### Fireworks show set July 6th in Wilson

The Wilson fireworks show will be held on Saturday, July 6th, at the Wilson City Park, with free hot dogs and live music prefacing the show that begins after dark. All area residents are invited to the free event that begins at 7 o'clock and continues until the last fireworks display, sponsored by St. Paul Lutheran Church in Wilson. The park is located just west of the Wilson school campus, on FM 211.

"We invite everyone to share in this celebration of our nation's independence," said Pastor David Rohde. The fireworks show is St. Paul Lutheran's gift to the community, and is a tradition that began 12 years ago when the church was celebrating their 75th anniversary in 2001. That year was their first fireworks show, and church members have kept the tradition going, contributing towards a special fireworks fund throughout the year to sponsor the annual event for their community.

The music begins at 7 p.m., with free hot dogs, chips and soft drinks

served from about 8:30-9:15 p.m. The fireworks show begins at dark, and usually lasts 30-45 minutes. Bringlawn chairs for seating.

"We do get a pyrotechnic permit from the City of Wilson for the show," said Pastor Rohde. "And, several of our church members are volunteer firemen and the Wilson VFD has a fire truck on site at the event, just in case. We set up two firing stations at the south end of the park, and we have volunteer loaders and firers, usually about six people, and they have learned over the years how to organize the fireworks show to keep it going," he explained.

"This celebration is basically our treat – we want to do this for the community, and we don't want anybody to have to pay for anything. Come out, have a good time, enjoy a hot dog and music, and sit back and watch the fireworks," he invited.

**NOTE:** Although fireworks are banned in the unincorporated portions of Lynn County, fireworks shows held inside the city limits of Wilson and O'Donnell fall outside the jurisdiction of the county. City officials there have approved permits for sponsors of their annual events.

#### O'Donnell sets July 4th celebration in park

The City O'Donnell will host a July 4th celebration at the City Park tonight (Thursday). The program will begin at 6 p.m. with the Lubbock Sheriff's Dept. presenting the flag ceremony, followed by music and speeches.

The city will furnish hot dogs for the event, and other booths will offer a variety of food. The Community Center will be open for a place to sit down and eat, and a fireworks show will begin at dark. Bring lawn chairs for seating.

# Man jailed twice for disturbances

A 23-year-old Tahoka man was arrested twice over the weekend on disorderly conduct and other charges after incidents were reported at a convenience store in Tahoka.

On Friday a Tahoka police officer was summoned to Allsup's, where he was met by the subject, who reportedly was service screaming, "you can't touch me; I'm going to get paid," and other things. He was arrested and jailed on charges of disorderly conduct and public intoxication.

After his release from jail, he again was arrested Sunday night at Allsup's, where he reportedly had been yelling at customers. He allegedly refused to give his name and other information to the officer who was called to that scene, and who reported he found the suspect walking in the middle of the street outside the store. He was jailed on charges of disorderly conduct and failure to identify to a peace officer.


A traffic accident or incident involving a vehicle occurred in the county early Friday morning, but no information was available from the Dept. of Public Safety, whose officers could not be contacted by the newspaper Tuesday. However, it was

learned that a man was arrested and charged with intoxicated assault with a vehicle causing serious bodily injury in connection with the incident.

Three other persons were jailed during the week, on charges of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, theft of services over \$500 and less than \$1,500, and disorderly conduct with three prior offenses plus public intoxication.

Total number in jail this week was 19, with two held for Andrews County.

for animal control, 22 ambulance calls and six fire alarms.




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#### Barbara Louise Griffiths

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AST WEEK 34-year-old Nik Wallenda of Florida walked across a Little Colorado River Gorge in northeastern Arizona on a 2-inch thick steel cable, stretched 1,500 feet above the river. He wore no harness or other safety equipment on his tightrope walk of a quarter of a mile.

(This was shown live on the Discovery Channel. Anyone who missed it can Google "Nik Wallenda tightrope walk" and see it on You Tube)

Wallenda is a seventh-generation high-wire artist who is part of the famous "Flying Wallendas" circus family, a clan that has lost several members killed doing the same dumb sort of things. Nik Wallenda last year walked on a cable across Niagara Falls.

Unless Nik changes his ways, I don't expect him to be with us much longer. Come on, fun is fun and entertainment is great, but there are some things a person just shouldn't do, chancing death just to get some measure of fame and/or fortune. It's sad when any person dies, but I never can feel a great deal of sorrow for people who walk tightwires, stand on airplane wings, climb mountains, practice dentistry on crocodiles or take up lion-taming.

Nik Wallenda's great-grandfather, Karl Wallenda, fell and died during a performance in Puerto Rico at the age of 73.

The news reports last week said Nik began wire-walking at the age of 2. This must have been right after he fell out of his high chair on his head.

WITH THE July 4<sup>th</sup> observance coming up this week, it is fitting to note that a tiny remnant of a famous WWII raid, Doolittle's Raiders, met publicly last week for the final time.

There were 80 men crewing 16 B-25 bombers in that first retaliation against Japan after the Pearl Harbor attack. They were led by Lt. Col. James Doolittle, bombing Tokyo even though they knew they would not have enough fuel to return safely. Sixty-two of them survived the war, and were hailed as heroes.

Each year since 1946 there has been a reunion of survivors, with 80 golden goblets provided with their names. Each year goblets of those who died are turned upside down. This year there were only four survivors, all in their 90s, and they have decided to have no more reunions.

People like those, and there are many of them over the years and in other wars, who gave so much for their country, need to be remembered on this weekend and whenever an American flag is visible.

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



#### New laws will protect Texas seniors

Austin is more than the "live musical capital of the world," a vibrant high-tech hub and home to one of the top universities in the country. Decisions made there by those same legislators we elect back home have a profound impact on our everyday lives.

This year was no different. When the dust settled at the end of the 2013 regular legislative session, Texans had gained some important wins and in many cases avoided some painful losses. Throughout the 140-day period AARP was there, working with bill sponsors, testifying before committees and mobilizing our members and the public on key issues and concerns for older Texans.

Older Texans can cheer about improved access to medical services thanks to a new law helping Texas recruit the next generation of doctors by establishing incentives for training primary care physicians and encouraging more doctors to participate in Medicaid and Medicare. The law will also make it easier for advance practice registered nurses to see patients and write prescriptions, providing more Texans of all ages with access to health care professionals.

Long-term care at home, an essential service for many of our seniors, has also been improved and expanded. More low-income seniors will be able to receive

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community-based long-term care through Medicaid, the primary payer for long term care services for seniors. This will allow them to stay in their homes and communities with their families while also saving taxpayer dollars.

Moreover, community-based attendants, those hard-working folks who help care for our parents or grandparents on Medicaid, will receive a pay increase--bringing starting pay up to \$7.86 per hour and exceeding the state minimum of \$7.25 per hour.

Texas seniors who live in nursing homes also got a win when the Legislature adopted measures to greatly improve these facilities. Texas Medicaid nursing home reimbursement rates have long been among the lowest in the country. The legislature passed a 6 percent increase over two years, making it easier for nursing homes to retain quality staff, a significant indicator of care quality.

In addition, Medicaid-funded nursing home stays throughout Texas will soon fall under STAR+PLUS managed care. This will encourage higher quality care by rewarding the best plans with more enrollees and by creating higher standards.

Another key issue where good things happened and bad things were kept from happening was the defined-benefit pension program essential to the financial security of Texas teachers as well as other

school district and state employees. Earlier this year, some groups at- . . gued that the state pension programs should be converted to individual-... -and more uncertain-401k-type programs. This could have spelled disaster for workers who have devoted their lives to public service.

In the end, the Texas Legislature decided to preserve pensions for state and school employees while granting cost-of-living increases to those who have been retired the longest. To help strengthen the system, both state government and current employees will contribute a bit more, to the pension system, and new employees will have stricter requirements on when they can retire.

Payday and auto title loan businesses prey on economically vulnerable Texans, by offering them "fast cash" loans that can carry fees in excess of 500% APR. Families often pay many times over the original amount borrowed for these small dollar loans, leaving them with long-term financial problems. Cities like Dallas, San Antonio,

El Paso, Austin and Denton have taken strong steps to protect their citizens from predatory lending by passing ordinances that send a powerful signal that abusive lending practices will not be tolerated. Potential harm was averted this year when the Legislature shut down a measure that would have undone "a the strong payday ordinances enacted by these local governments.

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
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



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### A weedy issue ...

**Common Purslane presents problems to lawns**

fter the recent rains, it seems that turfgrass is not the only thing greening up in home landscapes. One common weed that seems to have shown up in full force is called "Common Purslane," and it is making its pesky presence known everywhere.

The ongoing drought of three years has contributed to the problem since many lawns have been stressed and are not as healthy and lush as they would be in a more normal rainfall pattern. Once lawns become thin this allows for weed seeds to lay dormant and then germinate once sufficient moisture is received.

"Common Purslane seems to be one of the most problematic weeds after the recent rains in June. It is showing up almost everywhere including those landscapes where it was never a problem before," stated Bryan Reynolds, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service agent for Lynn County. A single purslane plant can produce up to 240,000 seeds, thus making control even more difficult. These seeds can lay dormant for up to 40 years, he said.

Pre-emergent control is always the best option for Com-

Purslane. **Products** containing the active ingredients dithiopyr, pendi-

methalin, or combinations of benefin and trifluralin or benefin and oryzalin are recommended for preemergent control.

Since the Common Purslane has already emerged for this year, homeowners are going to have to rely on post-emergent control of the weed. Several products are available for helping control the weed. Those products with active ingredients of Dicamba, MCPP, MSMA and 2,4-D or combinations of those ingredients are effective in controlling Common Purslane. Many of these products are readily available for use in the home landscape.

Another method to control the weed is to remove it from the landscape by hand or hoe it. The key is to remove it completely from the area. Leaving the plant in the landscape after you pull it up will still leave the seeds to lay dormant and the show back up later. In flower beds, using mulch will help control the weed and keep it from germinating.

Always read and follow directions when using any herbicide in the home landscape to ensure its effectiveness and to prevent injury to other vegeta-

#### Cornyn requests extension on decision to list Lesser Prairie Chicken as threatened species

U.S. Senator John Cornyn (R-TX) and five Senators today sent a letter to the Director of U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) Daniel Ashe requesting a 60-day extension of the comment solicitation period and a six-month extension of any final decisions on the proposal by FWS to list the Lesser Prairie Chicken as a threatened species. Senators on the letter include Sens. Ted Cruz (R-TX), Jim Inhofe (R-OK), Tom Coburn (R-OK), Pat Roberts (R-

KS), and Jerry Moran (R-KS). The outcome of this listing proposal is vitally important to many sectors in the local economies of our states, including agriculture; oil and gas development; ranching; transportation; and wind energy," wrote Sen. Cornyn.

"Listing the Lesser Prairie Chicken under the Endangered Species Act would negatively impact these sectors for many

The letter acknowledges that the wild life agencies in five states home to the Lesser Prai-

rie Chicken, including Texas, are working hard to finalize and submit a conservation plan by mid-March, the same time as the comment period is scheduled to end. The 60-day extension would allow state agencies time to incorporate comments to the Service's proposal as well as allow the states to complete this spring's aerial population survey, which is conducted in the honth of April.

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
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
