A couple of loud jarring booms rattled windows and had people in the Tahoka area looking outside to see what had happened a couple of weeks ago. It sounded like a bomb went off. It was, in fact, a bomb.

People were in no danger, however, although some minor damage was reported after the blast. It was a standard blast test procedure from Architectural Testing, Inc. that created the air-shattering booms. While the noise may have scared some people, the testing serves a good purpose - to test the effects of bombs on glass and other materials that may be used in buildings on military facilities, government buildings, and commercial buildings. In other words, the testing evaluates where a terroristic threat of a bomb could exist.

"We apologize for scaring anyone nical delays caused - it was not our intention to alarm people, but the [atmospheric] conditions were such that people not only heard it but probably felt the blast as well," explained Daniel Simmons, Project-Manager for the Arena Blast Facility located on land leased several miles west of Tahoka. He said that the test had been planned for a certain time, when the atmosphere ceiling was supposed to be at least 5000 feet, but due to techni-

Bang Theory Recent blast test raffles windows, gets attention of local residents

The knowledge gained from the tests could help save the lives of people in buildings targeted by terrorists with bombs.

"When we plan a test, I'll call NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) a week in advance, and set it for a day when the atmospheric ceiling is greater than 5,000 feet, so that hopefully the blast is not felt by local residents. At 3 p.m. that day it was at 5,000 feet, but tech-

vides real time data that is evidenced by actual events. In shock tube testing, a specimen is mounted at the end of a large tube and a pressurized pulse is generated at the opposite end of the tube and travels down it.

"We run at least six tests a year, although this year we have been much busier than usual,

and have already run a total of 18 tests," Simmons said. "The height of the ceiling - basically, where air start to mi

One local business reported damage to plate-glass windows from the blast that day, and a windshield was damaged on a tractor, according to Simmons, who added that the company is paying for the repairs.

The blast facility in Lynn County is one of only two public (commer-

one for full-scale arena blasting, and one for something called shock tube tests. Simmons is quick to point out that the explosive materials are not kept on site, and are only brought to the site on the day of scheduled testing.

It's the explosions in the full-scale arena testing that people are hearing. Full-scale arena testing involves an actual explosion in front of glazed glass panels that can be of any size or shape. Witnessing an actual explosion and examining the glazed test panels pro-

the sound travels from the explosion. We use basically the same type of bomb explosion in each test, but sometimes the atmospheric conditions change drastically in a short time period. I prefer it to be about 15,000 feet, but if we have the test ready to go we have to conduct it," he added.

ot outdated files, paperwork or bank statements? Get them shredded, for free, this Friday at Lynn County Hospital.

Lynn County Hospital District, in the spirit of being a good neighbor, is sharing an opportunity for area residents, businesses, schools, and other organizations to have their outdated documents shredded by a professional security/shredding company. WesTex Documents will have a truck parked in the hospital parking lot from 10 a.m. until 12 noon Friday, Dec. 12, to accept documents for shredding.

It's free to everyone - except the hospital, which is paying for the truck to be onsite to shred their own outdated paperwork.

"We're paying for the truck to be here to shred our documents, but we wanted to be a good neighbor and share this opportunity with other county residents and businesses. It won't cost you a penny, and we want as many to take advantage of this opportunity as possible," said Carmen Chapa at LCHD.

Chapa said that those wanting their

documents shredded may bring them directly to the WesTex Documents truck that will be in the hospital's parking lot, and hand over the boxes or bags of documents directly to the personnel manning the truck.

"Please don't bring your documents to the hospital beforehand, as not only do we not have storage space but we also don't want to have access or be responsible for your private documents," said Chapa.

The truck will accept all types of paperwork for shredding, providing a safe and secure way to dispose of paperwork that may contain private information such as social security numbers, bank accounts, or other financial numbers or personal information.

"The truck will be available for two hours only, from 10 a.m. until 12 noon, so be prepared to bring your items for shredding during that time period," said Chapa.

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

Following them will be the Middle School Symphonic Band, composed of 7th and 8th



Bulldogs claim 69-61 win over New Deal Lions

The Tahoka Bulldogs varsity boy's basketball team got a significant win at New Deal last Tuesday, Dec. 2. Coach Gibbs and assistant Coach Mills suited up only seven players as the Bulldogs won a hard fought battle against a previously undefeated New Deal team. New Deal is ranked in a few of the state polls and is picked to finish at the top of District 4-AA along with Abernathy and Floydada. The Bulldogs scoring was evenly distributed during the first quarter as Tahoka rallied from a 9 to 2 deficit to end the quarter behind only 14-16.

Seniors Roman Parmer, Colton Taylor, Dillon Trevino; juniors, Carlos Moralez, Jared Green, Luke Fleenor and sophomore Grant Tekell appeared to continue progressing in new Coach Gibb's system as the Bulldogs would pull ahead 31-

29 by halftime.

Tahoka stretched their lead to 49-43 by the end of the 3rd quarter, but would have to overcome a 3-point deficit midway through the final period to finish strong and earn the 69-61 win over the Lions. With the Bulldogs clinging to a 63-61 lead with only 36 seconds remaining, New Deal fouled Parmer, which would send him to the line for a 1 and 1 attempt. After New Deal attempted to ice the senior by calling a time-out, Parmer sank both free-throws to give the Bulldogs some breathing room.

Taylor and Morales would also convert clutch free throws to erase any doubt of the final outcome. Parmer and Taylor led Tahoka with 18 points each. Morales added 16, Green had 9, and Trevino and Tekell added 4 points each to close the Bulldog Pollow scoring.

City Council okays A.C.T. property purchases

Tahoka City Council met in regular session Monday night, approving a couple of property purchases through the A.C.T. Board (Advancing the Community of Tahoka), among other business.

The council approved \$5,000 to purchase lots from the First United Methodist Church of Tahoka, for the property where the old tennis courts were located adjacent to the city park, and \$3,000 for the purchase of lots in the 1100 block of North 6th, for future development of a park in the northeast portion of the city. The lots on N. 6th were purchased from the Sayles family. The A.C.T. Board has plans for future development for both of these lots.

In other business, Susan Tipton met with the council to present an update from the city's Centennial Committee, regarding plans for the June 2015 event celebrating the city's 100th birthday as an incorporated city.

Monthly bills were approved and the council renewed a policy regarding their public funds investment policy.

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Security & Privacy Shredding Drive!

Lynn County Hospital District will have a professional security/shredding company come in and shred your private documents for FREE!

Bring items to be shredded on

Friday, December 12th from 10:00 am to 12:00 noon

to the large truck that will be in our parking lot at the hospital.

It is likely that your trash passes through several stages on its way to a landfill or incinerator. Every step that occurs has risk that someone will find personal information they can use to cause you harm. One way to safeguard personal information is to shred it before it goes into the trash.

ITEMS THAT SHOULD BE SH

Tax information & returns: There is a general three year statute of limitation for your taxes, but keep copies of tax returns forever.

Investment records & statements: Investment records must be kept to support tax returns. Documentation of purchases and sales should be kept for three years past when you report the sale on a tax return. You may want to keep brokerage statements for many years.

Bank statements: You may want to keep Bank Statements for some period (three years or so) to document payments for important items.

Paycheck stub: These documents can include Social Security numbers and financial institution numbers. Keep the last three month's stubs if you are planning to apply for a loan. Otherwise, only keep the latest stub.

ATM receipts: Keep ATM receipts until you have compared them with bank statements.

Credit card statements: Even though there is no requirement to keep these statements, you may want to save them for some period (a year) in case there is a dispute.

Credit card receipts: Generally keep receipts until you have compared them to your credit card statement.

Insurance: Insurance policies and claims information should be kept for as long as the policy remains in effect.

Home financial information: Deeds, mortgages and information on home improvements should be kept for as long as you own the home plus the three year period for tax purposes.

Personal documents and pictures: Shred anything containing sensitive information and private pictures.

DO NOT SHRED Permanent Files:

Documents to keep forever include wills, powers of attorney, birth certificates, marriage documents, divorce or child care orders, trust documents, business agreements, military records and other such permanent records.



A Warrant Roundup will be conducted across the state of Texas soon, according to Lynn County Justice of Peace Nancy Guilliams, but there is some good news: anyone with outstanding warrants has a chance to pay up now, to avoid jail time.

Judge Guilliams told The News that a statewide warrant roundup will soon be conducted, and that many who have had outstanding warrants will find a law enforcement officer on their doorstep to arrest them and take them to jail.

In Lynn County alone, Judge Guilliams says she has \$17,000 in local warrants to collect, some dating as far back as the year 2000, but these warrants are all going to be in the

"If you have an outstanding warrant, even if it was several years ago, you now have two choices: pay it now, or go to jail," she said. "If anyone is

aware they have an outstanding warrant, or if they are not sure, please call my office as soon as possible, at 806-561-4387, to find out or to make arrangements to pay. You will be given one last opportunity to pay the warrant, plus any late fees that may have been incurred, " she explained.

Bid for electrical repairs at county courthouse is high

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning at the county courthouse, considering a lone bid for extensive electrical repairs throughout the courthouse, with funds for the project coming from an emergency grant that the county has received through the courthouse restoration/stabilization project. Commissioners were dismayed to find that the sole bid received on the project is considerably higher than the grant funding of \$179,204, with the bid from Hale and Associates coming in at \$927,573 for the total scope of the project. With Lynn County kicking in the required additional matching funds for the project, the bid is still nearly three times higher than the \$358,408 that the county had earmarked for the project. Dana Hale, representing

Hale & Associates Electric, told commissioners that the bid includes over \$496,000 for the extensive rewiring to the engineering specifications and bringing everything up to code in the courthouse, as well as complying with historical restoration issues, with other work to include lighting repairs, lightning protection for the building, and sub-contracting for plaster repair/painting, and that the project would take a full year to complete. Commissioners took no action on the issue, and are expected to consider their options for the project.

The Texas Historical Commission (THC) awarded Lynn County the \$179,204 emergency grant funds in May through its nationally recognized Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program. Lynn County was among 18 communities awarded funds in Round VIII of the program. The THC had requested \$20 million for the Round VIII grant cycle, but was appropriated \$4.2 million by the 83rd Texas Legislature. While the significant reduction is a temporary setback for the 78 counties that currently qualify for additional funding, Round VIII emergency grants will be used to address serious building deficiencies affecting usability, structural problems, and safety issues in historic (more than 50 years old) county courthouses.

The grant program required 50% matching funds from awardees to qualify for the emergency funds, which County Judge Mike Braddock says the county has held in reserve for

such projects. The project includes putting in a new ground transformer and new breaker boxes on each floor of the courthouse, and extensive rewiring.

"The electrical wiring has been a major issue, and we have had quite a few problems especially in the last few years in the courthouse," said Braddock. "It has become a matter of safety, as we certainly don't want to lose our historic building to a fire caused by electrical wiring."

In 2004, Lynn County received a THC Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program planning grant totaling \$399,844. Future work being considered for the courthouse includes accessibility improvements, fire protection, masonry restoration, and interior finish-

es, but funding for the construction portion of the preservation grant has not yet become available.

In other business, Judge Braddock asked commissioners for permission to get estimates for repainting the flag poles at the courthouse and law enforcement center, and commissioners adopted an order regulating the use of certain aerial fireworks in the county during the upcoming holidays, which prohibits aerial rockets with fins or sticks.

Monthly bills were approved, and Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin reported on his department's activities. Newly elected county officials will be sworn in to office during ceremonies scheduled for 9 a.m. Friday, Jan. 2.2015.

Judge Braddock led the session, with commissioners Keith Wied, John Hawthorne, Don Blair and Danny Martin present, as well as other county officials. Incoming Pct. 4 commissioner Larry Durham observed the session.

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

wo brothers, Jay Mac and David Yowell, former Wilson High School graduates, competed in the full Iron Man triathlon competition in Cozumel, Mexico on Sunday, November 30. After training daily for a full year consisting of early morning swims, long bike rides and distance runs, their goal was achieved as they completed the grueling swimming/biking/ running event and the announcer pronounced, "You are an Ironman!"

The Iron Man triathlon consists of 2.4 miles of swimming in the ocean, 112 miles of biking and then 26.2 miles of running - for a total of 140.6 miles, back to back, in one day. There were 2800 participants with the professionals starting the com-

petition and then categorized age groups following. Each event had a cutoff time that had to be met. Those unable to finish in the allotted time were disqualified. The cutoff for the entire competition was 17 hours.

Jay Mac, 32, and David, 30, completed each event within the time requirements and finished strong to earn the Iron Man medals around their necks. With competitors from all over the world, both men represented their county, state and country well, finishing the grueling race strong. Both finished well under the 17-hour time limit. David finished with an overall time of 12:59:22, and Jay Mac finished in 15:56:56, according to the Iron Man race website.

The two-transition course started with a single-loop swim in the Caribbean Sea teeming with tropical fish within the protected waters of the Reefs of Cozumel National Park at Chankanaab Park Beach. The 180-kilometer, three-lap bike course in Cozumel took competitors along the spectacular coastline of beaches and resorts





the ceiling lower than 5,000 feet the sound traveled outward, rather than upward, rattling windows in town and even several miles east of Tahoka.

The company was formerly known as HTL, or Hurricane Test Laboratories, but several years ago merged with Architectural Testing, Inc. They have several office locations, including one in Lubbock.

"In plain English, we test stuff to make people safe," Simmons said. "About 80-90 percent of our business is testing glass products for commercial companies, but we also test other materials. We set up a product, conduct the test, and give it an industry rating based on the results of the test," he explained.

The company provides clients with a competitive advantage with technical expertise and in-depth knowledge of building codes, test standards, and certification services. While the facility in Lynn County is geared towards bomb testing, Architectural Testing's core services include hurricane, blast, air, water, structural, thermal, roof and security testing. In addition to testing, Architectural Testing also provides professional engineering services.

The company's mission is to provide technologically advanced testing and consulting services that will ensure pro-

rating is to Department of Defense standards. Since the 1995 bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, that left 168 people dead and hundreds more injured, the architectural industry has focused more on safety standards with an eye towards terroristic threats. Blast testing has become a common discussion topic in government agencies and engineering and architectural firms.

Architectural Testing has been blast testing here since 2006. Simmons says that the explosions are basically producing a shock wave, and that damage is minimal to the area.

"There is some debris after the explosion – mostly rocks – and most of the debris is within a 200-300 ft. radius," he explained. "We do contact the manager of T-Bar Ranch and the Lynn County Sheriff's Office to let them know when the testing will be conducted, as we do want to maintain a good relationship with the area. To my knowledge, there have been no adverse effects to cattle in the area, or other animals," he added.
