Commissioners had a long meeting Tuesday, beginning at 9 a.m. and continuing until 2:30 p.m., with a one-hour break for lunch. Much of the meeting was consumed with budget talks as county officials brought budget estimates to the table for consideration. Several officials from courthouse offices were present to discuss their budget issues with commissioners, and budget talks are expected to continue throughout the month.

One office, that of the county clerk, requested an increase in funding because of the manpower/office supplies needed to handle the heavily increased workload of accessing and copying records for the oil and gas companies


Heroes in almost all the books I read are portrayed as over 6 feet tall and mostly bulletproof. And the heroines are never overweight and always beautiful.

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees will hold a public hearing tonight (Thursday) for comments on the proposed budget for the 2011-2012 school year. The public is invited to attend the hearing at 6 p.m. at the Harvick Educational Building, 2129 N. Main, in Tahoka.

USDA crop certification deadline is July 15

Lynn County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Rodney Schoppa, reminds producers that the annual crop certification deadline for spring-seeded crops is July 15,2011.

Producers who file accurate and timely reports for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage can prevent the potential loss of FSA program benefits.

"I encourage all producers to visit the Lynn County FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the July 15 deadline in order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements," said Schoppa.

Considering the current drought situation in Texas, producers are also reminded to report crop losses insured through Federal Crop Insurance and the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) within 15 days of the disaster or after the loss is apparent.

USDA-FSA to host four webinars on hispanic and women farmer and rancher claims process

USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Juan M. Garcia announced four webinars (internet-based) to discuss the USDA Hispanic and Women Farmer and Rancher Settlement Claims Process and current FSA loan programs. They are scheduled for July 14, 28 and Aug. 11 at 7 pm. On February 25, Secretary

of Agriculture Tom Vilsack and Department of Justice Assistant Attorney General Tony West announced a process created to resolve the claims of Hispanic and women farmers and ranchers who assert they faced discrimination when seeking USDA farm loans during certain periods between years 1981 and 2000. The optional claims process offers a streamlined alternative to litigation and provides at least \$1.33 billion in compensation, plus up to \$160 million in farm debt relief, to RABIES for Cats & Dogs at the WILSON CITY HALL (side door of the Green Bldg.)







financial accountability and the protocol of how finances are reported. That is something, he says, that he will not be allowed to do anymore, and that

the county will be required to have a person, such as an internal auditor with a background in auditing/financial issues, to be accountable for the county's

"As independent auditors

run ... it won't be dollar for dollar in the first year, or even in the second year, but long term it should. I don't think you will be spending any more than you do now overall. And, the compliance controls will be there for each county office, and this is something that has to be in

place," Eaker added. Commissioners did not take any action on hiring an internal auditor, but said they would

place the issue on their next agenda. Eaker said the position should be filled by September if possible.

Commissioners approved monthly bills before adjourning the meeting at 2:30 p.m. County Judge H.G. Franklin led the meeting with all four commissioners present, including Keith Wied, Danny Martin, Don Blair and Mike Braddock, as well as other county officials.
