

## **Bulldog TD in** last few seconds gets 34-27 win

Ke'Shawn Hood ran 10 yards for a touchdown with just 15 seconds left in the game at Crosbyton Friday to give the Tahoka Bulldogs a 34-27 victory in the opening game of the season.

Coach John Cornelius and the Bulldogs will host Ralls in the home opener Friday. Last week, Ralls pounded Sudan 42-6.

Tahoka Quarterback Trystan Hilger rushed for 95 yards and passed for another 114, including a 19-yard touchdown pass to Isiah Vega opening scoring in the first period. Hilger scored two touchdowns himself, on runs of 55 and 13 yards, and also kicked two extra points. He completed 5 of 14 passes with no interceptions. Kordell Baker caught two passes for 70 yards.

Hood also scored two touchdowns, the winning run at the end and a 26yard TD run early in the fourth quarter. He wound up with 80 yards on 15

The Chiefs showed a strong running game, led by Nathan Childers, who had 219 yards on 15 carries, and scored three touchdowns.

Tahoka led 7-0 after Vega's score

# **H20** Dlan: Planning phase nearly complete for Tahoka's waterline system

The planning phase of the project to replace antiquated water lines with a completely new system under the city streets of Tahoka is getting closer to the finish line, with city officials expecting to have the plans ready to submit for the project's construction funds early next year. The good news, too, is that the state has set aside a substantial amount of funding for such projects.

The Texas Water Development Board this week announced the availability of \$50,000,000 for the Economically Distressed Areas Program (EDAP) for state fiscal biennium 2014-2015. Applications for financial assistance through the EDAP program are currently being accepted on a firstcome, first-served basis until the Board

has committed the full \$50,000,000 for the biennium. The EDAP program provides financial assistance for water and wastewater services to economically distressed areas where services do not exist or systems do not meet minimum state standards - and Tahoka has met all the criteria for the EDAP funds.

"We are excited to hear about the state funding for next year," said Mayor John Baker early this week, adding that the city's project will be in good shape to submit for those grant funds. The overall concept for the project has already been approved by the TWDB, and the city has received the planning portion of funds already, expending those funds for engineering plans detailing the project. Once the planning

portion is finalized, city officials can then seek the portion of grant funds for the actual construction phase to replace the water lines.

"City officials met with our engineers last week to review progress on water plans," said Mayor John Baker this week, explaining that the plans have progressed into the third portion of the four-part planning phase (Phases A-B-C-D, with D as the final phase). Phase C+ will be submitted soon.

"Tahoka has been asked for a larger submittal, hence the title C+, rather than the normal phase C. This will reduce the design phase 'D' timeline, and gain us 'shovel ready' plans by February next year," said Baker.

He added that the plans now in-

clude "smart water meters" throughout the city as well. "We are investigating radio frequency read water metering to accurately report and record meter readings," he explained, which should both streamline the meter reading process and provide readings that can pinpoint potential problems with the meters.

City residents - and city workers - have long suffered through the problems created by the antiquated water lines in the city of Tahoka, with numerous waterline breaks, boil-water notices, and water shutoffs while repairs are made. Many of the city's water lines are part of the original water

## Thefts, vandalism, burglary reported

Two reports of thefts, a burglary of a residence, and a case of criminal mischief were among crimes investigated by Tahoka Police Dept. during the last week.

Lisa Rachel Abrego told officers Monday that a new auto battery valued at \$120 had been stolen from the back porch of her residence. On the previous day, Kevin Ray Hood of Tahoka that he was missing an android cell phone valued at \$250, apparently stolen from his yehicle.

HEN I READ last week that a new Monopoly token, a cat, has replaced the iron as one of the eight things offered, I was mostly surprised that Monopoly still is a popular table game.

I have heard no one mention playing the game in the last 40 years, which is about the last time I played it.

Introduced in the 1930s, Monopoly was a game where you rolled dice, advanced your token around the board, and if you landed on property owned by some other player, you had to pay up from a limited amount of fake money dealt out to each player at the start. We used to play the game as youngsters and then as teenagers.

Our family even played Monopoly occasionally as adults. The game was (and is) too realistic, though. You pay too much for a brief stop on someone else's property, especially if it has the little red hotel, then you are out of money with no hope of recovering.

I remember my younger cousin, about 14 at the time, once throwing a fit because he lost, jumping up and overturning the board, scattering Monopoly money, deeds and tokens everywhere, and stomping out of the house. I was not a good loser, either, but I never did THAT.

The tokens have changed over the years, and now are cat, battleship, car, Scottie dog, top hat, old shoe, wheelbarrow and thimble. The original version included a lantern, purse and rocking horse.

Although I haven't seen it since Eisenhower was president, I think we have a full Monopoly game somewhere around the house. If I can find it, I may check to see what the tokens are.

The cat token was voted in by people on the Internet. A recent survey claims the most popular token is the car, chosen by one of every four players. Least popular was the wheelbarrow, possibly because it reminds people who are playing that there's also work to be done.

Over the years, our family has played a lot of table games, including 42 and 84 and canasta, but none of those in the last 20 years. Now we mostly play a domino game called Mexican train or a card game called hand and foot.

I invented a card game called Dalton Wins, but nobody else seems interested in playing it.

## O'Donnell ISD adopts \$1.17 tax rate, triggers tax rollback election

On Thursday, August 22, the O'Donnell ISD Board of Trustees met and approved the 2013-2014 OISD budget and adopted a property tax rate of \$1.17 for Maintenance and Operating (M&O) to fund that budget. The adoption of the \$1.17 tax rate exceeds the OISD tax rollback rate, and, therefore, must be approved by the voters of the school district in a Tax Rollback Election (TRE).

The Tax Rollback Election will be held on November 5, 2013. Because the election is in November, tax notices for the O'Donnell ISD will not be sent to property owners on Oct. 1 when the Lynn County Appraisal District sends tax statements with tax rates from all other taxing entities. The OISD tax statements will be mailed separately to property owners after the election.

The proposed tax rate is 7-cents higher than the current OISD tax rate of \$1.10, and 20-cents higher than the effective tax rate of 97-cents. There is a reason, however, that the school district is asking voters to adopt the highest rate allowed by state law, and it has to do with capturing as much revenue as possible this year, because the following year OISD is expected to be designated as a Chapter 41 (rich school district) and could lose thousands of dollars in state funding, as well as losing the additional revenue

from wind energy when the wind energy abatements take effect, according to school officials.

Dr. Cathy Amonett, Superintendent of O'Donnell ISD, explains that the budget adopted by the Board for the 2013-14 school year is 5.95% lower than the 2012-2013 school year budget in both M&O expenses and total expenditures. "Notwithstanding the OISD

Board's cuts to the budget, the tax rate adopted by the Board exceeded the rollback tax rate because of a drastic drop in the effective tax rate. The effective tax rate is the rate that would bring in the same level of total revenue to OISD from local ad valorem taxes as last year when applied to the current year's total district property values. Last year's tax rate was \$1.10 and brought in local revenue of \$1,443,872. Due to OISD's large increase in assessed property value attributable to windmills constructed and operating in the District, the effective tax rate decreased to \$0.9733. In the case of OISD, under state law, the voters of the District must approve any rate that exceeds its 2013-14 effective tax rate through a Tax Rollback Election," said Supt. Amonett. "The Tax Rollback Elec-

"The Tax Rollback Election is being pursued so the district's fund balance will not be depleted during the 2014-2015 school year when the windmills cannot be fully taxed [due to abatements that will come into effect]," said Amonett. "The district is also evaluating facilities and will pursue facility improvements and additions with additional funds raised with the increased tax revenue," she added.

At the \$1.17 tax rate, taxes on a home valued at an average market value of \$35,645 in 2012-13 would increase by about \$12, according to figures released by the school district. The average market value would drop to \$34,558 for 2013-14, with taxes due of \$404.33 compared to \$392.10 last year at the \$1.10 tax rate.





### **TISD Board approves** \$1.17 tax rate, budget

No one attended a public hearing for information about the proposed tax rate and budget for Tahoka Independent School District last week, and the TISD Board formally adopted the \$1.17 tax rate and 2013-2014 budget in a special session immediately following the hearing. The 2013 tax rate is 4-cents higher than the 2012 rate of \$1.134900.

The public hearing was held prior to the special session last Thursday, August 29, as required by the state's truth-in-taxation laws. The proposed operating budget was \$7,034,166 million and the proposed tax rate was \$1.17 per \$100 of property value, which is the maximum the District can levy without triggering a rollback election. The rate that was needed to provide the same revenue was \$1.456 (the effective

Superintendent Steve Burleson explained that the proposed operating budget reflects a 4.9% increase in expenditures over last year's budget. However, school officials estimate that revenue from state foundation funds and local property taxes will still fall short of funding the proposed

"The District's goal is to commit to a conservative spending approach to reduce the amount that may be required to be pulled from its reserve funds during the 2013-2014 school year," explained the superintendent.

Following, the Budget and Tax Rate Hearing, the five trustees present at the meeting voted 5-0 to approve the proposed budget and also approved an ordinance setting the tax rate at \$1.17



### **The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly** Ag producers head into Fall with mixed emotions

by Bryan Reynolds, CEA Lynn County Agriculture

Lynn County ag producers are heading into Fall with mixed emotions - for some growers, Fall and harvest time will be exceeding their expectations, while others will still be feeling the effects of the lingering drought.

Some areas of the county have cotton and grain sorghum crops that received a few timely rains and those crops have the potential to produce some very nice yields. At the same time, other areas have dealt with high winds, lack of rain and/or hail storms. Those areas have crops that were replanted several times and are behind in terms of maturity. Some fields definitely need a good warm fall in terms of weather for those crops


to have any chance of producing significant yields.

Lynn County growers planted over 334,000 acres of cotton this year, which would rank among the largest acreage of cotton for any county in the U.S. However, more than 153,000 acres were failed due to the drought and storms. With that large number of failed acres, many producers replanted to grain sorghum. This year there are more than 67,000 acres of grain sorghum in Lynn County.

One of the biggest issues growers have faced this season, besides the weather, is weeds and weed control. After more than two years of historic drought, the rains helped germinate those weed seeds that had been lying dormant.

"One of the biggest weed issues is the herbicide resistance that has shown up in pigweed. This problem started last year on the South Plains and has really become a problem in 2013," said Bryan Reynolds, Lynn County Extension Agent. In some cases, pigweeds are showing a resistance to glyphosate herbicides. This resistance is causing growers problems in controlling this type of weed. Producers are having to look for different methods of controlling resistant weeds whether it be through mechanical methods, different herbicides or combinations of both methods.

"Overall, 2013 will definitely be more productive across the county for ag producers. However, we are still in the drought and it appears it will take significant weather changes to break out of this pattern," added Reynolds.



lines that were designed and built in 1911, although some areas have newer lines as they were replaced by necessity through the years. Tahoka easily qualified for a 'nuisance' rating for its waterline system in the EDAP criteria. It's a hopelessly outdated system that city officials have struggled to overcome, and Mayor Baker has high expectations that the waterline project will be approved for the construction funds next

"We hope to provide excellent service to our citizens with this project," Baker said. The project is expected to be completely funded by grant money in the EDAP program, without asking the citizens of Tahoka to help pay for the project.

"In that light, the City of Tahoka proposed no increases in taxes or fees to our citizens," stressed the mayor.
