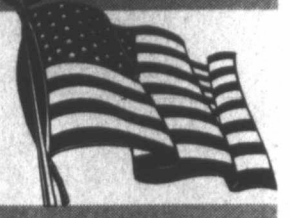

Health Fair slated at LCHD next Thursday

Lynn County Hospital District is sponsoring a county-wide Adult Health Fair next Thursday, Oct. 11, with free screening in several health categories, as well as a flu shot clinic for \$15 and information available on a variety of topics. This year's health fair will be held at the hospital, with participants invited to enter through the front lobby of the hospital, with the event set up in the front hallway from 9:00 a.m. until 2:30 p.m.

Healthcare professionals will offer free screenings for bone density, blood pressure, glucose and cholesterol, body fat, and heart rate. Flu shots will available for \$15, or bring a Medicare card.

Information will be available about dental care, food and nutrition, weight management programs, personal emergency response systems, home health care, health insurance, diabetes care, GED and ESL classes, and tobacco/alcohol/drug and mental health information.

With the exception of the \$15 flu shots, everything is free and provided by local and area businesses and healthcare organizations.

'Movie on the Square' offered Saturday night

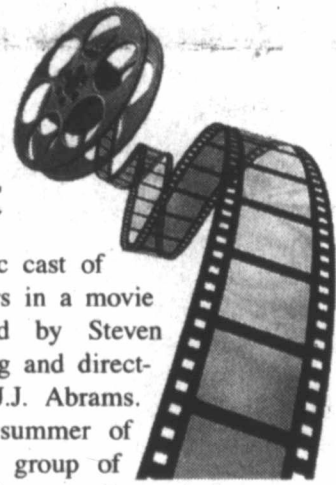
Bring your lawn chairs - and blankets - to the Lynn County Courthouse lawn this Saturday night, Oct. 6, for a free Movie on the Square - it's the Harvest Festival movie that was postponed due to weather on the night of the Harvest Festival. The weather forecast for this Saturday is cool, however, so come prepared for a possibly chilly night. Also, be aware that if the weather turns wet, the movie may be cancelled at the last minute, as the projector equipment can not get wet.

The movie will begin at dark, between 7:30-8 p.m. Bring quilts or lawn chairs for seating on the courthouse lawn. The movie will be shown on the wall of Tejada's Café, facing the courthouse, and admission is free. Lynn County Hospital District will have cotton candy, popcorn and soft drinks available for purchase, so bring money for snacks. The proceeds from the LCHD concessions will go towards cancer research, through the American Cancer Society's Relay For Life event.

The feature stars Elle Fanning and

a terrific cast of teenagers in a movie produced by Steven Spielberg and directed by J.J. Abrams. Area gins begin processing cotton

Area cotton gins have begun processing cotton during late September and the early days of October, with Weaver Farms (Billy and Sue Weaver) reportedly bringing in the first bale on Sept. 17 at Texas Star Gin, which has operations in both Wilson and Union. As of Monday, the bale count was reported at 1,379 for Texas Star.

New Home Coop-Lakeview Gin processed their first bale on Sept. 26, from producer Mark Clem, reporting a bale count of 38 on Monday, and Wells Coop Gin reported their count at 41 with the first bale on Sept. 27, from producer Ronnie Gardenhire.

Grassland Coop Gin began processing cotton this week, reporting that producer Ty Stark had brought in cotton for processing on Monday, Oct. 1.

Farmers Coop Gin in O'Donnell officials said they expect to begin processing this week, and Farmers Coop Gin in Tahoka said they would



start operations in a week to 10 days. Woolam Gin in O'Donnell has not yet begun processing. No information was available from Close City Gin in Post early this week.

The total weekly bale count from these seven gins is at 1,458 bales this week. The weekly bale count will be listed in The Lynn County News until the harvest is finished.

Lynn County Appraisal District mailed out Tax Statements on Oct. 1. Taxes may be paid through Jan. 31 without penalty or interest. Beginning Feb. 1, penalties and interest will be added monthly for late payment of property taxes.

NOTE regarding optional QUARTERLY INSTALLMENT PAYMENTS: Homeowners who are qualified for the age 65 or older or disabled homestead exemptions, may pay their current taxes on their home in four installments. Please call 806-561-5477 or come by the Appraisal Office to sign up for the installment option. At least one-fourth of the current taxes must be paid before the Feb. 1 delinquency date. The remaining payments are due before April 1, June 1, Aug. 1, without any penalty or interest. If you miss an installment payment, you will face a penalty and also pay interest at 1 percent for each month of delinquency. You must indicate on your first payment that you are paying your home taxes in installments. Installment payments apply to all taxing units on the tax bill.

THE LOONEY LADY on Ave. L says she is selling her car so she will have enough money to pay for the insurance on it.

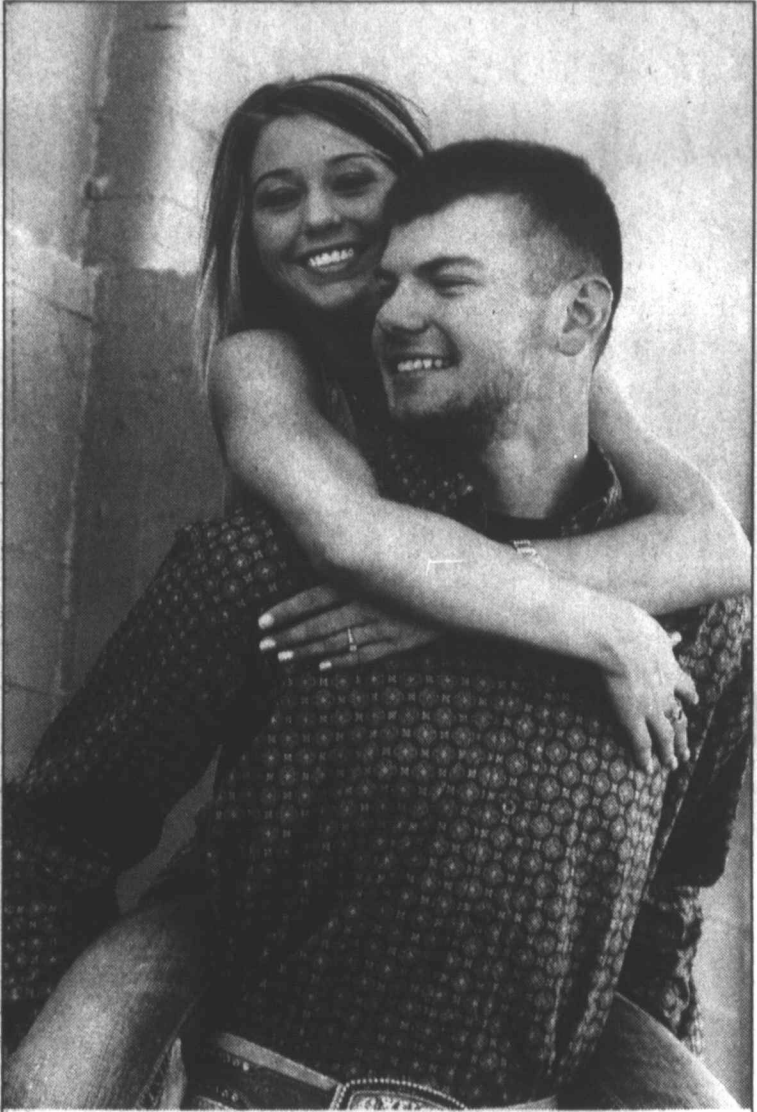

Home-Making Cottage Opened

Tahoka High School Home-making Department moved early this week into the new brick "Cottage" recognized as being one of the most modern and revolutionary buildings of its type in all Texas.

Plans of the structure were drawn by Arnold Maeker of Lubbock, and Everton Nevill of Tahoka was the builder.

Fully equipped, the building has cost about \$37,000 or approximately \$3,000 under the lowest bidder's estimate.

Located southwest of High School at the corner of North Second and Miller streets, the building faces northwest. It covers 2,900 feet of floor space, is constructed of rose chip brick, has turquoise and aluminum trim, and resembles a private residence in appearance. Construction was begun about September 1.

The building includes an entrance foyer, combination

living and dining room, food laboratory, pantries, clothing laboratory and storage space, a model bedroom, bath, restrooms and central heating and cooling.

The living room of the rambling brick structure features modern blonde sectional furniture and end and coffee tables, with wrought iron dining chairs. Rose chip brick planter boxes add to the effectiveness of the scheme.

The foods laboratory has six kitchen units with three gas and three electric stoves. One kitchen unit is a demonstration unit with island surface unit and nearby wall oven.

The sewing laboratory has blonde drop-leaf cutting tables and 96 tote drawers for individual students. There are seven new sewing machines.

The bedroom is also furnished in modern blonde furniture. The bedroom and living rooms are carpeted, and the rest of the building has in-laid tile floor coverings.

Mrs. Fred B. (Madeline) Hegl, teacher, says the draw draperies to cover the aluminum trim windows will be made by the girls of the department as a project.

An "open house" will probably be held early in April in the new building.

Remodel Old City Hall for Boy Scouts, Library

Tahoka Scout organizations and the Lynn County Library will soon have a new home as a result of efforts by the Tahoka Rotary Club, the Tahoka City Council, and contributions of funds by businessmen and other citizens.

Recently the Council voted to donate the old City Hall building 40 by 50 feet in size to the Scouts.

Since the Rotary Club is the sponsoring agent of the Boy Scout troop, President Winston C. Wharton named a committee composed of H.W. Carter, Calloway Huffaker, Fred McGinty, A.M. Bray, Ronald Sherrill, Herman Heck and Otis Spears to consider moving the building to the new City Park.

However, an agreement was reached with the City Council to leave the building in its present position if modernized.

The committee, Herb Carter principally, raised \$760 in contributions and work of refinishing the building has already been started.

Rotarians also voted to give a portion of the building to the Lynn County Library Association, which now maintains the library in the basement of the courthouse.

A new roof was put on the building last week. Both the outside and inside will be improved and modernized.

More funds will be needed for completion of the project in a creditable manner, and Carter invites any individual or organization interested to help out financially on the project.

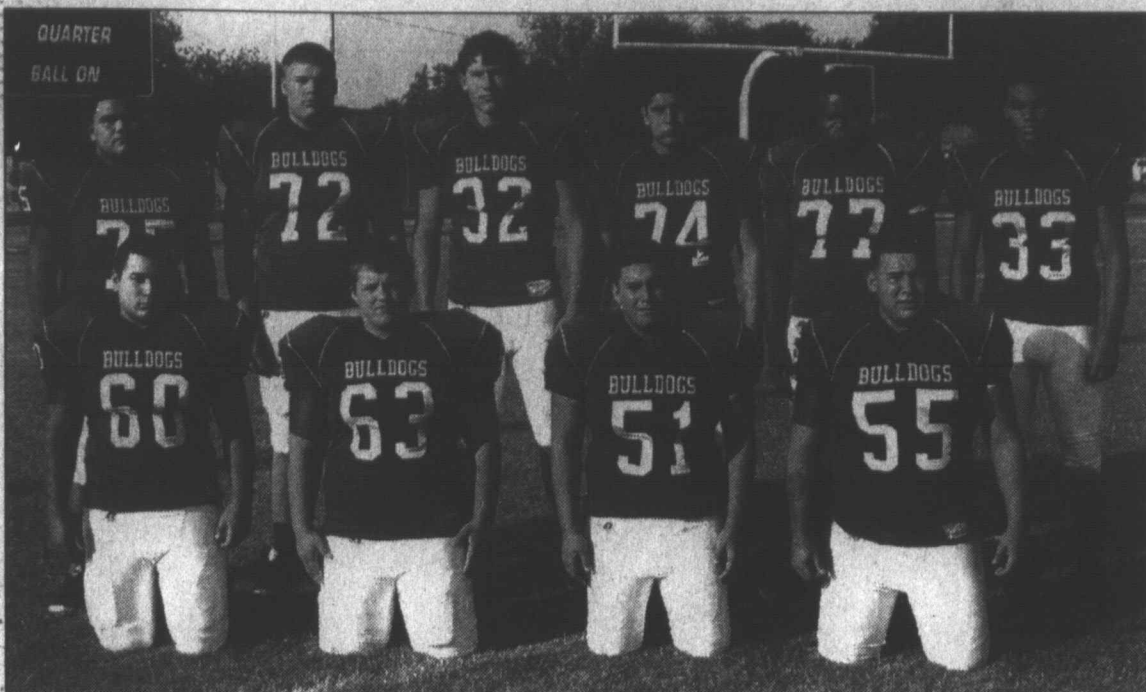

Tahoka Bulldogs down Plains Cowboys 29-14

Ke'Shawn Hood ran for 184 yards in only 16 carries and scored two touchdowns as the Tahoka Bulldogs dominated Plains 29-14 here for their second win of the season.

This Friday night Coach John Cornelius will take his Bulldogs, now 2-3 for the year, to Anson, who downed Coleman 26-9 last week. It will be the final non-district game for Tahoka.

Hood opened scoring Friday with a 31-yard run in the first quarter, and an extra point attempt failed. Tahoka went ahead 12-0 early in the second when Preston Hammonds passed 4 yards to end Smith McLelland for a touchdown.

Plains came right back to score on a 32-yard pass from Zack Wilkins to Omar Calderon, and it was 12-7 after Wilkins kicked the extra point.

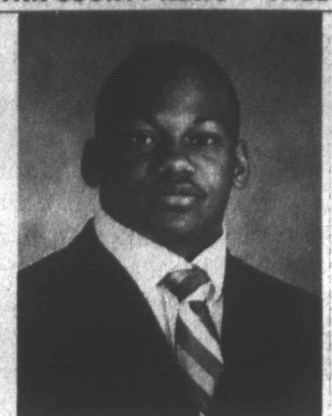
Tahoka's lead went to 20-7 before halftime when Dillon Trevino ran in from 5 yards out, and two more points were added on a pass from Trystan Hilger to McLelland.

Plains cut the lead to 20-14 near the end of the third quarter on a 28-yard run by Wilkins, whose kick added another point.

Early in the fourth period, the Bulldogs got a safety when

the ball was snapped over the head of a Plains punter. Then Hood eluded defenders on a 27-yard touchdown run midway of the quarter, and an extra point kick by John Ryan Barrientez ended scoring.

Hood's rushing led the offense, and QB Hilger added 52 yards in 9 carries, with Ray Parmer gaining 33 on 8 efforts. But a strong defense held Plains to less than 2 yards per rushing attempt. Leading tackler was Luke Hawthorne with 14. Parmer had 11 and Mikkel Garza and McLelland each had 10. Hilger and Swade Hammonds had interceptions.

A wide variety of projects and volunteer efforts may be recognized through the Governor's Award. The John L. Nau, III award recognizes an individual in the museum field for significant achievement. The award is presented at the facility that earns the distinction. Anyone may submit a nomination in accordance with the guidelines

Nine jailed here in last week

Ten persons were being held in Lynn County jail early this week, including three held for Gaines County.

Nine were jailed last week, including one man arrested on three separate charges related

to criminal non-support in child support plus two charges of criminal trespassing. Others were charged with driving while intoxicated, assault on family member with previous conviction plus evading arrest with previous conviction, hunting plus failure to appear, possession of marijuana, possession of marijuana under two ounces, driving while license invalid with previous conviction, bond surrender and failure to appear on charges of assault causing bodily injury/family violence, DWI third offense or more.

Dispatchers at the sheriff's department processed 295 calls in September, including 137 for the county, 123 for city of Tahoka, 8 for O'Donnell, 23 ambulance calls and 4 fire alarms.

Ashley West has been named the new Animal Control Director of the Lynn County Animal Shelter, according to information this week from County Judge H.G. Franklin. She officially began her duties on Monday, Oct. 1, and is working under the jurisdiction of Lynn County Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin.

Jesus said to [his disciples], "... This poor widow put more in the offering box than all the others." - Mark 12:43 (TEV)
Our church holds a fall soup supper as our weather gets colder. Rather than setting a charge for the meal, we ask for a freewill donation. These donations go to help local services assisting those in our community who need help to pay heating bills, food, and clothing.
Last fall as the aromas of homemade chili and chicken-noodle soup filled the fellowship hall, I found myself quietly observing what people were dropping in the donation basket. Some would write a check, others dropped many bills, and some would give a single large bill. There were a few who gave only a few coins. This bothered me. I felt those people were taking advantage of us and getting a free meal. I went to the pastor, explaining my observations, and asked, "Do you think we should suggest a price for the meal?"
He replied, "We should not even look at the donation basket. A freewill donation means people give freely what they feel called to give. Maybe they need the fellowship as much as they need the soup."
His words were liberating. I was reminded of the story of the widow who gave all she had -- a few coins. Every time I serve a bowl of soup, I remember the lesson I learned that cold fall evening: I am not to judge others for what they give -- or don't give.
Thought for the Day: What others give is not my concern; what I give is.
PRAYER: Dear God, help us give freely and not judge what others do. Bless all our gifts to the good of all your children. In Christ's name. Amen.

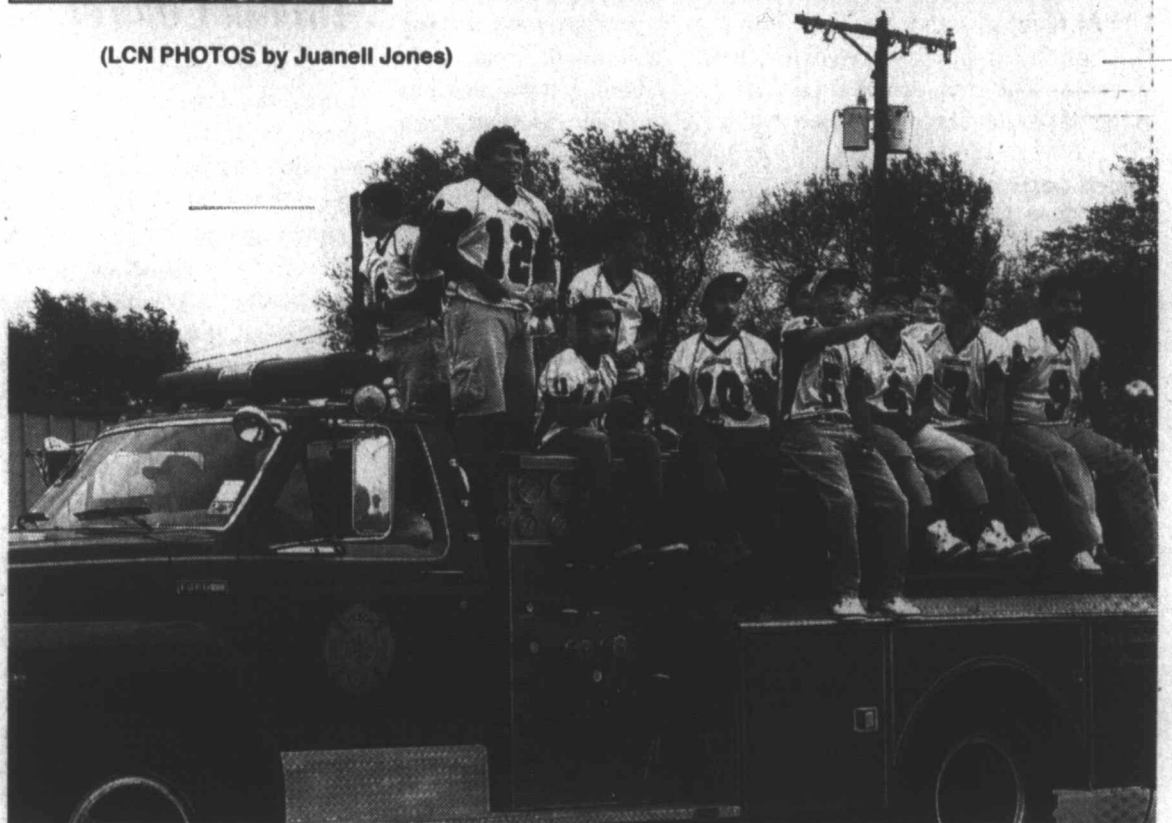

Hunter education course offered at Post for youth, adults in area

A hunter education class has been scheduled for October 20 and 21, beginning at 8:00 a.m. at the Post High School cafeteria, according to Drew Spencer, Garza and Lynn County Game Warden and Hunter Education Instructor. Spencer adds that the class on Saturday will run until 5 p.m., with students allowed an hour and a half lunch break. Sunday's class will be from 1:00-5:00 p.m. Students will be required to attend class both days.

According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, if you were born on or after September 2, 1971, and you are:

- under 9 years of age, you must be accompanied, or
- age 9 through 16, you must successfully complete a hunter education course, or you must be accompanied, or
- age 17 and over, you must successfully complete a hunter education course; or purchase a "Hunter Education Deferral," and you must be accompanied.

Spencer points out that "accompanied" means: by a person who is at least 17, who is licensed to hunt in Texas, who has passed hunter education, or

is exempt (born before September 2, 1971), and who is within normal voice control. Proof of certification or deferral is required to be on your person while hunting.

However, any individual may take the course on a voluntary basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of requirements, according to Spencer.

"The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instruction in modern firearms and primitive sporting arms handling and safety, outdoor responsibility and ethics, laws and regulations, wildlife conservation and management, hunting traditions, field care of game and wilderness first aid and survival," Spencer added. "I'm hoping better attendance than my two classes last year. With youth deer and turkey season opening the following week, there should be higher demand."

The minimum age for certification is 9 years and cost is \$15. Students 9 years of age or older successfully completing the course will be issued a "Temporary Student Card" at the end of the course. Students will then receive an original "Hunter Education Certificate" from Texas parks and Wildlife after processing the paperwork. Those less than 9 years of age will receive a "Certificate of Attendance," but must take the course again after turning 9 for proper certification.

Free webinar offered on open-space land appraisal

(AUSTIN) — The Comptroller's office will offer a free webinar on open-space land on Thursday, Oct. 11. The webinar will provide an overview of the legal requirements for appraising open-space land. Productivity values from open-space land, such as agriculture and timberland, are determined by the appraisal process.

Appraisal district staff, property tax professionals, taxpayers and landowners will find the presentation both informational and useful.

Landowners have specific responsibilities and rights in the appraisal process including the following:

- Applying for the special appraisals;
- Notifying the Central Appraisal District when land no longer qualifies for special appraisal; and
- Having the right to protest market or productivity value, change of use or non qualification for special appraisal.

USDA Announces Supplemental Revenue Assistance Sign-Up

Farm Service Agency Administrator Juan Garcia announced the sign-up period for the 2011 crop year Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) program will open Oct. 22. The SURE program is part of the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (Farm Bill). Under the 2008 Farm Bill, SURE authorizes assistance to farmers and ranchers who suffered crop losses caused by natural disasters occurring through Sept. 30, 2011.

Any eligible producer who suffered losses during the 2011 crop year is encouraged to visit a local FSA office to learn more about the SURE program and how to apply," said Garcia. As of Sept. 30, 2011, the Department's authority to operate the SURE program expired along with four other, important disaster assistance programs: the Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP); the Emergency Assistance to Livestock, Honey Bees, and Farm-Raised Fish (ELAP); the Livestock Forage Disaster Program (LFP); and the Tree Assistance Program (TAP). Production losses due to disasters occurring after Sept. 30, 2011, are not eligible for disaster program coverage.

To be eligible for SURE, a farm or ranch must have: At least a 10-percent production loss on a crop of economic significance; A policy or plan of insurance under the Federal Crop Insurance Act or the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) for all economically significant crops; Been physically located in a county that was declared a primary disaster county or contiguous county by the Secretary of Agriculture under a Secretarial Disaster Designation. Without a Secretarial Disaster Designation, individual producers may be eligible if the actual production on the farm is less than 50 percent of the normal production on the farm due to a natural disaster. A "farm" for SURE purposes means the entirety of all acreage in all counties that a producer planted or intended to be planted for harvest for normal commercial sale or on-farm livestock feeding, including native and improved grassland intended for haying.

Producers considered socially disadvantaged, a beginning farmer or rancher, or a limited resource farmer may be eligible for SURE without a policy or plan of insurance or NAP coverage.

Farmers and ranchers interested in signing up must do so before the June 7, 2013 deadline. For more information on the 2011 SURE program, visit any FSA county office or www.fsa.usda.gov/sure.

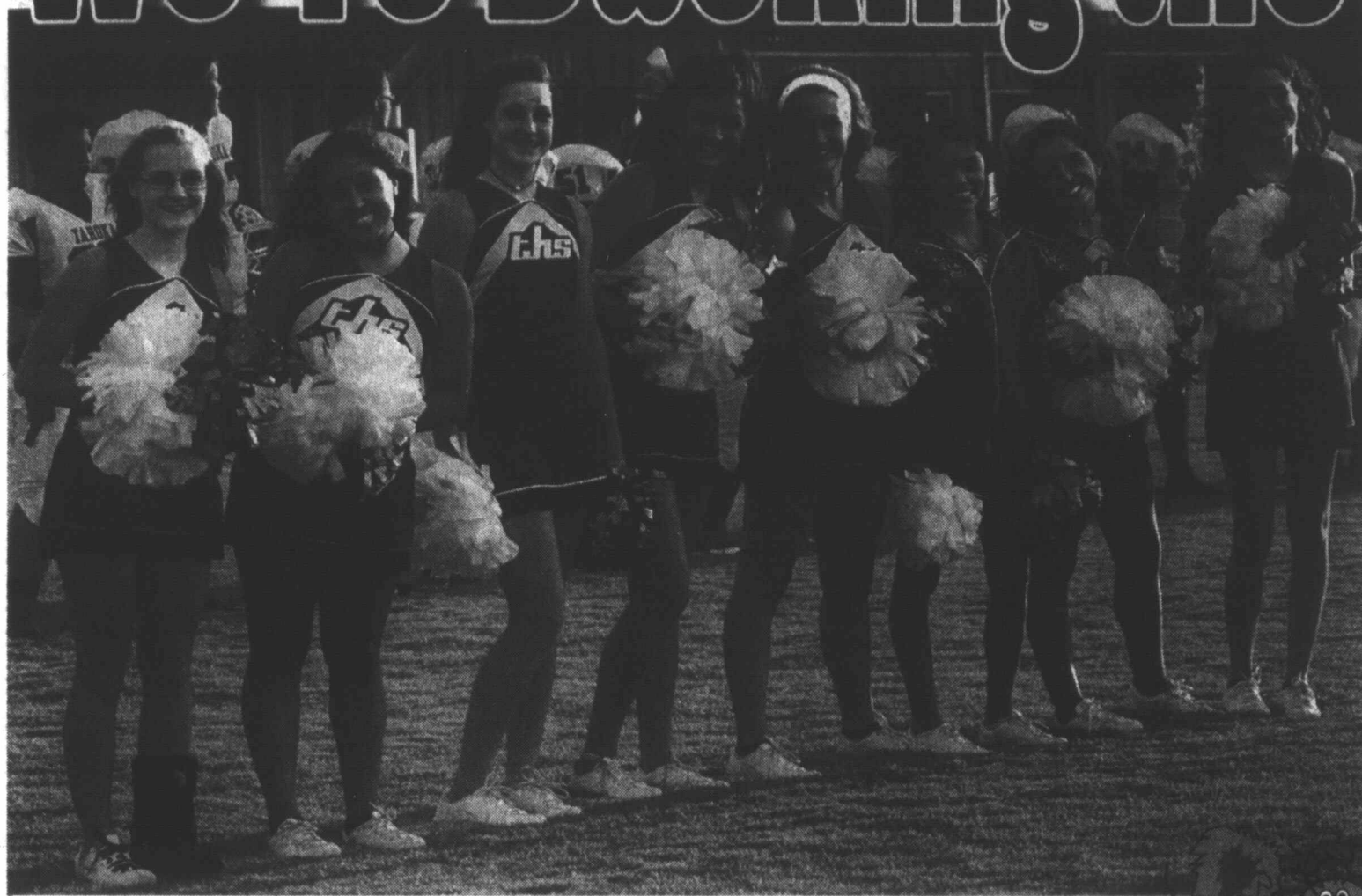
