Outreach program starts Monday with community projects, Bible Clubs, more

Next week, several churches in Tahoka will come together to sponsor and participate in "Mission: Tahoka," a city-wide outreach ministry to the community, with Backyard Bible Clubs in several locations around town and work projects planned throughout the week of July 22-28 to help area families. Worship services will be conducted each evening, and a community picnic is also slated, as well as other activities.

"Mission Tahoka is something in which your entire family can participate," said Bro. Bill Fuller, pastor at First Baptist Church of Tahoka. "Every person is invited to participate and I hope you will help us spread the word and build excitement for this outreach ministry for all the body of Christ in Tahoka," he added.

Mission Tahoka kicks off with work projects for volunteers, scheduled to begin at 7:30 a.m. Monday through Friday. Various projects are expected to include painting, yard work, cleaning, and other general maintenance work for local residents who could benefit from the helping hands of volunteers. To volunteer, call the First Baptist Church office at 561-4557 to be assigned to a project. Volunteers of all ages are welcome to participate.

Backyard Bible Clubs will offer

fun activities for children each weekday morning from 9:00 a.m. until 10:15 a.m., for youth ages pre-K through sixth grade, at four locations in Tahoka: N. 4th and Ave. O (on school grounds in front of elementary daycare center); S. 1st and Aye. P; S. 7th and Ave. M; and S. 3rd and Ave. F. Backyard Bible Club signs will be posted at these locations. Parents are welcome to stay (may want to bring lawn chairs for seating) while children participate in these activities.

Evening worship services for all ages, youth through adults, will be held nightly at the high school auditorium, at 7 p.m. Casual attire is welcome.

A free community picnic will be held 5:00-8:00 p.m. Saturday on the courthouse lawn, featuring live music, a homemade ice cream contest (bring your entry by 5 p.m. for judging), games, hot dogs and more. All food is provided free of charge, and the picnic is open to the entire community.

The Mission Tahoka week will culminate with a community worship service at 11 a.m. in the THS auditorium. 'Teledoc' offers specialist input at LCHD Family Wellness Clinic

The Family Wellness Clinic has a new doctor in the house - that goes by the name of "Teledoc." Actually, the Teledoc is a computer with cameras that allow for secure communication with specialists for local patients who have a need for a specialist's opinion but don't want to make the trip to Lubbock for another doctor's appointment.

"The Teledoc works basically like a specialty referral to Lubbock... without all the driving back and forth," explains Melanie Richburg, DNP, FNPC, at Lynn County Hospital District's Family Wellness Clinic located at 1809 Lockwood in Tahoka. "If labs and x-rays are needed they can be done here in Tahoka, and the results provided to the specialist," she added.

The system works much like Skype, but the technology is much more advanced, with many security features than the home computer version.

"How it works is pretty straight forward," said Richburg: "(1) Patient comes in with a problem. We decide he needs a specialist opinion. (2) We call the specialist that does telemedicine and schedule an appointment. (3) Patient returns to the LCHD Family Wellness Clinic (FWC) on the day of the scheduled appointment and the scheduled specialist calls the Teledoc in the FWC. (4) The patient is evaluated, via camera, by the specialist and a treatment plan is created. Medications, labs, x-rays, etc. are ordered by (See Teledoc, page 3)
