to improve the safety of homes," James said.

in the cities of Tahoka, Wilson, New Home and O'Donnell. The animal shelter is located at South 2nd and Ave. H in Tahoka, just southeast of the courthouse.

In another issue, Elrod reminds citizens to please ensure their dog is current on its rabies vaccine, which in most cases should be given annually.


"If your dog bites someone and you have no proof that it is current on its rabies vaccine, your dog will be quarantined at the animal shelter for ten days, at a cost of \$25 per day," Elrod says. "All dogs must have a rabies vaccine.'

Elrod and her assistant, Maria Banda, try to find homes for all animals abandoned at the

"We have kept some dogs for several months while we try to find them a home," said Elrod. "If the animal is adoptable, we try very hard to get it adopted locally or through the Humane Society. We only euthanize an animal as a last resort, or if it is a dangerous animal that we know won't be a good candidate for adoption," she said.

The animal shelter cannot accept monetary donations, but Elrod says they do eagerly accept donated items such as dog food or toys, blankets, dog treats, etc.


