The City/County Library staff and those who participated in the Solar Eclipse Viewing at the library in Tahoka were amazed by the spectacular view in the sky on Monday. Dr. Ray, OD of Foresight Eye Care in Lubbock provided special Solar Eclipse glasses for the event. On Monday, August 21, 2017, the Earth crossed the shadow of the moon, creating a total solar eclipse. This eclipse was special, frequently referred to as the "Great American Eclipse", because for the first time in almost 40 years, the path of the moon's shadow passed through the continental United States and was visible within a band across the entire contiguous United States passing from the Pacific to the Atlantic coasts. The total eclipse could only be viewed from American soil. Texas was further south than the central US area that could best view the total eclipse, so Tahoka area residents could see only a partial eclipse.

themselves at a home they had just broken into. The snapchat video was used by Lynn County Sheriff's Office deputies in an investigation of a home burglary in Wilson last Tuesday night. According to the SO call sheet, several teens broke into a home at 1409 Lumsden

Ave. in Wilson while the owner was

gone, reportedly taking several items from the home and then posting a video of themselves as they harassed the homeowner's puppy that was inside the home. Officers are questioning the teens as they investigate the incident and work to recover items taken from

the home, including a 15-foot chain, several cell phones, Beats headphones, and a metric wrench set.

25 years and counting ... Dr. Donald Freitag to celebrate 25th year here with Open House

by JUANELL JONES onald Freitag, M.D., or "Doc" as he is most commonly called, is celebrating a milestone next week. He invites area citizens to help him observe "Cheers to 25 years!" at an Open House from 2:00-4:00 p.m. next Wednesday, Aug. 30 at his clinic,

At 25 years, Doc Freitag has served for the longest time period in Lynn County Hospital's history. The Lynn County Hospital District was approved by voters in 1967, after which the hospital and clinic were built, opening in January of 1971. Dr. Richard Wright was a longtime physician at LCHD, for 21 years, but Dr. Freitag has surpassed that already. Doc opened his practice here in July of 1992, and in fact prior to that, had served in the hospital's ER for two

located at 2600 Lockwood Suite A at Lynn County Hospital in Tahoka.

Next week's Open House is a celebration of his 25th year at the LCHD clinic here, but don't assume that this is the end of Doc's story. He says he will continue to serve the citizens of Lynn County and other areas at his clinic here,

hopefully for many years to come. It hardly seems that 25 years has passed since he opened his practice here in 1992, but he does say that some things have changed over the past quarter of a century.


"I've looked over some of the things that

have happened here at LCHD over the past 25

years. There have been a lot of upgrades and improvements over the years," said Dr. Freitag. "We have state of the art radiology equipment. We have an expanding laboratory. And the nurse's station is currently getting a makeover. That is one part of the hospital that has changed. There were windows surrounding the nurse's station at one point. I remember bumping my head into the glass a few times by accident. I'm glad that the glass never broke!" he added with a smile.

"I looked at an article in The News from 1992 when I started here. I mentioned not having state of the art equipment. Now that we have up to date equipment, we are better able to care for patients here than ever before," he said. "We have been able to care for patients here more often than in the past. Our Swing Bed program has been a blessing for the hospital also as well as for local patients and their families. The convenience and excellent care are a great combination for those needing rehab services."



enjoy working in the emergency

"I realize that that is the place where I am challenged the most, see a wide variety of people, and can see any type of medical problem," he stated. "I am grateful that I can help the patients there as I have learned that the emergency room is often where people are the most scared about their health or the health of a loved one. That is when we do our best to show compassion for our patients.

"I look back at the different things we have treated in our ER and I am glad for the training I have had and ongoing learning that keeps me up to date on treatments. Someone recently asked me what I would do if I could not work in this ER for whatever reason. I would have to say I would continue in the office and do moonlighting in another ER. I feel that need and call to help and be there for patient's in those acute emergency settings," he explained.

The doctor also expressed an appreciation for the LCHD nursing staff that he has worked with over the past 25 years.

"Our nursing staff has been amazing. We have had many nurses come and go over the years. I learned early in medical school to listen to the nurses, as they will keep the doctors out of trouble. I have done my best to follow that advice and our awesome nurses have not let me down. I can tell just listening to them on the telephone as they inform me of a patient to be seen just how urgent the patient's situation happens to be. I still will run in the halls if needed (I know, teachers tell us not to run in the halls!). I appreciate all of the staff that I work with. They do an excellent job!!" he stated.

He says that seeing such a wide variety of illnesses and medical problems keeps him from becoming bored with his job and forces him to learn and

"Doctors are required to have continuing education. I will often pick the topics to learn based upon the patients I have been seeing. It is always interesting to me how medical problems tend to occur in groups. Sometimes this makes sense, like for influenza or Strep throat, but sometimes it doesn't, like chest pain or kidney stones. So I will use this to learn and grow myself. "I enjoy this job, but this is

more than a job. I have become closely attached to the people in this and the surrounding communities. I will cheer along with them and grieve with them also. It has been great to see people grow, mature, and see their lives unfold before our eyes," he says.

As he looks back on his time here, Dr. Freitag says he realizes he is right where he wants to be.

"I love being in a family practice that allows me to share in the joys and lives of the families. I get the chance to sit and talk with some patients for a brief time in my office, which makes for a unique and wonderful connection," he said.

It's wonderful for the citizens of Lynn County, too, to have a family physician who has been here for them for so long, even from one generation to the next. There is something to be said for continuity, for a history that needs not be explained every time a patient visits with their medical practitioners. And it works both ways, too, Doc no-

"Some people have noticed that I have lost weight recently. I tell them that I finally took my own advice and started eating better and exercising more," he says, smiling. "I hope that my example will help my patients to want to get healthier also.

"I am glad I have had such a long time here to serve the Lynn County people as well as those of the surrounding communities, and am looking forward to many more years of service to come!" he added.

The citizens of Tahoka, and Lynn County and surrounding areas, are fortunate that Doc has served here for so long, and The News joins in wishing Dr. Freitag a happy 25th anniversary!

Citizen worried about health concerns with smart meters

A Tahoka citizen addressed the Tahoka City Council and other city leaders at the city council meeting held last Monday, presenting her concerns with the new smart meters the city has installed for water meters. Connie Pirtle spoke to the council for about 10 minutes, providing information she believed showed potential health risks from smart meter EMF radiation. Mayor John Baker thanked her for the information and for addressing the council with her concerns.

In other business, the council approved an A.C.T. Board expenditure of \$2,128 for electrical work at the city pool, and appointed Jay Dee House for another two-year term as the city's representative on the Board of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority (CRMWA), where the city gets its water supply. The council also approved a CRMWA request to refund the 2009 bonds, in order to save interest on the bond note.

The council went into closed session for about 25 minutes to consult with an attorney, but took no action upon returning to open session. Monthly bills were approved and the meeting adjourned.

All council members were present at the meeting, including Ronny Jolly, Johnny Rosas, Tyler Hawthorne, Jeff Martin, and Ray Box, as well as City Administrator Jerry Webster

Main Street gets new paving ... Main Street, from the courthouse to the northern edge of Tahoka, was getting new pavement last week, as part of TxDOT's agreement with Lynn County and the City of Tahoka. This is the route for Loop 472 in Tahoka, that comes from the US 87 exit through Tahoka and curves past the courthouse to go on to access US 87 on the south edge of town. Loop 472 will not exist much longer, however, as a portion of the street that curves through courthouse grounds will be removed as part of the Lynn County Courthouse renovation project. The square will be restored to include the memorial triangle, and traffic will be routed around the courthouse when complete. This week, TxDOT had moved on to repave the rest of Main Street.

hand reported that a window hád been broken on a tractor owned by Math Bartley, at a rural location in the county.

Two reports of two different phone scams came in last week. On Thursday afternoon, an attorney called the Lynn County SO to follow up on a client, a Killeen woman, who said she had received a phone call telling her to pay by phone with a credit card in order not to be arrested on a warrant out of Lynn County. Lynn County SO assured the attorney that no such warrant existed, and that the call was a scam. A Lynn County woman reported another phone scam on Friday, telling officers she had received a phone call from someone claiming to be with the IRS to pay money or she would be arrested. She realized the call was a scam and reported it.

Two reports of illegal dumping on county roads came in last week. A large amount of trash was dumped at County Road 10 and CR HH and discovered last Monday morning about 9 a.m. And last Saturday on County Road 1 and CR M, more ille-

gal dumping caused the road to be blocked, after an old motor home was found laying on its side in the road, with trash and other debris, including old furniture, laying in the road.

County Commissioner Larry Durham told The News that he had picked up more than three large trailer loads of debris from illegal dumping on County Road 1 alone, and he urges Lynn County residents to be mindful of vehicles carrying loads of junk, debris or tree

"I would ask that if anyone sees someone driving on a county road with a load of trash or tree limbs, and especially if you see someone dumping these items, please take note of the type of vehicle, and if possible get the license plate number. If you see someone dumping items on county roads, please call the Sheriff's Office immediately," Durham urged. Citizens can be fined for illegal dumping on county roads, he added.



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New driver course to combat distracted driving required for drivers 18 and older starting Sept. 1

The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) announced a new one-hour driving course to educate drivers on the dangers of distracted driving. The Impact Texas Young Drivers(ITYD) course will be required for certain drivers beginning Sept. 1,

2017. "Driving is one of the most dangerous things we do on a daily basis, and it should command our undivided attention," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "This new component of the department's distracted driving initiative uses research and compelling true stories to highlight the many risks facing drivers. This important program is designed to provide Texas drivers with critical information to help keep their focus on driving - and to ultimately save lives on Texas roadways."

Starting Sept. 1, all skills examination applicants 18 and older must complete the free ITYD course, and obtain proof of course completion prior to taking the driving skills examination. In addition, drivers 18 to 24 must complete the 6-hour adult driver education course prior to the skills examination.

ITYD is the second course* offered through the Impact Texas Driver (ITD) program, which was developed by DPS in 2015 to help save lives through awareness and education related to distracted driving. The first course launched under the ITD program was Impact Texas Teen Drivers, which drivers ages 16 and 17 are required to complete.
