Members logged over 170 hours of certified outside training in 2012, in addition to the twice-monthly business/training sessions that are held at the fire station in Wilson. They regularly attend the Lubbock Area Fire Conference each year, where each attendee may complete up to 12 hours of additional training, and some members attend other certified training sessions as well, such as the Mid-West District SFF-MA Introductory Academy and Wolfforth Rescue School.

The Wilson VFD is a member of the Texas SFFMA (State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Association of Texas), an organization that encourages training, education and certification for all emergency responders.

Heading the crew as Fire Chief is Craig Wilke, a farmer and six-year member of the department. Daniel Clark is Assistant Chief, and Clyde Wilke is Hose Captain. Dusty Patterson serves as Secretary for the department, and David Maldonado is Training Officer. Other members include Lanny Zant, Derek Holden, Lester Gicklhorn, Jacob Dunn, Jayson Dunn, Casey Donald, Cody Donald, and Ed Donaho.

The WVFD team includes three sets of brothers, including the Wilkes - Clyde and Craig, the Donalds - Cody and Casey, and the Dunns - Jayson and Jacob, as well as the Dunn's brother-in-law, Daniel Clark. One of Clyde Wilke's out-

standing memories involving the fire department was when an emergency call came in for one of the firefighter's homes. Wilke and several other firefighters, including longtime member Lester Gicklhorn, had gone to attend vehicle extrication classes at Wolfforth's Rescue School. While at the school, they were notified that they had a house fire just south of Wilson, and shortly afterwards were told it was Gicklhorn's house. They immediately returned to Wilson to find Tahoka VFD on the scene but discovered, thankfully, that it was Lester's well pump house on fire, and not his home.

Lester Gicklhorn is the WVFD member with the most experience on the volunteer crew, with 20 years under his belt, and Daniel Clark has put in 16 years with the department. The newest member of the team is Ed Donaho, who joined the WVFD just last month, on Dec. 17. While he may be the "rookie" with the WVFD, his day job is with Lubbock Fire Dept. and he has 15+ years of fire service, professional and volunteer, and is a welcome addition to the Wilson crew.

Currently in its 57th year of operation since the Wilson VFD was founded in 1956, the department has a relatively new fire station that was built in 2004, using funds collected in fundraisers. The station holds three fire trucks and all the crew's gear and equipment.

Their newest truck, a large brush truck, was purchased in 2011 in cooperation with Texas A&M Forest Service's HB 2604

grant and fundraiser funds HB2604 was a 90/10 cost share grant, with Wilson VFD paying 10% of the truck's cost. Wilson Fire 1 Rescue/ Brush truck was purchased in 2003 through an AFG (Assistance to Firefighters)/FEMA grant. The Wilson Fire 3 Pumper is the oldest truck in the fleet, a 1980 model.

"The WVFD operates on a \$1200 budget from the county, with support from the City of Wilson for fuel, water and insurance," explains Training Officer David Maldonado. "Our equipment (tools, helmets, bunker gear), trucks, facilities and training budget come from two annual fundraisers - a meal and auction in the early spring, and a meal, gun raffle and ladies raffle in the fall. These two fundraisers make up the highest percentage of our budget, and we do appreciate all our supporters at these events," he says.

Their next fundraiser is scheduled for April 7, including a ham and sausage dinner as well as an auction of donated items. The community shows their appreciation for the volunteer firefighters by attending and contributing to their fundraiser events, but the department reciprocates by participating in community events.

The fire crew is very visible at St. Paul Lutheran Church's annual citywide Fourth of July celebration, bringing the fire trucks onsite "on standby" in case a fireworks display goes awry, and they also work the event selling raffle tickets for a fundraiser.

"A number of our department members are also members of St. Paul Lutheran Church," admits Maldonado, "but the Wilson VFD is pleased to be a part of this community event, and willing to be there for the safety of our citizens."

Each year department personnel host a fire safety briefing during Fire Prevention Week at the Wilson Elementary School, teaching children about fire safety and enjoying some faceto-face time with the children. The WVFD also assists with and participates in the Wilson ISD Homecoming parade, an annual event that draws the community together in support of their school.

The crew responded to 25 fire calls in 2012, including six wildland acreage, six vehicle fires, and three structural fires, and they assisted EMS when requested.

"We are very proud of our fire department in Wilson," says Wilson Mayor Donald Klaus. "These guys are very dedicated and committed to providing the best protection for our citizens. and we are blessed to have them. They get grants for trucks, and they work hard at fundraisers to make money to purchase new equipment and gear. I really can't say enough good things about them - it's great to be able to depend on them like we do,"

he adds. Donations to support the WVFD are accepted year round at any First Bank and Trust branch in Lubbock, Wilson and Tahoka or by mail, to Wilson VFD, P.O. Box 22, Wilson, TX

Notice of Availability of Electronic Communications

LYNN COUNTY - Under current law, chief appraisers of county appraisal districts, appraisal districts, and appraisal review boards may communicate electronically through email or other methods with property owners or their designated representatives. Written agreements are required for notices and other documents to be delivered electronically in place of mailing.

How does it work?

Certain guidelines must be followed for this local option communication:

- Written agreements with the county appraisal district must be entered first, ensuring what electronic means of delivery are acceptable. If you are interested in receiving communications in electronic format, you should contact your local appraisal district.
- Public notice regarding the availability of agreement forms authorizing electronic communications may be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the district on or before Feb. 1 each year, or agreement forms may be delivered on or before Feb. 1 each year to property owners shown on the certified appraisal roll for the preceding tax year.
- The chief appraiser may determine the medium, format, content and method to be used for electronic communications other than notices required by Section 25.19 of the Tax Code, which are prescribed by Comptroller rule.
- A decision by the chief appraiser not to enter into agreements may not be the subject of an appraisal review board protest, a lawsuit or a complaint to the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation.
