

C.B. "Boots" King: Tahoka's WWII Combat Glider Pilot

National Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day, which is observed annually on December 7, is to remember and honor all those who died in the attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. It is a tradition to fly the Flag of the United States at half-staff until sunset in honor of dead patriots.

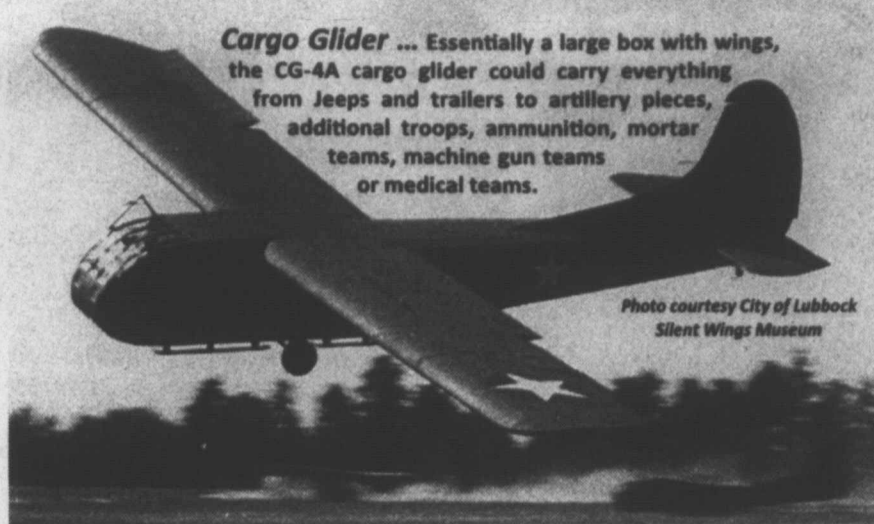
On Sunday morning, December 7, 1941 America's naval base at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii was attacked by aircraft and submarines of the Imperial Japanese Navy, killing 2,403 American military personnel and civilians and injuring 1,178 others. The attack sank four U.S. Navy battleships and damaged four more. It also damaged or sank three cruisers, three destroyers, and one minelayer. Aircraft losses were 188 destroyed and 159 damaged. The day after the attack, the United States declared war on Japan and entered World War II.

During World War II many new military tactics were used to fight the war. One of the best known was the use of paratroopers, by the thousands, in operations known as "vertical envelopments". Most of the belligerents in the war used airborne troops, but the U.S. and the British were the most committed advocates of the strategy. The idea of surrounding and disrupting the enemy from above played a major role in Allied invasions into hostile territory, such as at Normandy, into Holland, and finally into Germany.

For these airborne operations to have any chance of success

SURVEY: TISD survey seeks community input for bond possibility to update school facilities

"How satisfied or dissatisfied are you with the quality of school facilities in Tahoka ISD?"

This is just one of 12 questions on a survey posted on the Tahoka Independent School District website that school officials are asking community members to complete. The survey offers multiple-choice options for answering each question.

According to Dr. George McFarland, Superintendent, parents of current students have been contacted to seek their responses to the survey, but he and the Board of Trustees would like for the entire community to give their input on the survey.

"The survey is posted on our district website welcome page which asks for community input regarding the district possibly seeking a bond to upgrade district facilities. I made a callout to district parents about it, but I am very interested in all community members giving input using this survey so that we can get as wide a perspective as possible," said Dr. McFarland.

To find the survey, go to the Tahoka ISD website at <http://tahokaisd.us>, and

look under the "District" subheading for "About the District." Click on "About the District" and it will take you to a page with a link to the survey. Complete the survey online, and then click the "Submit" button at the end of the survey to send the results.

With just 12 questions to answer, the survey may be completed in a few minutes, and is completely anonymous. The survey will be available on the school website through Dec. 19.

Among other questions, the survey asks whether there is a need to renovate existing building facilities, or to build new structures to replace existing facilities; whether there would be support to upgrade or build a new gymnasium; and the likelihood of supporting a tax increase to support a bond for capital improvements to facilities.

"We urge the community members, business owners, farmers, and people who don't have children in our school system to please complete the survey,

so that we may gain insight of their support, or non-support, of these issues," Dr. McFarland told *The News*. "I can say that this survey will directly impact the direction that the Board of Trustees will need to go, and what approach to take in addressing these needs. We conducted a similar survey with staff members, which showed them to be very pro-facility oriented," he added.

Dr. McFarland said that the results of the survey are tabulated in an ongoing process, and that he plans to update the Board of Trustees on the results at their Dec. 18 board meeting.

Tahoka PTO hosting canned food drive

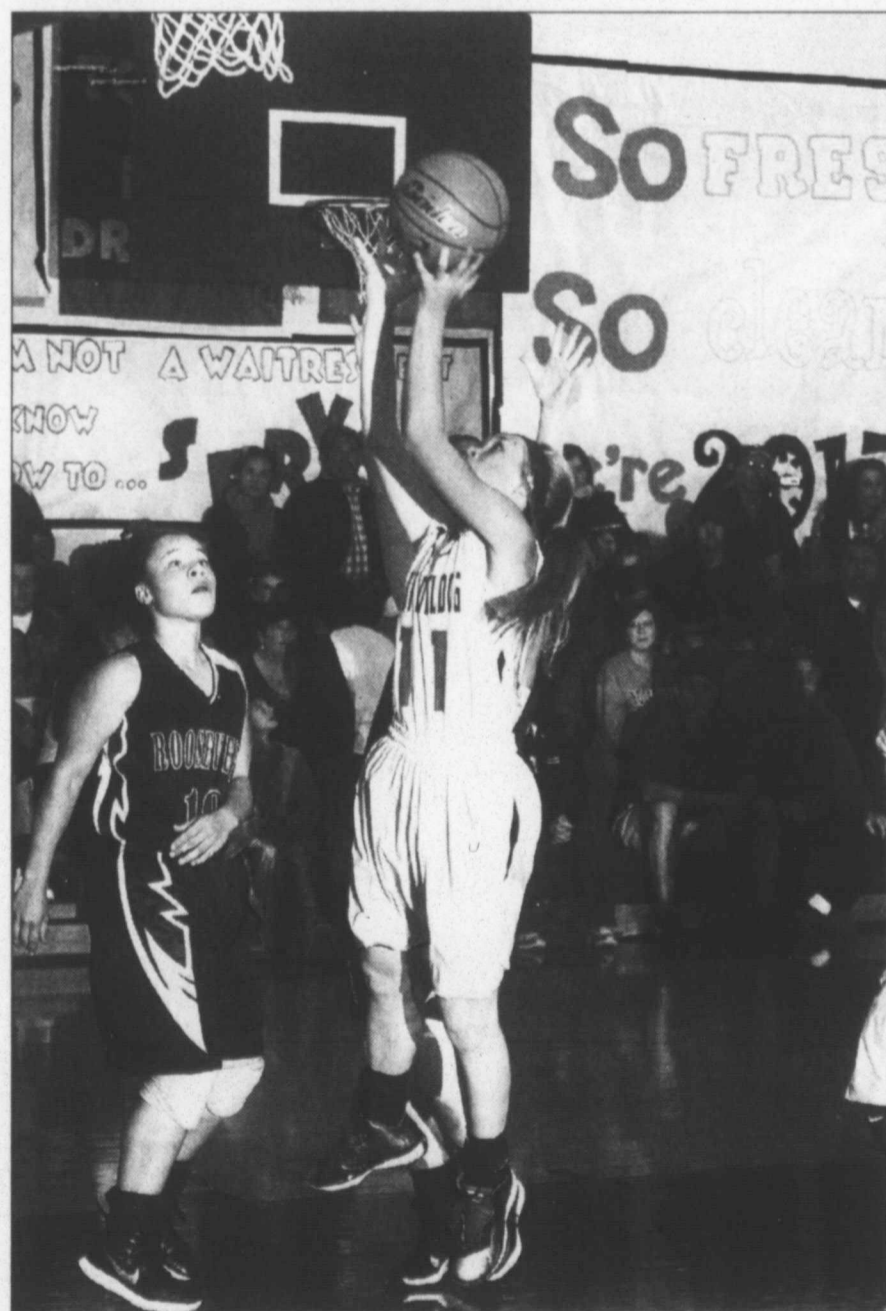

EMT Basic class to be offered here

Adults interested in earning an EMT-Basic certification may take an EMT-Basic class in Tahoka, starting Jan. 5, sponsored by Lynn County Hospital District and approved by Texas DSHS. The class will be offered Monday and Tuesday nights from Jan. 5 through April 25 at the Tahoka High School vocational building (the new portable building facing the high school campus).

The class is open to the public (must be 18 years of age by Aug. 15, 2015), and limited to the first 20 who pre-register. Registration is due by Jan. 5, by calling Lynn County EMS Director John Baker at Lynn County Hospital District, phone 806-998-4533 ext. 505.

Cost of the class is \$275, but anyone who joins the Lynn County Ambulance Service after completion of the class may have this fee reimbursed (must join for a two-year period, and will be reimbursed after the first year).

Memorial services for Walter Lee Hardt were held at the Nevels Cemetery in Tahoka on Tuesday, December 2, 2014 at 3:00 p.m. He died on Wednesday, November 26, 2014 after a brief stay in UMC hospital in Lubbock.

Walter was born March 19, 1951 in Lubbock, to Warren (Jr.) and Frances McKibben Hardt. He served four years in the United States Army and then 16 years in the United States Navy Seabees. \$4500 loss estimated in theft of tools here

Tahoka Police this week are continuing investigation into the reported theft of a large assortment of tools and a double tank air compressor in which the total loss was estimated at \$4500.

Michelle Sullivan reported the items stolen on Nov. 20, taken from property in the 1500-block of Ave. D. She said three Craftsman toolboxes, one on rollers, and the Craftsman tools, plus the compressor were missing.

Police also investigated a report from a Midland man in Tahoka, who identified a suspect Sunday believed to have sent threatening text messages and voice mails.

Denise De La Cruz of Tahoka advised police Monday that someone had vandalized her 2002 Ford Explorer while it was

parked at Thriftway Supermarket.

Sheriff's officers investigated two burglaries and two theft reports during the last week.

On Nov. 25, New Home school district reported a trailer carrying a Miller welder and a toolbox had been stolen. That same day, D.B. McAlister reported a metal detector stolen off a tractor near his home on FM 179 near County Rd. 11.

Lynn Smith reported a barn burglarized on County Rd. 2 in the northwest part of Lynn County, with scrap metal, bolts and sweeps missing.

The sheriff's office was notified by Lamesa Police Dept. Friday that a vehicle had been abandoned and vandalized in Lynn County on U.S. 87 just north of the Dawson County line. On Sunday, Gloria Hernan-

dez reported that her residence in Wilson had been burglarized.

Also last week, sheriff's officers confiscated a pressure washer involved in a dispute between Lubbock and Tahoka men.

A total of 45 inmates were incarcerated in Lynn County Jail this week, including 24 held for Ector County and 2 for Dawson County.

Dispatchers at the Lynn County Sheriff's Office processed 239 calls in November, including 100 for the county, 61 for City of Tahoka, 8 for City of O'Donnell, 31 for animal control, 32 for EMS ambulances and 7 fire alarms.

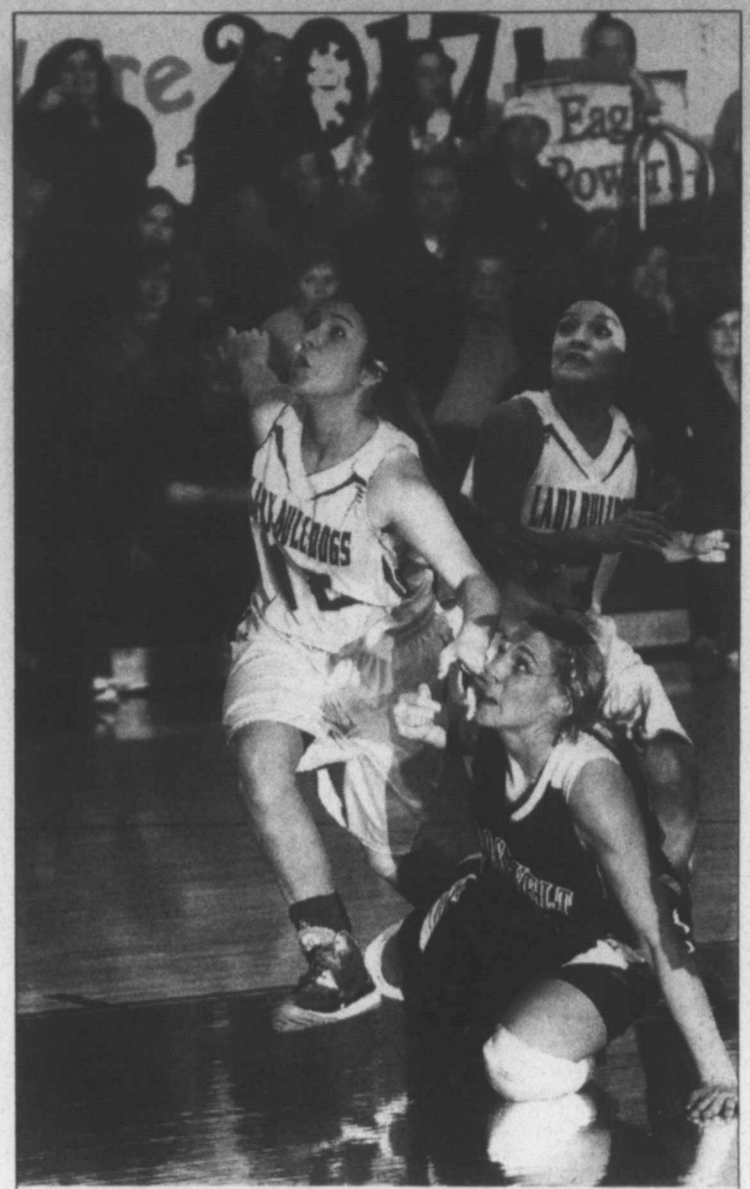
Dec. 12 is deadline to donate to PKW

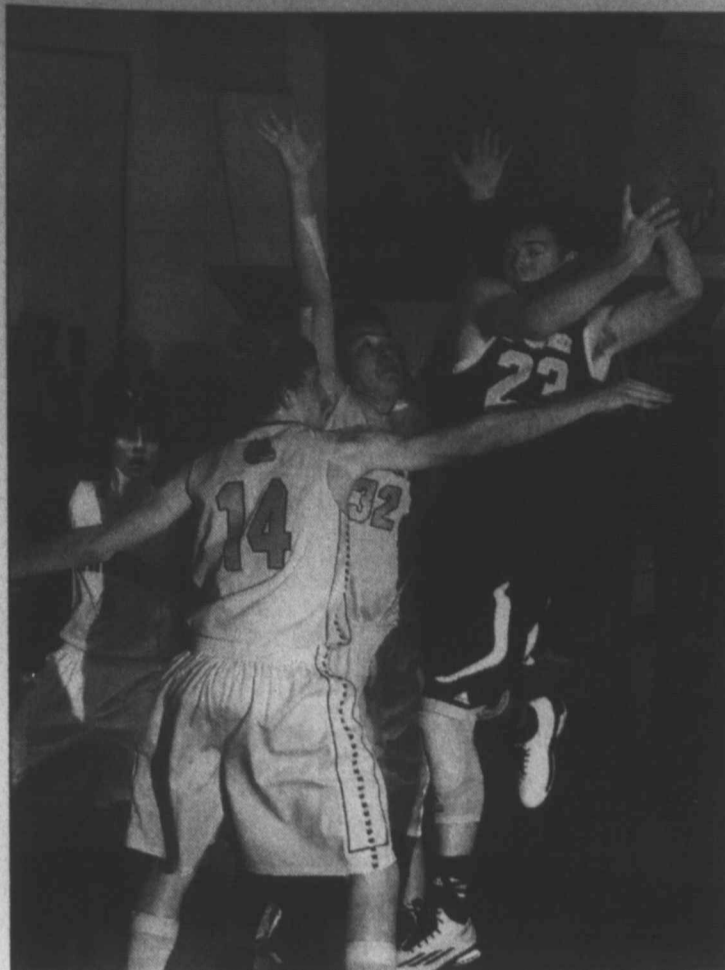

Tahoka's WWII Combat Glider Pilot ...

the Army needed a way to deliver heavy equipment and supplies to the airborne as soon as they were on the ground. The tool of choice was the cargo glider (or combat glider if you flew one into harm's way). Essentially a large box with wings, the cargo glider could carry everything from Jeeps and trailers to artillery pieces, additional troops, ammunition, mortar teams, machine gun teams or medical teams, the list is endless.

Flying the gliders into combat was a very dangerous process. They were totally defenseless, with no armor of any kind. When they landed in combat zones they flew in low and slow, making perfect targets for ground fire. Most landings in combat zones were little more than controlled crashes.

Only about 6,000 men were trained as glider pilots during WWII. One of them was C.B. "Boots" King, from Tahoka.

C.B. King was one of four brothers who entered the U.S. military when war broke out. His brothers served across the globe. Sgt. Bill King was in England by mid-1944, Jack King was in the Navy, "somewhere at sea", Lt. Lee King was dead, killed in the China-Burma-India theater by mid 1944. C.B. was also in England by the spring of 1944.

C.B. entered the US Army in February of 1942, initially sent to Lubbock Army Airfield to be trained as a crew member and mechanic. He volunteered for the Army glider program and was training in Plainview in July of 1942. He then moved to Ft. Sumner, New Mexico for his next round of training, finishing that section on August

16th, 1942. From there he went to Dalhart, Texas for his Advanced glider training, winning his Glider Pilot "G" Wings in January, 1943.

From Dalhart, King went to the Sedalia Army Airfield for further training, and then on to Laurenburg-Maxton AAF in North Carolina for final tactical training. Finally, he was shipped to England for his permanent assignment to the 439th

Troop Carrier Group; 92nd Squadron.

King was a bit older than most glider pilots, and was married. His wife lived in O'Donnell while he trained. Tragedy entered King's life in early 1943, shortly before he went overseas, as his wife died in childbirth. The healthy baby was taken by Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Lowrey, part of his wife's family. By the time King arrived in England he was a widower with a very uncertain future.

On June 6, 1944 he flew a glider (one of over 900 sent out) into the maelstrom known as the Normandy invasion, receiving severe facial cuts and a broken finger during his landing. On August 14, 1944 he flew one of over 450 gliders into Southern France as part of the airborne operations of that invasion. Then, in September of 1944, he flew into Holland in the huge and chaotic Operation Market-Garden. Over 2,500 gliders were sent into Holland over a 10 day period in September.

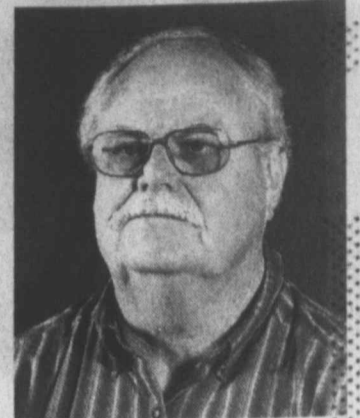
So far, King's luck was holding; three major airborne invasions and only minor inju-

ries as a result. The last major airborne operation of the war came on March 24th, 1945. Two entire airborne divisions were dropped across the Rhine River near Wesels Germany in Operation Varsity. Over 1,000 gliders went into landing zones which were hotly contested when they landed. During the chaos of the landing, when all gliders were under fire, before, during and after landing, a number of glider pilots were killed. C.B. King was one of them.

The official post-operation military interview with King's co-pilot tell us that the glider King was piloting was hit while in the air, or just as it landed, and was on fire from end to end. A burning King clambered from the glider and was immediately cut down by enemy fire. His luck finally ran out. He was buried in Europe, but his remains were transferred to Tahoka between 1946 and 1948. Next of kin listed as recipient of

the remains was W.L. King of Tahoka. C.B. King is buried in either the Tahoka or O'Donnell cemetery.

Don Abbe, Ph.D., is a graduate of Tahoka High School (Class of 1968). He took his BA, MA,



and PHD degrees in history at Texas Tech University. He taught history there before working as a historical preservation consultant. Currently Dr. Abbe serves as curator of the Silent Wings Museum in Lubbock.

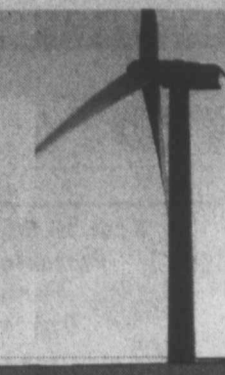

100% of teachers 'highly qualified' at TISD, according to NCLB report

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session last Monday night. The board approved the public presentation of the district's NCLB Highly Qualified Teacher Report which showed that TISD has 100% highly qualified teachers according to standards set in the NCLB legislation.

Section 1119 of the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) focuses on improving teacher quality at the local level. To achieve this goal, the act requires all teachers teaching core subject academic areas to meet specific competency and educational requirements. Teachers who meet these requirements are considered "Highly Qualified."

Teachers are required to be highly qualified if they are the Teacher of Record providing direct instruction to students in any core academic subject area, including English, reading or language arts, mathematics, science, foreign languages (languages other than English), civics and government, economics, arts, history, and geography. Highly qualified teachers must hold at least a bachelor's degree; be fully certified to teach in Texas; and demonstrate competency in their core academic subject area.

In other business at the board meeting, trustees approved the district textbook committees who will participate in the instructional materials adoption process for material which will expire in May 2015. Those include committees for math in grades 9-12, social studies in grades K-12, and K-12 fine arts.

The board approved the instrument to be used to evaluate the superintendent, but tabled the action item to adopt the district's new vision statement.

Teachers and students recognized from each campus for their great work thus far this year included: Elementary Teacher Carolyne Wilson and students Brooklyn and Azelyn Saenz; Middle School Teacher Kristi Lockaby and student Molly Brown; and High School Teacher Angie Colbert and student Laura Henderson.

Board President Dr. Cathy Box presided at the meeting, with trustees Jim Bingham, Brenda

Dotson, Scottie Olivian, Matt Woodley and Scott Dimak present, and trustee Michael Duncan absent from the meeting.

Superintendent Dr. George McFarland informed the board that the Tahoka ISD Administration will host an employee Christmas appreciation on December 10 at the Harvick building.

The School Board members will cook lunch for TISD employees as a Christmas appreciation gift on December 16.

The next regular meeting of the school board will be December 18 at 6:30 p.m. at the Harvick building. This meeting will be preceded by a public hearing at 5:30 p.m. on the district's state accountability rating.
