

With seven more persons jailed for offenses in Lynn County during the last week, the jail was holding 47 inmates early this week, including 20 for Ector County, six for Dawson County and one for Andrews County.

Those recently jailed were charged with driving while license invalid with previous conviction, aggravated assault causing bodily injury, unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, public intoxication with two or more previous convictions, possession of marijuana, and criminal trespass.

During May, dispatchers at the sheriff's office processed 283 calls, including 124 for the county, 82 for City of Tahoka, 10 for City of O'Donnell, 23 for ambulances, 39 for animal control and five fire alarms

ISD," she told The News. The Board must wait 21 days after naming a finalist to offer a contract to the candidate, which would be Thursday, June 26. Trustees have scheduled a meeting for the 26th with the issue on the agenda, and are also hosting a reception after the meeting, from 6-7 p.m. at the Harvick Building, to introduce Dr. McFarland to the community.

In 2010, he enrolled in the Superintendent Certification program at the University of Texas at Permian Basin and received his superintendent certification in 2011. In the fall of 2012, he enrolled in the Doctoral program of Educational Leadership at Lamar University in Beaumont, Texas. He completed all requirements for his doctoral degree in the spring of 2014.

In Lynn County, the Lakeview and New Home areas were hardest hit on Saturday night, taking out power lines and overturning more than a dozen pivot systems. Young cotton was hailed out in a swath from Lakeview to near U.S. 87, according to Lynn County Commissioner Danny Martin, and Lubbock TV stations reported wind gusts up to 96 mph in the Wolfforth area.

This photo, taken by Lyntegar employee Slate May, was taken at daybreak Sunday, south of County Road 3 on FM 212 (east of Wilson, south of Slaton), as crews were making repairs.

Lyntegar reported a total of 2,957 meters off over their entire service area due to the storms, as well as two Draw and Hackberry Substations off due to an Xcel transmission outage. More than 30 poles were down, and crews worked throughout the weekend to replace lines as quickly as possible. Many New Home/Lakewview area residents were without power Saturday night, but most had been restored by Sunday evening.



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

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

The City of Tahoka is initiating a citywide cleanup by providing extra-large containers in several locations for citizens to dump furniture, mattresses, tree limbs and other debris. The large bin will first be available on Friday, June 13, in the northeast section at 1101 N. 7th (near Pleasant Grove Baptist Church). The bin will be in this location for two weeks, and then moved to another location to be announced. Residents of Tahoka are encouraged to placed unwanted items in the bins, excluding metal, batteries, tires, hazardous materials, and paint

Frances Truehart, Code Enforcement for the City of Tahoka, reminds citizens that they are responsible for any items that they may place in their alleys.

"If you have piled/collected items in the alley for pickup, you may place these items in the cleanup bins, otherwise, you are responsible to haul the items to the landfill as the City does not remove items any longer," she added. To have metal items picked up please call the Code Enforcement Office at City Hall, 561-4211.

She also asks local residents to keep weeds and grasses mowed to help keep the mosquito population under control.

"Hooray for the rain! But with rain the weeds are growing – weeds/grasses over 12" are in violation of City Ordinances and invite mosquitoes, mice, and general unwanted varmints," said Truehart. "Please remove weeds/ grasses around items (trees, trash bins, etc), along fence lines, in alleys, and along roadways. Please help keep Tahoka beautiful!" she added.

New wastewater treatment plant completed for Wilson community

ilson city officials celebrated the completion of their new wastewater treatment plant and lift station last Thursday afternoon, hosting ribbon cutting ceremonies at the new facility at 2 p.m. The \$1.7 million project took five years to complete, from the application process for funding and through the design and construction phase, and replaces a system that was 50 years old.

the future. While the project may not be a glamorous addition to the city, it is absolutely essential for the infrastructure of the community.

The city also has a new lift station, built with a \$250,000 grant from the Texas Dept. of Agriculture. The lift station will provide service to the entire city of Wilson by pumping all wastewater collected in town to the new wastewater treatment plant. The lift station is located west of the Texas Coop Gin in Wilson and is equipped with two new sewage pumps and pipeline to efficiently pump the city's wastewater.

The new wastewater treatment plant consists of a 135'x330' facultative lagoon and storage pond system. Wastewater pumped from the lift station travels slowly through the facultative lagoon, allowing solids to settle to the bottom, and the treatment process begins.

Following initial treatment in the lagoon, the wastewater moves to the 140'x320' storage pond. The treated wastewater in the storage pond is used to

irrigate 25 acres of agricultural land. Both the facultative lagoon and the storage pond are lined with a 60-mil plastic liner to prevent groundwater contamination.

"Yearly operation and maintenance costs should be very minimal as the wastewater treatment plant has no moving parts, except for two irrigation pumps," explained Kori Welch, an engineer for the project, with Parkhill Smith & Cooper, Inc.

Fireworks not banned this year

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session Tuesday morning at the courthouse to consider several routine agenda items, one of which was whether to act upon a fireworks ban for the upcoming July 4th Independence Day holiday. After some discussion, commissioners decided not to issue a ban on fireworks this year for the rural unincorporated areas, since recent rains have alleviated much of the fire hazards.

City residents, however, should be aware that most cities (including Tahoka) have city ordinances banning the shooting off of fireworks within the city limits.

In other business, commissioners approved bids from Guardian for security camera systems at the county's weigh station and annex building, and approved a resolution requested by Texas Farm Bureau supporting opposition to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's proposed rules defining "waters of the United States" in the Clean Water Act. County Judge Mike Braddock led the meeting with all commissioners present, as well as other county officials.



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



City waterline project enters design phase

The city waterline project, to replace underground waterlines throughout the city, has finally been approved for the planning portion of the project, and is now entering the design phase, Mayor John Baker informed Tahoka City Council members at Monday night's city council meeting.

City Administrator Jerry Webster told The News that the final category D in the planning phase has been approved, and it is anticipated that the design phase of the project should be completed by the end of August. When the finalized design plans are submitted to the state, Webster said, state officials must review and approve the plans before the construction phase can get underway. "It is supposed to take up

to 60 days to get approval from the state, but sometimes it can take longer. We hope to be ready to move on to the construction phase before the end of this year," said Webster.

Mayor Baker told The News that he hopes to have more news on a timeline for the project soon, and a more in-depth story will be printed when the information becomes available

In other business, council members heard a presentation from Julia Allen regarding a contract between the A.C.T. Board (Advancing the Community of Tahoka) and The Retail Coach Company for an economic development project. The council approved a contract of up to \$3,000 with The Retail Coach Co. to conduct a survey of the community to determine what types of businesses could realistically be sought, and to follow up with training the A.C.T. Board on how to go about bringing these new businesses to Tahoka. The A.C.T. Board uses funds, upon city council approval, collected from a half-cent sales tax for such projects.

The council approved the appointment of a new member to the A.C.T. Board, naming someone from a list of choices presented by the A.C.T. Board, but declined to name the person until he could be contacted to give his consent to serve on the board.

The City Administrator was instructed to seek proposals for a CPA firm to conduct the city's annual audit, and to bring the proposals for consideration at a future council meeting. Monthly bills were approved, and the council named councilwoman Amy Preston as Mayor Pro-Tem.



To be eligible to serve on an FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area where the person is nominated.

Farmers and ranchers may nominate themselves or others. Organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign the nomination form, FSA-669A. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections. Nomination forms for the 2014 election must be postmarked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on Aug. 1, 2014. Elections will take place this fall.

While FSA county committees do not approve or deny farm ownership or operating loans, they make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, emergency programs, commodity price support loan programs and other agricultural issues. Members serve three-year terms. Nationwide, there are about 7,800 farmers and ranchers serving on FSA county committees.

FSA will mail ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 3. Ballots are due back to the local county office by Dec. 1, 2014. Newly elected committee members and alternates take office on Jan. 1, 2015.


