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Fatal crash claims life of 23-year-old Tahoka woman

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Katherine Jennifer Colon was pronounced deceased at the scene of the one-car rollover. She was the front seat passenger and was not wearing a seatbelt, and had been ejected from the vehicle, according to information from Sgt. John Gonzalez, Media Communication and Education officer with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

According to the DPS investigation, a Chevrolet Suburban was traveling east bound on FM 213 about 6 miles east of US 87 in Lynn County at 5 a.m. Friday. The vehicle lost control on the right, overcorrected to left, came back to the right and left the roadway into a steep embankment of the barrow ditch.

The vehicle rolled into the field and onto its top, ejecting a passenger, identified as Colon.

The driver, Erika Chavarria, 26, also of Tahoka was not injured.

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Memorial services for Colon were held at 2:00 p.m. Monday, September 5, at St. Chapel Evangelical Methodist Church in Wilson.

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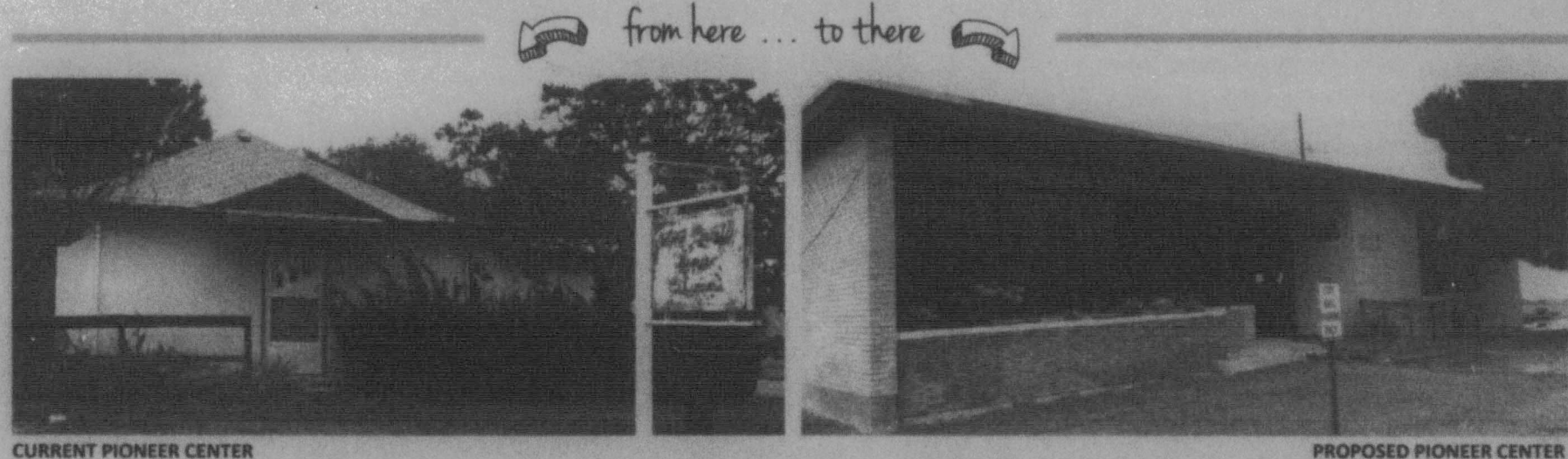
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It's a worthy project, however, and the Board of Directors for the Lynn County Pioneers officially accepted the challenge at a director's meeting last week, voting to accept the building and to pursue grant funds and donations to complete the needed renovations.

"The building that the center is in now is in terrible condition, and we have had lots of maintenance problems," said Jay Dee House, Chairman of the Pioneer Board. The current Pioneer Center is located at 1600 South

3rd Street. On a daily basis, the center serves an average of 20-25 senior citizens onsite, as well as an average of 40 delivery meals per day.

"We are looking forward to this partnership to better serve the senior citizens of Lynn County with a more suitable building at a more central location," said John Baker, Mayor of Tahoka. "That old house that the senior citizens center is in has served its purpose, and it is time to move to a better facility," he added.

"The City will retain ownership of the building and provide all the maintenance, which should infuse money into their budget that they are currently spending on maintenance issues," the mayor said.

Renovation plans at the former City Hall building include converting the large garage area into the dining area and main entrance of the Pioneer Center, which will necessitate raising the floor, new flooring, lowering the ceiling, HVAC ductwork and adding heating/air conditioning to the area, finishing interior walls, and new entry doors and windows. Inside other areas of the old City Hall, renovation plans call for converting the large meeting room in the back of the building (adjacent to the garage area) into new kitchen facilities, complete with new appliances and kitchen equipment.

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could be used for adult education, quilting, and an activity room. Furnishing the new dining area with tables and chairs is also figured in the renovation costs.

"We are going to seek grant funding, and will also have fundraisers and seek donations from area citizens and organizations for this worthy project," said House.

Dogs open with 55-18 win over Crosbyton's Chiefs

The Tahoka Bulldogs started out the 2016 season on a good note, beating the Crosbyton Chiefs 55-18 in the opener on the road, and have two more away games coming up before the first home game of the season. The Dogs head to Post this Friday, and to Springlake-Earth on Sept. 9, before hosting Smyer in Tahoka's Homecoming game on Sept. 16.

In the Friday's win, the Bulldogs took the opening kickoff and were able to score on their first possession, on a one-yard run by Brit Lockaby. The defense was able to cause a fumble on Crosbyton's first play from scrimmage and quickly added another touchdown as Lockaby connected with Grant Tekell to put the Bulldogs up 14-0, with both PATs from John Quinonez good.

"Crosbyton is a very good, well-coached football team. I knew if we came out with a lot of

emotion and executed the game plan, it could be a big night for us," said Coach Brandon Hopper.

On Crosbyton's next possession, Kevin White was able to pick a fumble up and score making it 21-0 with another PAT from Quinonez.

Both teams settled in and traded scores throughout the first half leading to a 42-18 halftime lead for the Bulldogs.

The defense held the Chiefs out of the end zone the second half and the offense was able to add two more touchdowns after the break.

"Our defense played great! They were very opportunistic and were able to cause six turnovers," said Hopper. "When the defense is able to give your offense that many opportunities, good things are going to happen. Our offense did a great job in not turning the ball over as well."

Juwan ended the night rushing for 225 yards while Brit ended up with 120 yards rushing. Each scored three rushing touchdowns apiece, with Hamilton scoring on runs of 65 yards, 67 yards, and 48 yards, and Lockaby running for TDs of 1 yard, 52 yards, and 41 yards.

"Juwan Hamilton and Brit Lockaby were great in executing the game plan. Both were key contributors to the success of the offense," the coach said.

John Quinonez converted 7 PAT's, and John Stone and Tristen Stice each had an interception. Andrew Alvarez had a fumble recovery.

"It was a great team win where all three phases of the game came together. I am very proud of our boys and the way they came out playing Friday night. I am excited to see what's in store for this group the rest of the season," Hopper added.

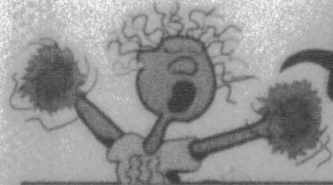

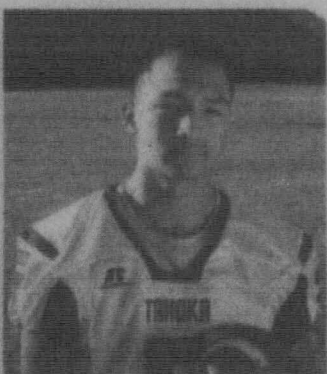

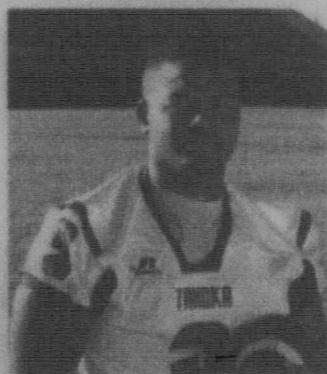

The movie begins at dark on the practice field, but snacks will be served beginning at 8 p.m. If inclement weather, the movie will be moved indoors to the school gym.

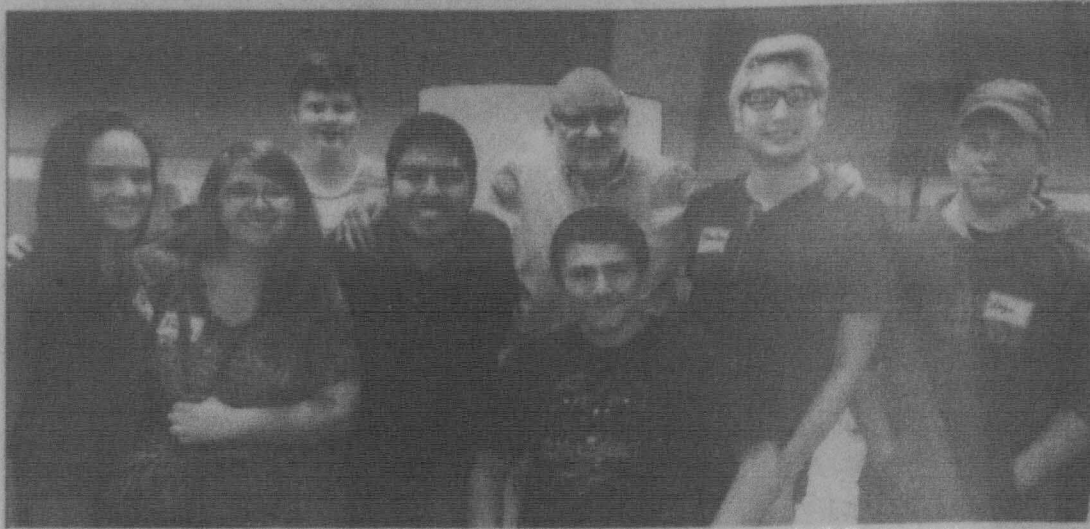

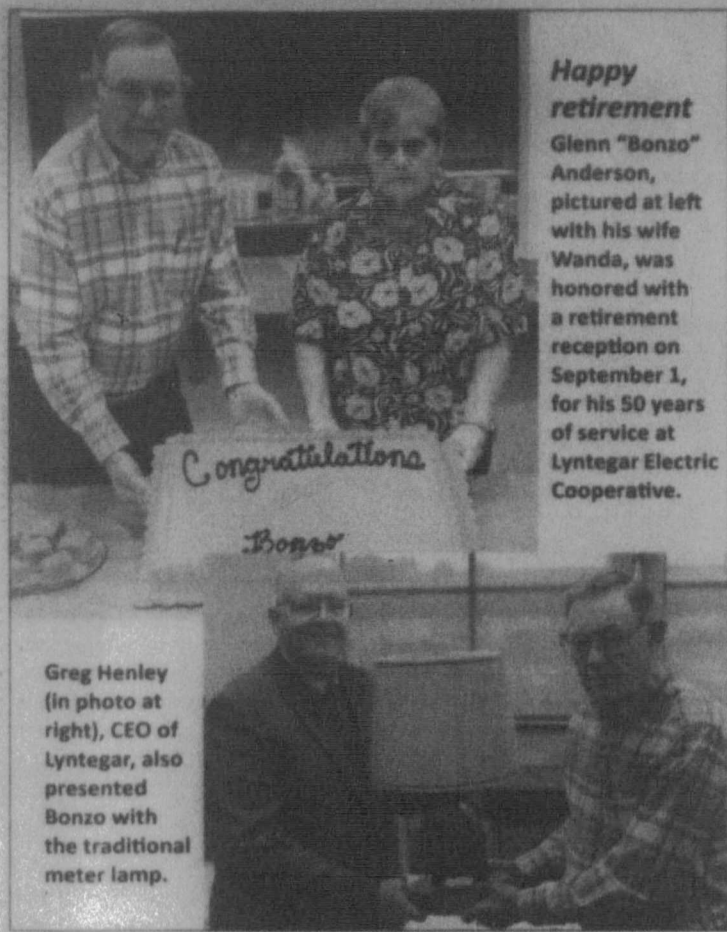

Tahoka man retires after completing half a century of service

August 31, 2016 marked the end of a career spanning half a century for Glenn "Bonzo" Anderson, who was employed at Lyntegar Electric Cooperative for 50 years. A retirement reception was held in his honor on September 1, at Lyntegar Electric Cooperative's headquarters in Tahoka. Bonzo was presented with the traditional meter clock and a Moore Maker pocket knife recognizing him for 31 years of no loss time. The reception was well attended by family, friends, past and present coworkers, and even peers from other cooperatives.

Prior to working at Lyntegar, Bonzo served in the United States Navy from March 4, 1957 until he was Honorably Discharged on March 4, 1963. He served as a Diesel Technician and later as an Air Conditioner and Refrigeration Technician. He left the Navy as a 2nd Class Petty Officer and farmed a few years before starting his new line of work with the cooperative.

Bonzo began his career with Lyntegar on January 16, 1967, as a Groundman Trainee. He worked his way up through the line department becoming a Journeyman Lineman in 1972, Construction Superintendent in 1976, Maintenance Superintendent in 1982, and he was promoted to Line Department Manager on February 1, 2001, the position he would hold until his retirement.

During his career with the cooperative, Bonzo received numerous awards and honors. In 2001 he was awarded the first "Unsung Hero Award," by Texas

Electric Cooperatives' Loss Control Program. The award was given for his, "Continued support and extra effort towards the success of the TEC Loss Control Program."

In 2002, Texas Electric Cooperatives Loss Control partnered with South Plains College and opened the Glenn Anderson Underground Training Facility. They managed to keep the facility's name a secret, at least from Bonzo, until opening day.

Bonzo also served on the TEC Loss Control Advisory Committee from 2003-2006. In 2004 he was awarded the Ray Pantel Meritorious Service Award by TEC Loss Control.

Bonzo and his wife Wanda plan to stay in Tahoka.

"The board of directors, staff, and members of Lyntegar Electric Cooperative, Inc. want to congratulate Bonzo on his retirement and thank him for a job well done. Employees like Glenn "Bonzo" Anderson help us remain, "Owned and operated by those we serve," said a cooperative representative.

Texas setting rainfall records, says Texas A&M State Climatologist

COLLEGE STATION — If you think August was a wet month in Texas, pick up your prize. Preliminary totals indicate that August averaged about 5.69 inches of rain statewide, in a tie with 1914 for the wettest August on record, according to figures from the State Climatologist office at Texas A&M University.

John Nielsen-Gammon, professor of atmospheric sciences at Texas A&M who also serves as State Climatologist, says the wet month was due to an atmospheric wind pattern that pumped lots of deep, moist tropical air into Texas.

The wet months could continue for a while, he notes.

"September and October are historically among the wettest months of the year in Texas, so if normal conditions continue, we will see several more inches of rain," he explains.

"If a tropical storm or hurricane stalls over Texas — September is the peak month for such storms — then we would be at risk for serious flooding since most of the ground is already saturated."

Texas has also had the wettest 24-month consecutive period in the state's history, Nielsen-Gammon says.

The state has averaged 75.25 inches of rain over the past two years, breaking the previous record of 74.85 set in 1942.

The final numbers won't be official for another few months. Nielsen-Gammon notes that August 2016 could end up either first or second all-time, but the 24-month record is secure. "That 24-month record might only last a month, though, if Texas has a wet September," Nielsen-Gammon says.

Forecasters have predicted the development of a La Niña — when cooler than normal temperatures occur in the Central Pacific which in turn tend to affect weather worldwide — but it looks more and more likely that the La Niña will be marginal.

If a weak La Niña does develop, it likely means above normal temperatures and lower than normal precipitation rates for November through March.

The warm conditions would probably not follow last year's pattern, in which temperatures stayed relatively mild throughout the winter.

"Although the winter overall should be mild, La Niña allows

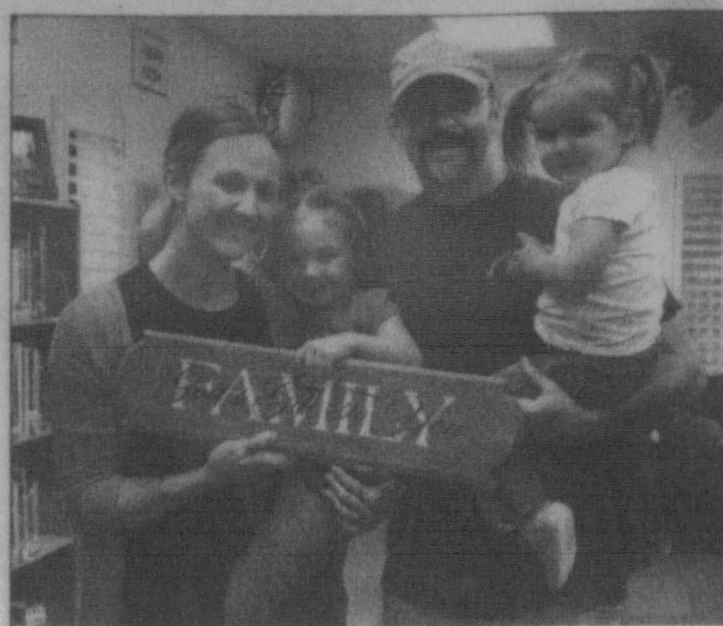
run by Juwan Hamilton.

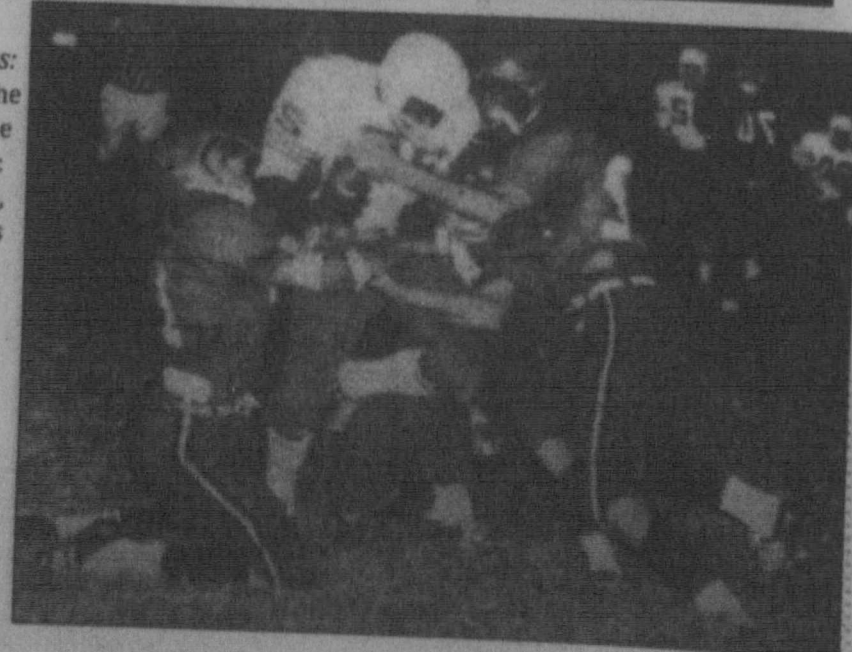
