Sandra Sconiers named new TISD Elementary Principal

ahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in special session Monday evening, voting to hire Sandra Sconiers as Tahoka Elementary Principal, and on Tuesday morning Ms. Sconiers was already at work in her new office, tending to her duties as the opening date approaches quickly for the 2014-15 school year.

Ms. Sconiers comes to Tahoka from Lubbock, where she has been an assistant principal in Lubbock ISD at Brown and Wheelock elementary schools since 2010. She was a second/third grade teacher for the first 10 years of her educational career. Afterwards she spent two years as an educational consultant for Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, an educational and trade publisher for textbooks and other instructional materials, before her assistant principal position.

Serving Lynn County since 1903

"I am so excited and looking forward to being here," Sconiers told *The News* on Tuesday morning.

The Board also hired another teacher for the upcoming year, approving a contract for Angela Colbert, high school art teacher.

In other business, trustees approved a contract with TASB for the district's Risk Management plan, which includes insurance for property, automobiles, casualty, and workers compensation; and approved the 2014-

2015 TISD student code of conduct, and the PDAS (teacher evaluation) calendar for the 2014-2015 school year, appointing administrators Dr. George McFarland, Jeff Perez, Jeff Fleenor, and Sandra Sconiers as district second PDAS appraisers.

The Board approved a contract with Heartland School Solutions for the 2014-15 school year to provide software used in the district's cafeteria management system, and reviewed the 2014-2015 student handbook.

Trustees also received information that the bus TISD is having refurbished (interior and transmission) will be on display at the TASA/TASB convention in Dallas on September 26-28. The company offered a discount to TISD for allowing the display to show their work at the convention, and a school official plans to drive the bus back to Tahoka from the convention to save a delivery service charge from the company, which is located in Huntsville.

TEACHING GLOBALLY,

THS grad named Teacher of Month in South Korean teaching position

rom his small town roots in Tahoka, a young man finds adventure and fulfillment in traveling to other countries for opportunities to teach English. He has learned to find his way in countries where he was unable to read street signs and menus, or even to give his own address in the language that a cab driver would understand. But it's a life that suits him, and recently he was surprised to find that he was being honored as teacher of the month.

Casey Jones, a Tahoka High School grad who teaches English as a foreign language to students in the Republic of South Korea, was named Teacher of the Month by the agency that placed him in the position. Footprints Recruiting, a global leader in recruiting certified teachers and ESL instructors for teaching jobs abroad, featured him in their company newsletter as Teacher of the Month for June 2014 (see it online at www.footprintsrecruiting.com/teacher-community/featured-teachers).

It's 7,000 flight miles from Tahoka to Ulsan, and a 14-hour time difference. Getting from Tahoka to Ulsan was a 24-hour adventure in "planes, trains and automobiles" for Jones, and included a middle-of-the-night "sign language" attempt with a Korean hotel manager, who

had to awaken his son to help him translate the exhausted traveler's English request (all children in Korean public schools must learn English as a foreign language). He had two days to recover from the trip, unpack and get situated in his new apartment, familiarize himself with his neighborhood, shop for groceries and try to figure out the bus transit system to get to school on his first day of work.

The first day had its difficulties. He discovered he took the wrong bus to get to Ulsan Elementary School that first day, and ended up getting off the bus in an unfamiliar area and finding a cab to get him back to the school. When he left school at the end of the day, he took the right bus but the bus stop is several blocks from his apartment, and, unable to read any street signs and still

unfamiliar with the area, he admits he "wandered around" for a time before he was able to (See TEACHING GLOBALLY, page 4)

Tahoka ISD will have new student registration on Tuesday, August 12, from 10:00 a.m.-2:00 p.m. in the elementary LRC and in the high school counselor's

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office. This includes any student new to the school district and any new Pre-K students.

Pre-K students will need to fill out an eligibility form or have someone pick it up for them to be filled out and returned to the elementary office as soon as possible in order to determine if they qualify. This includes any Pre-K students that were pre-registered in the spring.

Parents need to bring their driver's license or ID and the student's birth certificate, social security card, immunization records and last report card. If this information was provided for a Pre-K student in the spring then it will not be needed again, according to school officials.



locate his apartment building.

The public transportation by bus is a very common way for many residents to travel. Jones does not own a vehicle, as foreign ownership is a costly venture, but has learned the transit system by trial and error, and is philosophical about making mistakes in choosing the wrong route.

That's just part of living in a foreign country - hopefully you can figure out where you are and get back to where you intended,"

Jones is a 2001 graduate of Tahoka High School, and holds a Bachelor's Degree in Sociology from Texas Tech University, and a Masters Certification in TEFL (Teaching English as a Foreign Language). He is the son of Gary and Juanell Jones of Tahoka, and grandson of Dalton and Lenda Wood of Tahoka and Marie Brieger of Slaton.

He spent three years in Japan teaching English to youth and adults, both in public and private school settings, and then returned to the USA for a time, eventually deciding that teaching English in a foreign country was his true calling. He accepted the position in Ulsan, South Korea and moved there in October 2013.

"I chose Korea because I was looking for a public school job with financial incentives, and I was looking for a new place in Asia since I feel that my in-



A different spelling ... The Korean spelling for these fruits is unique, which Jones learned how to read in a Korean language class.


troverted, mindful personality relates better in this part of the world," Jones said. He teaches 150 students in grades K-6.

"I feel that what separates the remembered teachers from the adequate teachers is that the good teachers do most of the small things well: interacting in small talk with the kids, doing purposeful one-on-one time, giving kids equal opportunities to earn something, discipline appropriately but not overly, producing classes with a variety of activities over the long haul, etc. When it succeeds and you have a class that is attentive and listens by their own choosing, that's when you can

have real joy in your job. Who wouldn't want that? Teaching and being received well abroad provides one real lifeline into that aim we each possess within us to want more out of life," he ex-

"Once a month on Wednesday afternoons, we have student club classes at school and everyone can make their choice of which club class they want to go to: recorder, violin, drama, movie, balloon making (like you see at a carnival), art, craft making, origami club, and others. I was asked to have a club this year related to English, and I eventually chose to have an English News club class. It's not meant to be serious since it is meant to be a club class. It's a small club with only ten sixth graders, and I have them watch news clips from CNN Student News. In Korea, most schools have mounted, flat-screen TVs in the classroom, which makes for a very helpful tool. My objective for this club class is meant for watching English news videos and having the kids retaining some of the information in developing awareness and their general world knowledge," he said.

Jones arrived in South Korea knowing very little of the language, but has since taken Korean language classes at Ulsan University during the evening hours after work. He lives within walking distance of the university.





classes at Ulsan University in South Korea. He was the only American in the class that included students from Vietnam, Pakistan, Bangladesh, and Norway. "Ironically, as time passed, it was speaking in English that became our common bond that, and our collective attempts of academic interpretation of trying to understand what the heck was happening in our Korean language class!" said Jones, who teaches English as a foreign language at an

Under state law, the dollar amount of school taxes imposed on the residence homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or of the surviving spouse of such a person, if the surviving spouse was 55 years of age or older when the person died, may not be increased above the amount paid in the first year after the person turned 65, regardless of changes in tax rate or property value.

Notice of Rollback Rate: The highest tax rate the district can adopt before requiring voter approval at an election is 1.170000. This election will be automatically held if the district adopts a rate in excess of the rollback rate of 1.170000.

Ulsan is a seaside metropolitan city in the southeast of Korea with a population of 1.2 million. The city is known for its whaling heritage and more recently as the industrial heart of the country.

"It was an interesting class experience. There were a total of twelve Korean class students, all foreigners: four people from Vietnam (two men and two women), three men from Pakistan, three men from Bangladesh, one man from Norway, and me as a fellow solitary countryman being the American in the group. All of them are graduate-degree level students in different fields on study abroad programs here in Korea. I was the only official non-student in the class, as I was not taking the class for credit, and I was a complete stranger to every single person there prior to this class. Ironically as time passed, it was speaking in English that became our common bond - that, and our collective attempts of academic interpretation of trying to understand what the heck was happening in class! We humorously got along just fine with many assigned Korean dialogues, subsequent giggles, and purposefully premature 'break time' calls along the way.

"When we were not in class, I would take my Korean notes and textbook with me to a café I often visit, and the café owner would quiz and drill me with Korean vocabulary questions at the end

of her night shift," he added. One of the most difficult aspects of living in a foreign country is learning how to communicate with citizens on a day to day basis - ordering at restaurants, shopping at grocery stores, banking and paying bills.

"What I'm most thankful for in this Korean language class was that it taught me to read. For that skill alone, the price of this course felt invaluable to me and makes me feel a little better about myself. It is my strongest Korean language skill. I remember the moment when I could authentically read my first cafe restaurant menu without translation or assistance. It was an inner joyous occasion with an outer fist pump for good measure!" said Jones.

He is limited to the school's curriculum in teaching the English courses, but he is allowed some creativity in certain areas. Recently he organized a "show and tell" project, asking his Korean students to talk about a personal talent, a hobby, or to bring something interesting or special from their home and be able to speak about it in English for two minutes. He was quite pleased with the results, with an added bonus of getting to know more about each student as they talked about what was important to them. The presentations ranged greatly in variety, from magic shows to artwork, from a blind taste test

between Coke and Pepsi, to one girl's presentation of "Why I love my Mashahiro (stuffed doll)," and a memorable performance of The Beatles' song, "I Will," by a guy duo that "really got into it!"

He says he enjoys his students, and that his time in South Korea has been a great adventure. He recently re-upped for another year, and will be teaching there through October 2015. After that, he may choose another opportunity in another country.

During his four-year foreign. teaching career to date, he has taught over 1500 students at a... total of eight schools: three elementary schools, three nursery schools, and two academy conversation schools.

"The best way to express" the fullness of my feelings as a .teacher is that school atmosphere, ... teaching dynamics, and environments make all the difference in the world," he concluded.

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
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County Conservation partners to host Local Working Group meeting Aug. 13



Sorghum growers cautioned on possible armyworm invasion

"This is not a panic situation yet, but a growing number of reports of increasing numbers of fall armyworms from AgriLife Extension entomologists located across the state have led us to warn producers of this possible threat," said Dr. Charles Allen, AgriLife Extension statewide integrated pest management coordinator at San Angelo.

Fall armyworms are the caterpillar or larval stage of a drab-colored moth with striking translucent white hind wings. The caterpillars can quickly devastate a crop if left unchecked,

Allen said. Not much damage occurs when larvae are small, but as larva become full grown damage rapidly increases. The larvae are brownish and relatively smooth-skinned with stripes running the length of the body. Mature caterpillars are about 1.5-2 inches long.

Drs. Pat Porter and Ed Bynum, AgriLife Extension entomologists at Lubbock and Amarillo, respectively, are trying to make sure AgriLife Extension personnel, consultants and farmers are aware of the potential threat to grain sorghum and non-Bt corn in West Texas.

Bynum is running a trapping network for fall armyworms and other pests in the Panhandle.

"Fall armyworm moth captures are unusually high in Lipscomb, Gray, Randall and Swisher counties, and appear to be high across much of the Panhandle," Bynum said.

"Some whorlstage grain sorghum is being treated in Lubbock and Lynn counties," Porter said. "My non-Bt corn test plots at Lubbock have at least one fall armyworm per ear. The really troubling thing is that numbers in our fall armyworm traps this past weekend, were abnormally high and may reach 1,000 moths per trap this week.

"This is 10 times higher than what we caught this time last year, and this is the July flight. The big flight usually occurs in August. We hope natural enemies and weather will keep them in check, but growers need to be aware that damaging populations may develop and be prepared to deal with them."

Rick Minzenmayer, AgriLife Extension entomologist for Runnels and Tom Green counties, said fall armyworms and corn concern in his area of Central West Texas on both forage and grain sorghums.

"Our grain sorghum looks great and many fields have just finished blooming, but we really need to be watching for headworms (headworm refers to either fall armyworms or corn earworms)," Minzenmayer said. "A simple economic threshold for when control measures are warranted is 12 one-half inch or larger larvae per 25 heads of

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
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2014 Property Tax Rates in CITY OF NEW HOME
