



Safe driving must be made a personal habit of every motorist if the slaughter on America's highways is to be curbed, Ben Bullard, Assistant Safety Director, Texas Farm Bureau, declared Tuesday as he spoke prior to conducting driving tests at Muleshoe High School.

"Excessive speed is the greatest single cause of automobile accidents," Bullard said. In the demonstration which followed, he pointed out the conditions under which even 20, 30 or 40 miles per hour can be excessive. Bullard added, "when drivers know the true facts and base their driving on those facts, highway accidents

will drop sharply." A film on traffic safety was shown to the students, teachers and guests.

Students and teachers took part in the test which were conducted in a specially equipped car. The test driver was signalled to stop by an electrically controlled detonator. As the shell was fired, the street was marked with yellow paint. A second bullet was fired as brakes were applied and a third after the car came to a complete stop. Distances between the spots were carefully measured to determine in feet and inches how far the car traveled before the driver applied the brakes, or the reaction distance, and how far it traveled after the brakes were applied, or the braking distance.

Bullard emphasized the fact that a driver who observes the speed laws carefully is not a safe driver if he neglects many other items such as proper signalling for turns, approaching an intersection in the proper lane for a turn, the proper way to turn around, and many other Lings which are essential for safe driving.

Today's safety demonstration which was brought to Muleshoe High School under the sponsorship of the Bailey County Farm bureau is part of a long range program of traffic safety conducted since 1957 by the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department,

Two types of communication contacts are handled by the overseas stations. First is the phone-patch or radio-telephone link by which the serviceman is enabled to talk with his folks back home. Second is the wireless written -type message which, when it reaches its destination, is mailed or phoned by a MARS operator to the recipient.

Families in the United States are not permitted to initiate a phone-patch due to the difficulty in contacting specific areas in Viet Nam and Thailand. However, anyone desiring to send a written message to service personnel overseas has only to contact any MARS member.

In Hawaii, Alaska and the other 48 states there are 32 stations authorized to handle both phone-patch and written messages. Of these, six are in the Fourth Army area: Headquarters Fourth Army Command MARS Station, Fort Sam Houston, Tex.; Fort Hood Tex.; Fort Sill, Okla.; Fort Polk, La.; Fort Bliss, Tex., and U. S. Army Aeronautical Depot Maintenance Center, Corpus Christi, Tex.

Once the radio circuit is established between the MARS station overseas and an authorized MARS station in the Fourth Army area(Arkansas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas), phone- pat-ches are handled as accurately and as quickly as possible, depending on the quality of the radio signals being received, Belk said.

On the other hand, wireless type or written messages from senders in the Fourth Army area to Viet Nam and Thailand must be relayed through the Headquarters Fourth Army Command MARS Station. The station recently increased its capabilities to permit an attendant to monitor Fourth Army MARS 24 hours daily, 'seven days a week. Anyone desiring to contact this station, A5USA, may do so by calling San Antonio CA 1-3003.

"Transmission of written messages for soldiers and their families serves a twofold purpose," Belk emphasized. "Most important, it service is invaluable to civilian Mars members in mastering the military radio operating procedures. In doing so, these individuals may someday provide the only communication link during a national emergency or disaster. Secondly, the messages serve soldiers overseas and in the states who are separated from their families with a speedy and cost-free means of communication,"

All MARS members are Fourth Army area there are more than 30 military or bout 700 individual MARS members, 95 per cent of whom are civilians such as doctors, lawyers, printers and housewives, who operate amateur stations in their homes.

Since Jan. 1 they have averaged more than 10,000 volunteer hours a month in MARS activities, helping servicemen and their families to communicate with one another.

33,036 acres in the total "available for planting" came to the Plains through purchases or leases of allotments or from acreage transfers between farm of the same ownership. Such transactions were permitted under the Agriculture Act of 1965 for the first time in 19-66, when the Plains had a 46,770 acre net gain from acreage transfers.

By far the biggest gainer of acreage under sale or lease and transfer provisions has been Gaines County, with 12,906 acres moved in the first year and 8,940 gained acres in

Not included in the acres producers intend planting in 1967 are 300 that went to Francis Cunningham in Cochran County under the export acreage provisions of the program, Production from these 300 acres must go into export markets at the world price without benefit of price support or government loan. According to State ASCS officials, these were the only

export acres issued in Texas. The 1967 cotton program, as in 1966, gave producers a choice of diverting between 12-1/2 per cent and 35 per cent of effedtive allotments. The government payment for this diversion in 1967 will be 10.78 cents per pound times the farm's projected yield.

In addition cooperating producers will receive a price support payment on production from domestic allotments (65 per cent of effective allotments) of 11.53 cents per pound times projected yield. Diversion and price support payments, respectively, were 10.5 cents and

9.42 cents per pound in 1966. With this economic incentive almost every county on the Plains this year will come close to diverting the maximum 35 per cent. The only two Plains counties to fall below 34 per cent diversion were Swisher and Deaf Smith Swisher County farmers signed up to divert 33.9 per cent of allotments. but Deaf Smith County signed to divert only 30.3 per cent.

The low level of diversion in Deaf Smith County is probably accounted for by the large number of allotments below ten acres in that county. Producers with less than ten acre 21lotments, or with an aggregate rojected yield of less than 3,600 pounds, can receive the 10.78 cent diversion payment without actually diverting any

Despite slightly reduced ac-reage in 1967, Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of PCG, believes the area can reasonably expect to produce over 200,000 bales more in 1967

than in 1966. Adverse weather conditions last year cut High Plains production on 1,451,407 planted acres to approximately 1.25 million bales. "If in 1967 we can reach the 519-pound per acre average yield achieved in 1965, total production would come out to over 1,488,000 bales," Johnson said.

Discussing income to the area from the 1967 crop, Johnson said this too should be considerably above that of 1966. He pointed out that while the loan price in 1967 is 75 points below 1966, basis middling inch cotton, and discounts on some of our lower quality cotton will be greater, the increased payment rates will slightly more than offset these decreases, even assuming a similar quality

"And there is every indication that the quality of our 1967 crop will be considerably above that of 1966. This, coupled with more bales to sell and the possibility that some of our cotton will sell above the government loan price, should bring about a significant improvement in cotton producer income," Johnson

that we deal with will have to settle this question.

The third question arises on the types of loans which the bank may make and the interest rates at which these loans will be available to borrowers. If the bank is to be structured on a business-like basis, the question arises immediately as to whether the bank can borrow money on the open market at six percent and relend it to eligible borrowers at four percent, the intermediate loan interest rate provided for in H.R. 1400. The committee must decide as a mater of policy whether the bank is to set up on a subscribed basis or whether it will be completely structured to

be a self-supporting operation. A fourth question arises as to the public's stake in the capital that has been advanced to the bank by the government. Under the terms of the bill, some question then is how is that \$750 million to be repaid and when and at what interest, if any. As you can see, the existence of an intermediate loan program at four percent will have a direct bearing on whether the bank will be able to repay the government seed capital on a regularly scheduled basis and at some interest.

The fifth question arises in regard to the public's obligation to back up the debentures and other securities that are issued by the bank to raise additional capital. Under the terms of the bill, there is "Treasury backup" on the bank's debentures: that is, if the debentures could not be paid by the bank, the U.S. Treasury would stand behind them and repay the amounts invested by the investing public together with the accumulated

interest. There are, of course, a number of other issues involved in the bill; it is indeed a very complex and technical piece of legislation,
