Fireworks not banned this year

ireworks will be allowed in rural Lynn County during the Independence Day weekend, according to county officials, who considered the issue this week.

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session Tuesday morning at the courthouse to consider several agenda items, one of which was whether to act upon a burn ban, which led to discussion about whether there is a need for a fireworks ban for the upcoming July 4th Independence Day holiday. After some discussion, commissioners decided not to issue a burn ban or a ban on fireworks this year for the rural unincorporated areas, since recent rains have alleviated much of the fire hazards. They do ask citizens to keep fire safety in mind and consider whether surrounding areas have dry brush or other fire hazards when setting off fireworks.


City residents, however, should Tahoka) have city ordinances banning the shooting off of fireworks within the city limits.

In other business, commissioners appointed Teri Aten to the Lynn County Historical Commission, and approved a couple of routine agreements, one with a company for court payment card processing for e-filing, and one renewing a contract with Martin County to house Martin County inmates at Lynn County Jail.

Commissioners entered into two separate executive sessions, one to consider a settlement offer with Cirrus Wind I, LLC, and one to consider contemplated litigation regarding County Road 18. No action was taken regarding the settlement offer, upon return to open session, but County Judge Mike Braddock told The News that the settlement issue may be resolved next week. Commissioners approved action

to repair and restore County Road 18 to its original location, but declined to take any legal action regarding the issue. At issue is a portion of County Road 18 that runs east-west between FM 179 and FM 1328 in Precinct 4, that has reportedly been moved by an adjacent property owner.

County Treasurer Schuknecht informed other county officials that Lynn County will have a team walking in the Diabetes Walk on June 19, and that the team has set a goal of raising \$250 to donate to the Diabetes Association. The Diabetes Walk is sponsored by Lynn County Hospital District, with area citizens invited to participate. The walk, around the neighborhoods near the hospital, will be from 6:00-8:00 p.m. Friday, June 19, and begins at the hospital parking lot.

Monthly bills were approved, and departmental reports presented.








The clock was first installed in 1410, making it the third-oldest astronomical clock in the world and the oldest one still working (according to Wikipedia). The clock mechanism itself is composed of three main components: the astronomical dial, representing the position of the Sun and Moon in the sky and displaying various astronomical details; "The Walk of the Apostles", a clockwork hourly show of figures of the Apostles and other moving sculptures—notably a figure of Death (represented by a skeleton) striking the time; and a calendar dial with medallions representing the months. The oldest part of the clock, the mechanical clock and astronomical dial, dates back to 1410 when it was made by clockmaker Mikuláš of Kadaň and Jan Šindel, the latter a professor of mathematics and astronomy at Charles University. The first recorded mention of the clock was on 9 October 1410. Later, presumably around 1490, the calendar dial was added and clock facade was decorated with gothic sculptures.

FSA Committee nominations begin Monday, June 15

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced that the nomination period for local Farm Service Agency (FSA) county committees begins on Monday, June 15, 2015.

"Through the county committees, farmers and ranchers have a voice. Their opinions and ideas get to be heard on federal farm programs," said Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. "It is important for county committees to reflect America's diversity, so I encourage all eligible farmers and ranchers, including beginning farmers, to get involved in this year's elections. We've seen an increase in the number of nominations for qualified candidates, especially among women and minorities, and I hope that trend continues."

To be eligible to serve on a FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an agency administered program, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administrative area where they are nominated.

Farmers and ranchers may nominate themselves or others. Organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at www.fsa.usda.gov/elections. Nomination forms must be received in the local USDA Service Center by August 3.

While FSA county committees do not approve or deny farm ownership or operating loans, they make decisions on disaster and conservation programs, ducers.

Order Goat Head Weevils at SWCD now

Goat head weevils are a natural predator to goat heads, also known as puncture vines. They are host specific -- which means they eat puncture vines and only puncture vines.

The adult female seed weevil deposits an egg in a small hole she chews in the green seed. Then she seals it with fecal material. The egg hatches and burrows its way inside the green seed. In the process-eating the viable portion of the seed, so it cannot sprout a new plant. The weevil larvae will spend its entire larval stage inside the seed. It actually pupates within the seed and emerges from the seed as an adult.

The stem weevil works in the same manner only attacking the stem of the plant. Stem weevils will inhibit the plant's ability to grow and spread.

"Unfortunately, puncture vine weevils aren't perfect. They won't find every single seed. The thing to keep in mind is every seed a weevil eats is a seed that can't sprout," stated a SWCD representative.

Each adult female weevil will lay 250-450 eggs. Eggs will reach reproductive adult age in about 25 days. This is dependent upon accumulated heat units. As weevil numbers continue to build, they will become more and more effective. Cold winters will inhibit survivability. Regions with moderate winters are most conducive to over wintering.
