Three accidents occur in county, one involving a deer on U.S. 87

Lynn County Sheriff's Office reported three accidents during the past week, including a one-vehicle rollover, an SUV hitting a deer, and another SUV that flipped

On June 30, a farm hand rolled a pickup truck belonging to Kevin Mitchell at 9:04 p.m. at FM 1317 and FM 179. The driver was apparently unharmed, as he had left the scene before officers arrived.

An SUV driving northbound on U.S. 87 Sunday night hit a deer approximately 3 miles south of the Poka Lambro building, about 9:30 p.m. No information was available on the driver who was apparently not hurt, but the vehicle suffered sufficient damage that it had to be towed from the scene.

And on Monday night, July 5, a woman called the Sheriff's Office at 11:18 p.m. to report that a black SUV driving behind her had flipped over, on U.S. 87 about 6 miles north of O'Donnell. The driver, a woman from Lamesa, was transported by Lynn County EMS to the hospital.

Tahoka Police arrested a 39-year-old Tahoka woman on charges of Driving While License Invalid with Previous Convictions and for Display of Fictitious License Plate/ Registration, after stopping a black Ford Focus at 8 p.m Thursday, June 30. A search of the vehicle also resulted in a citation for possession of drug paraphernalia.

Tahoka Police and Lynn County Sheriff's Office received numerous calls regarding loud fireworks, both inside the Tahoka city limits and in rural areas, but no injuries or damages were reported during the holiday weekend.

TxDOT sealcoat program set for July through Sept.

More than 333 miles of state roadways are part of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) Lubbock District's 2016 seal coat program. Roadways in Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Floyd, Gaines, Garza, Hale, Hockley, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Parmer, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum counties will see \$15.4 million of preventative maintenance work during the months of July, August and September.

"Seal coating provides a variety of benefits to the roadway," said Mike Craig, P.E., Tx-DOT Plainview Area engineer. "including a waterproof surface that prevents moisture from entering and weakening the roadbed. Seal coating also reduces deterioration and cracking of the asphalt surface, which prolongs the life of the pavement."

Other roadway benefits include an improved non-skid surface in wet or icy conditions and an anti-glare and increased reflective surface for night and wet weather driving, Craig not-

Lynn County is included in the 2016 seal coat program on FM 1730 and FM 400, as well as other surrounding counties in the Lubbock District. The seal coat operations are expected to continue through September. Motorists can expect lane closures and a pilot car to guide traffic through the work zone, and are asked to drive with caution through the work zone. be on the lookout for workers and avoid distractions for their own safety and the safety of the workers. FSA County Committee nomination period underway

Lynn County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Rodney Schoppa, announced that the nomination period for local FSA county committees is underway.

"County Committees are unique to FSA and allow producers to have a voice on federal farm program implementation at the local level," said Schoppa.

To be eligible to serve on a FSA county committee, a person must participate or cooperate in an FSA administered program, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and reside in the local administra-

Lynn County USDA Farm tive area (LAA) where they are rouse Agency (FSA) Execunominated.

This year, nominations and elections will be held in LAA 2, which includes Wilson and the east of FM 400 and east of 2956.

Farmers and livestock producers may nominate themselves or others. Organizations representing minorities and women also may nominate candidates. To become a candidate, an eligible individual must sign an FSA-669A nomination form. The form and other information about FSA county committee elections are available at www. fsa.usda.gov/elections. nomination forms must be postmarked or received in the Lynn County FSA Office by close of business on Aug. 1.

Elected county committee members serve a three-year term and are responsible for making decisions on FSA disaster, conservation, commodity and price support programs, as well as other important federal farm program issues. County committees consist of three to 11 members.

"It is important that county committees are comprised of members who fairly represent

the diverse demographics of production agriculture for their community," said Schoppa. "All producers, including women, minority and beginning farmers and ranchers are encouraged to participate in the nomination and election process."

FSA will mail election ballots to eligible voters beginning Nov. 7. Ballots must be returned to the Lynn county FSA office via mail or in person by Dec. 5. Newly-elected committee members and alternates will take office on Jan. 1, 2017.

Cotton Crop Management news ...

CURRENT CONDITIONS

We are still getting our scouting program put together and trying to obtain a pattern of which fields are scouted on which days - still waiting on a couple of fields to be placed in the program.

Cotton is developing at a near optimal rate. Of course we always have those fields that get "out-of-step" with nature and the weather patterns that are having problems and are strugup not producing much cotton at the end - time will tell. The sunshine and heat following the rains is ideal for cotton production. I would really like to see temperatures in the 95° to 97° range during the day and stay in the 70's at night. Looks like we are going to have the nights where we need them.

Cotton has started to square (62% of our program fields). Square set is outstanding - averaging about 99% for all fields I am scouting (ranging from 98% - 100%). The most advanced fields have matchhead size squares.

Insect activity remains very light, however, I have one field which has 25 adult fleahoppers per 100 plants. Finding all adult Cotton Fleahoppers and no immatures tells me they are just starting to infest the cotton so be on the watch. This week I also found a single bollworm

egg, an armyworm egg mass and one plant with three aphids in the terminal. None of these finds are concerning at this point and may never be a problem, but we need to continue to scout our fields so none of these sneak up on us.

THE SQUARE

The square is simply the flower bud of a cotton plant housing the pollen anthers and sepals and surrounded by three (or sometimes four) bracts. They are located on the fruiting branches. In the older varieties the first fruiting branch started at node 5 or 6. In the newer varieties, first fruiting branch starts about nodes 7, 8 or 9.

Cotton has an internal mechanism to regulate the initiation of squares. Squares will appear at every new mainstem node following development of the 1st fruiting branch. The node location of the first fruiting branch is controlled by variety and the environment surrounding the plant during the first weeks after emergence. Adverse conditions will always cause the first fruiting branch to move up the plant - never down. After the first 3 weeks of plant growth, the only possible manipulation of square numbers is through protection and sustained plant growth:

Scientists and producers have sought a "magical" chemical or management practice that would make cotton square. An increase in the relative amount of fruit does occur when plants suffer from water or nitrogen
