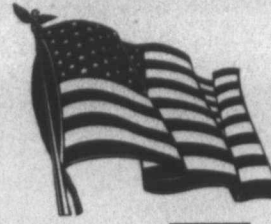

Voters mark choices in area elections

Voters in three area elections marked ballots Saturday, May 11 to choose their representatives for city and school boards in Tahoka and O'Donnell.

Incumbent Rudy Fuentes retained his seat over challenger Justin Antu for District 1 on the Tahoka City Council. Fuentes had 24 votes to 18 for Antu, according to city officials.

In the O'Donnell Independent School District election for three seats on the Board of Trustees, Landon Mires led the ticket with 183 votes, Billy Edwards had 128, and Mark Royce had 86 votes to win the election.

Elected to three seats on the O'Donnell City Council were incumbent Wayne Mott, who led the ticket with 144 votes, Martin Casarez, 89, and Liz Luera, with 75 votes.

Tahoka club named Rotary Club of Year

Tahoka Rotary Club has long been a vital part of the community, involved in many projects and endeavors that benefit the city and its residents. Last week, the Rotary organization honored the Tahoka club in recognition of this club's outstanding service and contributions to the community. For the first time since its inception, the Tahoka Rotary Club has been named Rotary Club of the Year for District 5730 Area 6.

"Take a bow, club members - this area includes the Lubbock Rotary Clubs, so this is a great honor for the Tahoka Rotary Club," said club president James Craig as he presented a framed certificate to the club during their weekly Thursday noon meeting at the Tahoka Life Enrichment Center last week.

"When I went to the district meeting, the woman who presented the award said they were quite impressed not only with the Tahoka club's many projects, but with the diversity of our projects as well," Craig added.

One of those projects is the club's sponsorship of the Billy Tomlinson Memorial Hospital Benefit Auction, which brings in thousands of dollars for Lynn County Hospital District. Craig said that one of the reasons the project is successful is due to the special efforts of club member Julia Allen, who spearheads the project. In honor of her dedication, Craig presented Mrs. Allen with a plaque depicting Rotary's 4-Way Test, which is a guiding principle for Rotarians: "Of the things we think, say or do: Is it the Truth? Is it Fair to all concerned? Will it build

Good Will and Better Friendships? Will it be Beneficial to all concerned?"

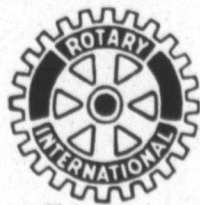
Another project the club sponsors is their popular sausage-on-a-stick booth at the Lynn County Harvest Festival, which has been an excellent fundraiser

THS girls basketball coach resigns; trustees approve other contracts

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees accepted the resignation of head girls basketball coach Anthony Catherrall at their May 6 meeting, and approved contracts for 61 other teaching staff for the upcoming school year.

Catherrall has served as head girls basketball coach for the past two years. The Board voted to offer term contracts to 45 teachers, term dual-assignment contracts to 8 teachers, probationary contracts to 7 teachers, and probationary dual-assignment contracts to one teacher for the 2013-14 school year.

Sam Monsivais, transportation director, gave a report on the mileage of buses and sub-bans in the district. Trustees and school officials toured two buses brought to the meeting by Robert Haynie, a representative from Blue Star Bus Sales, LTD of Lubbock, who also presented information regarding the buses.

The Board voted to lease purchase a Girardin Blue Bird Model G5-29, 14-passenger bus for a total price of \$62,024. This bus will be used for trips for small groups, including cheerleaders, UIL literary teams, golf teams, tennis teams, and others, according to school officials.

Covenant Health System was approved as the provider of athletic training coverage for the 2013-2014 school year. The Texas Association School Boards Policy Update 96 was tabled until the next board meeting. Texas Association School Board policy EIC Local was approved.

The school calendar was revised to include the President's Day holiday that was left off the original calendar. The remainder of the calendar remains the same.

Supt. Steve Burleson reported enrollment at 612 students in TISD as of May 3, which is an increase of four students from the enrollment reported last month and 22 students more than were enrolled at TISD at this same time last year.

Prior to the business portion of the meeting, trustees recognized several FCCLA students for their accomplishments in competing at the State FCCLA contest, including McKenzie Forsythe, Virginia Lopez and Gabriella Pando, for Illustrated Talk; Gabriella Alvarez, and Elvia Aguilar for Applied Technology; and Kelsi Hilger and Tyler Perez for Promoting and Publicizing FCCLA.

The next regular meeting will be Thursday, June 13, at 6:30 p.m.

HERE ARE NUMEROUS sunken ships in the shallow and murky waters of the northern Gulf of Mexico, according to an article in the latest issue of *The Medallion*, a publication of the Texas Historical Commission, which gives some details about two of the shipwrecks.

According to the article by Texas Marine Archeologist Amy Borgens, many of the shipwrecks, some dating back more than 500 years, remain undiscovered on the sea floor because it is really dark down there, with visibility usually only about 5 to 7 feet.

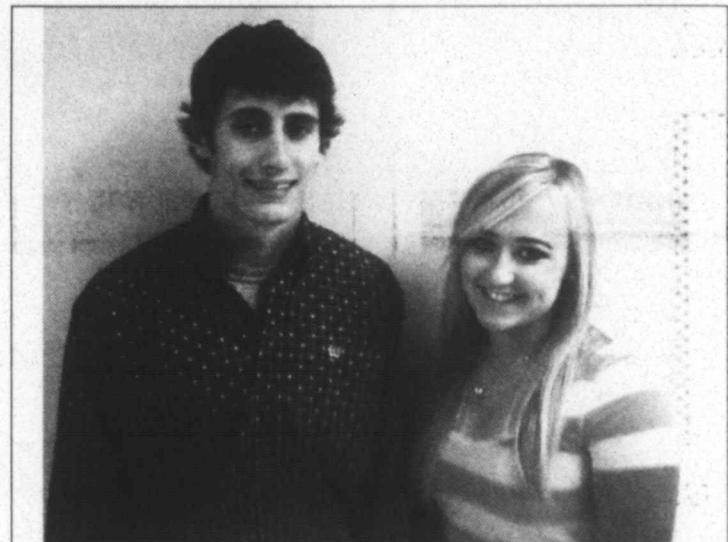
In 1976 a Rice University physics professor, Dr. Paul Cloutier, discovered the wreckage of the *USS Hatteras*, which was stationed off Galveston during the Union bombardment of the city in January 1873. The *Hatteras* was sunk on Jan. 11 by the Confederate warship *CSS Alabama* after a battle of less than 15 minutes with loss of two lives. It was the only naval battle in the Civil War in the Gulf of Mexico, and the only U.S. warship sunk at sea during that war.

In 2010 a federally-funded study of the *Hatteras* wreck showed the site was more exposed on the sea floor than in the past, and in 2012 there was a survey using more advanced sonar technology. In addition to new information about the 210-foot *Hatteras*, the survey collected data on the wreckage of the *City of Waco*, a 242-foot iron-hulled steamer which sank about three miles off Galveston during a storm in November 1875, killing all 56 passengers and crew.

These wrecks are only about 60 feet under water, but down there it's darker than Tim Tebow's future with the New York Jets.

Shipwrecks are interesting, but I have not heard of any shipwrecks in Lynn County. One ship is missing around here, however. My ship has never come in.

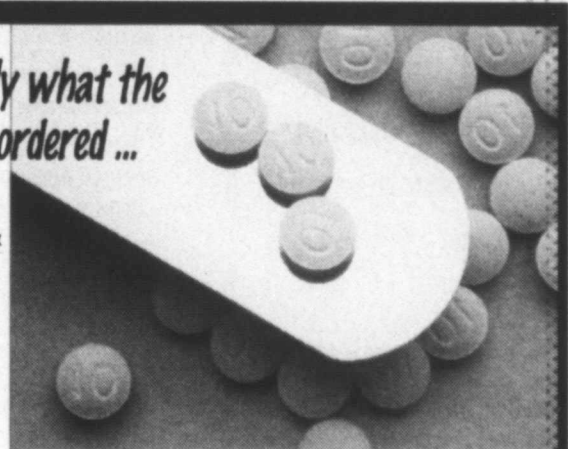

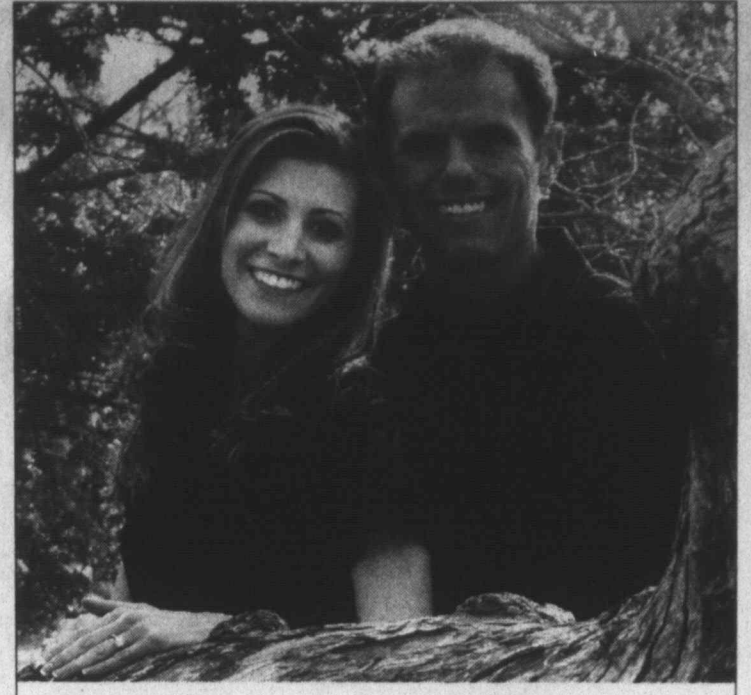
Awards will be presented to athletes at the banquet.

Dogs finish terrific season with Area playoff series

Tahoka travelled to Crane last weekend to take on the Fort Hancock Mustangs in the Area Round of the Class 1A State Baseball Playoffs. Although the Bulldogs battled every step of the way, they eventually fell by losing a deciding Game 3 after splitting the first two games of the 2 out of 3 series.

Tahoka wraps up its season at 20-9 with its first twenty-win season in Head Coach James Garrett's tenure here in Tahoka.

"The team would like to thank all of those who not only made the trip all the way down to Crane, but to anyone who was supporting us at any point in the season...in person or from afar. Thank you for your support, and we will see you next year," said Garrett.

Game 1 - Mustangs win 6-1

Tahoka struggled to get much offense going on Friday night in Game 1 of the Area Series with the Fort Hancock Mustangs, only scoring once in the first inning and losing by a score of 6-1.

Tahoka got on the board first when Ethan Curry scampered home on an ill-advised throw to first by the Mustangs after he had already stolen 2nd and 3rd base. He just barely beat the throw back to home, and Tahoka enjoyed an early lead. But the lead wouldn't last long.

The Mustangs got two runs in the 3rd and one run in the 4th with most of the damage coming from Frank Arzate and leadoff man, Luis Quijas. Those two combined for 5 of the 6 hits the Mustangs got on the day.

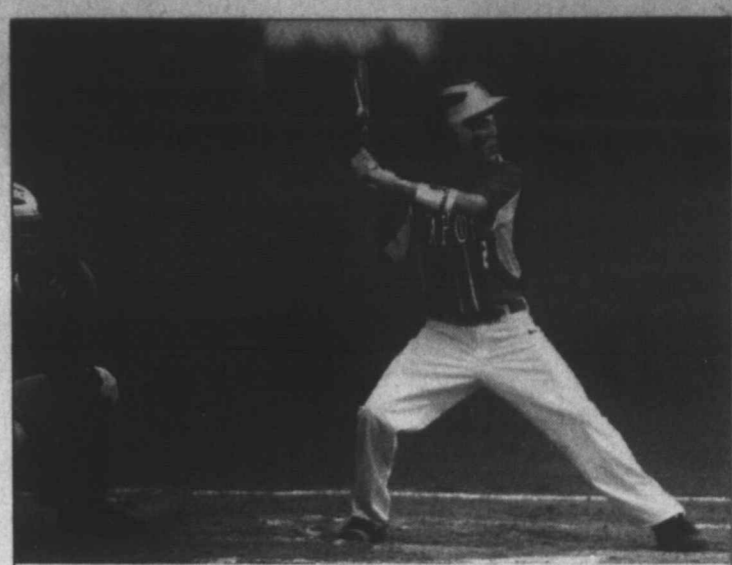
But most of the credit for the win would go to senior right-hander, Manny Grajeda, who

threw 7 innings in the winning effort. He struck out 11 batters and only gave up 2 hits on the day and really dominated the Bulldogs in Game 1.

Game 2 - Dogs up 10-4

Tahoka found the offense they were looking for on Saturday afternoon in Game 2 of the Area Series with Fort Hancock, as they defeated the Mustangs by a score of 10-4, evening up the series.

The Bulldogs pounded 12 hits off Fort Hancock starter Mando Soto. Dominique Herrera and Swade Hammonds both had 3 hits apiece and combined for 4 RBIs on the day. The big hit of the day came in the fourth inning when Ethan Curry blasted a 2-out, 2 strike, bases-loaded, 3 RBI double off the left field wall. That wasn't all Curry did as Tahoka rode his bat and his arm all day. Curry threw 6 stellar innings in the win. He also racked up 9 strikeouts while only allowing 4 hits and 2 earned runs in the winning effort.

right-handers combined for 9 strikeouts, and only allowed 2 hits and one earned run on the day. Unfortunately, Luis Quijas, Fort Hancock's pitcher, only allowed 1 hit and no runs in a seven inning complete game shutout. Although Tahoka hit the ball well with several line drives, they never could find a place where a Mustang defender was not standing, waiting to catch the ball.

Professional Food Manager Certification training course offered in Brownfield

Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Terry County, is offering a professional food manager certification training course. The 2-day program will be offered for \$125 on May 23-24, at 209 S 5th St., Brownfield. Cost includes training, materials, and a national food manager certification examination. The food manager's certification is valid for five years. Registration deadline is May 13, by calling 806-637-4060.

"Under the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) jurisdiction, each food establishment is required to have one certified food manager on site," said Mary Collier, CEA-FCS Terry County. "This program is designed to not only prepare foodservice managers to pass the certification examination; it will provide valuable education regarding the safe handling of food. Almost 50¢ of every dollar Americans spend on food is spent on meals prepared away from home. Therefore, careful attention to food safety will help keep customers safe and satisfied."

Statistics indicate that foodborne illness continues to be a health issue in the United States. Each year, 1 in 6 Americans will become sick, 128,000 will become hospitalized, and 3,000 will die due to a foodborne illness.

By attending the course, foodservice managers will learn

- Identifying potentially hazardous foods and common errors in food handling
- Preventing contamination and cross-contamination of food
- Teaching and encouraging personal hygiene for employees
- Complying with government regulations
- Maintaining clean utensils, equipment and surroundings
- Controlling pests

Foodborne illnesses can be prevented by following simple food safety practices. USDA announces farm payments to resume*

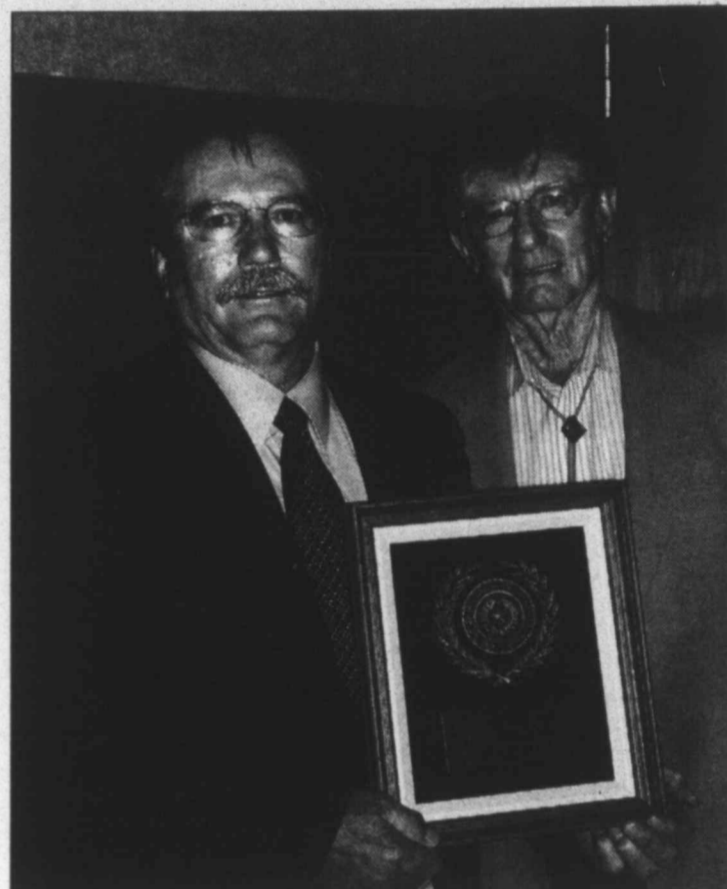
The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan M. Garcia announced that farm payments, which had been temporarily suspended due to sequestration, were scheduled to resume on May 8. This includes payments for the 2011 Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE), the Noninsured Crop Assistance Program (NAP) and the Milk Income Loss Contract Program (MILC).

On March 4, 2013, FSA began a temporary suspension of FSA program payments in order to assess the impact of sequestration and determine the least-disruptive process possible for carrying out required cuts. The Department will use the Secretary's limited authority to transfer funds to avoid reducing these program payments.

Producers should be advised that program sign-up periods currently underway have the following enrollment deadlines: 2013 Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) Program - June 3rd; 2011 SURE - June 7; and the 2013 Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program - August 2nd.

Producers should contact their local Farm Service Agency office as soon as possible for appointments to enroll in these programs before the deadlines.

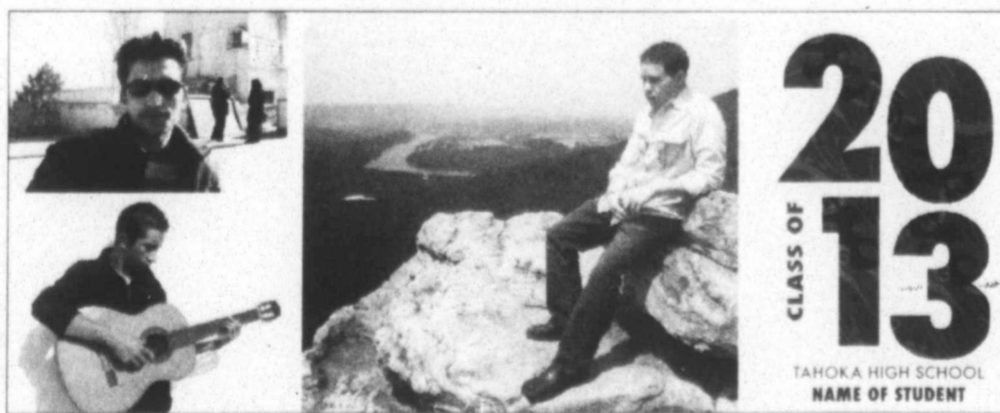

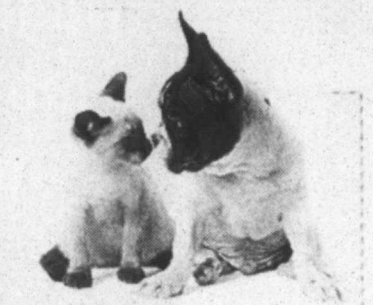

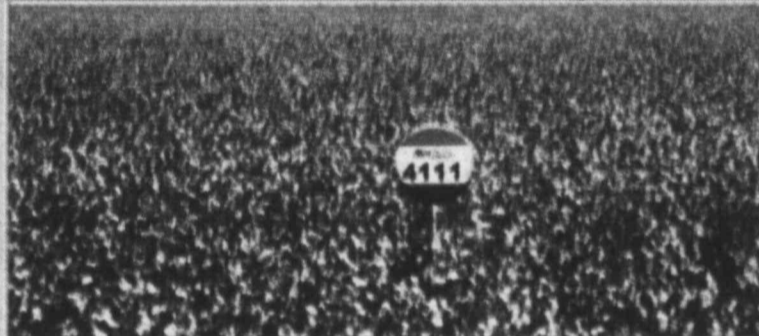
