LET THE FUN BEGIN - 2017 FESTIVAL IS AT THE MINI-PARK!

Fun, food, prizes offered at Harvest Festival Saturday

ots of activities will be offered at the 42nd annual Lynn County Harvest Festival in Tahoka this Saturday, Sept. 16, following Friday's Tahoka Hometoming festivities – but take note that this year's festival is in a different location, at the Tahoka Mini-Park at N. 1st and Ave. J (due to courthouse grounds under renovation).

A portion of Ave. J will be closed to traffic (from the museum to the Methodist Church), and a portion of N. 1st will be closed to traffic, between Ave. J and Ave. K. Handicap parking will be marked on Lockwood south of the

former City Hall building, as well as on the west side of the park. Attendees are asked to please not block residential driveways when parking in streets, and note that the parking lot for the Tahoka Police Dept. (across from the Methodist

church) will not be available as it is for police department use only.

The festival features live entertainment, food and craft booths, games, and cásh prizes from audience participation, and a Street Dance will follow that night, sponsored by Lynn County Hospital District.

Admission to the Harvest Festival is free. Bring lawn chairs for seating. Portable restroom facilities will be onsite during the festival.

In conjunction with the event,

Tahoka Elementary PTO is sponsoring a Fun Run and Walk event that morning, with a one-mile route that begins at 8 a.m. from the park. Call Shea at 806-759-0225 to register.

The Harvest Festival fun starts at 10 a.m. with turtle races for the children (kids must bring their own turtles, decorated, for the races). Turtle races, sponsored by Lynn County 4-H, will be held in the street next to the minipark. Food and game booths also open at 10 a.m. See the full page ad inside this edition for a complete list of booths and the Harvest Festival schedule.

New to this year's festival is The Wall (as seen on TV), which features a fun opportunity for youth to win cash prizes throughout the day. Tickets for school-age youth to participate will be handed out all day. This event will be held on the stage.

The Harvest Festival Princess and Queen will be crowned during the afternoon. This year's raffle tickets sold by princess and queen contestants features 16 chances to win \$4000 in prizes. Two \$1,000 grand prizes will be given away this year, one from the Queen ticket raffle, and one from the Princess ticket raffle. In addition, there will be four drawings for \$250 prepaid Visa cards (from the Queen tickets), and 10 drawings for \$100 cash (from the Princess tickets). The drawings will be at the end of the Harvest Festival. Winners will be announced as they are drawn, as well as reported in the following week's issue of The Lynn

Cadillac Jack's band will return to the festival this year, playing popular tunes throughout the day.

There will be a Silent Fundraiser booth again this year, but instead of the proceeds going as usual to the City/County Library, the Library has graciously given this project over for this year to the Lynn County Senior Citizens Center, with all proceeds to go into the Building Fund for the Senior Citizen Center. Bidding will close around 3:30 p.m. (or as announced from the stage). The popular booth features a variety of items on which to bid, with all proceeds helping to renovate the former Tahoka City Hall into the new Senior Citizens Center.

The Princess contest starts at 1:30 p.m. on stage, with 16 young ladies vying for the title of Princess, which is determined by the highest ticket sales. The Princess and runners-up will win cash awards.

There are six Harvest Festival Queen scholarship candidates, with that contest starting at 3 p.m. Three judges will rank the queen candidates based on several criteria, to determine the winner. The Queen and runners-up will win scholarships from the Harvest Festival for their college careers. Three judges will determine the points scored by each candidate. These judges include Bobby Jo Compton, Samantha Rodriguez, and Jerquaan Lightbourne.

Bobby Jo Compton was born and raised in Hereford. She is married to a high school football coach and has two children; a daughter who is at Oklahoma State University and a son who is a senior at Coronado High School. Both Bobby Jo and her husband work at Coronado High School, where she is a librarian.

Samantha Rodriguez was born and raised in Lubbock. She graduated from Lubbock High in 2009, and holds an Associates of Arts in General Studies from South Plains College and a Bachelors of Arts In Social Work from Texas Tech University. Currently she is working on obtaining her Master's degree in Social Work



Post hands Bulldogs first loss

The Tahoka Bulldogs suffered their first loss of the season at the hands of the Post Antelopes 44-0 last Friday night here at Kelly Field. The Dogs (1-1) will host Springlake-Earth here this Friday, in front of a Homecoming crowd.

"I felt like we played a really solid first half against Post, especially on the defensive side of the ball. Offensively we struggled getting snaps and that kind of put us in a hole we couldn't get out of," said Coach Stephen Overstreet.

"Post is a very physical football team and a team that I'm glad we had on the schedule. Playing teams that are good and that test you early gives you an idea of what needs to be worked on, but better yet gives you a glimpse as to what the post season will look like. I have said it many times, we are playing for those five games starting in October and I felt like our kids proved to me that they will be ready when that time arrives.

"I never felt like at any point in the game the kids gave up. We didn't have the best week of practice, but again that is something we can use as a teaching tool. I tell them all the time the work you do Monday-Thursday will determine what kind of outcome you get on Fridays. There is no magic fairy dust they sprinkle over you on Fridays that makes you play well. I believe this group saw that and did see a change in how we approached this Monday's practice,"

"This week holds another tough challenge, both on and off the field. Springlake is coming to town with a team that is pretty solid on both sides of the ball. We will see another good defense, and an offense that likes to hang their hat on running the football.

Commissioners approve 85-cent county tax rate

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session at 9 a.m. Monday, unanimously moving to adopt an 85-cent tax rate and approving the 2017-18 budget in two separate motions. The tax rate is 4-cents lower than the current tax rate of 89-cents per \$100 of property value.

Another motion was approved to set salaries, expenses and other allowances of all elected county and precinct officers, at the rates published in a notice of proposed salaries printed in the Aug. 31 edition of The Lynn County News.

In other business, monthly bills were approved, and commissioners approved an order setting compensation for the County Auditor at a salary of \$19,683. Sheriff Abraham Vega presented a report, noting that the county jail currently held 43 inmates, including 21 for Ector County, 11 for Dawson, and 11 for Lynn County.

County Judge Mike Braddock led the meeting, with all four commissioners present including Larry Durham, Don Blair, John Hawthorne and Matt Woodley, as well as other county officials.

LCHD sends ambulance, two EMTs to assist with Hurricane Harvey relief

Two Tahoka citizens got an upclose look at the scene left behind by Hurricane Harvey, as they were a part of the relief team sent from this region to assist in the effort. Lynn County Hospital District EMTs John Baker and Johnna Alvarado spent nine days helping victims in the aftermath of the storm.

Baker is an EMT-P (Paramedic), and EMS Director of Support Services for LCHD, and Alvarado is an EMT-B (Basic). The two took an LCHD ambulance and headed out on the second strike team from Region 1 to help with Hurricane Harvey relief, and were part of a team of eight ambulances and two command trucks.

The strike team was originally supposed to have been on a five-day deployment, but they ended up serving nine days when they were asked to stay longer. They spent the first three days stationed in San Antonio, helping to ferry hospital patients who had been temporarily relocated during the storm to return back to their original hospitals. The next six days, Baker and Alvarado were stationed at the NRG Astrodome in Houston, serving in the ER center there, where thousands of evacuees were sheltered. They treated, and transported, hundreds of people during their time there, working long hours to serve those affected by the storm.

"Our team was commended by the regional command center stationed at the NRG Astrodome in Houston," said Kathy Grant, Public Relations Officer at LCHD.

Baker said they stayed in

tent cities set up for relief workers, and were treated very well while they were there.

"They had these huge, massive tents that were filled wall to wall with cots, and that's where we stayed. But we were treated very well, and the food was awesome, from food trucks that were serving the workers," said

"We feel very fortunate, and blessed, to have been able to serve in this relief effort," he added. "I would go back in a heartbeat to do it again."

The Great Divide Isaiah 55:8-9

When we picture Jesus as our bridge to God, it is natural to think about the things that separate us from the Father. Therefore, let's examine three metaphors that describe the barriers between us and almighty God.

First, we are separated by height. Scripture calls God the "Most High" and describes Him as "high and lifted up" (Psalm 9:2; Isa. 6:1 ESV). He is above creation and unconstrained by gravity, time, or space. Furthermore, He declares, "For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways" (Isa. 55:9). Without question, God is above man

Next, we are separated by distance. Moses experienced God through the burning bush, but even in that holy moment, the Lord warned him not to come too close (Ex. 3:5). Later, when the people of Israel built the temple and tabernacle, God warned them not to enter the Holy of Holies except for a single specific time each year, and then only one person was allowed to enter under strict conditions (Heb. 9:7). There is a distance between man and God that cannot be breached.

Third, we are separated by light and fire (1 John 1:5; Deut. 4:24). We know that staring into a giant spotlight can cause blindness, and standing near a flame can burn our skin. In a similar way, if we were to stand in the presence of holy God, we would be consumed.

Why did Jesus come to us? The reason is that only the perfect, sinless Son of God could reach the Father, come close to Him, and stand in His presence. And, in Christ, we can share in that intimacy.

Three sentenced to probation in 106th District Court cases

Three men were sentenced to probation in cases presented before 106th District Judge Carter Schildknecht in Tahoka on Aug. 28. The following pled guilty to these charges:

· Raul Chavarria, 56, for Driving While Intoxicated charge on Feb. 10, 2017; sentenced to 10 years Community Supervision, and Drivers License suspended for 2 years, plus pay \$3,000 fine and court

· Gabriel Quintero, 27, for Assault Public Servant charge on June 2, 2017; sentenced to Deferred Adjudication of Guilt Community Supervision term of 5 years, plus pay \$2,500 fine and court costs.

• Pedro Guadalupe Rivera, 32, for Assault Family Violence charge on March 29, 2017; sentenced to Deferred Adjudication of Guilt Community Supervision term of 5 years, plus pay \$1,000 fine and court

Four traffic accidents occurred in Lynn County during the past week, including one that the driver described as "hitting a large

animal," possibly a deer, on US 87. The driver, Christopher Lee Benitez of Lamesa, told Sheriff's deputies that his Ford Expedition struck "a large animal" on US 87 about 2 miles south of Tahoka, at 9:28 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 6. No injuries were reported, and the extent of damage to the vehicle was

unknown. Two one-vehicle rollovers were reported. The first rollover occurred at 10:02 a.m. Sunday, about a half mile north of the north roadside park on US 87. Jacob Noel Estrada of Lubbock was the driver, and Lynn County EMS transported him to a Lubbock hospital. He also had a dog in the vehicle, which Lynn County Animal Control was holding until it could be picked up by family members.

At 9:07 a.m. Monday, Sept. 11, a one-vehicle rollover occurred 10 miles south of Tahoka on US 87. Joseph Michael Castillo of O'Donnell was the driver of a 1997 Honda that rolled. Lynn County EMS transported him to Lynn County Hospital for treatment.

For those under 18 years of age, Texas law already bans all cell phone use while driving, including hands-free, except in the case of emergencies. Additionally, drivers are currently banned from texting and using hand-held cellular devices while driving in school zones. School bus operators also are prohibited from using cell phones

while driving if children are present. Lynn County Jail held 43 inmates last week, including 21 for Ector County, 11 for Dawson, and 11 for Lynn County.

Proposition Number 4 (SJR 6)

SJR 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas legislature to require any court that is hearing a challenge to the constitutionality of a state statute to notify the attorney general of that challenge, if the party raising the challenge notifies the court that the party is challenging the constitutionality of such statute. Additionally, the amendment would allow the Texas legislature to set a period of not more than 45 days following the notification to the attorney general that the court must wait before rendering a judgment that a state statute is unconstitutional.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to require a court to provide notice to the attorney general of a challenge to the constitutionality of a state statute and authorizing the legislature to prescribe a waiting period before the court may enter a judgment holding the statute unconstitutional.'

> **Proposition Number 5** (HJR 100)

HJR 100 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide a more detailed definition of "professional sports team" for purposes of their charitable foundations, which the Texas legislature may permit to hold charitable raffles. The amendment also deletes a requirement that an eligible professional sports team charitable foundation permitted by the Texas legislature to hold charitable raffles had to be in existence on-January 1, 2016.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment on professional sports team charitable foundations conducting charita-

> **Proposition Number 6** (SJR 1)

SJR 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas legislature by general law to provide that a surviving spouse of a first responder who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty is entitled to receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation from all or part of the market value on the surviving spouse's residence homestead, as long as the surviving spouse has not remarried since the death of the first responder. It would also allow the Texas legislature to provide that the surviving spouse, who qualifies

and receives the exemption and then qualifies a different property as the surviving spouse's residence homestead, receive an exemption from ad valorem taxation of the different homestead in an amount equal to the dollar amount of the exemption of the first homestead for which the exemption was received in the last year in which the surviving spouse received the exemption for that first homestead. Like the initial exemption, this benefit will only remain available if the surviving spouse has not remarried since the death of the first responder. The proposed amendment would apply only to ad valorem taxes imposed for a tax year beginning on or after January


The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a first responder who is killed or fatally injured in the line of duty."

> **Proposition Number 7** (HJR 37)

HJR 37 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas legislature to make an exception to the law regarding the award of certain prizes. Currently, the Texas Constitution requires the Texas legislature to pass laws prohibiting lotteries, raffles, and other programs where the award of gifts is based on luck or chance. The proposed amendment would make an exception to this general rule to allow the Texas legislature to authorize credit unions and other financial institutions to institute programs which, in order to encourage savings, would award prizes based on luck or chance to the credit union's or financial institution's customers.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment relating to legislative authority to permit credit unions and other financial institutions to award prizes by lot to promote savings."
