The McRoberts' rate of interest on the 35 year issue was broken down as follows: 1951-65, \$24,000, 23/4%; 1966-75, \$45.000, 31/4%; 1976-85, \$81,000, 3%. JUDGE SAYS DECISION OFFERS NO BASIS FOR SUIT

The Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Co. today revealed for the first time that, contrary to the claims of the anti-trust lawyers a previous decision against the company at Danville, Ill., in the words of the presiding judge could not be the basis for the current suit to destroy the A&P.

In a nationwide newspaper advertisement, A&P disclosed that Federal Judge Walter G. Lindley, who presided over the 1946 Danville case, said shortly thereafter in a letter explaining his decision:

"I have not condemned the A&P system. I have not made a finding which could be the basis for a suit of dissolution.'

The letter contradicted the repeated claims of the anti-trust lawyers that the same Danville decision is the basis of their present suit in federal court at New York to compel A&P to dispose of its seven retail store divisions and its manufacturing plants, and to dissolve the Atlantic Commission Company, its fresh fruit and vegetable buying subsidiary.



"When chronic disease is menthink of the problem as being confined to the middle-aged or older," the health chief said, adding that such an idea was not consistent with the facts.

The term chronic, Dr. Cox explained, means the opposite of acute. When applied to a disease, chronic means of long duration. That would mean cancer or tuberculosis is chronic, while smallpox or poliomyelitis is acute.

"The significant thing," Dr. Cox indicated, "is that the chronic disease classification cause one-third of all deaths among young people in the 15-29 age bracket.



> But rural electrification in Texas is past the stage where the accent is on the extension of lines. It is developing to a point which will create a new problem, arising from an increased farm use of power to create income. In December of 1941, the average power use per farm for that month was 45 kile watt-hours. In December of 1949, it was 90 kilowatt-hours. The national average is 141 kwh. This constantly increased demand for power on the farm eventually is expected to throw an additional strain on Texas' power sources. Even now many suppliers are nearing the limit of their capacity to produce dependable service. Co-op eaders are hoping for new dams to provide more hydroelectric power to meet the increased demand.

Texas' 77 rural electric co-ops now have a monetary value of more than \$125 million. 
