

TISD Board names Alan Umholz as lone finalist for superintendent

At a called meeting last Thursday, June 29, the Board of Trustees of the Tahoka Independent School District named Alan Umholz as the lone finalist for the TISD Superintendent's position. Mr. Umholtz has been employed as the Superintendent at Henrietta Midway ISD, a 1-A district southeast of Wichita Falls, since 2015. Prior to his tenure at Midway ISD, he was the superintendent at Yorktown ISD for two years, and superintendent at Overton ISD for five years. He was also

curriculum director at Whitney ISD for four years, campus administrator at Crowley ISD for ten years, teacher/ coach at All Saints Episcopal School in Fort Worth for 15 years, and teacher/coach at Rosemont Middle School in Fort Worth for one year.

Mr. Umholtz graduated from Brewer High School, Fort Worth, in 1978 and Texas Christian University in 1985, where he received his Bachelor of Science Degree. He received his Masters of Education degree from

Texas Woman's University in 1998 and his Superintendent Certification from TWU in 2000.

Umholtz and his wife, Beth, have

two children, Hillary, 24, and Blair, 21. Government Code 552.125 requires that the Tahoka ISD Board of Trustees wait 21 days before taking final action to employ Mr. Umholtz as Superintendent. The date of official action on the employment of Mr. Umholtz is tentatively scheduled for Thursday, July 20, 2017.

Mayor administers USAF promotion of his son to Lieutenant Colonel

As mayor of Tahoka, John Baker performs many civic duties, but this week the Mayor had a highly unusual opportunity to perform a special duty, one that he was honored to bestow. As an elected official, Baker was allowed to perform a ceremony that administered the promotion his son, Major Jacoby Louis Baker, to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in the United States Air Force.

In ceremonies conducted on Monday, July 3, 2017 at First Baptist Church of Tahoka, Mayor Baker had the honor of presenting Special Order Number 845 that read: The President of the United States, acting upon the recommendation of the Secretary of the Air Force, has placed special trust and confidence in the patriotism, integrity, and abilities of Major Jacoby Louis Baker. In view of these special qualities, and his demonstrated potential to serve in the next higher grade, Major Baker is promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, United States Air Force, effective the third day of July, Two Thousand and Seventeen, by Order of the Secretary of the Air Force.

Lt. Col. Baker is in his 18th year of service to his country in the U.S. Air ' Force. He flies an AC130j gunship, and is stationed in Hurlbert, Florida.





Dog owners reminded of leash laws in town

Citizens who own dogs in Tahoka are reminded that all dogs must be kept in a fenced yard or some other type of enclosure, or must be on leashes if outside the enclosure. Tahoka also enforces a no-tether law, which means dogs may not be chained or tied to a fixed object as a means of keeping them on your property.

One citizen reported to Animal Control authorities last week that her neighbor's dogs were loose and attempted to attack her on her own property, and she was concerned that any pedestrians or children in the area would be vulnerable to an attack as well.

Take control of your debt

Make changes like packing your lunch instead of eating out, skipping the fancy coffee and keeping your car for a few years once it's paid off. Your commitment to sticking with your budget and living within or below your means is critical to getting out of debt. Plus, it will help install good financial habits for the future.

Ask Creditors for Lower Interest

Ask your credit card issuers to lower your interest rate. They'll often negotiate the rate for customers with a good payment history. The saved interest can make a real impact over time **Boost Your Income** Try to boost your income how-

ever you can. This may mean tem-

porarily taking a part-time job or: selling things you no longer use. If: you receive a tax refund, bonus or other unexpected money, immediately put that toward paying offdebt

Be realistic and understand that you can't erase years of debt overnight. Acknowledge that setbacks will come up but don't get discouraged and give up. 





Wind, rain, hail cause havoc on area crops

The cotton crops in Lynn County have taken a beating during the past three or four weeks, as weekend thunderstorms have caused havoc on the young plants. Farm Service Agency officials in Tahoka estimate roughly 80,000 acres have been either destroyed or severely damaged due to drought that precluded the thunderstorms, and then by hail, high winds or heavy rains.

The O'Donnell area was the first to be hit a couple of weeks ago, then the New Home area, and last weekend the Wilson area was hit hard with heavy rains and wind, with the weather

causing varying degrees of damage throughout the entire county.

Rodney Schoppa at FSA said they are busy certifying crops that have been planted in Lynn County.

"Normally we have from 300,000 to 310,000 acres planted each year, in both dryland and irrigated acreage," he told *The News*. "But the crop failures and damages are occurring on almost a daily basis during this time of year, so we won't have any good numbers about cotton acreage until August or September," he explained.

Social Security Matters

Ask Rusty - Working & Social Security

Dear Rusty: I recently turned 62, and have not yet filed for Social Security benefits. At this point my benefit based on my own record would be about \$1,000 per month, but since I still work I know I would lose some of what I earn over the \$15,000 limit. I read that if you lose some of your benefit because of working you will get it back later. Is this true? If so, how would I get it back? Signed: Working Girl

Dear Working: Yours is becoming a much more common question as more and more people are choosing to work even after they are entitled to receive Social Security benefits. Social Security's rules say that if you work and are receiving benefits but have not yet reached your full retirement age (which for you is 66) and you earn more than their annual earnings limit, they will "take back" half of everything you earn over the earnings limit (which for 2017 is \$16,920). The way they do this is by withholding what you owe from future benefit payments, which could cause you to not receive benefits for a number of months until they recover what you owe. This would happen every year up to the year you turn 66, which would mean that during that working timeframe you would have gone some number of months without receiving Social Security. In the year you turn 66, the amount you can earn is much more generous and the amount they withhold is much less. After you turn age 66 you can earn as much as you like without penalty.

The way you "get back" what they withheld is this: When you reach your full retirement age, Social Security will recalculate your benefit amount taking into account the number of months you did not receive benefits in those working years between age 62 and 66. They will then advance your original start-of-benefits date by the number of months you didn't receive benefits, effectively moving your start date forward and increasing your benefit amount accordingly. If, for example, you originally applied at age 62 and continued to work and, over the course of those years between age 62 and 66, you did not receive benefits for a total of 12 months, when you reached age 66 your benefit start date would be moved to age 63 and instead of receiving the \$1,000 per month for the rest of your life, you would get about \$1,070. So while they do take away some benefits while you are working, the increase you receive at your full retirement age will last for the rest of your life.




3D Doodler Classes




