State Commission on Judicial Conduct issues Public Reprimand to Judge Carter Schildknecht

The State Commission on Judicial Conduct has issued a Public Reprimand to 106th District Judge Carter Schildknecht, according to information released in document CJC No. 17-0423-DI that was issued Aug. 22, 2017. This decision comes after the commission reviewed allegations made by former 106th Judicial District Attorney Michael Munk that Judge Schildknecht failed to be patient, dignified and courteous, a violation of the Texas Code of Judicial Conduct.

The 106th Judicial District Court serves Lynn, Garza, Gaines and Dawson counties.

According to the reprimand, Judge Schildknecht criticized Munk multiple times during hearings in December of 2016. Such comments included: "our present district attorney, who fortunately, will only be in office for another couple of weeks, has chosen to cancel grand juries all over the district since he was defeated in May"; and, "So our district attorney's failure to do the job with which he was being paid to do has created a lot of problems for everybody: the citizens, the defendants."

According to the commission, Judge Schildknech's response regarding the comment was, "Although my comments were the truth, perhaps it was not courteous to bluntly tell why the accused had not had their cases timely brought before a grand jury."

Munk reported to the Commission that he could not indict the cases because he had not received the drug results from the Department of Public Safety lab.

According to the commission, Judge Schildknecht also stated, "I regret that I made those statements. I recognize that I should have been more soft spoken and generic about the situations and request forgiveness and mercy."

The public reprimand, which is the highest sanction the commission can vote to give a judge without formal proceedings, states the commission took action in a continuing effort to produce public confidence in the

Following the reprimand, Judge Schildknecht responded to The News with these comments:

"I appreciate the many expressions of wonderful support that have been given to me by the people in the four counties of our district and by the attorneys who appear before me in the courtroom.

"I respect the decision that the Judicial Commission handed down this week concerning statements of public concern that I put on the record last December when I had to let some defendants out on personal recognizance bond because they had been in jail for more than 90 days without their cases being presented to a Grand Jury.

"I look forward to continuing to do the people's work in our 106th Judicial District during the year and three months remaining in my term," she concluded.

The commission had previously issued Judge Schildknecht a Public Admonition with an Order of Addi-

tional Education in part, for referring to Munk as a "New York Jew" in May 2015 proceedings.

A public reprimand means Judge Schildknecht is prohibited from sitting as a visiting judge when she retires from her current term at the end of next year. This is Judge Schildknecht's final term of office due to a state law that prevents judges from seeking re-election to another term after reaching the age of 75.

Property tax statements to arrive in mid-October

Lynn County property owners should expect to receive their 2017 property tax statements by mid-October, according to information this week from the Lynn County Appraisal District, which sends out statements to collect property taxes as set by all county taxing entities.

January 31 is the deadline to pay property taxes. After that, the late payment fees, penalties and interest begin to add up quickly.

A \$25,000 homestead exemption on school district taxes (deducted from the total value of the home) is available for property owners who use the home as their principal residence on January 1 of the tax year.

Homeowners may file an Application for Residential Homestead Exemption with the appraisal district for the \$25,000 homestead exemption up to one year after the taxes on the homestead are due. Once you receive the exemption, you do not need to reapply unless you should move or your qualification ends.

An additional \$10,000 exemption

on school district taxes is available for A \$3,000 exemption on county taxhomeowners age 65 or older, or dises is given for homeowners age 65 or abled. And, their school district taxes older (but not for disabled under 65). Also, disabled or over-65 homeare frozen at the total amount of taxes

owners may opt to pay their taxes in four installments instead of a one-time full payment. To make the installment payments, the homeowner must notify the Appraisal District (each year) be-


fore the end of January, of their intent to pay their tax bill in this method. The first payment is due by the end of January, with the other three payments due in March, May and July.


Last Tuesday afternoon, a rural resident called the Sheriff's Office to report a phone scam from someone claiming to be with the IRS and seeking



The coach believes, however, that the team gained a lot of irreplaceable experience last Friday night.


