New Trend in Selections **Endorsed by Baptist**

a new trend in the selection of representatives for the executive board of the 1.8 millionmember Baptist General Convention of Texas was heartily endorsed here Friday by board members.

The recommendation calls for the establishment of 15 new geographical areas disignated "zones" and is designed to provide equitable representation on the 191 - member board as well as its four commissions and committes.

The executive board also gave Baptist Hospital to acquire 42,-500 square feet of property for parking purposes, totaling \$1,-250,000 --- plus building costs. The board also nodded with favor a guidline for subcommittees to follow in nominating trustees for Texas Baptists' hospitals.

Roy E. Ladd, pastor of Baptist Temple Houston, and chairman of the Committee for Establishing Geographical Boundaries said the guidelines proposed offer fair and equitable representation on commissions and committees. The recommendation will directly effect two top convention committees, these being the Committee to Nominate Executive Board Members and Committee for Nomination to In-

stitutional Boards. The executive board with its 180 elected members as well as its four commissions -- State

procedures. Representation calls for a balance between laymen and ministers with a knowledge of the denomspecialists to meet special

Houston hospital officials cited growth of major downtown buildings for creating acute parking problems for its central unit as the need for the purchase of additional land. The Baptist hospital system was granted approval to enter formal negotiations with Gulf Interstate co., owners of the downtown property, together with authority to borrow required funds.

Academy trustees were also authorized to sell the present academy site.



Nine Sorghum-Sudan hybrids were used in the 1966 Forage clipping test at the High Plains Research Foundation. The green weight from three clipping ranged from 35,51 to 40.33 tons with an average of 37.41 tons per acre. The average protein content of the nine hybrids was 11.68 percent. August and September rains delayed the third clipping until September 20 and eliminated the fourth clipping, which may have reduced the total yield. The clipping dates were June 24, July 26 and September 20.







DOES YOUR INDOOR "dumps,". GARDEN GROW?

To stay healthy, house plants need an adequate supply of warm water - not cold water which may chill or even shock them. Most plants should be thoroughly soaked once a week,

plant's preference regarding sunlight and temperature. In general, foliage plants thrive ed and flushed away. Warm between 60-70 degrees and should not be "roasted" near a heater in the winter. Fertilize plants at regular intervals, and provide for proper drainage and soil aeration. Cleanliness is vital because plants breathe through tiny pores which lace leaves. If these plants brethe through tiny pores which lace their leaves. If these become clogged, plants whither and die. Thus dust and soot should be removed, and the easiest and best method is with soap and water. Washing the leaves gently helps a plant to

If the plant is reasonabley sturdy, put it into a sink cr tub of warm soap suds. To protect the soil, first cut a piece of plastic to fit the top of the pot - allowing an inch of overhang. Slash this plastic to the center, fit it around the plant, and fasten it round the edge of the pot with an elastic band. Up-end the plant and swish it gently through the suds until clean, then rinse it

When leaves are broad and not too dense, they can be washed individually. Dip a sponge or soft cloth in warm soapsuds and wash both sides of every leaf, supporting it from under-

If foliage is very fragile, spray soapsuds over it with an atomizer; then spray - rinse the same way. This technique is especially good for loosening and washing off the sooty mold which often attacks sensitive gardenia plants. Once foliage is clean and dry, a commercial plant polish may be applied evenly over each large leaf-or may be sprayed over tiny-leaf plants from an aerosol dispenser.

Most food materials may be ground in the disposer. Some fibrous materials -- corn husks, pea pods, celery -should be fed into the unit gradually since they require a longer grinding time. The grinding mechanism can usually take care of small amounts of chicken bones, corn cobs, and fruit pits. Viscous foods, like cooked oatmeal and raw dough, should be thoroughly mixed with vegetable peelings and dry crusts before being put into the waste cylinder.

A disposer is self-cleaning. Drain - cleaning chemicals should never be used in a grinder; they may corrode the shredding mechanism. If the waste unit should develop an odor, grinding lemon or orange peel will "sweeten"it.

Certain materials should never be put into the disposer. 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

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


