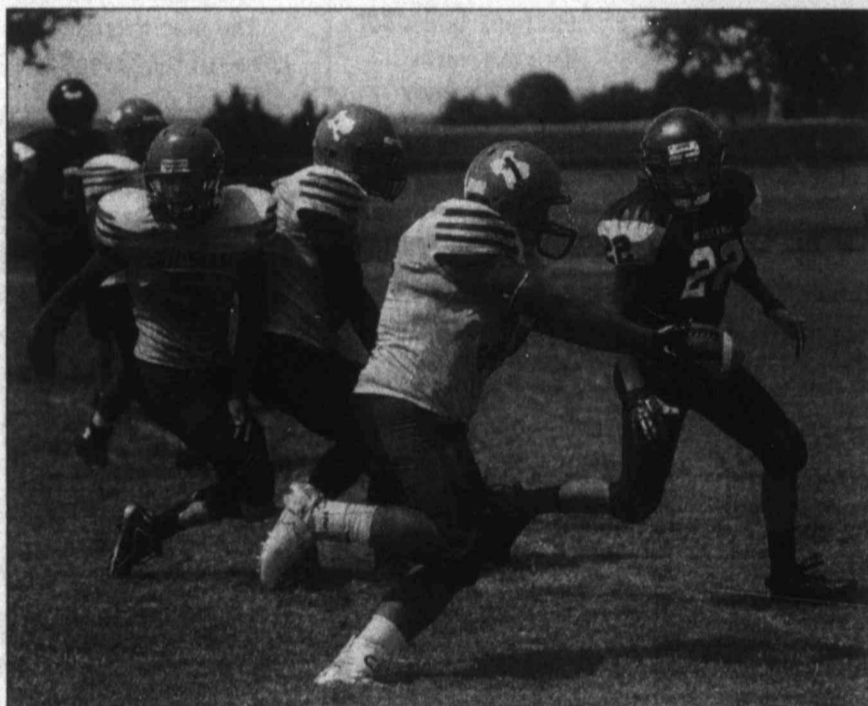

Harvest Festival is next Saturday

The 40th Annual Lynn County Harvest Festival will be held at the courthouse square in Tahoka next Saturday, Sept. 19, featuring live entertainment, food and craft booths, games, and cash prizes. The fun starts at 10 a.m. and lasts all day.

In honor of the 40th festival, this year audience members will win a minimum of \$40 cash for every correct answer to trivia questions or as a reward for requested items brought to the stage.

Lynn County Hospital District employees are sponsoring a Harvest Festival Street Dance on the square after the festival, from 8-11 p.m., with live music from Vance Guthrie & Junction 84, who will play a variety of music for dancing and listening pleasure. Popcorn, drinks and other concession items will be sold during the dance. Bring lawn chairs for seating.

Grand Jury indictment, cases of assault reported

A recent grand jury indictment and cases of assault and disorderly conduct were listed in reports by law enforcement officials in Lynn County during the last week.

Jailed on an indictment by a 106th District grand jury was Michael Joe Monk, 51, of Midland, charged with possession of a controlled substance, methamphetamine.

Tahoka police Saturday arrested a 37-year-old Tahoka man who allegedly was yelling loudly and profanely at customers and store employees on a business parking lot. He was jailed on charges of disorderly conduct, and police indicated that further charges of possession of a synthetic drug would be charged.

On Sunday, a 21-year-old Tahoka man was being sought as a suspect in a terroristic threat and possible assault with a deadly weapon after a Tahoka woman said she was threatened at work and at her home.

A Tahoka man told police he suffered minor injuries and damage of more than \$200 to his vehicle Saturday when a New Home man allegedly ran into him deliberately. The victim was treated at the scene in Tahoka and police said the investigation is continuing.

As of Tuesday, the county jail was holding 42 persons, including 27 for Ector County and four for Dawson County. Recent arrests were the one

for indictment listed above, and others for possession of marijuana under two ounces, possession of a controlled substance less than one gram, failure to identify a fugitive, burglary of a vehicle, criminal negligence/endangering a child, two for burglary of a building, and disorderly conduct.

CEO named for hospital

Lynn County Hospital District (LCHD) Board of Directors have named Jeff Barnhart as the new Chief Executive Officer of the hospital. According to information from LCHD Board President Jannis Childress, Barnhart verbally accepted a contract with LCHD last Wednesday morning, but final details, including a starting date, are still under consideration.

Childress said the LCHD Board interviewed five candidates last week for the position, on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday nights. Barnhart was the final candidate interviewed, and was the board's unanimous choice to offer a contract, she said.

Barnhart will be coming to Tahoka from Canyon. He and his wife have two daughters, one who attends college and one who is a sophomore in high school.

and manage wildlife and to preserve the future of hunting and fishing. The proposed amendment would establish hunting and fishing as the preferred method of managing and controlling wildlife in Texas. The proposed amendment is not intended to affect any law or provision related to trespass, property rights or eminent domain, and would not prevent the legislature from authorizing a municipality to regulate the discharge of a firearm in a populated area in the interest of safety.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment recognizing the right of the people to hunt, fish, and harvest wildlife subject to laws that promote wildlife conservation."

Proposition Number 7 (SJR 5)

SJR 5 proposes a constitutional amendment to dedicate a portion of revenues from (1) the state sales and use tax, and (2) the tax imposed on the sale, use, or rental of a motor vehicle, to the State Highway Fund (SHF). Under current law, these funds would be deposited to the General Revenue Fund. Money deposited to the SHF is intended to be used only to construct, maintain, or acquire rights-of-way for public roadways other than toll roads; or to repay certain transportation-related debt.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment dedicating certain sales and use tax revenue and motor vehicle sales, use, and rental tax revenue to the state highway fund to provide funding for non-tolled roads and the reduction of certain transportation-related debt."

Proposition Number 4 (HJR 73)

HJR 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the legislature the authority to pass statutes to allow a professional sports team charitable foundation to conduct charitable raffles under the terms and conditions imposed by general law. The laws passed under this authority may provide that the professional sports team charitable foundation may use proceeds from such charitable raffles to pay reasonable advertising, promotional, and administrative expenses. Any law enacted by this provision only applies to entities defined as professional sports team charitable foundations on January 1, 2016. Additionally, any law enacted by this provision may only allow charitable raffles to be conducted at games hosted at the home venue of the professional sports team associated with a professional sports team charitable foundation.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to permit professional sports team charitable foundations to conduct charitable raffles."

Proposition Number 5 (SJR 17)

SJR 17 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase from 5,000 to 7,500 the maximum total population threshold of a county that is allowed to construct and maintain private roads as long as the county imposes a reasonable charge for the work.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize counties with a population of 7,500 or less to perform private road construction and maintenance."

Proposition Number 6 (SJR 22)

SJR 22 proposes a constitutional amendment that would add the right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife, including by use of traditional methods, in the Bill of Rights of the Texas Constitution. This right would be subject to laws and regulations intended to conserve

exemption, and prohibiting the enactment of a law that imposes a transfer tax on a transaction that conveys fee simple title to real property."

Proposition Number 2 (HJR 75)

HJR 75 - In 2011, voters approved a constitutional amendment to allow a surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value of the disabled veteran's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse had not remarried. The amendment did not apply to surviving spouses of veterans who died before 2011. This amendment would extend the exemption in such cases. The proposed amendment would apply only to ad valorem taxes imposed for a tax year beginning on or after January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a 100 percent or totally disabled veteran who died before the law authorizing a residence homestead exemption for such a veteran took effect."

Proposition Number 3 (SJR 52)

SJR 52 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the requirement for the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, the Attorney General, and any other officers elected statewide to reside in Austin, Texas, the state capital. Under current law, these statewide elected officers are required to reside in the capital of the State of Texas while in office. This amendment would not apply to the residency requirement for the Governor.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment prohibiting the requirement that state officers elected by voters statewide reside in the state capital."

MY DOCTOR is driving me to drink. But that's okay, because when he keeps telling me after every checkup that I need to drink more, he means water, and a newly-released conclusion from a study by university researchers supports what he has been telling me for years: water is good for you.

The most encouraging thing about the 12-week experiment by researchers from the University of Birmingham was that drinking water is the easiest way to lose weight.

(The university is in Alabama, but the study was not directed by Drs. Billy Bob and Bubba).

The research project "involved 84 obese adults." (That's college-speak for fat, y'all). Those who drank 500 ml of water 30 minutes before a meal lost almost 10 pounds more than participants who did not drink water. Tap water, not sparkling water, soda, or sports drinks, was the only beverage allowed for the study.

Dr. Helen Parretti, a clinical lecturer at the university, said this:

"The beauty of these findings is in the simplicity. Just drinking a pint of water, three times a day, before your main meals may help reduce your weight... Losing a few extra pounds over the course of a year can be significant to an individual, an easy way to help with that weight loss. It's a simple message that has the potential to make a real contribution to public health."

Well, gee, my doctor never told me drinking water would help me lose weight. He probably figured I would resent the suggestion that I was too fat, and perhaps feared I might waddle out of his office in a huff and seek a second opinion. I wouldn't have done that, unless I could have found a blind physician.

I am reminded of the story of two men brought before a judge for fighting. The judge asked the evident instigator why they were fighting.

"Well, your honor, this guy called me a no-good, lying son-of-a-gun."

The judge smiled and asked, "Are you what he called you?" The man thought a minute, and then said, "Well, sure, but I got a right to resent it, don't I?"

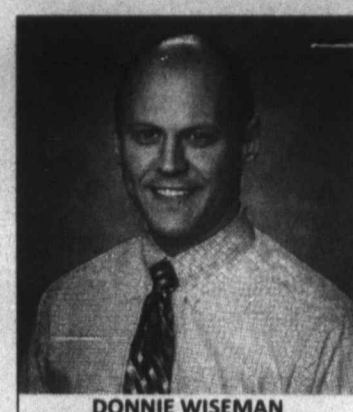

Eagles wallop Dawson, 67-16

O'Donnell's Eagles soared past the Dawson Dragons 67-16 last week, led by A.J. Rivas' 4 touchdown runs and Donovan Pesina's four touchdowns and one safety. The game was halted at halftime by the six-man 45-point rule.

Jaden Benavidez started the scoring in the first quarter for Coach Brad Bell's Eagles by returning a fumble 34 yards for a touchdown. Rivas, who rushed for 183 yards and passed for another 100, scored on runs of 12, 57, 32 and 14 yards, and passed for Pesina for a TD on a 37-yard play. Pesina ran 14 and 49 yards for touchdowns, scored on a 52-yard kickoff return, and caught the scoring pass from Rivas. Pesina gained 75 yards in just three rushing efforts.

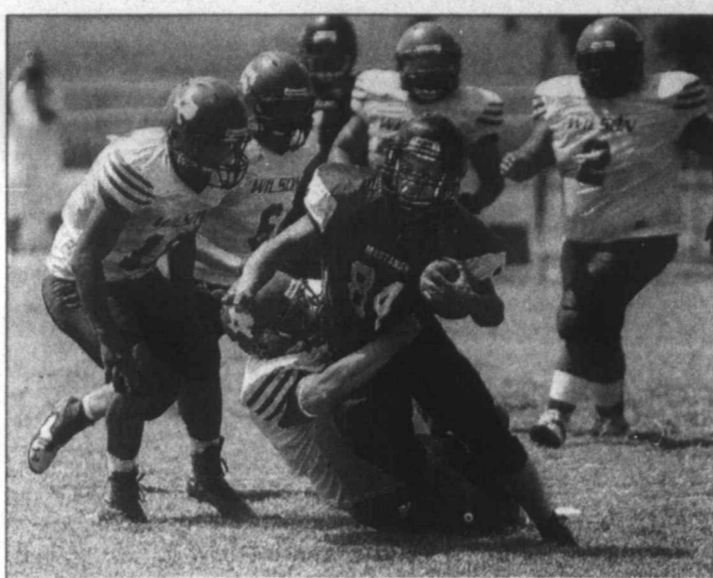

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative, Inc. ("Golden Spread") on behalf of itself and its member distribution cooperatives listed below (the "Participating Members") hereby gives notice of their intent to file with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission ("FERC") requesting approval of a proposed Joint PURPA Implementation Plan ("Joint Plan") to jointly implement their respective obligations under Section 210 of the Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act of 1978 (16 U.S.C. § 824a-3) ("PURPA") and under Part 292 of the FERC's Regulations.

The Joint Plan provides that (1) Golden Spread and each Participating Member will interconnect with and operate in parallel with any QF that adheres to applicable rules and regulations pertaining to generator interconnection; (2) on behalf of itself and each Participating Member, Golden Spread will purchase capacity and energy from QFs at a rate equal to Golden Spread's avoided costs; (3) each Participating Member will sell supplementary, back-up and maintenance power to a QF, upon request, on either a firm or interruptible basis, in accordance with the applicable law and the Participating Member's applicable rates, rules, and regulations governing retail service, and on the terms that are consistent with the ones offered to the Participating Member's other customers with similar load or other cost-related characteristics; and (4) no QF will be subject to duplicative charges for interconnection or wheeling solely as a result of selling to Golden Spread and buying from a Participating Member.

In the filing with FERC, Golden Spread, on behalf of itself and the Participating Members, plans to apply for waiver of certain obligations under Section 292.303 of FERC's Regulations which, if granted, would result in all purchases from QFs being made by Golden Spread and all sales to QFs interconnected with the Participating Member electric distribution systems being made by the Participating Members. With respect to South Plains Electric Cooperative, however, Golden Spread will only assume the obligation to purchase power from QFs with respect to South Plains' load located within the Southwest Power Pool.

Copies of the proposed Joint Plan will be sent to interested parties upon request. Golden Spread will also accept written comments on the proposed Joint Plan. Golden Spread intends to file for approval of the Joint Plan with FERC on or after September 14, 2015. FERC will publish notice of Golden Spread's filing in the Federal Register following receipt of the filing. That notice will specify that any person desiring to be heard in this matter can make the appropriate filing with the FERC.

VOCA grant approved for second year for Victim Advocate position in DA's office

The Office of District Attorney employs seven full-time employees besides the elected District Attorney and is responsible for prosecuting adult felony offenders in Gaines, Dawson, Lynn, and Garza Counties. Those seven employees include a receptionist, two assistant district attorneys, two investigators, a para-legal, and one victim advocate. Justin Boyd is the Victim Advocate for the DA's office.

"Although the victim advocate position is mandated by law, to my surprise, there was no such position in the office when I first took office in 2013," said District Attorney Michael Munk. "Besides being a legally mandated position, I realized the importance of this position

after getting my start in the office as the victim advocate in 2006. Since then, I have also had the honor of working alongside several talented victim advocates in our district, who considerably help our prosecutors do their jobs more effectively. The victim advocate is the liaison between office activities and the victim. Keeping victims abreast of court dates, plea agreements, and all court developments are an essential part of the pursuit of justice," he added.

"I am proud to report that the State has approved our victim advocate grant for our second year running. This essential position has been filled at a cost of only 20% to the district taxpayers. The other 80% is funded courtesy of the State through a grant. This comes as a savings to the district taxpayers of over \$42,000 per year.

"The effective administration of justice does cost money, but it does not hurt to find funding through grants whenever possible. I would like to thank the commissioner's courts and county judges that have supported this endeavor. I would also like to thank the citizens who have graciously donated toys, games, and books to our victim advocate program. Thank you and God Bless," added Munk.
