

Grand Jury indictment, cases of assault reported

A recent grand jury indictment and cases of assault and disorderly conduct were listed in reports by law enforcement officials in Lynn County during the last week.

Jailed on an indictment by a 106th District grand jury was Michael Joe Monk, 51, of Midland, charged with possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine.

Tahoka police Saturday arrested a 37-year-old Tahoka man who allegedly was yelling loudly and profanely at customers and store employees on a business parking lot. He was jailed on charges of disorderly conduct, and police indicated that further charges of possession of a synthetic drug would be charged.

On Sunday, a 21-year-old Tahoka man was being sought as a suspect in a terroristic threat and possible assault with a deadly weapon after a Tahoka woman said she was threatened at work and at her home.

A Tahoka man told police he suffered minor injuries and damage of more than \$200 to his vehicle Saturday when a New Home man allegedly ran into him deliberately. The victim was treated at the scene in Tahoka and police said the investigation is continuing.

As of Tuesday, the county jail was holding 42 persons, including 27 for Ector County and four for Dawson County. Recent arrests were the one

for indictment listed above, and others for possession of marijuana under two ounces, possession of a controlled substance less than one gram, failure to identify a fugitive, burglary of a vehicle, criminal negligence/ endangering a child, two for burglary of a building, and disorderly conduct.

Explanatory Statements for the November 3, 2015 Constitutional Amendment

Proposition Number 1 (SJR 1)

SJR 1 - Current law provides an exemption of \$15,000 from the ad valorem taxation for public school purposes of a residence homestead. The proposed amendment would increase this exemption to \$25,000, starting in the tax year beginning January 1, 2015. In order to reflect the increased exemption on the homestead of a person 65 years of age or older or a disabled person, the proposed amendment would provide a reduction to the current limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes. The proposed amendment would protect school districts from all or part of the revenue loss by authorizing an appropriation of funds according to formulas set by the legislature. In addition, the proposed amendment would authorize the legislature to prohibit a political subdivision from reducing or repealing a homestead exemption adopted by the political subdivision. Finally, the proposed amendment would prohibit the imposition of a tax on the conveyance of real property, but would not prohibit the imposition of a business tax measured by business activity, a tax on the production of minerals, a tax on the issuance of title insurance, or a change in the rate of a tax in existence on January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the amount of the residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation for public school purposes from \$15,000 to \$25,000, providing for a reduction of the limitation on the total amount of ad valorem taxes that may be imposed for those purposes on the homestead of an elderly or disabled person to reflect the increased exemption authorizing legislature to prohibit a political subdivision that has adopted an optional residence homestead exemption from ad valorem taxation from reducing the amount of or repealing the

exemption, and prohibiting the enactment of a law that imposes a transfer tax on a transaction that conveys fee simple title to real

Proposition Number 2

(HJR 75) HJR 75 - In 2011, voters approved constitutional amendment to allow a surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value on the disabled veteran's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse had not remarried. The amendment did not apply to surviving spouses of veterans who died before 2011. This amendment would extend the exemption in such cases. The proposed amendment would apply only to ad valorem taxes imposed for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran who died before the law authorizing a residence homestead exemption for such a veteran took effect."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 52)

SJR 52 proposes a constitutional repeal requirement for the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, the Attorney General, and any other officers elected statewide to reside in Austin, Texas, the state capital. Under current law, these statewide elected officers are required to reside in the capital of the State of Texas while in office. This amendment would not apply to the residency requirement for the Governor.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment repealing the requirement that state officers elected by voters statewide reside in the state capital."

Proposition Number 4

HJR 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the legislature the authority to pass statutes to allow a professional sports team charitable foundation to conduct charitable raffles under the terms and conditions imposed by general law. The laws passed under this authority may provide that the professional sports team charitable foundation may use proceeds from such charitable to pay reasonable advertising, promotional, and administrative expenses. Any law enacted by this provision only applies to entities defined as professional sports team charitable foundations on January 1, 2016. Additionally, any law enacted by this provision may only allow charitable raffles to be conducted at games hosted at the home venue of the professional sports team associated with a professional sports team charitable foundation.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 17)

SJR 17 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase from 5,000 to 7,500 the maximum total population threshold of a county that is allowed to construct and maintain private roads as long as the county imposes a reasonable charge for the work.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to authorize counties with a population of 7,500 or less to perform private road construction

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 22)

SJR 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would add the right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife, including by use of traditional methods, in the Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution. This right would be subject to laws and regulations intended to conserve

and manage wildlife and to preserve the future of hunting and fishing. The proposed amendment would establish hunting and fishing as the preferred method of managing and controlling wildlife in Texas. The proposed amendment is not intended to affect any law or provision related to trespass, property rights or eminent domain, and would not prevent the legislature from authorizing a municipality to regulate the discharge of a firearm in a populated area in the interest of

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: 'The constitutional amendment recognizing the right of the people to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife subject to laws that promote wildlife conservation."

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 5).

SJR 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to dedicate a portion of revenues from (1) the state sales and use tax, and (2) the tax imposed on the sale, use, or rental of a motor vehicle, to the State Highway Fund (SHF). Under current law, these funds would be deposited to the General Revenue Fund. Money deposited to the SHF is intended to be used only to construct, maintain, or acquire rights-of-way for public roadways other than toll roads; or to repay certain transportation-related

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment dedicating certain sales and use tax revenue and motor vehicle sales, use, and rental tax revenue to the state highway fund to provide funding for nontolled roads and the reduction of certain transportation-related debt.'

Y DOCTOR is driving me to drink. But that's okay, because when he keeps telling me after every checkup that I need to drink more, he means water, and a newly-released conclusion from a study by university researchers supports what he has been telling me for years: water is good for you.

The most encouraging thing about the 12-week experiment by researchers from the University of Birmingham was that drinking water is the easiest way to lose weight.

(The university is in Alabama, but the study was not directed by Drs. Billy Bob and Bubba).

The research project "involved 84 obese adults." (That's college-speak for fat, y'all). Those who drank 500 ml of water 30 minutes before a meal lost almost 10 pounds more than participants who did not drink water. Tap water, not sparkling water, soda, or sports drinks, was the only beverage allowed for the study.

Dr. Helen Parretti, a clinical lecturer at the university, said

"The beauty of these findings is in the simplicity. Just drinking a pint of water, three times a day, before your main meals may help reduce your weight... Losing a few extra pounds over the course of a year can be significant to an individual, an easy way to help with that weight loss. It's a simple message that has the potential to make a real contribution to public health."

Well, gee, my doctor never told me drinking water would help me lose weight. He probably figured I would resent the suggestion that I was too fat, and perhaps feared I might waddle out of his office in a huff and seek a second opinion. I wouldn't

have done that, unless I could have found a blind physician. I am reminded of the story of two men brought before a judge for fighting. The judge asked the evident instigator why they were fighting.

"Well, your honor, this guy called me a no-good, lying son-ofa-gun."

The judge smiled and asked, "Are you what he called you?" The man thought a minute, and then said, "Well, sure, but I got a right to resent it, don't !?"

The Office of District Attorney employs seven full-time employees besides the elected District Attorney and is responsible for prosecuting adult felony offenders in Gaines, Dawson, Lynn, and Garza Counties. Those seven employees include a receptionist, two assistant district attorneys, two investigators, a para-legal, and one victim advocate. Justin Boyd is the Victim Advocate for the DA's

"Although the victim advocate position is mandated by law, to my surprise, there was no such position in the office when I first took office in 2013," said District Attorney Michael Munk. "Besides being a legally mandated position, I realized the importance of this position

after getting my start in the office as the victim advocate in 2006. Since then, I have also had the honor of working alongside several talented victim advocates in our district, who considerably help our prosecutors do their jobs more effectively. The victim advocate is the liaison between office activities and the victim. Keeping victims abreast of court dates, plea agreements, and all court developments are an essential part of the pursuit of justice," he added.

"I am proud to report that the State has approved our victim advocate grant for our second year running. This essential position has been filled at a cost of only 20% to the district taxpayers. The other 80% is funded courtesy of the State through a grant. This comes as a savings to the district taxpayers of over \$42,000 per year.

"The effective administration of justice does cost money, but it does not hurt to find funding through grants whenever possible. I would like to thank the commissioner's courts and county judges that have supported this endeavor. I would also like to thank the citizens who have graciously donated toys, games, and books to our victim advocate program. Thank you and God Bless," added Munk.






