The City of Tahoka and Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc. have negotiated a trade for property that will allow the city offices to move into Lyntegar's current headquarters office on Main Street, while Lyntegar will build a new headquarters facility at the city property currently housing the old Higginbotham Lumber yard at the northwest corner of Lockwood (Hwy. 380) and the U.S. 87 access road.

Members of the Tahoka City Council officially approved the property trade at their June 4 council meeting, finalizing the negotiations with the Lyntegar Board of Directors that will have a positive impact on the community by providing the city with larger city offices and space for public meetings, as well as Lyntegar's plans to build a new headquarters facility in Tahoka that will bring the first new office construction in many years to the community. The trade is for existing property as-is, and no funds are being expended in the trade.

"We are excited about the opportunity to build a new headquarters building here in Tahoka, and this property trade has provided excellent opportunity for both Lyntegar and the city to improve and expand facilities," said Greg Henley, General Manager for Lyntegar. Henley said he anticipates the legal paperwork on the trade to be completed by August, and that demolition of the old Higginbotham facilities will begin in early fall.





Lynn County Commissioners will seek bids for roof repairs on all county-owned buildings, including the courthouse, after the April hailstorm that caused an estimated half million dollars worth of damage in total for county property. Commissioners moved to seek bids to be opened on July 9, with specifications available from the County Judge's office.

In other business, the burn ban was left rescinded in the county, not in effect for unincorporated areas of the county at this time. The budget for Commissioner Prec. 2 was amended to receive funds from the FEMA 2 account to be placed in the Precinct 2 Material and Fuel line item in the amount of \$14,000.

County Treasurer Amy Schuknecht explained the need for a joint server for computers in the county annex building where the Pct. 1 Justice of Peace and Tax Assessor/Collector's office will relocate. Funds for the purchase will be taken from the JP Tahoka Tech Fund.

Monthly bills were approved, and Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin reported on his department's activities.

Budget work sessions were set to start on July 9 and continue all of that week, with each session starting at 9 a.m.

County Judge H.G. Franklin led the meeting, with all four commissioners present including Keith Wied, Mike Braddock, Don Blair and Danny Martin, as well as several other county officials.




