ODonnell Independent School District Board of Trustees set the 2016 property tax rate at $\$ 1.50$ per $\$ 100$ of property value, at their Sept. 13 board meeting. The total tax rate includes
$\$ 1.17$ in the Maintenance and Operating ( $M \& 0$ ) fund, and $\$ 0.33$ in the interest and Sinking (l\&S) fund for debt service to pay off bonded indebtedness. The new rate is the same as the current rate of \$1.50.
