

Muleshoe man gets 7-year sentence; local man asks to be arrested here

by JUANELL JONES A Muleshoe man was sentenced to seven years in TDCJ in court proceedings in the 106th District courtroom at the Lynn County Courthouse last Tuesday, a local man walked in to the Tahoka Police Dept. and asked to be arrested on Wednesday, and another Tahoka man was arrested this week on felony indictment charges for theft of a vehicle.

In District court, Ismael Ramirez Reyes, 41, faced charges on two counts, one for unlawful possession of a firearm by a felon, and one for evading arrest, from a case stemming from Dec. 10, 2015 here. He was assessed the prison sentence on the first charge of unlawful possession, with no fine or restitution, and the second charge was dismissed.

Grand Jury was also held in the 106th District courtroom last Tuesday, with Tahoka Police reporting one arrest this week of a Tahoka man indicted in felony charges of vehicle burglary. Nathan Lyn Applegate, 25, of Tahoka was arrested here Monday on a felony warrant for Grand Jury Indictment for Theft out of Lynn County, as well as a Grand Jury Indictment for Felony Theft of Property out of Lamb County. Police actually arrested Applegate in the course of another investigation, after a report of another

attempted vehicle theft at 1529 Ave. O, called in at 7:30 p.m. on Monday. The owner, Jay Forsythe, told police that he had received a call from a witness in the area stating someone was "messing with his vehicle" parked at his rent house. Police observed the dash to the vehicle was broken and wires hanging out of the steering column, and the owner reported that the witness identified the suspect as he walked from the vehicle to a location

on South 1st. According to the police report, Tahoka PD is also currently working with Lubbock PD as well on another vehicle theft case involving this same suspect.

A 35-year-old Tahoka man walked in to the Tahoka Police Chief's office last Wednesday morning at 11 a.m., and asked the Chief to arrest him for public intoxication. He stated that he had consumed "about 35 beers and that the last beer he had was just mo-

ments ago." He was placed under arrest for public intoxication "due to the fact that he was heavily intoxicated in a public place and in danger to himself or others," according to the report.

Three reports of theft of propane tanks in the Wilson community were called in to Sheriff's Officers on Sunday and Monday, Jan. 22-23. The first caller, just after noon on Sunday, reported that a partially full propane (See POLICE REPORT, page 3)

Did you know ... A most convenient commute

Imagine the convenience of a half-hour commute to and from work each day-even though your place of employment is nearly 400 miles away. It may not be such a far-fetched notion, if the folks at Hyperloop Technologies Inc. are right, says the Association of Mature American Citizens.

HTI will be testing its tube-based intercity transport system at a test track it is building near Las Vegas. The company is already working with government officials in Abu Dhabi and the Czech Republic with the goal of making its vision a reality.

According to the HTI Web site its Hyperloop transportation system uses a capsule that "hovers inside a tube with low air pressure, and like a jet plane at high altitude, experiences little air resistance. The remaining air in front of the capsule is moved to the back using a compressor, allowing for speeds up to 760 mph, with very low energy consumption."

ynn County Commissioners met Monday morning in regular session at the County Courthouse, hearing information from District Attorney Philip Mack Furlow, and the county extension agents, as well as taking action to authorize the issuance of Certificates of Obligation (COs) for funding the courthouse renovation project.

Vince Vialle, Specialized Public Finance, told commissioners that the county's credit rating was much higher than anticipated, resulting in the availability of better interest rates, which is good for the renovation project. It was anticipated that the county would need \$1,900,000 in COs, but Vialle said the county would only need \$1,750,000, and the best of three bids for the project came in at 2.78% interest. Commissioners unanimously authorized the issuance of \$1,750,000 in "Lynn County, Texas Certificates of Obligation, Series 2017."

The District Attorney addressed the court to update them with changes in his office, and invited county officials to come by or contact him

if needed. As the new DA, Furlow reported that his office is in transition but working hard to organize and has made some staff changes as well.

"We now have two full-time attorneys, instead of three, and a parttime person as well," Furlow said, telling commissioners about the new staff he had hired. He explained that his new investigator is a retired DPS officer that he anticipates will work well with other law enforcement agencies in the district. He also explained about computer upgrades in his office that will enable access to sharing files within the district.

In other business, Lynn County 4-H members Haley Kessler, Denton Moore and Bryson Stone attended the

meeting with county extension agents Wendy Scott and Wade Howard, presenting information about how they were involved in the 4-H program. Scott and Howard also addressed the court, presenting information about several extension programs offered in the county.

Commissioners approved a subdivision plat for Gaylon, and Vicki Zant in the New Home area, as presented. An interlocal agreement was approved between the county, SPAG and the cities of Tahoka, O'Donnell, New Home and Wilson to create a county-wide hazard mitigation plan. The FEMA-approved plan would make the county and its participants eligible to apply for FEMA Hazard Mitigation Assistance grants.

Commissioners approved a membership list of the Lynn County Historical Commission, to include Manuel Deleon, Harold Hohn, Clyde May, Dana McKay, April Moore, Wendell Morrow, James Sanders,

Walter Steen, Barbara White, Sandra Laws and Terri Aten.

An annual contract with the O'Donnell Volunteer Fire Dept., for \$2,500, was also approved.

Lynn County Sheriff Abraham Vega reported on the Sheriff's Office, noting that he had hired deputies to fill two positions, and reporting that the county has a new Animal Control Director. He presented information about providing new cell phones for his officers, which would present a cost-savings from the current reimbursement per person process as well as provide a security measure for business use only, and he explained ` about the need for a new phone system at the office as well.

Lynn County Judge Mike Braddock presided at the meeting that lasted just over two hours, with commissioners Matt Woodley, John Hawthorne, Don Blair and Larry Durham present, as well as other county officials and guests.


From Stetson Wilke, Wilson **HS student:**

"Showing hogs is a full time commitment. We start buying a hog for shows in October. We go to many sales looking for the "right" one. Picking out a hog is no easy task. You look for bone structure and knowing bloodline can help in choosing. Once we get the pig home that's when the real work starts. Things that have to be done daily are, feeding, checking pens and watering. Feeding a hog is a science that I m not sure anyone does perfectly. You have to look at your pig daily, see if he needs more fat, needs to be leaner, if he needs to «pop». Feeding is done twice a day. Pigs also need weekly baths, if not more often. Walking each pig for 30 to 45 minuets a day is best. As for the shows, its your job to teach the pigs to walk with their head up and stride through the ring. After we walk we check the pig over, making sure they are in optimal health. We do all of this day in and day out. If its 105 or 5 degrees outside, the pigs still need all this done. In freezing weather, the water lines can freeze. When that happens, that means you get





Three file for places in May 6 elections

Three candidates filed during the past week for places on city ballots in the May 6 elections. The filing period for city, school and hospital board elections in Lynn County opened on Jan. 18 and continues through Feb. 17.

As of early Tuesday afternoon this week, Tahoka Mayor John Baker filed for re-election, Johnny Rosas filed for the Tahoka City Council, and Pat Cates filed for re-election to the Wilson City Council.

Lynn County Hospital District will have an election for two directors, both of whom will have three-year terms. City elections in Lynn County are for two-year terms, and school board trustees serve three-year terms

Wilson, Tahoka and O'Donnell ISD each have two trustee seats up for election.

City elections in the county include two council seats in O'Donnell and New Home, two council seats and a mayoral term in Tahoka, and three council seats in Wilson.

City of O'Donnell: Two Council seats. Terms expiring: Jesse Perez, Ramiro Montez Jr.


