The project has been a long time coming, as city officials began the search for funding several years ago to replace the antiquated waterline system underneath city streets. The city has been plagued with waterline breaks and other maintenance issues for many years, which became increasingly problematic in recent years due to the 100-year-old pipeline system throughout much of the city. Some areas of the city had been replaced as funds became available, so the upcoming project will replace the older pipelines, and all will be tied in to a newer, more efficient system to serve the needs of the citizens.

"It is high time for this project to get underway," said Tahoka Mayor John Baker. "We are thankful for the grant, and appreciate our citizens' patience and understanding during the many waterline breaks and boil notices, and ask for their continued patience throughout the upcoming construction process," he added.

City Administrator Jerry Webster told The News that he anticipates the funds will be in city coffers by July 12, and that city officials have met with the engineers on the project to draw up contracts ready to be in place by the end of July. If all goes as planned, it is expected that actual construction work on

In other business, council members heard from several citizens who spoke about issues with dogs in their neighborhoods, and city street issues.

The council approved leasing a front-end loader from Caterpillar for landfill use, and approved monthly bills.

Julia Allen, chairman of the A.C.T. Board (Advancing the Community of Tahoka), presented requests from the board for fund expenditures, which the council approved. The A.C.T. Board requested \$1600 for purchasing nonslip mats at the city pool; \$175 for the Tahoka Pioneer Museum sign; \$250 for the A.C.T. Board to join the Ports To Plains coalition; and up to \$1200 to provide a handicap ramp and sidewalk at the Tahoka Mini-Park to allow handicapped children access to playground equipment.


Also, city officials were informed of the resignation of Donnis Scott from the A.C.T. Board. The council may take action at an upcoming meeting to fill the vacated seat.

One of my favorite times growing up was the summer I was 14. My cousin always spent the summer with me in Tahoka. That summer we got to work at my dad's Exxon station. We each had uniforms and could pump gas, check everything under the hood, check tires, wash windows and greet each customer.

Dad (Bill Chancy) also taught us how to do an oil change and check spark plugs. We really thought we were something.

We also washed cars and dried them. Dad was very particular about the inside of the cars and the windows. I have redone a window several times until it met his approval! Afterwards, we would return the car to its owner. We were not allowed to touch anything inside the car and it would get very hot inside them. (Do not even think about rolling down a window and streaking the shine on it!) We would stop at the end of each block and open the doors to let in some air.

Dad had an old Model T pickup that he would leave when he would pick up a customer's car. My cousin could not drive a stick shift and I could. She would drive and I would shift for her. There was so much play in the steering wheel that it took both of us to drive that pickup just to keep it going straight!

Dad taught me how to work hard and to take pride in the work you do. He also taught me that it was very important that people would come back to trade with him if you were honest and dependable. Dad loved people. and it showed in how he treated them. Hard work, honesty and a sense of humor are all of the things I love about my dad. Thanks dad for those memories!

It was news, and it was happening right across the street from the News Office. Inwardly I chuckled, as of course I stayed at the burial service, but I knew Dad was laughing from Heaven. I bet he set off that fire alarm himself.

In case you were wondering - the fire was put out before the fire trucks arrived, and it was basically a non-story - which turned out to be a blessing for that business as well as for me.







# **Tahoka ISD Board approves** contracts for 4 new teachers

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met Monday night, approving contracts for four new staff members and conducting other routine business.

Teacher contracts were approved for teacher/coaches Lance Hogle (HS Social Studies/boy's coach), Portia Price (Middle School ELA/girl's coach), and Kavin Comer (Middle School Math/boy's coach), and Miranda Underwood (Middle School ELA/One Act Play Sponsor), for the 2016-17 school year. Resignations of two teachers were reported, including Shayla Erickson (Elementary Computers/ Art), and RC Mills (HS social studies/ boys' coach).

The board approved two contracts for next year with the Education Service Center, including a curriculum interlocal agreement for \$16,050, and a software and webhosting interlocal agreement for \$30,150. Policy updates were approved, dealing with the teacher appraisal system (called T-TESS), and the principal appraisal system (T-PESS). Trustees also approved the adoption of a resolution identifying areas east of US 87 as hazardous routes, for purposes of the district's transportation department reporting guidelines.

TISD Athletic Director Brandon Hopper recognized Serena Ayala for being named to the all-district softball team. Coach Stephen Overstreet recognized Juwuan Hamilton, Brayden Castillion, Tristen Tipton for making all district in baseball.

The board approved naming trustee Doug Green as the district's delegate for the 2016 TASB Delegate Assembly and Jon Luna as the alternate. The TASB delegate assembly will take place during the annual TASA/TASB convention, which will be held September 23-25 in Houston.

Prior to the regular board meeting, the board held a onehour budget workshop led by the superintendent, Dr. George McFarland, Dr. Cathy Box, Board President, led the meeting with trustees Jim Bingham, Scott Dimak, Doug Green, Clay





Commissioners were asked to submit their annual road reports, approved several budget amendments, and approved monthly bills. The meeting adjourned at 10:15 a.m.




### Resident kills rattlesnake on front porch
