Good crowd attends County Stock Show

good crowd turned out for the 2017 Lynn County Stock Show last week, as county youth demonstrated their showmanship skills in exhibiting pigs, goats, lambs and steers to win awards as well as cash prizes in Saturday's auction sale.

The annual County Stock Show requires many hours of planning and preparation by the Lynn County Stock Show Association and numerous volunteers to help put on the show, as well as the support of county commissioners and sponsors who generously contribute to the show. Bill Miller, with some assistance from Jason Spence and Shiloh Braddock, shared auctioneering duties at this year's event. Slate May and Brady Askew were announcers for the show. Spence presented Bill Miller with

a buckle in appreciation for Miller's 40 years of auctioneering at the county show, and he also recognized Billy Davis for his support of the show for over 50 years.

"Billy Miller sold my last project

for \$400 in 1988 (and I was glad to get it). This year, Billy Miller celebrated his 40th sale, so I had a buckle made in recognition of this. Billy Davis has been with this stock show over 50 years and he received a buckle as well. Both of "The Billys" hauled me many miles during my show career and taught me a lot of life lessons," said Spence.

Tahoka, Lynn County, Texas

This was the 79th annual county stock show, with the first one held in 1938, but it wasn't until 1978 that the show added the sale to the event. At that first sale, a total of just over \$41,600 was raised, according to stock show records. Last year, the sale brought in \$184,403, and this year's sale tally is still being counted as additional add-ons come in.

Grand Champion winners at this year's show included Lainee Cook, who showed the Grand Champion Barrow; Brook Tyson, Grand Champion Steer; Maddison Truhlicka, Grand Champion Lamb; and Tristen Truhlicka, Grand Champion Wether Goat. For the younger exhibitors, Remi Donald showed the Grand Champion Miniature Hereford, and Kaylee Jordan showed the Grand Champion Pee Wee Goat. Buckle sponsors were Gar-

lyn Gin, Lynn County Farm Bureau and Atterbury Grain.

Reserve Grand Champion winners included McKinley Clem (Lamb), Jake Tabor (Barrow), Jace Jordan (Steer), Jace Jordan (Wether Goat), Sawyer May (Pee Wee Goat), and Bryce Gill (Miniature Hereford). Buckle sponsors were Garlyn Gin, Mesa Irrigation, Helena Chemical Lamesa, Peoples Bank and Atterbury Grain.

Brook Tyson won the Overall Showmanship award at the show. Braden Cook won Senior Barrow Showmanship, Kyley Gill won the Senior Lamb Showmanship, Brit Lockaby won Senior Steer Showmanship, and Tristen Truhlicka won the Senior Goat Showmanship award. In the junior division, Jake Tabor won the Junior Barrow Showmanship; Warren Taylor, Junior Steer Showmanship; Carlee Smith, Junior Lamb Showmanship; and Rayna Epley, Junior Goat Showmanship, Trevor Martin, Miniature Hereford Showmanship, and Remi Donald, Pee Wee Goat Showmanship award. Pay property taxes by Jan.31 or face additional interest fees

Lynn County property owners who have not yet paid their 2016 property taxes have less than two weeks left if they plan on getting by with no additional fees, interest or penalties tacked on their original bills.

January 31 is the deadline to pay property taxes. After that, the late payment fees, penalties and interest begin to add up quickly. Those who wait until after Feb. 1

will pay an additional seven percent in penalties and interest. Every month following that, the penalties and interest go up by two percent through June when the penalty fee remains at 15 percent.

Property owners who want to pay their taxes in person have until 5 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 31 to pay their taxes (without additional interest) at the Lynn County Appraisal District office, located at 1615 Main Street in Tahoka. If paid by mail, taxes must be postmarked by Jan. 31 to avoid penalties


There is an option for homeowners over age 65 or disabled, to pay their taxes in four installments instead of a one-time full payment. To make the installment payments, the homeowner must notify the Appraisal District before the end of January, by phone or in person, of their intent to pay their tax bill in this method. The first payment is due by the end of January, with the other three payments due in March, May and July. For more information, contact the Appraisal Office at 806-561-5477.

Three accidents reported, one due to rain

Three accidents were reported in the county during the past week, one of them apparently due to heavy rains on Sunday afternoon.

A 2015 Honda reportedly hydroplaned on the wet road on US 87 about 2-3 miles north of O'Donnell during the heavy rains at 3:30 Sunday afternoon, ending up in the ditch. The driver, Marcus Labron Hereford of Lubbock, was reportedly not injured, although his airbag deployed in the vehicle and had to be towed from the scene. Lynn

County Sheriff's Office said

they had several reports of vehicles sliding off US 87 during the rains, but most were able to get back onto the road without any damage to their vehicles.

On Friday, Jan. 13, two vehicles collided at the intersection of FM 1054 and US 380 at 3:30 p.m., but no other information was available as to the drivers or vehicles involved in the wreck. No injuries were reported, however.

Last Wednesday, Jan. 11, EMS was called to the scene of a one-vehicle rollover at County Road 18 and FM 1054, but no one was transported from the

scene. No information on the
 driver or vehicle was available.
 Doug Hlavaty reported a

window broken on one of his farm trucks – a 2002 Ford pickup – parked at a location near US 87 and CR 19 last Wednesday morning. Investigation continues in this case.

A homeowner at 1710 CR 14 reported someone trespassed on his property at 1 a.m. last Wednesday, stealing a kennel from his front porch. This investigation continues.



Filing period now open for May 6 elections

The filing period for city, school and hospital board elections in Lynn County opened this week, with Wednesday, Jan. 18 the official first day to file for a place on the ballot at the main offices of the respective entities. Filing will continue through Feb. 17, with elections to be held on May 6.

Lynn County Hospital District will have an election for two directors, both of whom will have three-year terms. City elections in Lynn County are for two-year terms, and school board trustees serve three-year terms

Wilson, Tahoka and O'Donnell ISD each have two trustee seats up for election.

City elections in the county include two council seats in O'Donnell, two council seats and a mayoral term in Tahoka, and three council seats in Wilson. No information was available from the City of New Home.





Rep. Dustin Burrows files House Bill 869 to authorize study of extending I-27 to Laredo

Texas State Representative Dustin R. Burrows (HD-83) filed House Bill 869 on Jan. 9, legislation directing the Texas Department of Transportation to conduct a feasibility study of extending Interstate Highway I-27 from Lubbock to Laredo.

"This bill would direct TX-DOT to examine a critically needed expansion of I-27, which currently ends in Lubbock. Given the economic and population growth West Texas has experienced during the last 20-years, the continuation of the interstate to Laredo would allow for further industry and business expansion along the route," said Burrows. "Presidentelect Trump has stated he will pursue substantial national infrastructure improvements and my bill positions West Texas to be ready with a solid plan for the I-27 expansion," Burrows added.

Michael Reeves, Executive

Director of the Ports to Plains Alliance, a group of over 275 communities and businesses who advocate for transportation infrastructure improvement, said "We wholeheartedly support Rep. Burrows' bill which will facilitate a critical next step in our efforts to extend Interstate 27. Texas does not have a major north-south Interstate west of I-35. An extended I-27 will boost economic growthand opportunity in West Texas, while serving as a much needed. alternative to the congested I-35 corridor."

Lubbock Mayor Dan Pope said "From an economic development perspective, the extension of I-27 would be a huge boost, not only to Lubbock's economy, but to virtually all of the communities along the interstate. A thorough TXDOT study would certainly prepare us for the next step in this process."


