





Joseph Lemuel Scott

Our Daddy, Grandpa and Great-Grandpa, Joseph Lemuel Scott died on January 7, 2014 at the age of 95, just two days shy of his 96th birthday.

He was born January 9, 1918 to Fred and Maud Abel Scott. He was baptized at the age of 6 by the same Rising Star Church of Christ that his grandfather and namesake was baptized by in 1879. He had two older sisters, Noma Iru Scott Dryden and Emma La Verne Scott Gentle. At the age of 11, Lemuel began to keep bees and he taught his Aunt Florence how to enjoy the sting to savor the honey. He graduated from Carbon High School and attended Texas A&M University. In 1936, the boll weevil ruined chances of making a cotton crop in Eastland county, so Fred and Maud moved the family to Lynn County settling on the home place east of Wilson where they farmed, raising cattle, hogs, chickens and bees. Fred and Lemuel took a risk in buying more land out west of Tahoka. After breaking ground out of mesquite, the first crop of cotton on this new land was up and shinning with large green leaves when a hail storm decimated it. Without hesitating, they tried a new variety of early-maturing grain sorghum called "Martin maize". It did well enough fetching a high price that year to pay for the new aland that first year.

Lemuel, in his youth was a builder of windmills. He set up at least 7 windmills to supply water for homes, and livestock. It was a passion of his to harness the wind. He put up a 32-volt wind-generator and bought batteries to light up the home place, run the family AM radio and even power an early refrigerator.

air base buddy; L.C. Strawn that Lemuel went to Turkey, Texas where he met Mary Jane Godwin at the Godwin Hatchery and farm. He fell in love with her as she was milking their family cow when he first saw her and he had to know more about her. They married September 13, 1943 in the home of "Doc" and Lessie Castleberry of Slaton. They bought a small, comfortable nice house in Lubbock where the modern day Overton Hotel now stands. They were soon blessed with daughters: Rose LaRue and Lema Jo. One day at the air base, Lemuel heard an Air Corp woman joke and tell him that he was going to be shipped out to a "Farm" - Lemuel was reassigned out to the middle of the Atlantic Ocean with about 15 other men on a barren rock of an island known as Ascension. It was there for the remainder of the war that those men grew vegetables hydroponically using distilled ocean water and trace minerals. The produce they raised went to feed the officers and servicemen overseas.

After the war, Lemuel went back to farming, first living on the half-section of his Aunt Florence's east of Wilson when their son John was born and then on the quarter section east of Tahoka where he helped build the current home east of Tahoka in 1950. Two more sons were born: Jack and Freddy

In 1959, the local county agent drove up and showed Lemuel a small bag of grass seed imported from the pans (playa lakes) of Africa and asked him if he could grow and harvest the seed it made. That small patch of Kleingrass was the first to be grown in Texas.

It was with the suspicious and tragic death of his Aunt Nora in 1973 and the abduction of his Aunt Florence Scott that soon led to Lemuel being denied his expected inheritance of the family land that broke his heart in 1974. Lemuel then had to cling to the less than modern ways of farming, fearing even more losses at the hands of those with mental illness and those who would take what wasn't theirs.

Lemuel continued to follow a rotation of cotton and grain sorghum on his farms and he tried other crops using and adhering to contour farming principals with grass on the terraces and turn-rows for cover to control the wind and water erosion. In 1995, he was awarded the Lynn County Conservation Farmer of the Year.

The love of his life, Mary Jane Scott preceded him in death on January 14, 2002. Lemuel is survived by two daughters. Rose and Lema (Joste), three sons, John, Jack, and Freddy, four grandchildren, eight great-grandchildren, many friends including Mr. Wayne Whitehorn,



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

Arrests made for sexual abuse, false report

Early this week, 39 persons were being held in Lynn County jail, counting 17 held for Ector County, 3 for Andrews and 2 for Dawson County.

Among those arrested in the last week were one man charged with sexual abuse of a child/ continuous victim under age 14, plus a false report to a police officer involving law enforcement employment. Another man was jailed for invalid drivers license, and a third was held for driving while intoxicated/open container. In a report dated Jan. 7, Lynn Gounty jail was holding 42 inmates, including 16 for Ector County, 3 for Andrews County and 2 for Dawson County.

Among the 21 persons arrested in Lynn County were persons charged with application to revoke probation on conviction of fabricating physical evidence, a female accused of theft of property over \$50, assault causing bodily injury to a family member plus possession of a controlled substance, revocation of probation on possession of a controlled substance, driving while intoxicated third offense or more plus evading arrest, DWI first offense, possession of a controlled substance and drug paraphernalia, manufacture with intent to deliver controlled substance plus failure to identify to a peace officer, and an application to revoke probation on conviction of burglary of a habitation plus fugitive fleeing, plus robbery.


