The Tahoka Bulldogs finished the non-district schedule in smooth fashion at Plains Friday night, beating the Cowboys 40-0 to raise their season record to three wins against two losses.

Juwan Hamilton raced 33 yards for a Tahoka touchdown early in the first quarter to start the scoring, and later in the first, Fleenor scored on a 6-yard run that put Tahoka up 12-0 starting the second period. Four minutes into the second, Lockaby ran 18 yards to score, and for the third time, Tahoka was unable to add any extra points.

After Fleenor scored on a 14-yard run late in the second quarter, Hadley Reynolds kicked the extra point, and it was 25-0 at halftime.

Fleenor, who led all rushers with 105 yards in just 10 carries, ran 49 yards for his third TD early in the third quarter, and Lockaby scored the game's last touchdown on a 12-yard run midway of the third. QB Lockaby gained 80 yards rushing on 11 carries, and 103 yards passing, completing 8 of 14.

Reynolds kicked a 21-yard field goal for the only score of the fourth

Hamilton gained 69 yards in 8 carries, and caught 4 passes for 66 more yards. Nick Garcia had 49 yards in only two carries and Andrew Alvarez ran 29 yards in 6 efforts. Colbe Perez caught two passes for 16 yards and Nic Arce snagged one for 15.

Moses Burgoin led Plains rushing with 62 yards in 18 carries. Drake Emery completed 4 passes for 76 yards for Plains, and Caesar Reyes caught 3 for 70 yards, but the Cowboys had six passes intercepted by the alert Tahoka



## Car stolen during lunch hour; burglary attempt, theft investigated

A vehicle was reported stolen from a bank parking lot in Tahoka Tuesday, during a 20-minute time period in the lunch hour. Janis Thomas, an employee at First National Bank of Tahoka, reported her 2002 Honda Accord was missing from where she had left it parked on the east side of the building. The car was reportedly locked and the owner had the keys with her, when the vehicle was removed from the parking lot sometime between 12:40-1:00 p.m. Investigation is continuing in the case.

Theft of a cooler containing beer from a pickup parked for the Harvest Festival street dance, and an attempted burglary in Wilson were also in reports to law officers during the last week.

A Tahoka woman told police that someone took a red cooler containing Miller Lite beer cans from the bed of her 1999 Ford F250 pickup while it was parked in the 1600-block of Ave. H during the Harvest Festival street dance Saturday night, Sept. 19.

Sheriff's officers went to Wilson Monday to check a report that someone broke a window in the residence of Bridget Taylor, but did not gain entry, so nothing was missing.

Deputies also were seeking information Monday on who illegally dumped trash on County Rd. 28 about 4 miles southwest of Tahoka.

Lynn County Jail was holding 47 inmates as of Monday, including 27 for Ector County and six for Dawson County. Recently jailed persons were held for unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, theft of property over \$50 and less than \$500 (three persons), parole violation and theft from person.

Woodwork

ALL OFFICIALLY BEGAN last week, so the weather around here has cooled a bit, dropping into the 80s for a high on most of these days. That's a relief from the constant high 90s and occasional low 100s we've had during the summer, but I really would prefer that the average high stay at least as high as 70. All day, all winter, and always.

I don't like cold weather, and I have no need of snow, ice on the sidewalk, reindeer, polar bears or penguins. I do admit it's pretty uncomfortable when it's 99 and humid and the sun is so hot you can fry eggs on the hood of your car (not too tasty, though, because of all the bugs you've plastered on it).

Those extra hot days are unpleasant, too, when the air conditioner in your house or car seems to go out more often than you do.

Speaking of hot cars, my computer news page last week reported on a test some bigbrains conducted to see if darkcolored cars actually got hotter than light-colored ones. I was 70 years old before I learned that melanoma is not something you get from eating too much cantaloupe.



There are many more statements, some pretty goofy, and I may pass a few along at a time at the end of later columns.







starts about sunrise, heading out behind her home on the northern edge of town, where the cotton is now almost too tall for her to see over (she's 5-ft. nothing, at most). Within minutes, she is hitting her stride, and her Australian Shepherd-mix knows he's in for at least an hour, (and many times 2 hours), of communing with nature on their daily walk. It's not a Sunday after-

noon stroll, either - anyone walking with them had better keep up, or they get left behind. It's a minimum of two miles, and on many occasions, as much as four miles, before she gets back home. There's not a country road,

turnrow, or footpath on the northern edge of town that Lenda and Rascal haven't traipsed down during their daily walks. If they happen to find a stray golf ball near T-Bar Golf Course, the ball goes into a plastic bag she carries. Sometimes she actively hunts down golf balls left behind on the driving range. She has, personally, picked up, washed and delivered back to the golf course, more than 1,000 golf balls. Yes, she counted them, and bagged them by 50s. She's nothing if not organized.

By early to mid-morning, she's back at the house, where her husband Dalton has begun his day in a less strenuous manner, with breakfast and setting off for his normal routine down to his office. Both are retired, but they don't know it.

She's off in her "bubble" then, tooling down the road at about 25

various other tools loaded in the cart behind her, just in case she needs something. Which she will, because she just doesn't know how to get through a day without chopping a weed or - on the days she likes best - picking up pecans that fell to the ground that someone else failed to pick up. She delights in shelling pecans, and spends many happy hours in her toolshed working the meat out of the shells. Rascal gets his share, waiting patiently for her to toss one his way. She has shelled hundreds of pounds of pecans for herself, her family, her friends, and yes, perfect strangers whom she met after knocking on their doors and asking if they were aware that their pecans needed to be picked up, and secondly, would they let her pick them up, shell them, and bring them back. At no charge. For fun.

On Fridays and Saturdays, Lenda keeps the Pioneer Museum open from 10 a.m.-2 p.m., but she will never, ever, be found sitting at the desk at the front door. She's most likely outside with her hoe, chopping any weeds that dare show up on the lot surrounding the museum, or in the flower beds at the adjacent City Hall. Oh, and the flowers at City Hall those are hers, too. She waters and maintains the plants, and in fact she is the one who "asked" City Administrator Jerry Webster several years ago to let her put in the flower pots, bark mulch and plants in the large flower bed beneath the front windows at city hall, as east side of the building. Webster, not one to turn down a good deed when he sees one, immediately told her to "have at it" and gave her the funds to purchase the materials. She was tickled pink. And the upkeep? That's hers. Voluntarily. For fun.

Visitors to the museum on Fridays will see at least six vehicles parked there, from 10 a.m. until long after 2 p.m., when the museum is supposed to close. That's because Fridays have become a kind of ladies day out for Lenda and a group of friends who have come to cherish their Friday get-togethers at the museum. But they're not sipping tea and eating petit fours. This is their game day. They've come to visit, yes, but it's over several games of Hand-and-Foot, a card game that pairs up partners in a four-hand series. This is serious fun for the ladies. I've been there. They keep count of who wins, and they giggle like teenagers at a slumber party.

On Wednes days, she volunteers at the Lynn County News office, helping with the mail-out of the weekly newspaper. She labels and bundles newspapers with nononsense speed because she's

got other things to do in the day after Sometimes she's going back to the house to make her famous Monster cookies, or oatmeal cookies, or orange-pecan cookies, or maybe her pecan pies because Lord knows she's got plenty of pecans. Sometimes

it's to make her chicken enchiladas, a favorite dish that turns up at many funeral lunches or finds a way to a friend in need. When she makes this dish for her family, she has a free hand with the jalapenos - tasty, but watch out for the burn. She apparently has a cast-iron stomach.


She eats disgustingly healthy most of the time, with lots of bran, fruits and vegetables on her plate, but she can be tempted with a donut sometimes. Maybe even two.

Her healthy lifestyle, in fact, is probably what saved her life. It's been more than seven years since a heart attack took her by surprise, and almost took her life. She had been feeling unusual all day, with what felt like increasingly worsening indigestion or abdominal pain. Turns out it was a prolapsed valve in her heart, and she had been having a heart attack all day. She finally allowed her family to take her to the local emergency room in the evening, despite her protests that she could just go to bed and feel better in the morning (pay attention here, people!), where after viewing her x-rays the doctor actually came running back to the ER

the Lubbock heart hospital ER as fast as possible. After a fast ride in the Lynn County EMS (which her family credits with having a major part in saving her life), the heart specialist said she needed openheart surgery to repair the valve within the next few hours. He came to the waiting room and told her family that it looked very, very bad and that they should prepare themselves, because she probably would not make it through the sur-

As it turned out, he was basing his dire predictions on a false assumption that this 76-year-old woman was in the kind of shape that most 76-year-olds are. Her family told her, as they were taking her into surgery, to remember that she was very strong, and they would be waiting for her when she came back. She did come back. Stronger and better. She started her daily walks again at the heart hospital, getting stronger every day. Her doctor was amazed, and from that day forward called her "the miracle woman." She's still his star patient.

She loves working outside,




## Cleto Saldana wins \$40 in LCN contest

## Commissioners approve grant, indigent defense contract for 2016

Lynn County Commissioners met at 9 a.m. in regular session Monday morning at the Lynn County Courthouse, approving a grant for Lynn County Pioneers Senior Citizens Center and a contract for indigent defense in district court, among other routine issues.

The county receives a \$7,500 grant designated for the Pioneer Center that provides for home delivery of meals to elderly or disabled homebound citizens, which commissioners approved with a resolution. They also approved an annual contract for indigent defense for the 106th Judicial District, at a cost of \$7,867.50 for the fiscal year of 2016. Lynn County contributes this portion along with portions from the other three counties in the 106th judicial district, for an annual contract with an attorney to represent the indigent. Each county's apportionment is based on the number of indigent cases served in

## Phishing scam targeting debit card holders here

Debit card holders from First National Bank of Tahoka may have been notified recently by an automated phone call that their debit cards have been blocked, but the phone call is NOT coming from FNB or its card monitoring service, and FNB officials want to alert their customers that the call is part of a phishing scam.

"We were contacted by customers Monday morning about receiving phone calls telling them that their debit cards have been blocked," reported Janis Thomas, a banking officer at FNB. "It is a recorded message asking the customer to return the call. I have confirmed with our card monitoring service that this is indeed a phishin, cam," she explained

Worth Whitworth, FNB President, advised that anyone who received such a call should NOT return the call and should not give private financial information to someone on the

the previous year. Lynn, Dawson, Gaines and Garza counties comprise the 106th district.

In other business, commissioners approved 12 holidays for county employees in 2016, and designated the second and fourth Mondays of each month as the designated meetings dates for commissioners court. Longevity payment for county employees was changed in the county handbook from December to September, to keep the annual payment within the county's fiscal year, and wording was changed regarding employee payroll to be paid "every other week" instead of the wording "bi-monthly." The Family Medical Leave Act status of the county was deleted from the handbook, as the county does not have the required number of employees needed to meet that requirement. Several budget amendments were also approved.

County Judge Mike Braddock discussed the bee infestation removal from the third floor walls of the courthouse was currently underway, and Sheriff Jerry D. Franklin presented a report on his department's activities.

Three of four commissioners were present at the meeting, including John Hawthorne, Don Blair and Larry Durham, as well as Judge Braddock and other county officials. Commissioner Keith Wied was absent. The meeting adjourned at 10:20 p.m.

## from the A's desk

DWI

Driving while intoxicated conjures up mixed emotions for a lot of people. Many people have grown up with family members that have drinking problems. Others have had loved ones seriously injured or taken away from them as a result of this offense. I have seen many people not want to sit for jury duty on a DWI case because of personal issues with DWI that have affected their lives. Over 3000 people are seriously injured or killed in DWI crashes each year

Besides the devastation it leaves in the lives of victims and victim's families, it can result in a life changing event for a high school or college student that does not know any better. Criminal penalties can range from probation up to 6 months in jail and a \$2000 fine for a first time offender, up to 1 year and a \$4k fine for a second time offender, and up to 10 years in prison and a \$10k fine for a third time offender. For those that continue to commit felony DWI's and reach the status of a habitual offender may be punished by life in the penitentiary.

These penalties are for simple DWI not involving injuries or other aggravating factors. Some factors can make a first time DWI a felony. A first time DWI with a passenger under the age of 15 years old, for example, is a state jail felony. It is also a more serious felony if the offender causes serious bodily injury or death to another, even if that other person is within the same vehicle as the offender. An irresponsible night out with friends, even for a driver with no criminal history, could result in the driver going to prison for up to 20 years, and his friends going to the morgue.

In addition to the criminal penalties and legal fees, the offender's DL will be suspended for up to 2 years, the Texas Department of Public Safety will assess annual surcharges for 3 years at a rate of \$2,000 a year, installation of an interlock device paid for by the offender may be ordered, as well as DWI intervention classes and other forms of treatment. have seen people lose very well paying jobs as a result of a first time DWI as well.

Unlike many other types of offenses, DWI strikes without motive, and without warning. It truly affects us all.





## DPS reminds student drivers of new ITTD requirement as of Sept. 1 The Texas Department of

Public Safety is reminding student drivers about the Impact Texas Teen Driver program (ITTD), which went into effect Sept. 1 and is a new requirement for driver license applicants who complete a teen driver education course. The two-hour ITTD program contains several videos that provide awareness about the dangers of distracted driving. As of September 1, 2015, anyone who takes a teen driver edu-

cation course - including Parent Taught Driver Education - must also complete the ITTD program, which consists of watching the video and printing out the ITTD completion certificate. ITTD should be completed after the classroom hours and all behindthe-wheel instruction, and it is the last step before taking the driving skills examination. (Individuals aged 18-24, who choose to complete a teen driver education course, must also complete the ITTD program.)

In order to take the driver skills examination, student drivers must present the ITTD completion certificate along with their driver's education course certificate of completion. The skills examination must be completed within 90 days of date on the ITTD cer-

## Outstanding farmer awards presented during recent Lynn County Ag Tour

Farmers, ranchers, agribusinessmen and women gathered at New Home Co-Op Gin at Lakeview to attend the annual Lynn County Ag Tour, held last Wednesday, Sept. 23. The field tour started at the Clem's sheep barn where Jordon and Jody Clem discussed their sheep operation. Because of rain that started after that stop, the field tours were cancelled, and the rest of the presentations were made at the gin, and concluded with a noon meal sponsored by Lynn-Garza Farm Bureau and People's Bank and presentation of the Outstanding Farmer and Outstanding Young Farmer of the year awards.

Danny Nettles was named the 2015 Outstanding Farmer and Jody Clem was recognized as the 2015 Outstanding Young Farmer. Jason Gandy (Vice President) and Clint Robinson (Sr. Vice President) of Capital Farm Credit presented plaques to the winners.

The ag tour was sponsored by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, the Natural

Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) and Lynn County Soil & Water Conservation District (SWCD).

Dr. Jason Woodward, plant pathologist with Texas AgriLife Research, discussed plant pests, nematodes and diseases in cotton. Dr. Peter Dotray, weed scientist with the Texas Agrilife Extension Service, spoke about fall weed control and weed resistance issues. Dr. Calvin Trostle discussed corn and milo Rodney Schoppa, CED for

Lynn County FSA, discussed the on-going ARC/PLC 2014 and 2015 enrollment. He discussed the importance of enrolling in the ARC/PLC for these years as there might possibly be government payments available if some of the covered commodities trigger a payment.

"Currently do not know if there are any payments that triggered for 2014. It is rumored that peanuts may have triggered," said Schoppa. The deadline to complete the enrollment was September 30. If there are any

payments for 2014 they should come out sometime in October.

Also discussed was the importance of completing the FSA-941 or AGI form. Commodities cannot be marketed without one on file in the FSA office. Producers were told to come by the office to complete the AGI form as soon as possible and pick one up for their

The upcoming COC election for the Southwest part of the county will take place this year. Ballots will go out in November. There are two people on the ballot this year - Megan Mires and Bill Griffing.

Schoppa encouraged producers to certify their wheat as soon as possible. The deadline to certify wheat this year is November 30. He noted it is very important to certify wheat as there will be a late file charge this year for late certification of wheat of \$46 per farm, and said that producers should consult their insurance agents with any questions about wheat insur-

## No re-trial for Tahoka man given probated sentence

Sammy Carl Williams, 49, a Tahoka man convicted of driving while intoxicated and given probation for causing a wreck that took a child's left leg, will not get a new trial sought by the prosecuting attorney, an appeals court ruled last week.

In August 2014, Williams was given 10 years' probation by a Lynn County jury whose members immediately claimed they meant to send him to prison, but misunderstood a form given to the jurors to sign.

The Amarillo based Seventh Court of Appeals dismissed the appeal by District Attorney Michael Munk. The court's opinion cites trial testimony in which both attorneys initially declined to poll jurors after they announced the sentence, and notes that the probated sentence was within the range of punishment for the second-degree felony of which he was convicted.

Munk later issued this state-

"I thank the Seventh Court for their well-written opinion and the opportunity for oral argument. They confirmed what we already knew as prosecutors, that a State's appeal is very limited and difficult to obtain after a judgment is entered. It is noteworthy, however, that their opinion in no way condoned the actions or procedures followed by the trial court after realizing the jury's mistake. We simply lacked the standing for the limited purposes that the code gives the State to appeal. Hopefully, one day the legislature will give the State the standing to appeal a trial court's procedures that lead to a manifest injustice."

Williams was driving back to Tahoka on June 28, 2013 after drinking at Lubbock bars earlier that night when his Chevrolet van struck the Chevrolet Tahoe of a family traveling to Mexico from their home in Colorado. The Tahoe had been legally parked on the shoulder near a roadside park just north

tion of his left leg.

Williams fled the scene and later was arrested near his home in Tahoka. His blood alcohol content reportedly was almost three times the legal limit.
