Miguel Reyna named Tahoka Police Chief

Miguel Reyna, an officer with the Tahoka Police Department, was named Monday night as the new Chief of Police for the Tahoka Police Dept., in action taken by the Tahoka City

Council members voted unanimously to name Reyna as Chief, after discussion in executive session at Monday night's council meeting. He was chosen from among seven appli-

Reyna has almost 20 years of law enforcement experience, earning an Associates Degree in Law Enforcement from South Plains College in 1996. He has been employed with the Tahoka PD as an investigator since December 2013, and is also currently

a Reserve Deputy Sheriff for the Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. He was employed with the Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. for over eight years, and has 11 years experience with the Collins County Sheriff's Dept. Reyna earned his Master Peace Officer license in 2008, after earning his Basic Peace Office license in 1996 and Intermediate Peace Officer license in 2000.

"Reyna was my recommendation, as well as the Mayor's recommendation, for the Chief's position," City Administrator Jerry Webster told The News. "We believe he is well-qualified and anticipate that he will do a good job for the city as police chief," he

County tax rate to increase 6.7-cents

Citizens air concerns at commissioners meeting about proposed shooting complex in NH area

ynn County Commissioners had a long session Monday morning, voting for a proposed tax rate and budget, approving a county audit, and considering several other issues, including hearing concerns from county citizens. Three citizens from the New Home area addressed County Commissioners at the meeting, airing their concerns that a proposed outdoor shooting range in Lynn County could present significant public health and safety risks, and asking commissioners to protect citizens by imposing regulations regarding firearms use by commercial shooting ranges.

Tom and Barbara Mandry, and their neighbor, Tim Thompson, each spoke about their concerns that the shooting complex would be located too close to their homes - within 825 feet from the Thompson home, where a family with four children under the age of 7 reside - and said that the proposed complex is within less than one mile of 13 residential homes and fami-

Mandry said that Will Sickles, a resident of Lubbock County, is the landowner who has begun preliminary scraping of the surface area for the proposed shooting complex, which would be located 2 miles east of New Home on FM 211, just west of Ave. M, on the north side of FM 211.

According to the Mandrys, Sickles plans to provide a multi-gun outdoor shooting range that will also be designated for therapy to help PTSD war veterans. Assorted weaponry, including assault rifles, will be allowed at the shooting range.

Thompson, who said he is a UMC paramedic and also works with the emergency aerocare service, told commissioners, "I see a lot of trauma in my work - I don't want to be a victim of an accident that could have been prevented. I have four small children, and I am very concerned about the safety of my family."

"You are our only hope," said Mrs. Mandry, addressing the four county commissioners. "Our main concern is a health and safety issue for our families, but also a quality of life issue with the noise, as well as concerns about our property values going down because we are located so close to where the shooting complex would be. We have no ill will

towards this gentleman who wants to provide therapy for veterans of PTSD, but we are very concerned about the safety issue. Please won't you protect us?" she asked.

Commissioner Don Blair, who was presiding at the meeting due to the absence of County Judge Mike Braddock, thanked the citizens for their comments and said that commissioners would take the information into consideration. And, by the conclusion of the meeting, commissioners had decided to schedule a special session for next Monday morning, at 9 a.m. to consider the issue, listing a sole agenda item "to discuss and act upon enacting an ordinance to restrict and/ or regulate sport shooting ranges."

In other business, commissioners unanimously approved a proposed tax rate of 91.7-cents, which is a 6.7-cent

increase in the county tax rate, from the current 85-cents per \$100 of property. Commissioners cited a loss off \$24 million in the total tax value in the county when proposing the increase and, the proposed rate is not as high as the effec-

tive tax of 94.9-cents, which is the rate calculated to bring in the same amount of revenue as the previous year.

Commissioners approved a proposed budget for 2015-16 as well, which originally did not include a raise for the second consecutive year for all county employees. However, after hearing impassioned pleas from several county officials and taking into consideration that a 3% raise across the board would require roughly \$36,000 in funds, commissioners chose to add the salary increase into the proposed budget.

The proposed budget lists \$3,038,848 in expected revenue and \$3,081,221 in expenditures, leaving a \$42,373 deficit. A public budget hearing for the 2015-2016 budget will be held at 9 a.m. Monday, August 24, in

Mineral values drop significantly;

ag values also decline in county

A TAXING ISSUE

Lynn County taxing entities are at the point of proposing budgets and tax rates for the upcoming fiscal year, and sharp declines in mineral values, as well as a decrease in ag values, are creating a big hit for some taxing entities in the county, according to information from Lynn County Appraisal District.

The four city taxing entities, which mostly have no ag or mineral values in their tax base, are not affected as much as the county, school and hospital taxing entities.

"Total tax values for the four cities in Lynn County are showing little change," said Marquita Scott, Chief Appraiser for the Lynn County Appraisal District. "But Lynn County's tax base lost more than \$24 million in total values from last year, and that is due mostly to a 48% decline in mineral values. The county lost \$33,178,440 in mineral values, from \$68,795,820

last year to \$35,617,380 in mineral values this year. That's a big deal, and I don't anticipate any new oil wells to be added this year. Add to that an 8% decrease in ag values overall - a reduction of \$8,580,260 - and Lynn County is looking at a total tax value of \$350,010,970 for

compared \$374,403,940 last year. That's a reduction of \$24,392,970 total tax value," she explained this week.

Lynn County commissioners voted Monday to propose a 6.7-cent increase in the county tax rate, from the current 85-cents per \$100 of property value to 91.7 cents. Although it is an increase in the rax rate, the proposed rate is not as high as the effective tax of 94.9-cents, which is the rate calculated to bring in the same amount of revenue as the previous year, and is far short of the rollback rate of 99.2-cents.

For tax appraisal purposes, ag values are based on a five-year time period, with crop production from 2009-2013 calculated

in the ag schedule for the 2015 tax year. Scott said that this year's ag values showed a 16% increase in irrigated cropland, but at the same time the dryland values (which is a much larger portion in Lynn County than irrigated acreage) declined

"The biggest change for taxing entities is in the mineral values, and that is affecting everyone a little differently," explained Scott.

"New Home ISD has no mineral

values, so the decline has no effect on their tax base. Tahoka ISD has some mineral values, down \$6,484,440 from last year's mineral values of \$9,968,450, to this year's mineral value of \$3,554,010 (a 64% decrease), but O'Donnell and Wilson school districts are taking a bigger hit with the declin-

ing mineral values," she said. Mineral values in the O'Donnell school district include portions of Lynn, Terry and Dawson counties, which show a 49% decline from last year's mineral values of \$76,051,580 down to \$38,527,450 in this year's calculations. Overall, O'Donnell ISD's total taxable values have declined from \$146,045,187 last year to \$111,020,985 this year, for their Maintenance and Operating (M&O) fund. This includes a \$10,000,000 value for all wind energy farms, due to a tax abatement agreement. However, for the Interest and Sinking (I&S) debt service tax rate, the full value of the

HE FACT that people lose inches in height as they grow older is no concern to any men six feet or more tall, but it is for short guys like me (if I keep getting older and shorter, pretty soon I will be able to look under the bed without bending over).

My memory must be getting shorter, too, because when I look in my files at columns I have written in years past, I often don't recall writing them at all. Following is one I wrote in 2001, just 14 years ago, but it was all new to me when I glanced at the files recently. I'm repeating it this week because if I don't remember it, surely no one else will, either.

I WAS READING an article which said you can substitute a certain spice for the meat in your chocolate beef stew and it will be better for you.

Chocolate beef stew? The last time I ever heard of any such combination of foods was when I considered mixing ketchup with peanut butter on a sandwich.

Okay, I never tried that either. But apparently some people do eat something called chocolate beef stew, and this story said you could eliminate the beef by substituting something called seitan, described as low in fat and carbohydrates and cholesterol-free.

Well, they lost me again with the word "seitan." Seitan, I thought, was an island in the Pacific where Robert Taylor killed about a million Japanese in a movie. The story described seitan ("also called wheat meat") as a "dense protein formed, from the gluten of wheat flour."

I don't know where you get the stuff. But I'd be afraid, somebody would hit me if I went into Thriftway and askedfor some seitan, or even some gluten, whatever that is: I'llbet "gluten" is something which makes you want to eat everything on the table, whether anybody else gets to eat or not. I thought the correct spelling was g-l-u-t-t-o-n.

There was a recipe for chocolate seitan stew. It can't be all bad, because it includes walnuts, onion, chili, tomatoes and other good stuff, in addition to the cocoa and seitan. I doubt that I ever will get a chance to try it.

Part of the story was about spices from Europe and other odd places, like Latin America and Boston. A photograph. showed a South African spice box, holding some "tumeric, corlander and " (another substance which I would be ashamed. to print in a family newspaper)". Anyway, I don't want any of that stuff on my plate. Tumeric sounds like a growth, and a corlander must be some kind of snake,

I have saved the recipe for chocolate seitan stew, in case, somebody wants to get it and make up a batch. But they have to bring me a bowl full, or a chunk of the finished product.

Tahoka ISD would like to inform students and parents of the changes made to the TISD DRESS CODE:

DRESS AND GROOMING (All Grade Levels)

The dress and grooming standards of the Tahoka Independent School District are meant to promote a positive, professional learning environment where the focus is on instruction and not on clothing. TISD recognizes that parents are essentially responsible for their student's dress and general appearance. The district's dress code is established to teach grooming and hygiene, prevent disruption, and minimize safety hazards. Students and parents may determine a student's personal dress and grooming standards, provided that they comply with the following:

- The general appearance of the student and his or her clothing should not interfere with the instructional
- Clothing should be designed, constructed and worn in a manner that is not suggestive or indecent.
- Clothing that exhibits pictures, emblems, slogans or writings that are lewd, offensive, vulgar, or obscene, or that depict or advocate violence, or advertise tobacco products, alcoholic beverages, drugs, or any other substance prohibited under FNCF(LEGAL) is prohibited.
- The wearing or possessing of heavy chains, such as wallet chains, and any spiked jewelry on school grounds is prohibited.
- Footwear shall be a part of regular attire. The wearing of house shoes or skate shoes is prohibited. • Students' hair shall be clean and well-groomed. All hair colors shall be natural hair colors. Bright or neon
- colors and extreme hairstyles are prohibited. Hair on all students must be worn in a manner that does not cover the eyes of the
- Male students with facial hair must keep it maintained and well-groomed.
- Any body piercing on a student must not be visible to others, except female students may wear earrings or studs. Male students shall not wear earrings or any other foreign objects in the ear, unless prescribed by a physician. This prohibition on visible body piercing includes, but is not limited to, facial studs, facial rings, clear spacers, or tongue bars. Any visible tattoos must not be derogatory or offensive in nature.
 - To prevent inappropriate exposure when a student is sitting, standing or performing other normal activities, the length of a dress, skirt, or shorts must touch the top of the student's knee cap when the student is standing. Cheerleaders must wear tights underneath their skirts when worn during the school day.
- Tops with straps less than 3" wide (Secondary students) and/or without a standard armhole are prohibited. Bare midriffs, tank tops, spaghetti strap tops, halter-tops are also prohibited. Any top showing bare midriff when arms are extended straight outward to the side and parallel to the ground is prohibited. Students may not wear unhemmed sleeveless shirts or muscle shirts outside of the athletic period.
- Any clothing with excessively improper fit is prohibited. Leggings/Tights/Jeggings or clothes in this category are not permitted unless covered by an outer garment that covers the students' bottom completely. The waist of pants must be worn at the proper place on the hips. No sagging or bagging pants/shorts are permitted.
- The wearing of overcoats, trench coats, or dusters is prohibited.
- Except as required by law, hats, caps, sunglasses, or head coverings including bandanas, are not to be worn by students in the school buildings at any time.
- Contacts with unnatural eye colors, or designs, are not permitted.
- Pants or shorts with holes above mid-thigh are prohibited. Any undergarment may not be visible.

Principals at each campus may develop and enforce dress and grooming restrictions that the principal has reason to believe are gang-related. Principals shall post in a prominent place on campus dress code restrictions relating to gang attire prior to enforcement of such restrictions.

If the principal determines that a student's grooming or clothing violates the school's dress code, the student will be given an opportunity to correct the problem. If not corrected, the student will be assigned to in-school suspension until the problem is corrected, or until a parent or designee brings an acceptable change of clothing to the school. Repeated offenses may result in more serious disciplinary action in accordance with the Student Code of Conduct.

In all instances involving possible violations of the campus dress/grooming policy, the principal will ultimately determine the appropriateness for the campus learning environment and the discipline/correction required.





Tahoka ISD Board approves teacher appraisal system

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in regular session last Tuesday to consider routine business, with a budget workshop preceding the regular session.

The board had a 1-hour budget workshop that updated them on the current financial status of the district with regard to the current school year budget, and examined the proposed budget for the 2015-16 school year. Also, the board discussed the possible proposed tax rate for the upcoming school year.

In the regular board meeting, the Board approved the Student Code of Conduct for the 2015-16 school year, and approved campus principals as Texas Teacher Evaluation & Support System (T-TESS) certified appraisers for the 2015-16 school year, including Elementary Principal Christa Ritchey, Middle School Principal Jeff Fleenor, and High School Principal Jeff Perez.

the refinement year for T-TESS implementation (last year was the pilot year) and then T-TESS will be replacing PDAS statewide as the official teacher appraisal tool that districts can use or develop their own tool locally," explained TISD Superintendnt Dr. George McFarland. "Of the over 60 school districts in Region 17, Tahoka is one of only 10 participating in the refinement year of T-TESS implementation," he added.

Trustees also approved the T-TESS appraisal calendar for the 2015-16 school year. This calendar is developed at the district level and gives specific windows of when teachers may be "officially" evaluated. It also sets timelines of other teacher requirements with regard to

submission of documents pertaining to the evaluation pro-

The Board approved the following personnel as T-TESS second appraisers for the district: Dr. George McFarland, Jeff Fleenor, Christa Ritchey, and Jeff Perez. The second appraiser is the person a teacher may request if they are unsatisfied with their official first appraisal.

Trustees also reviewed and discussed the Student Handbook for the 2015-16 school

Board members present included Board President Dr. Cathy Box, Jim Bingham, Brenda Dotson, Scott Dimak, Clay Taylor, Abraham Vega, and Matt Woodley.

The Board met in special session Monday night, to fill a coaching position that a recent hire, Cole Hasie, vacated. Trustees approved the hiring of William Durham to a one-year dual assignment probationary contract to coach girls' sports and teach High School English.

The next board meeting is Aug. 13 at 6:30 p.m., when trustees will hear a presentation by the Community Facility Needs Committee and consider whether to call for a bond election for renovation/construction of facilities.

A public hearing on the proposed district budget will be held at 6:00 p.m. Aug. 27, followed by a special board meeting at 6:30 p.m. to adopt the budget and set the tax rate.

energy \$215,335,490 - is taxable, whichamounts to a total tax value of \$326,356,475 for OISD's 1&S property tax collections.

Wilson ISD's mineral values dropped from \$10,279,480 last year to \$5,575,410 - a 46% decline. That, added, to an 11% decline in ag values in the WISD tax base, accounts for a total tax value of \$43,345,540 this year, compared to a total tax value of \$50,705,430 last year.

All four school districts in the county have \$1.17 tax rate for Maintenance and Operating (M&O) and New Home and O'Donnell schools have additional I&S tax rates for debt service to pay off bonds for improvements to their facilities.

The \$1.17 M&O tax rate is the highest tax rate allowed by law for school districts. There is some good news, however, for homeowners. Senate Bill 1 has proposed allowing an additional \$10,000 exemption for residences, in addition to the \$15,000

"However, all that being said, SB 1 is not law yet, but appraisal districts have been instructed to calculate the additional exemption as state officials anticipate that voters will approve the \$10,000 exemption in the November constitutional amendment election," said

Last year, O'Donnell ISD had an additional 40-cent I&S tax rate, for a total tax rate of \$1.57, after voters approved abond issue for new construction. This year, the district is proposing a 7-cent decrease in their I&S rate, for a 33-cent I&S rate and a total \$1.50 proposed tax rate. The I&S debt rate is calculated solely on the amount of the actual debt payment required

for the current fiscal year. New Home ISD is also lowering their I&S tax rate by 5-cents, from 31.5-cents last year to 26.9-cents, for a total proposed tax rate of about \$1.44.

"New Home ISD's total tax value actually increased slightly, with six new homes added and some increased values on irrigated land. Last year, the total tax value was \$62,636,750 compared to this year's value of \$63,333,530 - a gain of \$696,780," said Scott.

Lynn County Hospital District has the same decline in mineral/ag values as Lynn County, but because of an 80% tax abatement for the wind energy farms, compared to a 100% tax abatement for the county, the hospital's total tax value is different from Lynn County's. The hospital's total tax value is \$396,673,672 for 2015, compared to \$398,612,753 last year - a decline of \$1,975,081. Currently, the tax rate for LCHD is 29.4-cents. The effective tax rate, to bring in the same amount of revenue as the previous year, is calculated at 32.9-cents.

Wilson ISD, City tax rates proposed; city rate increases

Wilson Independent School District and the City of Wilson released information this week regarding proposed tax rates for 2015, with the school district keeping their current rate of \$1.17 and the city proposing a tax rate increase.

Currently the City of Wilson tax rate is at 79-cents (0.792863 per \$100 of property value). The Wilson City Council voted to propose a tax rate of 86-cents (0.865505), which is a 7-cent increase and tops out at the rollback rate, which is the highest rate that the City of Wilson may adopt before voters are entitled to petition for an election to

limit the rate. The city's effective tax rate, which is the rate calculated to bring in the same amount of revenue as the previous year, is 80 cents (0.801396).

The total adjusted tax base for the City of Wilson is \$12,360,700, which is slightly lower than last year's total value of \$12,559,109. According to a city official, the council is proposing the tax rate increase to help fund street work projects, among other issues.

The council has scheduled two public hearings for public comment on the proposed tax rate, with the first hearing set for Aug. 26 at 8:30 a.m. at City Hall, and the second hearing on Sept. 3 at 7 p.m. at Wilson City Hall

Wilson ISD's tax rate of \$1.17 will remain the same, which is the highest rate for Maintenance and Operating tax levies allowed for school districts (and also is the same rate which the other school districts in the county levy). Wilson ISD does not have an additional Interest & Sinking (I&S) tax rate, as the district has no debt service. Total taxable value of all property for Wilson ISD is \$43,345,540, which is \$7,359,890 lower than last year's total taxable value of \$50,705,430.

The Wilson ISD Board of Trustees have scheduled a public meeting for 7 p.m. Aug. 2 in the Wilson ISD Library to discuss the school district's budget that will determine the tax rate that will be adopted. Public participation in the discussion is invited.




