"We will have over 30 original 8x10 matted and framed prints on display," Rachel Lehman, adviser said.

"We had our first art show a couple of years ago, and it was very successful," Lehman said. "The staff members asked if they could do one again this year so we are. The art classes have some really great projects so we asked them if they wanted to join."

The purpose of the photography project, which is titled "Our School, Our Town – 2012," is to learn what makes up a good photograph: good lighting,


composition, and angles. The students then use Adobe Photoshop to manipulate the photographs.

"Our goal is to raise enough money to replace the large framed posters that we made the last time we did a similar project."





Midland man, 55, dies in collision on U.S. 87

Daniel Pennell, 55, of Midland, died just after 6 p.m. last Thursday when his pickup overturned and rolled into the path of an 18-wheeler going the opposite direction on U.S. 87 about 200 feet south of the Tahoka city limits.

Fatal accident ... A Midland man was killed in a wreck just south of the Tahoka city limits Thursday

when his northbound pickup (lower left) careened across the median and up the incline and then over-

turned in the path of an 18-wheeler going southbound on U.S. 87.

A Dept. of Public Safety report said Pennell lost control of his northbound 2004 Dodge Ram pickup, which then

crossed the median and overturned into traffic on the southbound lane. A 2008 Kenworth semi tractor-trailer driven by Joseph Martinez of San Antonio struck

Pennell, who was pronounced dead at the scene at 6:15 p.m., reportedly was wearing a seat belt when the accident happened. A DPS spokesman said Tuesday that no charges have been filed in relation to the socident.

in relation to the accident.

DPS Cpl. John Gonzalez also reported that DPS officers re-enacted the accident the next day to try to determine what happened before, during and after the crash, "but still are unsure of how or why the driver lost control of his vehicle—but it did cross the median, run up on the side of the incline and came down in the path of the truck."

Twenty-two persons were being held in Lynn County Jail early this week, with nine held for Andrews County and three for Gaines County. Among the more recent detainees was a 34-year-old Tahoka man arrested by Tahoka police and charged with assault causing bodily

City approves zoning ordinance for sales of alcoholic beverages

In special session Monday night, Tahoka City Council approved an amendment to the City of Tahoka Code of Ordinances for zoning regulations that would affect businesses that engage in the selling of alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption. The amendment is Article 4.50 Alcoholic Beverages in the city code of ordinances.

"Basically, the zoning ordinance follows the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission regulations, for local retail zone C-1 in the Tahoka city limits," City Administrator Jerry Webster told The News. "Everything is regulated by the TABC, and we followed those regulations," he explained.

The zoning regulations include prohibiting the sale of alcoholic beverages within 300 feet (measuring front door to front door) of public/private schools; churches, hospitals or daycare facilities. A copy of the ordinance will be available at City Hall for viewing by interested citizens.

In other business at Monday night's meeting, the council approved a resolution authorizing the refinancing of bonds for the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority's groundwater supply project, of which the City of Tahoka is a member. The refinancing is expected to save the city \$1900 per year for the next 12 years, when the bond will be paid.

The council also approved a resolution suspending the effective date for 90 days in connection with a rate increase for Southwestern Public Service Co., for further consultation with legal representatives involved in the issue for member cities.

County Tax Assessor-Collector takes part in Seminar at College Station

AS CHRISTMAS approaches, it's getting hard to get a glimpse of Santa and his reindeer flying in, because of the stacks of magazines trying to sell me things is getting too high to see over. Seems like every day I get three or four in the mail, mostly from sellers I have never ordered from or even heard from, all filled with things designed to get my money (most of which already is spoken for).

I have ordered a few things from sales books in the past, and obviously when you order something online or by mail from one of these companies, about a hundred other companies get your name and address ("Let me look at your sucker list...yeah, here's a guy in Tahoka who ordered something, so we'll send him 15 catalogs of things to see if he has any money left.")

They come up with some really strange things to sell, too. For example, consider these offerings in just one sales book I received this week:




