## Police officers threatened with knife, fist; three arrested on Grand Jury indictments

uring the past week, Tahoka Police were threatened with a knife, two men were sentenced to jail terms in district court proceedings here, and three were arrested on grand jury indictments.

A Tahoka man was arrested about 2 p.m. Tuesday after he pulled a knife on a Taboka Police officer and attempted to hit another officer as he was evading arrest. Dustin Lane Burleson, 39, of Tahoka was charged with felony aggravated assault to a public servant, and felony assault to a public servant, evading arrest, and resisting arrest, as well as charges of criminal trespass and two counts of assault.

Earlier that morning, police had given Burleson a trespass warning to stay away from a residence in the 1200 block of N. 6th Street. Burleson reportedly returned to that residence about 2 p.m. the same day and allegedly assaulted a 30-year-old female and a 34-year-old male.

According to the police report, Burleson resisted arrest and further evaded from officers on the scene by fleeing on foot. At one point he pulled a knife and pointed it towards one officer during the pursuit. He was caught within a couple of blocks after a short foot pursuit in the 1100 block of North 7th Street, and reportedly attempted to hit another officer with his fist as he was taken into custody.

In 106th District Court proceedings last Tuesday, March 7, two men

Lizeth Castillo of Pampa was the driver of a 2012 blue Ford Explorer that she says was forced into a ditch by the 18-wheeler. No injuries were reported, but the Explorer had to be towed from the scene.

Last Tuesday morning, Linda Dworaczyk reported theft of her grandson's bicycle and a folding ladder from the backyard of her residence in Wilson.

A man was arrested at 3:25 a.m. Saturday, March 11, during a domestic disturbance at a rural residence, charged with assault causing bodily injury to a family member.

Illegal dumping was reported last Friday evening, with someone dump-

ing shingles on a county road. The shingles were dumped about a quarter mile north of County Road 1 on County Road M, in the New Home area.

Tahoka police arrested a 20-yearold Tahoka male on charges of possession of marijuana last Wednesday about 9:30 p.m. after stopping a vehicle in the city. He was also issued two citations, one for expired registration, and one for expired inspection.

The Sheriff's Office has received of several calls during the past week from citizens reporting phone scams. Several older residents in the county reported they had received phone calls from unknown persons saying that a family member, usually a grandchild, was in trouble and needed money, with the caller wanting them to send money. Sheriff's officials remind citizens to never verify or give out personal information to unknown callers, especially regarding financial matters. Lynn County Jail held 46 inmates during the past week, including 25 for Ector County and 21' for Lynn, with local charges including the three grand jury indictments, four for possession of marijuana, one for possession of drug paraphernalia, two for assault causing bodily injury, and one for hindering apprehension/prosecution.

# A.C.T. Board offers matching funds for exterior building improvements

ommercial business owners in Tahoka who are considering making improvements to the exteriors of their office buildings have a new opportunity in 2017. The A.C.T. Board (Advancing the Community of Tahoka) is offering a new Facade Improvement Program designed to encourage small, privately-owned commercial (not home-based) businesses to reinvest in the community by making exterior improvements and appearance enhancements to their commercial buildings, which would further beautify and maintain the city.

"It is the A.C.T. Board's position that attractive building facades support and encourage local businesses by having significant effect on the overall desirability and marketability of the surrounding area. Beautification efforts attract customers/visitors and demonstrate the economic vitality of the community," says Julia Allen, President of the A.C.T. Board.

Tahoka city officials agree with the concept. In a recent meeting, the Tahoka City Council approved \$22,500 in A.C.T. funds for the business façade program for 2017. The program matches funds for improvements made by business owners to

the outside of their commercial office buildings, up to a predetermined amount, if they meet certain criteria. The program is also available for improvements already made, if they were made in the past 12 months.

The A.C.T. Board program may reimburse up to \$7,500, or 50%, whichever is less, toward the cost of building façade improvements to eligible and approved businesses. Requests will be approved on a case-by-case basis. No more than 25% of the total cost of improvements eligible for reimbursement may be for the exterior painting of a commercial building, or for graf-

Businesses must be privatelyowned, and the owner must use private, non-City funds for their part of the improvement project, as well as meet other criteria for the program. Applications for funding must be submitted to the A.C.T. Board at Tahoka

Eligible improvements are limited to the exterior commercial building façade, including:

• Exterior treatment systems (painting, murals, siding, stucco or simulated stucco, and brick/stone work)

· Structural improvements to the building façade, masonry, or tile cleaning/repair

- · Restoration of details in historical buildings · Removal of elements that cover
- architecturally significant areas
- · Repair or replacement of exterior doors, windows and trim work (in public view) which are necessary for aesthetic purposes
- · Exterior lighting, shutters, gutters and awnings
  - New construction

## County Commissioners approve new storage building; new posting site designated during courthouse renovation

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session at 9 a.m. Monday, March 13 in the basement courtroom of the County Courthouse, approving the purchase of a metal building for storage behind the county jail at a minimum cost of \$5,900 plus \$650 for wiring. Construction work on the building is expected to begin soon.

Because all offices in the county courthouse will temporarily relocate during the upcoming courthouse

renovation project, the official county posting site for sales, probates and notices was designated as 1627 Ave. K (formerly the Huffaker-Green/James Craig office building), where several of the county offices will be leasing space. This location was also designated as the place to hold sales of property and tax sales.

Commissioners Court will be held at another location, at 1524 Harper Street (formerly the Jimmy Wright building) during the renovation project. It is anticipated that all county offices will be relocating by the end of March, with construction on the renovation project expected to begin in mid-April.

Commissioners approved a preliminary plat for Ranchland Estates, a subdivision that would be located one mile south of New Home at FM 1730 and CR 10; and approved the purchase of a new copier for the District Clerk's

Office with a three-year lease at \$152

Lynn County Sheriff Abraham Vega presented a report on his department; and monthly bills were ap-





#### Texas Tips...

Cook efficiently Texans can help reduce energy consumption, and keep the air clean, while cooking in the kitchen. Something as simple as matching the pot and pan size to the stove's burner size saves energy. For example: a 6-inch pot on an 8-inch burner wastes over 40 percent of the burner's heat. Using the rightsized pot on the right-sized stove burner can save about \$36 each year for an electric range, or \$18 per year for a gas range. For best efficiency, keep burners clean and well maintained on gas ranges. If you are getting a blue flame, the gas is burning properly. A yellow flame may mean you need to clean your burner or call an expert for a

### Ranchers: Know how to assist firefighters in event of wildfires

The recent events that occurred in the Texas Panhandle were eye opening. For farmers and ranchers who make their living on the land, a wildfire can be devastating. In the event of a fire on your property, these three tips can be of aid to you and your property.

1) Offer knowledge of your area to fire crews. Your knowledge of access roads, location of structures, location of water sources, fence lines and geography of the land can prove helpful to fire crews who may not be familiar with the area.

2) Communicate with fire operations. Ask questions, offer assistance, e permission. Chances are if a rire is on your ranch, fire crews will need to be in contact with you. Be patient and understand that there are many moving parts to a fire operation. Sometimes decisions require communication between several stakeholders and may take longer than you are accustomed to.

3) Don't panic or jump to conclusions. Firefighters and ranchers in Texas have the same goals when a wildfire occurs to protect lives, property and livelihoods. Grazing areas and stored hay can be a costly loss for ranchers. By offering your knowledge and communicating with fire operations, fire crews can run an operation effectively and efficiently while protecting what is important to you.

#### Talk about a 'quick trip'

The first supersonic commercial jet, the Concorde, made its inaugural flight 40 years ago and was taken out of service 13 years ago because, although it traveled at twice the speed of sound, it was too slow to be profitable, according to the Association of Mature American Citizens.

Now, says AMAC, there's talk from credible sources at NASA and the U.S. House Committee on Science, Space, and Technology of a hypersonic rocket plane that might reach speeds up to seven and half times the speed of sound.

"That kind of speed would surely make hypersonic travel a profitable business," notes one observer.

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## Council approves ACT fund expenditures

Tahoka City Council met in regular session Monday night, considering several business items including a request from the A.C.T. Board (Advancing the Community of Tahoka) for expending funds on three projects. Council members approved requests for (1) \$1000 for computer, printer and office supplies for the A.C.T. office at city hall, (2) \$2,137 for metal roof materials for repairing the swimming pool concession stand roof, and (3) \$10,000 to assist the city with the purchase of a new town crier.

The current town crier, located in front of the former city hall building on Lockwood, is no longer functioning, and city

officials say that the parts for repairing the outdated electronic sign are not available. City officials asked the A.C.T. Board to consider sharing the cost of purchasing a new electronic town crier sign, which may be posted in a new location. The A.C.T. Board voted to contribute \$10,000 from the half-cent sales tax funds collected within the city, to go towards the purchase of the new sign. Total cost of the new sign is \$21,974, with the remaining funds coming from the City of Tahoka.

In other business, the council discussed updating the tornado alarm siren system in the city, by adding two more sirens (currently there are five throughout the city), and repair-

ing or replacing the outdated sirens and replacing older poles with taller/newer poles for some of the sirens.

The council approved an ordinance canceling the May 6 election for the city, since all candidates are unopposed, including John Baker for Mayor, Johnny Rosas for the Dist. 1 council seat, and Tyler Hawthorne for the Dist. 3 council seat.

The city's annual financial audit was approved as presented. The council approved payment of monthly bills, and approved a change to the A.C.T. Board's Business Façade Program (see story elsewhere in this issue) that would allow for businesses that had already completed improvements within the past 12 months

to be eligible to apply for refunds through the program.

Mayor John Baker led the meeting, with all council members present including Amy Preston, Rudy Fuentes, Ronny Jolly, Jeff Martin, and Ray Box, as well as City Administrator Jerry Webster and others.

#### Texas Game Warden Cadet class applications now being accepted


AUSTIN — The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) is building its next generation of elite state law enforcement officers with the 62nd Texas Game Warden Cadet class. Applications are being accepted now through March 31.

"We are beginning the process of hiring and training the next generation of conservation law enforcement professionals. We encourage anyone interested in becoming a Texas Game Warden to apply," said Col. Craig Hunter, TPWD Law Enforcement Director. "Since 1895, Texas game wardens have protected the people of Texas through professional law enforcement services that include land, water and air patrols; search and rescue; and tactical operations, all while working to conserve and protect the natural resources of our state."

Applicants must be 21 years of age before the projected graduation date of Aug. 2018, and have a bachelor's degree from an accredited college or university prior to Sept. 1, 2017. Applicants must also undergo a preliminary interview, background investigation and physical skills tests focusing on agility and swimming. Persons interested instrengthening their swimming skills should contact the American Red Cross to take a swimming course.

All cadets are required to live at the Game Warden Training Center near Hamilton, Texas, for the duration of the 30-week training period.

Candidates can apply online. Application deadline for the 62nd Texas Game Warden Cadet class is March 31, 2017. 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


## Inspector General warns public about calls from OIG "Imposters"


The Acting Inspector General of Social Security, Gale Stallworth Stone, is warning citizens about a nationwide telephone "imposter phishing" scheme. The Social Security Administration (SSA) and its Office of the Inspector General (OIG) have received several reports from citizens across the country about persons receiving phone calls from individuals posing as OIG investigators. The caller indicates an issue exists pertaining to the person's Social Security account or Social Security number (SSN) and directs the person call a non-SSA telephone number to address the issue.

The reports indicate the calls include a recording from a caller stating she is "Nancy Jones," an "officer with the Inspector General of Social Security." The recording goes on to say the person's Social Security account, SSN, and/or benefits are suspended, and that he or she should call 806-680-2373 to resolve the issue. Citizens should be aware that the scheme's details may vary; however, citizens should avoid calling the number provided, as the unknown caller might attempt to acquire personal information.

OIG investigators occasionally contact citizens by telephone for investigative purposes, but they will not request sensitive personal information from a citizen over the phone. If a person receives a similar suspicious call from someone alleging to be from the OIG, citizens may report that information to the OIG at 1-800-269-0271 or online via https://oig.ssa.gov/report.
