## Coyote, deer, fire involved in separate vehicle incidents here

t was not a good week for vehicles in Lynn County last week, with two hitting wildlife on the highway, one vehicle consumed by fire, and three collisions in Tahoka on Monday.


Just after midnight last Friday, a Cadillac SUV hit a coyote on US 87 while driving southbound near FM 211, north of Tahoka. The vehicle was damaged enough to require it to be towed from the scene. And on Saturday morning, another vehicle hit a deer on US 87 about 9 miles south of Tahoka, damaging a 2013 Ford SUV and causing injury to one of the males inside the vehicle. Juan DeLeon and Jose DeLeon, of Lubbock, were in the Ford SUV that struck the deer at 7:15 a.m. Lynn County EMS transported one person to Lubbock UMC for treatment of unspecified injuries.

A 2006 Ford pickup caught fire and burned in the parking lot of Cardi's restaurant on the US 87 access road on Friday afternoon. Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. was called to the scene just after 3 p.m. to put out the fire. The driver of the truck, Armando Ortiz of Lamesa, was not injured, but the truck was destroyed.

On Monday, two pickups collided at the intersection of Main and Lockwood at 9:30 a.m. in Tahoka. Guadalupe Solorzano of Tahoka was the driver of a 2007 GMC truck traveling southbound on Main Street, and Franz Klassen of Seminole was the driver of another 2007 GMC pickup that was pulling a utility trailer, driving west on Hwy 380. Both drivers told Tahoka Police that they had green lights showing on the traffic signal prior to the collision. Both vehicles were damaged and had to be towed from the scene, but no injuries were reported.

At 12:40 p.m., an Isuzu box truck collided with an 18-wheeler hauling diesel at the on-ramp to southbound US 87 at the S. 5th Street access in

Tahoka, in the one-lane construcfailed to yield right of way, according to police reports. Rojelio Gomez of Odessa, driver of the 18-wheeler, was transported by Lynn County EMS to Lynn County Hospital for treatment of injuries. Justin Flores, driver of the Isuzu van, was not injured.

And at 4:20 p.m. Monday, Patricia

McCreight of Santa Fe was the driver of a 2008 Dodge pickup pulling horse trailer that was struck by a 2011 Ford pickup on the west access road at the Highway 380 overpass in Tahoka, when the Ford reportedly failed to yield right of way at a stop sign. Jeffrey Fletcher of Lubbock was the driver of the Ford. No injuries were reported.

Police arrested a 35-yearold Tahoka woman on charges of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine) under 1 gram, and possession of marijuana under 2 ounces, after a Tahoka Police officer stopped her about 10 p.m. Tuesday, Sept. 27 in the 1700 block of Lockwood. A check of the vehicle's license plates showed that the tan Buick Lesabre 4-door was reported stolen out of Hockley County, and the drugs were found in the woman's purse after she gave consent to the

No other gins had begun processing cotton as of early this week.

#### National Ranching Heritage Center features new Quanah Parker exhibits

Two new exhibitions focusing on Comanche Chief Quanah Parker and Texas artist Frank Reaugh will open with a public reception from 5:30 to 7 p.m.

Saturday, Oct. 8 at the National Ranching Heritage Center (NRHC), located at 3121 Fourth Street in Lubbock.

"Both men shared the same



time period in history, loved the same land and became part of the history of that land," said Dr. Scott White, NRHC director of collections, exhibits and research.

The reception will include a presentation by Parker's greatgrandson, Bruce Parker, from Albuquerque, N.M. He will perform a Comanche smoke blessing for the opening of the Native American exhibit. In addition, Austin filmmaker Marla Fields will discuss her documentary film, "Frank Reaugh: Pastel Poet of the Texas Plains." The film is being shown from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturday during the Flatlanders Film Festival at the Louise Hopkins Underwood Center for the Arts.

To celebrate the exhibition of artifacts that once belonged to Quanah Parker, the Texas Plains Trail Region has temporarily placed a Quanah Parker Trail Arrow on the front lawn of the NRHC, making it one of more than 70 Panhandle locations with a tie to the last chief of the greatest tribe in America.

"Only the Smithsonian Institute has a larger collection of Comanche artifacts than the National Ranching Heritage Center," White said. "To preserve these very old and delicate artifacts, we keep them in a temperature-controlled room and rarely handle them. This is only the second time in 13 years that we have put some of the items on display."

Quanah Parker Trail Arrow ... The Texas Plains Trail Region has temporarily placed a Quanah Parker Trail Arrow on the front lawn of the National Ranching Heritage Center in Lubbock in recognition of a new museum exhibition featuring clothing and artifacts that once belonged to Quanah, the last chief of the Comanche tribe. The trail arrows, made by Lynn County resident Charles Smith, dot the Panhandle landscape in more than 70 locations with a tie to the last chief of the most powerful tribe in America.
