Republican Primary to have six propositions

The Republican Primary, with John Baker as the County Party Chairman here, will be held in March and will include six propositions that voters statewide will consider, which were passed by the State Republican Executive Committee on Dec. 7, 2013.


by his parents and one sister, Emma Cook.

Voodwork

MONG the changes that 2014 will bring are these: No longer will you be able to buy 40-watt or 60-watt light bulbs, but maybe, before the year is out, you will get a chance to buy a new car that runs mostly on sunshine.

First, the light bulbs: As of Jan. 1 this year, no more 40-watt and 60-watt light bulbs are being manufactured, and they will be available only until current stocks in stores are gone. I had heard of this before, but sort of ignored it, and a survey somebody conducted last week indicated that 40 per cent of all citizens were not aware of the change.

The story I read didn't say if higher-wattage incandescent bulbs like 100s or 150s will still be made, but probably not, since the government has mandated that a new type of household light bulbs without the little inside filaments are to be used, whether you like them or not.

It wouldn't surprise me if the government were to establish a nationwide Light Bulb Police Force to go house-to-house to make sure we're not using the old type of light bulbs any more, although I don't think using them is illegal. It's just that I take a dim view of this light situation.

These new bulbs cost more than the old filament types, but supposedly last a lot longer, so will be cheaper in the long run. Of course, that remains to be seen, since the government has been known to lie to us.

The new bulbs are called halogen or "CFL." I've heard of halogen. CFL possibly stands for "Can't Find the Light."

I just hope the new lights will screw into the old fixtures in our homes. Replacing all the fixtures would be expensive.

NOW, A LOOK at the new car that runs on sunshine: (Big deal, I once knew a guy who claimed his car would run on moonshine—or anything else combustible).

Ford this month plans to unveil a solar-powered concept car that offers the same performance as a plug-in hybrid, but without the need for a plug. The car uses a gasoline engine combined with a device that acts like a magnifying glass to concentrate the sun's rays on the car's roof-mounted solar panels. Ford claims the car's estimated combined city-highway mileage is 100 mpg.

Ford says a full day of sunshine is equivalent to a four-hour battery charge, and that on a full charge, the car should have a range of 620 miles. The concept car was scheduled to be shown in Las Vegas this week.

Okay, so a car maybe can run mostly on sunshine. That's not so surprising when one considers the government has been running an entire nation for several years, mostly on hot air.







Pay property taxes by Jan.31 or face additional interest fees

Lynn County property owners who have not yet paid their 2013, property taxes have a few days left if they plan on getting by with no additional fees, interest or penalties tacked on their, original bills.

January 31 is the deadline to pay property taxes. After that, the late payment fees, penalties and interest begin to add up quickly.

Those who wait until February will pay an additional seven percent in penalties and interest. Every month following that, the penalties and interest go up by two percent through June when the penalty fee remains at 15 percent.

Property owners who want to pay their taxes in person have until 5 p.m. Friday, Jan. 31 to pay their taxes (without additional interest) at the Lynn County Appraisal District office, located at 1615 Main Street in Tahoka. If paid by mail, taxes must be postmarked by Jan. 31 to avoid penalties.

There is an option for homeowners over age 65 or disabled, to pay their taxes in four installments instead of a one-time full payment. To make the installment payments, the homeowner must notify the Appraisal District before the end of January, by phone or in person, of their intent to pay their tax bill in this method. 

Lynn County Judge Mike Braddock and his clerk, Lisa Meeks, show the application which they submitted to South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) for a regional solid waste grant to purchase a mini-dump trailer for the four commissioner precincts to share. Braddock presented the request to the SPAG board, and said Lynn County was placed second on the list to receive funds, one of six awarded from 15 applicants for the grant funds. Lynn County was awarded \$8,260, with the county's cost-share of \$4,130 contributing to the trailer purchase. "We were fortunate to be awarded these grant funds from among all the applicants," said Braddock. "The county has run into such a problem with illegal tire dumping and other debris left on county roads, and this trailer will be used monthly by each precinct to collect and dispose of it. The tires will be recycled with State Rubber Environmental Solutions to save our landfill space," he added.




