Water line renovation project will be approved, says mayor

Tahoka's grant request for funds to replace the city's antiquated waterline system underneath city streets is going to be approved, according to information this week from Mayor John Baker. If it is approved, Tahoka city officials can, finally, see the light at the end of the tunnel for the city's water woes that have plagued city meetings for years. And the best part is, no matching funds have been required for the grant funds from the Texas Water Development Board's Economically Distressed Areas Program (EDAP).

"I have been told by the EDAP project leader that the planning portion of Tahoka's EDAP funding request is expected to be approved at the August meeting of the Texas Water Development Board," Mayor Baker told The News. "Tahoka's project is fifth on a list of six projects that are expected to be approved at the board meeting. We are looking at an initial \$208,000 in grant funds, which should fully fund the engineering/planning phase of the project, and they have indicated that \$1,914,500 will be allocated to us for

the construction phase," he said.

If, as expected, the planning funds are approved in August, Baker says he will "turn the engineer loose on the project" as fast as he can. The city is working with Matt Hopper, an engineer with Wasteline Engineering, Inc., on the project.

"I believe the engineer can get the planning phase completed in six to nine months ... and I'm pushing hard for six months," Baker told The News with a laugh. "The sooner we can get the design completed, the sooner we can apply for the construction funds."

The rush to complete the design is understandable, as the city's underground waterline system is extremely old and fragile, with waterline breaks occurring with increasing frequency. And, almost every time work is required on the line, the entire city water system must be shut off, which is an annoyance for businesses and residents. It occurs with such regularity that the city initiated an automatic call system to notify residents of impending water shutoffs.

"From information I have been

told by the EDAP representatives, they are indicating they will fully fund the amounts requested for both the design and construction phases, and that is terrific news for Tahoka," said Baker. "This project is going to happen."

Baker said EDAP resumed processing grant applications that had been on hold due to uncertainties in state allocations, after the 82nd Legislature appropriated funding for the issuance of approximately \$50 million in bonds to fund the EDAP over the next biennium (Sept. 1, 2011-Aug. 31, 2013).

The mayor received a letter from EDAP that said their goal was to present Tahoka's EDAP funding request at the August board meeting, and he was told by phone that Tahoka's project should be approved.







When you hear the word Asylum, what comes to mind? Do images of white padded rooms, straight jackets, and crazy people bubble to the surface? While it can certainly mean that, it actually has much deeper roots...all the way back to the ancient Hebrew text. Would you believe that Asylum means refuge, a place of safety, shelter- a sanctuary!?

Before the Israelites even entered the Land, God made provision for His People. He told Joshua in Joshua 20:1ff to set up cities of Asylum; places of safety and refuge for those who accidentally took the life of another. These cities were well known and advertised. They were all situated prominently on mountains within a days journey from everyone. The gates to these cities were always open and the roads were to be unobstructed. They were available to

everyone...everyone was welcome. I believe these cities of refuge prefigure Jesus, our Asylum. In Him provision has been made. We can show hurt and pain, for in Him we are made whole. 



Two people attended a public hearing last Thursday about the 2011-2012 budget for Tahoka Independent School District. The hearing was held at 6 p.m., and was followed by a regular school board meeting beginning at 6:30 p.m. during which trustees approved a budget of \$6,124,893 for the upcoming school year.

Compared to last year, the new adopted budget slashes projected total expenditures by \$246,106. The previous year, trustees approved a budget of \$6,370,999 for the 2010-2011 school year.

In other business, board members heard a report from Tonda Freitag, chairperson of the school board's Redistricting Advisory Committee. The committee recommended "Map A" as the map that will have the least effect on the voters in each of the five Single Member Districts. 

First-ever production limits set for water wells:

HPWD Board approves amendments for 50/50 water management goal

LUBBOCK-(July 19) The Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 today approved rule amendments to implement the district's 50/50 management goal to have 50 percent of the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer in 2010 available for use in 2060.

State law requires that groundwater conservation districts adopt and enforce rules to implement and achieve their established management goals in order to maintain local control over groundwater management.

In order to achieve the 50/50 goal, the rule amendments establish the first-ever production limit for groundwater pumpage by water users within the 16-county High Plains Water District service area. This includes agriculture, municipalities, public water suppliers, and others.

"These rules are a good start, but the High Plains Water District Board of Directors and staff are committed to the rules being a living document as we go forward. We know issues will arise that can be addressed through tweaks and adjustments," Board President Robert Meyer of Canyon and General Manager Jim Conkwright agreed.

Beginning in 2012 and continuing through 2013, all persons owning or operating an existing, new, or pre-district well or well system pumping groundwater from the Ogallala Aquifer must limit the total amount of production to 1.75 acre-feet (21 inches) per contiguous acre per year. The production limit drops to 1.5 acre-feet (18 inches) per contiguous acre per year during 2014-2015, and is lowered to 1.25 acre-feet (15 inches) per contiguous acre per year in 2016 and beyond.

In addition, metering of groundwater and submission of annual production reports to the district will be required in the

Beginning Jan. 1, 2012, all new water wells or well systems in the district are required to have a meter in place before pumping can occur. Existing water wells or well systems may measure groundwater through an alternative measuring method from 2012 to 2016. These systems must be equipped with meters no later than Jan. 1,

A list of approved meters and alternate measuring methods will be made available on the High Plains Water District web site on or about Sept. 1, 2011.

Wells or well systems with fully functioning meters as of the date that the District's aproved meter list is nublished

are "grandfathered" and will remain so as long as the meter remains fully functional.

Owners or operators of wells required to be metered must submit annual production reports to the High Plains Water District. The first annual production report is for production during calendar year 2012 and must be submitted to the district no later than March 1, 2013.

The 4-0 vote to adopt the proposed rules was preceded by a public comment period in which agricultural producers and others spoke for and against adoption of the new rules.

Precinct One District Director James Powell of Lubbock thanked those in attendance for their participation in the rulemaking process.

"We may not all be right and we may not all be wrong. But one thing is for certainwhen the water is gone, none of us will be here. We encourage you to stay engaged as the Water District continues the process to meet its 50/50 management goal. I assure you there will be adjustments, as needed, along the way," he said.

Created in 1951 by local residents and the State Legislature, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is charged with the responsibility of conserving, preserving, protecting, and preventing waste of groundwater within its 16-county service area.

Volunteer Fire Departments from O'Donnell, Wilson, Crosbyton, Idalou, Petersburg, Sundown, Wellman, West Carlisle, and Whiteface received funds.

Full disclosure of frac fluid chemicals is coming soon

Elizabeth Ames Chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission (RRC), the energy regulatory agency for the U.S.'s largest oil and natural gas producing state, hopes to finalize a rule-making before the end of the year tó disclose components of the solutions used in the hydraulic fracturing process now so common in drilling natural gas and oil wells.

Jones said, "This rule will provide the additional assurance to the public that a common sense disclosure policy affords, and it will provide operators uniformity and reliability regarding the disclosure process for all wells that are hydraulically fractured in Texas."

"Our rulemaking should not be misconstrued to upend my earlier statements. It is still geologically impossible for fracturing fluid or natural gas or oil to migrate upward through thousands of feet of rock, sometimes miles, to adversely affect ground

"The Texas disclosure rule will formalize the best practices we already expect and this rule codifies what is being done voluntarily by many companies. I am proud to play a role that ensures the implementation of this groundbreaking policy. Hydraulic fracturing has been going on for over 60 years and the practice, along with other drilling technologies, continues to be perfected in Texas," added Jones

On April 26th, the Lubbock Area Foundation and South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) announced the creation of the South Plains Disaster Recovery Fund. "Wildfires have caused widespread destruction in the South Plains area. As a result, our volunteer fire departments have incurred tremendous expenses to protect us from danger. With drought conditions continuing, the likelihood of more fires is high and it is important that we step forward to provide aid to those that we count on for help when our communities are at risk," said Lubbock Area Foundation Executive Director, Kathy Stocco. "The South Plains Disaster Recovery Fund exists to give the people of the South Plains a way to do just that."

Numerous donors who wished to quickly and effectively aid local response and relief efforts stepped up immediately. On May 20th, those donations were distributed as grants totaling \$6,289.97 to Edmonson, Hale Center and Halfway Volunteer Fire Departments. Since that time, additional donations have been received to make further grants possible. The grants awarded on July 7th from the South Plains Disaster Recovery Fund totaled \$8,000. At this time, all contributions have been distributed as grants to volunteer fire departments. Unfortunately, dozens of departments have unmet needs in excess of \$100,000.

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees have scheduled a public hearing on Tuesday, July 26 at 6:30 p.m. to hear comments about the proposed redistricting plan as provided by the Redistricting Advisory Committee. The hearing will be held at the Harvest Educational Center, 2129 N. Main. All are welcome to attend. Tahoka ISD has five geo-

graphical precincts, or singlemember districts, within its area, with precinct lines drawn according to population figures and majority/minority populations within each district. Because the 2010 Census showed a population shift of more than the allowed percentage, according to the Justice Department, the school district must re-draw precinct lines to bring the majority/minority balance back within the required percentages. This process is intended to allow equal representation for minority populations to vote in school board elections.

The TISD Board of Trustees is comprised of seven board members. Of the seven-member school board, five members represent each of the five singlemember districts, and two trustees represent the entire school district at-large.

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

Questions answered about Childhood **Immunizations**

With the upcoming school year just around the corner, some of you may be receiving a notice from the school nurse about immunizations for your child. It is important to know the facts about immunizations and the questions to ask your child's doctor before they receive them.

Since the start of widespread vaccinations in the United States, the numbers of cases of formerly common childhood illnesses, like measles and diphtheria ,have declined dramatically. Immunizations have protected millions of children from potentially deadly disease. The truth is, most of the diseases that our children are vaccinated against, still exist in the world.

The information in this article will hopefully help you as parents better understand the benefits and risks of vaccines.

Vaccines work by preparing a child's body to fight illness. Each immunization contains either a dead or a weakened germ that causes a particular disease. The body practices fighting the disease by making antibodies that recognize parts of that germ. In long term, if someone is ever exposed to that particular disease, the body's immune system already knows how to fight that germ so that the person doesn't get sick.

Probably the most fearful part of having your child immunized is the possibility of them getting the disease the immunization is suppose to prevent. Let's clarify this fear.... It is impossible to get a disease from a vaccine that is made with a dead (killed) virus or bacteria. In some cases vaccines with a weakened or "live" virus, like chickenpox (varicella) or measles-mumps-rubella (MMR) could possibly cause a child to develop a mild form of the disease, but it's almost always much less severe than the illness that occurs when someone is affected with the disease-causing virus itself. The risk of disease from vaccination is extremely small, however if your child has a weakened immune system

caused by another illness, it is important to discuss immunizations with your child's doctor.

You may question that because your child is healthy and active they don't need to be immunized, but the truth about immunizations is that they work to protect the body before the disease strikes, if you wait until your child gets sick, it would be too late for the vaccination to work. The best time to immunize is when your child is healthy.

The lifetime of an immunization depends on the immunization. While there are a few immunizations such a measles and hepatitis B that will protect your child their entire life, there are others that require a "booster" for continued protection against the disease. It is so important to receive "boosters" as recommended by your doctor; because many illnesses that we vaccinate against are making a comeback as they are brought back from other countries by travelers. So be sure you keep a record of vaccinations your child has received so that your child's doctor knows when they. are due for a booster.

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Doctors recommend the following immunizations and will be given at different ages:

- pertussis (Tdap)
- * measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR)

* diphtheria, tetanus, and

- * hepatitis A
- * hepatitis B
- * meningococcal disease (meningitis)
- * human papilloma yoros
- * varicella (chicken pox)
- * polio * Influenza
- * rotavirus

Immunizations can be received through your child's primary care provider; as well they are available through local public health clinics and community health centers.

While we dread the thought of our child having to receive "shots", the shot itself only lasts for a second, but the most important thing to remember is that they will be protected for a long, long time.
