TISD Board sets \$1.13 tax rate;

Kindergarten enrollment is highest since 2004

The Tahoka ISD Board of Trustees met in a special board meeting last Tuesday, August 28, approving the 2012 property tax rate and a budget of \$6.6 million, and hearing a report on enrollment that indicated the largest number of students in kindergarten in the last several years.

The session opened with a public hearing on the proposed 2012-2013 budget and tax rate as required by the state's truth-in-taxation laws. The proposed operating budget was \$6.6 million and the proposed tax rate per \$100 value was \$1.1349, the maximum the district can levy without triggering a roll-back election.

"The purpose of the meeting was to provide information to interested taxpayers about the proposed budget and tax rate and give the public an opportunity to ask questions or provide input," said Superintendent Steve Burleson. He said that school officials estimate that revenue from state foundation funds and local property taxes will balance the proposed budget.


Following the hearing, the Board took action to approve the proposed budget and also approved an ordinance setting the tax rate at \$1.1349 for the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

Supt. Burleson reported that the Tahoka ISD kindergarten class enrollment of 65 students is the highest that it has been since 2004 when they had 60 students.

"The school board approved the hiring of an additional teacher to help reduce the number of students in our kindergarten classes. This will help our teachers to be able to spend more time with each individual student," said the superintendent.

The superintendent also reported a total of 584 students enrolled in the district on the first day of school, down 24 students from the first day of school last year. However, another 14 students enrolled on the second day of school, on Aug. 28, putting the current district enrollment at 598 students.

The next regular board meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 18, at 6:30 p.m. at the Harvick Educational

Who regulates the School Zone flashing beacons?

Do you wonder who regulates the school zone flashing beacon lights? City and school officials in Tahoka have had several calls about the School


Tahoka ISD officials said that due to new state laws, Texas Department of Transportation is obligated to have the School Zone flashing beacons on at the following times:

- 7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m., and
- 2:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.
- There will be no lights flashing during the noon hour.

The school zone flashing beacon lights are not under the jurisdiction of local school or city officials. However, local officials urge drivers to watch for children crossing streets at any time during the school day.

Cell Phone Use Prohibited by Drivers in School Zones

Remember, it is illegal for drivers to use cell phones while driving near school facilities. The law prohibits drivers from using their cell phones in school zones, and signs are posted. Violators can be fined up to \$200 per incident.

Harvest Festival is next Saturday

The 37th Annual Lynn County Harvest Festival will be held at the courthouse square in Tahoka next Saturday, Sept. 15, featuring live entertainment, a classic car show, art/ photo show, food booths, games, and cash prizes from audience participation. 

A PHOTO OF the statue "The Thinker" recently caught my attention, causing me to do a little thinking of my own, wondering if the famous artwork depicted any qualities I could relate to.

The answer was no, not much, except maybe a hard head. The bronze and marble statue first cast by French artist Auguste Rodin in 1902, shows an athletic-looking nude man seated with one elbow braced on a knee and leaning slightly forward to rest his chin on his hand. My reference didn't say how large the statue is, but it appears to be pretty large. That's a description that might fit me, but only in one direction.

The original casting of Rodin's statue is now in a museum in Paris, France. Some other castings of the statue were made, and one is at the University of Louisville in Kentucky.

About the only thing I recalled about The Thinker was from an old Laurel and Hardy movie where they were looking at the statue, and Oliver Hardy asked Stan Laurel, "What do you suppose he's thinking about?" The reply was, "He's trying to remember where he left his clothes."

Well, sitting around naked isn't appealing to me, especially since my picture, like Dorian Grey's, seems to get older and fatter every year. (Unlike Dorian Grey, the real me also has a whole broader

Chiefs outlast Bulldogs 26-20 in season opener

Crosbyton came back with two fourth-quarter touchdowns to beat Tahoka 26-20 here last Friday, despite a good offensive effort by the Bulldogs.

This week Coach John Cornelius will take his team to Ralls, which also lost a close opener at Sudan, 21-13.

Kordell Baker scored touchdowns both rushing and receiving for Tahoka, and Preston Hammonds scored on an 87yard pass reception from QB Trystan Hilger, who passed for 207 yards, including the two touchdowns.

Crosbyton led 14-8 at the end of the first period, and the game was tied at 14 at halftime. Tahoka took a 20-14 lead before Crosbyton running back Nathan Childers scored two touchdowns in the fourth to win the game.

Ke'Shawn Hood led Tahoka running backs with 78 yards on 16 carries. Baker had 55 yards rushing and 79 yards receiving. Hilger carried 10 times for 47 yards in addition to his 207 yards passing, hitting 11 of 19 with two touchdowns. Ray Parmer ran the ball 6 times for 34 yards. Tahoka had 421 yards of offense to 310 for Crosbyton.





"I've always had a kind of administrative philosophy of trying to get the best people to do the job," Smith said. "Get smarter people than you are around you, and you will be successful. Of course, getting them smarter than me wasn't a very high bar."

Smith's laughter returns, followed by another swig of Pepsi and then another look back.



said. That legislation was followed by the Hatch Act in 1887, which established experiment, or research, stations to study particular agriculture issues in connection with the public land-grant university, Smith noted. And the Smith-Lever Act was tacked on in 1914 to establish the county agent structure that would take the information from the universities and research stations to the local producers, where it would be applied to grow more and healthier food and fiber crops

for the people. "I'm often asked if that model fits in 2012," Smith said. "And I say it was important in 1700, it was important in 1900 and it will be important in 2500. Because it starts by asking the people what's important to their economic or health or social livelihood, and then brings the science to meet those issues in their locality. That gives people the ability to make informed de-

Smith swallows more Pepsi and pauses after rehashing his career.

"I have tried to make it fun for all the folks I've worked with in Extension," he said. "There's always a job to be done and when you can do it using your own talents, then the job is fun all the time."

"Fun" will take another form in his career as Smith considers the next turn on his path.

"I've never golfed, never fished, never hunted and I don't have any hobbies. So I've obviously got to find something fun to do. I need to get in shape. Maybe you'll see me on TV 'Ed Smith Does Yoga' telling everyone to stretch or whatever. I told my wife I would be hers 24/7/365 and she said she was going back to work," Smith said through deep laughter.

"Actually, I have two grandkids in Houston and two in Austin, along with my sons and their wives. So I have lots of grandpa-type stuff to deal with," he said. 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September is National Breakfast Month

Texas AgriLife Extension Agent September is National Breakfast Month and for many people. breakfast is a low priority or not one at all. If you think you are saving time or cutting calories by skipping breakfast, think again. Making a healthy breakfast a part of your morning can help get you on track to make healthier choices throughout the day, increase your physical activity, and help curb overindulging on convenience foods and overeating at lunch. A healthy breakfast replenishes your body and can have a positive impact on your general

Check out these tips on why a healthy breakfast is important and how to make it happen.

Tips on Making Breakfast a Priority: Skipping Breakfast and Weight Gain. Skipping breakfast may increase your chances for weight gain. Eating breakfast can help reduce hunger and avoid overeating. Skipping breakfast may leave you feeling famished, leaving the door open for temptations such as candy, chips, and other foods from the vending machine. When you are at the grocery store try buying portable breakfast items such as fruit, low-fat yogurt, and whole grain breakfast or granola bars for when you are on the go.

Breakfast and Academic Performance. Research shows skipping out on breakfast can negatively impact children's academic performance. As children get older they are less and less likely to eat breakfast. The American Dietetic Association states that children who eat a healthy breakfast are more apt to have better concentration, alertness, creativity, miss fewer days of school, and be more

The Health Benefits Breakfast. Research shows that those who eat breakfast regularly, are more likely to have a healthier. overall diet. Healthy options include whole grains (oatmeal, whole grain cereals and breads), low-fatprotein (peanut butter, lean slices; of poultry, meat, or fish), low-fat. dairy (low-fat milk, yogurt and cheeses), and fruits and vegetables (fresh or frozen or 100% juices).

Healthy Breakfast Ideas Small whole-wheat bagel with peanut butter, a banana, and a glass of skim or low-fat milk. Oatmeal with skim or low-fat milk topped with dried or fresh fruit and chopped nuts. Breakfast parfait made with low-fat yogurt, fruit, and low-fat granola. Sandwich made with whole grain English muffin, turkey. bacon, and low-fat cheese. Most: people say they don't have time; for breakfast. If that is the case buy portable breakfast items such as fruit, low-fat yogurt and whole grain breakfast or granola bars.

If you are one of the many people who skip breakfast, start eating breakfast this month and make it a routine. Plan ahead to eat breakfast, this means deciding the night; before so you will save time in the

Pursuant to Article 258.002 (c) of the Texas Transportation Code, the Commissioners Court of Lynn County, Texas provides this notice to the public of its intention to convene a public meeting to receive comment upon the adoption of a County Road Map including each road in which the County claims the continued existence of a public interest and a right of access and egress for maintenance of any existing County Road. The roads in which the Countyclaims a public interest have been maintained for many years beginning some time prior to 1981, and a list of said roads will be included in your ad valorem Tax statement. A proposed County Road Map depicting each road in which the County claims a public interest has been available for inspection by the public in the basement of the County Courthouse, during business hours, commencing September 1, 2012.

The commissioners Court will conduct a public hearing on October 22; 2012 at 9:00 A.M., in the Lynn County Courthouse. At this time, pursuant to Article 258.002(b), Texas Transportation Code, any person asserting a private right, title or interest in a road may appear before the Commissioners Court to object or protest the County's claim of its right to continue maintenance of the public roads depicted on the County road Map. Any person asserting a private right, title or interest in a road may also file a written protest with the County Judge at any time before the time and date of the scheduled public hearing. way of this procedure, the County makes no claim affecting title, acreage, or ownership of the land, but seeks merely to establish and document the right of the County to continue maintenance of the existing county road in its present location and dimension.

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Notice of Tax Revenue Increase



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


