

Thefts, burglaries, fights, vandalism reports filed

Fighting and domestic altercations in the city kept Tahoka Police busy during the last week, and they also investigated two burglaries, a pair of thefts and helped chase down a juvenile fleeing from authorities.

Sheriff's officers this week investigated two new incidents of criminal mischief.

Ty Stark of Tahoka told deputies that tires were punctured on two of his tractors at different locations in the county sometime late Saturday. One was located southeast of Tahoka and the other east of the city. Damage was estimated at \$525.

Mercedes Rohndell, who lives west of New Home, reported that the rear passenger window of her car had been broken out, with the loss estimated at \$150 Monday.

Last Wednesday, police talked to a 28-year-old man accused of knocking down a 47-year-old man in a family dispute. Police said three members of the family involved had been drinking.

A .45 caliber handgun was reported as stolen in a burglary of a garage on Ave. J last Thursday, with a young woman named as a suspect. Danny Follis, owner of the gun, valued it at \$400. Investigation is continuing.

On Monday, police spoke to two

teenagers involved in a fistfight at a residence on Ave. Q. No arrests were made.

Cash and checks totaling \$900 reportedly were stolen from Jesus Moya of Tahoka in a burglary Saturday of the city landfill office.

On Monday evening police and a sheriff's deputy helped chase down and arrest a 16-year-old who had fled from a juvenile probation officer.

Police were advised Monday of a theft of a water heater from a house on S. 3rd St. The water heater, new and not yet installed, and valued at \$314, reportedly was stolen about two months ago.

On Aug. 8, two vehicles collided at the intersection of Ave. L and S. 1st St., with no injuries resulting. Involved were a 2008 Chevrolet pickup driven by Norman Jake Kelln, 77, of Tahoka, and a 2001 Dodge Dakota pickup driven by Sherry Paschal, 55, also of Tahoka.

Lynn County jail this week held 45 prisoners, including 14 for Gaines County and 11 for Hockley County. Charges resulting in jail time here during the last week included aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, misdemeanor assault, driving while license invalid with prior conviction, and driving while intoxicated.


When mailing invitations, I usually get several returned that are local addresses. This certainly ensures everyone on the list does get a card. **Retha Pittman**

Early voting continues for tax elections

Early voting began Monday and continues through Aug. 23 for voters in Tahoka ISD and O'Donnell ISD to mark ballots in both school districts' tax rollback elections. Both Tahoka and O'Donnell ISD are asking voters to approve \$1.17 tax rates to fund school budgets.

Early voting is being conducted at the Lynn County Courthouse basement courtroom for the Tahoka ISD election, and at the O'Donnell ISD Superintendent's Office for the OISD election, during regular business hours.



Madeline Hegi to celebrate 100th birthday ...

family at Madeline's 100th birthday celebration on Sunday. A few years ago, a journalist friend of the family, Perry Flippin, wrote down some of Madcline's memories from her youth, as she visited with him. What follows here are some of those memories, in her words:

"Madeline Cox was born on the family farm just north of Goodrich, Kansas. You should have seen our Cox family farm - we had big timber and a creek running through it, and it was the most ideal place to live as a child. On the day I was born - August 21, 1911 - my father had hired a construction crew to build a silo. The men slept in the barn. My mother got up and cooked their breakfast. At that time, she had two little boys. After breakfast, I suppose she had some pains

so she went to bed and had little ·ol' Madeline. They wanted a girl. That was in my favor. From the very beginning, I was blessed.

The town of Goodrich was about 60 miles south of Kansas City. Not much remains of the little community, but the silo still stands on the Cox farm after 96 years.

My memories still return to childhood days when we raised pigs. We had to carry water from the creek up a slope to a big pigpen that Papa built. If it rained, we'd slide in the mud. I still have scars on my legs where I climbed over a barbed wire fence that snapped. In summers, we'd swing from grapevines that hung from trees along the creek. Then we'd drop into the water. That was fun. When I was a sophomore in high school, the Parker Message (newspaper) sponsored Madeline Cox in the Dairy Princess pageant. They really put me on a high pedestal. My hair looked awful. I was touted to be the winner for eastern Kansas, but the girl whose dad was commissioner won. People said she was ugly, but she had a wonderful personality, and I think that should count. I did a reading, "In the Heart of the Hilltop Pines." For years I could recite that before my memory got worn out.

I wasn't scared - I might have been so excited that I didn't know to be scared.

In 1934, I came to Dawson County as home demonstration agent. When I took that job for \$125 a month, I was asked, "Do you have any (marriage) plans?" No, absolutely not. But, that was before I met Pete Hegi, and that was just something!

I worked a year in Dawson County. I had a room in a house with kitchen privileges and a bed. I later met Sylvia Robb, the Lynn County home demonstration agent in Tahoka. Sylvia came downstairs in the courthouse. She said, "I want you to meet my boyfriend." Truett Smith was a lawyer upstairs in the Tahoka courthouse. She called and he came down. You know what Truett said? "I'm going to call ol' Peter over here. This is just what he's been looking for." That turned me off. It was almost like, "Here's a little filly. Come look

They've made me very happy. Grandkids are the greatest thing in the world.

Everybody was so good to me when Pete died in 1990. Here's the rest of the story: I was devastated, but God spoke to me. I didn't hear him with my ears, but I heard him with my heart: "Now you have more time to do my work." I heard that as plain as your voice only it was in my heart. That's when I really got busier with Kids for Christ. I'm going to keep on with KCs because that's what he intends for me to do. So when I'm gone, you'll say, "Well, KCs are over."

For many years, I've gone to One-Way, which is a Christian camp in Ceta Canyon. We had bear hunts each evening right after supper, when the counselors hid and campers found them. I always hid in a tree. For years, I could climb up a tree, then I came to the point where I needed a camouflage suit and a ladder. Nobody ever found me up in the tree. It was fun. They called me "Grandmother Bear." In Pete's memory, the boys helped finance the construction of The Hegi Chapel at Ceta Canyon.

What have I learned? Little things don't matter. Big things don't matter. It's the day-to-day that matters. I could not live a day without my Lord and Savior. He's my constant. I turn everything over to him. I cannot imagine people living without God or a relationship.

If I were starting over, I wouldn't be so strict on John. One



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

County tax rate to remain same


Lynn County's current property tax rate of \$0.86110 will remain in effect for another year, Lynn County Commissioners decided in a unanimous vote Monday morning. The 86-cent tax rate is lower than this year's effective tax rate of \$0.906053, which is the amount needed to generate the same revenue as the previous year, but commissioners voted to keep the current rate in effect for 2012.

Commissioners reviewed budgets for each county office, and heard a report from Chief Juvenile Probation Officer Bill Schoemann on his department. Changes to CRP will assist producers

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced that the Farm Service Agency (FSA) is modifying its Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) policies to help those affected by sustained drought conditions. Throughout this year of extreme weather, USDA has supported and delivered assistance to farmers, ranchers, and rural communities across the country.

"Many ranchers have been or will be forced to sell livestock due to drought and USDA will do what we can to help our farmers and ranchers during these challenging times," said Vilsack.

The policy changes influence FSA rules governing emergency grazing. The period normally allowed for emergency grazing lasts through Sept. 30, 2011. FSA is permitting farmers and ranchers in drought stricken states who have been approved for emergency grazing, including those in Colorado, Kansas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas, to extend the emergency grazing period to Oct. 31, 2011, without an additional payment reduction.

Producers wishing to participate in emergency grazing must first request permission from the FSA county office by indicating the acreage to be grazed.

As a second condition designed to help livestock producers, FSA will allow producers nationwide to utilize harvested hay from expiring CRP acres when those acres are being prepared for fall seeded crops. Prior to this modification, all mechanically harvested hay was required to be destroyed. This change enables livestock producers to feed the hay that is mechanically harvested to their own livestock or to sell or donate hay. Consistent with existing policy for managed or emergency haying and grazing of eligible CRP acres, rental payments will be reduced by 25 percent for those utilizing this option.

HPWD Board sets Effective Tax Rate

During the Aug. 16 regular meeting, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District Board of Directors unanimously approved a resolution adopting a 2011 tax rate of \$0.00776 per \$100 property valuation for operation and maintenance of the district.

This is the second year in a row that the tax rate has been lowered by the Water District Board of Directors. The 2010 tax rate was \$0.00785 per \$100 valuation. A person with \$100,000 in

property value pays \$7.76 in taxes per year to the Water District under the newly adopted 2011 effective tax rate.

"The Board of Directors are pleased that they could lower the tax rate while expanding programs and activities designed to help conserve groundwater within the district's 16-county service area," said Board President Robert Meyer of Canyon.

Although the tax rate has been lowered, Water District General Manager Jim Conkwright said some residents of the district may see a slight increase in their water district taxes, due to increased property valuations.
