
### NEW YEAR'S EVE PARTY TO BENEFIT SENIOR CITIZENS CENTER

## Keith Wied finishes term as Pct. 1 Commissioner

Lynn County Commissioner Keith Wied finished his term this week, attending his final meeting as County Commissioner of Precinct 1 on Tuesday, Dec. 27. County officials honored Wied with a going-away party following Tuesday morning's commissioner session, and thanked him for his years of service. Wied served as commissioner for Lynn County from Nov. 2007 through December 2016.

Wied chose not to run for reelection for another term, and commissioner-elect Matt Woodley will take the oath of office for the Pct. I seat on Sunday, Jan. 1, 2017.

In other business at Tuesday's meeting, commissioners accepted a corrected plat for the Palms at Kitty Hawk, a subdivision in northwestern Lynn County. This is a replat of Lots 1-32, 38-41 and landing strip located

in section 120, block 12, EL&RR RY., Co. Survey.

Commissioners approved a motion regarding health insurance, to add that if an elected official becomes an employee with no time lapse, said official will be covered fully by the county health insurance and will be exempt

from the 90-day probation period. Budget amendments were approved and monthly bills approved for

payment. County Judge Mike Braddock reported on the changes and improvements at the county showbarn, telling commissioners about the renovation project currently underway by the Lynn County Stock Show Assn.

"They are almost finished with the insulation, and the new south door is installed," Braddock told The News.

# A caring heart ... Local woman volunteers time to assist with GED classes here

mber (Sires) Farris has a passion. She wants people who may have low self-esteem because of not finishing high school to know that they are worthy, and wants to encourage them to obtain their GED. She has such a passion for it that she visited with Tahoka ISD Superintendent Dr. George McFarland about it, and now she volunteers her time to seek out those who would benefit from the program that is being offered through TISD. But she doesn't stop there - she calls them, encourages them, and is an exuberant cheerleader to support them as they undertake a new chapter in their lives.

"I'm so excited about this program," says Farris. "Did you know that Lynn County is in the top 5% of the poorest counties in the state of Texas? And that designation tends to have the stigma of an uneducated population? And so, rather than being judgmental of those who, for whatever reason, were unable to get their high

school degree, I decided I wanted to be a part of the solution and to help people get an education, and maybe have an opportunity to better their lives," she explains.

Farris believes the basic step to having an opportunity to making a better life, is to start (See GED CLASSES, page 3)

# A brand new look for 2017 County showbarn renovation includes new pens, show ring

he Lynn County Showbarn will feature a fresh new look - and be more 'user-friendly' - in January's upcoming stock shows. A much-needed renovation has been undertaken by the Lynn County Stock Show Association during the past few months, to upgrade and insulate the holding pen areas, as well as adding new show ring panels, gates and other upgrades.

"It's been 53 years since the wooden pens were built by the Lynn County Stock Show Assn. to hold animals at the showbarn, back in 1963, and we really needed new ones," said Martin Gill, President of the Stock Show Assn. "We're having 150 custom-built steel pens made to replace the old wooden pens and doing some other much-needed renovation at the county showbarn. We expect to have the majority of the renovations finished in time for the Tahoka Show and County Stock Show coming up in January," he added.

Gill said the new animal pens will be 5x5 ft. pens, custom-built by a company in Canada to replace 110 wooden pens that have been in the showbarn for years.

"The old wooden pens were in horrible shape, and had diseases in them, and a lot of the gates didn't work," Gill said, shaking his head. "These new pens will be nice, with better gates, and we have asked all the school ag programs in the county to help us by building new storage racks

for the pens," said Gill, explaining that when the pens are not needed they can be taken up and placed on the storage racks to get them off the floor. "These pens can be moved out to the wall, and that will allow space to be used for other activities if needed. And, it will make cleanup so much better," he added.

There will be a brand new garage door on the south entrance of the barn that will allow better access for loading and unloading animals, and the Stock Show Assn. is also adding spray foam insulation to the walls to better insulate the animal holding area in the southern half of the showbarn. The front public area of the showbarn is already insulated, but the back half has never been insulated.

Gill said the Stock Show Assn. is also buying new show ring panels. with all new gates, for showing animals in the stock shows.

Those old gates we had in the past were hard to use, and didn't work right a lot of the time," he explained.

It is a large project that the Stock

Show Assn. has taken on to improve the showbarn, and they have opened up sponsorship opportunities to help fund the renovation. Sponsorship opportunities include Platinum Sponsors (\$5,000 contribution), Gold (\$3,000), Silver (\$2,000), Bronze (\$1,000) and Pen (\$400).



Marcos, December 5-9, 2016. The Newly Elected Sheriff's Seminar is held every four years after election time for new Sheriffs and Chief Deputies' education, teaching and preparing them for office. This year, participants received training on a variety of topics, including: Duties and Responsibilities of the Sheriff, Model Policies, Inmate Transportation, Open Records, Media Relations, Texas Department of Public Safety Resources, TDCJ Intake and Classification, Estray Law, Parole Warrants, Civil Process, Texas Commission on Jail Standards and Regulations, Cold Case Review Team, Evidence and Property Room Liabilities, New Technology, Labor Laws, Ethics and many more.

This seminar also provides them a comprehensive overview of the responsibilities of their new office and a chance to meet their peers to whom they can look to for support during the coming term.

The Sheriff's Association of Texas (SAT) is a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit organization dedicated to increasing the effectiveness of local law enforcement in Texas. Through the support of their members. tests themselves.

Tahoka ISD has tried to offer a GED class in the past, but community interest in the class

"As a district this was something we tried to do with a GED class in the summer of 2015 but we were unable to gather enough interest," said Dr. McFarland. 'Amber called me midway through the Fall 2016 semester about her interest in establishing a GED program in Tahoka, and more importantly, that she had already determined that we would have a good amount of interest in the program. I proceeded from there to make the parts fit so that we can house an adult education program in our district. However, Amber has been instrumental in gathering the participants for the

program," he added. Farris is not a GED teacher, but she is working with Supt. McFarland to get the program started, and is also a liaison between the school and certified GED instructors to help set up class schedules. She calls people, trying to find out whom she may approach to encourage to obtain their GED. Then she works with those she calls, encouraging them to take the first step, sign up for the classes, and to focus on the education opportunities. She currently has 26 people who have signed up for the GED program

and say, 'You're worth it!'," says Farris. "It takes a lot of courage to make this decision, to admit that a GED is something worth work-

After helping someone get their GED, Farris has plans to encourage people to continue their education, helping them to apply for scholarships or seek entry-level positions in the workforce. She volunteers her time to serve as a

General Educational Development (GED) tests are a group of four subject tests which, when passed, provide certification that the test taker has earned their high school diploma. Farris coordinated her efforts with Tahoka ISD, and on January 10 the GED classes will begin for anyone interested in taking them. The classes are free, and while the four tests required for certification are not free, she has resources that will provide funds for the local GED candidates to take the tests without having to pay for the

"Wherever God leads me, I'm going to be ready. I am ready. But right now, I need to do what I can right here at home, in Tahoka," says Farris.



Burglaries, one-vehicle rollover

Two burglaries and a onevehicle rollover were reported in Lynn County during the past two weeks, and Tahoka Police officers were busy with drug arrests and a DWI.

A building in the south side of Tahoka that was used for storage was reported burglarized, according to Tahoka Police reports in the past two weeks. Todd McNeely reported that his property in the 1800 block of South 7th Street, formerly the Tahoka Care Center, was burglarized sometime during the

The owner told police on Dec. 16 that the suspect(s) had broken a window on the south de of the building to gain entrance. McNeely, and others, used the building for storage. and he reported several items had been taken. A complete list of stolen items was to be provided to police, and the investigation continues.

Lynn County Sheriff's Officer received a report of a barn burglarized on Dec. 15. The owner reported that he discovered the door lock broken, and reported tools missing including a Miller welder, a grind rock, and a cutting torch. The barn is located 4-5 miles north of Tahoka and 1.5 miles west on CR15.

A Tahoka man, 31, was found to be in possession of narcotics, after police contacted him regarding another matter on Dec. 12. Police saw the man pull into a local convenience store parking lot and approached him because he was needed to sign a criminal trespass warning for another case. Upon making contact, however, the man admitted to police that he had a pocketknife and "a little bit of marijuana" in his possession.

arrested in Tahoka on Dec. 20 on charges of possession of methamphetamine after police were called in to a local grocery store to apprehend a suspect attempting to cash a forged check. ## Texas Tips

This week's tip:

Drive less Combining errands into one trip saves you time and money and reduces emissions. Several short trips, taken from a cold start, can use twice as much fuel as a longer, multi-purpose trip covering the same distance when the engine is warm. To save more money and fuel, take advantage of carpools and ride-share programs. According to the American Automobile Association, if two people living nearby were to ride together on the 50-mile round trip commute each day and split the driving, each would save more than \$3,400 a year on gas, reduced maintenance costs, and insurance. Also consider using public transit when it's available. Walk or ride a bike along with your child to school. It's good for the environment and healthy for your family too.

Refuel at the right time of day

If you're on your way to work in the morning and notice you need gas, wait until your drive home to refuel, and you can actually help keep the air clean. Postponing your stop at the gas station until late afternoon or evening reduces the emissions during the peak daylight hours when ozone formation is most likely. At the gas pump, vapors are released into the air that, when combined with sunlight on hot, still days, will form ground-level ozone, sometimes referred to as smog. Another thing to think about at the pump: don't top off your tank; stop at the click. This prevents fuel from escaping as vapor, and it also decreases the chance for spilling fuel. After you finish filling up, make sure you properly tighten the gas cap; otherwise, gas will evaporate from your car's tank.





## **HPWD** annual water level measurements in progress

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) personnel are now making water level measurements to determine the effect of 2016 pumping on groundwater levels in the aquifers within the district's 16-county service

Measurements are made annually in a network of more than 1,400 privately-owned water wells. These observation. wells are spaced at a density of about one well per nine square

miles throughout the district.

After the measurement is made, a blue vinyl sticker with the observation well number, the depth-to-water level measurement, and the date of the measurement is affixed to the well equipment or other appropriate surface near the well site.

High Plains Water District personnel measure the same wells in the observation well network each year as long as the individual wells are accessible and continue to provide satis-

The current depth-to-water level measurements in individual wells are compared to those of previous years to determine the average annual change in water levels.

In recent years, the district has established a network of observation wells in the Dockum Aguifer within its service area.

These water level data are made available to the public through an interactive observation well map on the district's web site (map hpwd.org) as well as publication in an annual water level measurement report.
