



RESTORATION BEGINS 101 YEARS LATER . . .

Commissioners accept grant, approve resolution to begin County Courthouse restoration project

he restoration of Lynn County's historic courthouse is going to begin 101 years after its beginnings in 1916, as Lynn County officials this week moved to accept grant funding and to undertake the remaining financial obligation for a full restoration of the century-old courthouse. The \$8.2 million restoration project is expected to begin in January 2017.

Lynn County was awarded a \$4.8 million grant for the project from the Texas Historical Commission's (THC) Texas Historic Courthouse Preservation Program (THCPP) Round IX funding in July, and county officials had six months to consider accepting the grant. On Monday, Nov. 14, Commissioners Keith Wied, John Hawthorne, Don Blair and Larry Durham voted unanimously to accept the grant funding and to accept the obligation to finance the remaining portion of the

project, after considering their finan-

cial options in numerous sessions in the months since the grant was awarded.

'It's been 13 years since we started this project to get the grant funding," said commissioner Don Blair, as he voted for the resolution supporting the efforts of Lynn County to execute restoration of the courthouse. "I wish we could have gotten the funding then, because the cost of restoration has more than doubled since then. But we can't do it on our own, and we did finally get some grant funding to help - so let's do it," he added.

Commissioners unanimously ap-

proved three action items needed to begin the restoration project, including accepting a Source of Funds Statement and Verfication, the resolution to executive the restoration project, and accepting the Funding Agreement with the Texas Historical Commission.

The original grant was submitted to the Texas Historical Commission THCPP program in 2003, and the overall master plan was approved by the THCPP in December 2006. At that time, the county was seeking \$3.5 million for the project. Since that time, the plan (revised for updated costs) has been submitted for funding approval every two years, for the THC's biennial award process. In a previous round in 2012, Lynn County's project missed the grant award by mere points, and the project was estimated to have a total cost of approximately \$6 million. Now, the project comes in at \$8.2 million.

The county's portion on the \$8.2 million project has come in at (See COURTHOUSE RESTORATION, page 6)



ried 1,622 votes Philip Mack Furlow (REP), unopposed, had 1,668 votes for District Attorney in the 106th Judicial District. Other local offices were also running unopposed, all on the Republican ticket, with Rebekah Filley getting 1, 686 votes for County Attorney, Abraham Vega with 1,719 votes for Sheriff, Donna Willis with 1,708 votes for Tax Assessor/Collector, Matt Woodley getting 423 votes for Pct. 1 County Commissioner, and Don Blair getting 316 votes for Pct. 3 County Commissioner. 
Tahoka Elementary students practice voting skills in their own election



\$4,018,000, in the current project estimates. However, the county has set aside funds throughout the years in anticipation of this project, and currently has \$2.5 million earmarked for the restoration.

We knew from the getgo that we would have to have about \$2.5 million set aside for the restoration project, and would probably have to finance at least another million," said. Amy Schuknecht, County Treasurer. Some of the funds have come from a half-cent sales tax collected by the county, some from fees and fines collected by county offices, and some from funds collected by housing inmates from other counties in the Lynn County Jail (after the jail building project was paid

Judge Braddock explained that certificates of obligation are being considered for the remaining \$1,518,000, and he and commissioners have been discussing the county's options with Specialized Public Finance, Inc. No official action has been approved yet for the
