



VFD says: Change batteries in smoke detectors

reminds citizens to change the batteries in smoke alarms in their homes, and to purchase at least one smoke alarm if one is not already in the home. Most alarms need a new battery at lest once a year. Some smoke alarms have batteries that last for up to 10 years, but if the alarm is more than 10 years old it must be completely replaced with a new alarm and a new battery.

Check smoke alarms monthly by pressing the test button. Never take smoke alarm batteries out to put into other items like games or remote controls, and teach children what the smoke alarm sounds like and what to do when they hear the alarm sound.

Almost two-thirds of home fire deaths resulted from fires in properties without working smoke alarms, according to information from the U.S. Fire Administration. More than one-third of home fire deaths resulted from fires in which no smoke alarms were present at all. One-quarter of the deaths were caused by fires in properties in which smoke alarms were present but failed to operate, because of dead batteries, or missing or disconnected batteries.

Architectural plans drawn for proposed new hospital

rchitectural plans have been drawn for the construction of a new hospital here, as Lynn County Hospital District officials progress with plans for a proposed new hospital and renovation of the current facility into a full-time nursing home. The plans provide for building to the west of the current hospital building, for an LCHD complex that would include a new hospital and nursing home adjacent to Lynnwood Independent & Assisted Living Center, with all three facilities connected.

The modern hospital plan features innovative design to incorporate new treatment/surgery rooms and ER facilities, and 20 private patient rooms as well as kitchen/dining facilities and other necessary offices and facilities, and a small outdoor dining area and walking path. A portion of the current hospital, such as the clinic office/treatment rooms and administrative offices, would be remodeled to incorporate the new design, and the remainder of the hospital (including the current hospital patient rooms)

would be renovated in a second phase

as nursing home facilities.

Lynn County residents will have an opportunity to vote on a \$28 million bond for the proposed project, in a May 10 election. Stace Holland, Hospital CEO, says he is planning to have several town hall meetings in the community throughout the month of April, to explain the proposal and answer questions county residents may have about the project.

"We are excited about an opportunity to grow and serve the

residents of Lynn County," said Holland, adding that the hospital has seen significant increases in patient admissions during the previous year, up 157% from 60 admissions in 2012 to 154 admissions in 2013, and Emergency Room (ER) visits increased from 1,921 in 2012 to 2,280 in 2013, which is an increase of 19%. Lab and x-ray usage has also increased dramatically in the past year.

Holland believes this increase in volume in patient care areas is due to a renewed dedication and commitment of hospital staff offering compassionate care to their patients, and he has high expectations that providing more testing procedures and surgical services will bring even more growth, while providing much-needed healthcare services here.

"We want Lynn County Hospital to be the first choice for healthcare, and we believe that a new physical facility that provides more space and offers more services would have a positive impact on the community," said Holland.

He said that if the bond election passes voter approval, the economic impact on the community during the construction phase could be significant.

"During the construction, I estimate we would have 60 workers here every day – that's 60 extra people in town who need meals, gasoline for their vehicles, and other amenities," said Holland. He estimated that if each worker spent a minimum of \$15 per day for meals alone, that would bring \$900 a day to local food establishments.

When construction is completed, Holland said that he anticipates hiring 24-30 more people to staff the new nursing home and some additional hospital staff, which would bring local job opportunities and hundreds of thousands of dollars to the community. In addition, the CEO

James Craig appointed Lynn County Attorney

James Craig, a Tahoka attorney, was appointed Monday as Lynn County Attorney, to fill the position being vacated by Donnis Scott on April 1. Lynn County Commissioners approved the appointment in a unanimous decision after interviewing Craig and deliberating in Monday morning's session. Atty. Scott is resigning to accept a position as an Assistant AG.

Craig and another local attorney, Rebekah Filley, were the two applicants for the position, but Mrs. Filley was reportedly unable to attend the interview session as she was in a hospital giving birth at the time.

The interview and deliberation process was conducted in closed executive session for just over an hour, and upon returning to open session Commissioner Danny Martin made the motion to appoint Craig as Lynn County Attorney beginning April 1, seconded by Commissioner Keith Wied. Commissioners Martin, Wied, Don Blair and John Hawthorne all voted in favor.

Craig will serve as the county attorney until the November 2014 Gen-



eral Election, at which time he plans to file as a write-in candidate for the two-year unexpired term, since it is too late to file for a place on the ballot. Any other interested write-in candidates may also file when that filing period opens.

"I am excited to be able to serve the county as the Lynn County Attorney, and look forward to working with other county officials," Craig told *The News*.

In other business, commissioners approved a contract with Switch IT for 12 new computers for county offices, and approved an interlocal agreement for a Regional Public Defender for capital cases, should any such cases come to trial in the county.


Ashley Nicole Clark reported March 11 that the glass window on the back screen door of her home had been broken out, with damage estimated at \$100.





46 He sat on the sidewalk alone, the cardboard beneath him his only protection from the cold cement. Around him people talked. They laughed. They ordered coffee to go. Occasionally, someone would

drop a coin into the can at his side. The loud clank revealed that the can was virtually empty. A scrawled sign said, "I'm blind. Please help." Later a woman came walking down the sidewalk on her way to a meeting. She walked past the man, and then something made her stop. She turned and looked thoughtfully at the man, the sign and the empty can. She stepped forward and grabbed the sign. She flipped it over and she began to write. Without a word the revised sign was returned to its place and the woman strode off to her appointment.

The scene on the street began to change. Many of the people who passed the sitting man stopped to give a coin or even several coins. The empty clang in the can was replaced with the softer clink of a can filling with money. Several hours later the man heard the familiar sound of the earlier woman returning. He reached out and felt the familiar shoes to confirm it was her. "What did you do to my sign?" he asked. "I wrote the same thing you did but with different words," she replied. "Thank you," he said gratefully as she walked off. What did the new sign say that had made all the difference?

"It's a beautiful day and I can't see it.

This story really touched me, and I thought about the compassion that we all need in order to help those that are hurting or disabled. That's when I realized the story paralleled our Hospital. "Productivity appraisal" may lower the property taxes on your farm, ranch or timberland!

Texas law allows farmers, ranchers, wildlife managers and timber growers to pay property taxes based upon the productivity value of their land rather than on market value. This means qualified land is taxed based on its ability to produce crops, livestock or timber—not on its value on the real estate market. And it can mean substantial property

When is the application deadline?

If your land has never had a productivity appraisal or you are a new owner, you must apply to your local appraisal district before May 1 to take advantage of this benefit on your 2014 property taxes. You may get up to 60 extra days if you have a good reason and ask for it before May 1. If you miss this deadline, you may still be able to apply, but you will pay a penalty. Check with your appraisal district office.

Do you need to reapply annually?

If your land already receives agricultural or timber productivity appraisal, you normally don't need to reapply unless the chief appraiser requires you to do so. If a new application is required, the appraisal district will notify you by mail.
