Cotton stripper burns, vehicle rollover reported

Law enforcement agencies in the county had reports this week of a cotton stripper on fire, and a one-vehicle rollover.

The rollover occurred at 7:16 a.m. Friday, involving a male driver in a pickup near the Draw area, on FM 213 and County Road BB, but no information was available on the name of the driver. Lynn County EMS transported the driver for treatment of unknown injuries.

Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. responded to a call at 8:39 p.m. last Thursday, to a cotton stripper on fire at a location between County Roads 26 and 27 on FM 2056. No injuries were reported.

The Lynn County Sheriff's Office received a call at 8:39 p.m. last Tuesday, reporting a domestic disturbance between a male and a female in a vehicle stopped on the side of US 87 near the Lynn/Lubbock county line. When an officer arrived to investigate, he found the male walking on the side

of the road, who told the officer that the woman had driven off, leaving him on the side of the road. Upon further investigation, the officer found that the man was wanted on a warrant out of Lubbock County on charges of Terroristic Threat of a Family/Household and Application to Revoke Probation for Driving and Operating a Motor Vehicle in a Public Place while Intoxicated. He was arrested and transported to jail.

A suspicious vehicle was reported in the Wilson area at 1:12 a.m. last Wednesday. An officer investigating found that the two men inside the vehicle were reportedly searching for lost dogs.

Lynn County Jail held 43 inmates during the past week, including 20 for Ector County, 6 for Dawson, and 17 for Lynn County. Local charges included two for Public Intoxication, one for Driving While License Suspended/Invalid, and one for the arrest made on the warrant out of Lubbock County.

Early Voting ends Friday for Nov. 7 elections

Early Voting will end Friday, Nov. 3 in Lynn County for voting in the Nov. 7 Constitutional Amendment election and the O'Donnell liquor election. Registered voters in the county may cast ballots in early voting at a location for their voting precinct.

Early Voting for the Constitutional Amendment election will only be conducted in Tahoka, for all the voting boxes in the county, at the Lynn County Clerk's Office, located at 1627 Ave. K in Tahoka (note: this office has moved from the courthouse due to the renovation project there).

In O'Donnell, where O'Donnell city residents may also cast ballots in a liquor election (a separate election than the amendment election), Early Voting for the liquor election is being conducted at O'Donnell City Hall, 615 8th Street, during regular business hours (8 a.m.-5:00 p.m. Monday-Thursday, and 7 a.m.-4 p.m. Friday). O'Donnell city resi-

dents may mark a ballot to consider legalizing or prohibiting the sale of all alcohol beverages, including mixed beverages, within the city limits of the City of O'Donnell.

Voting Polls Open at 7 a.m. Tuesday

On Election Day, Nov. 7, voters may cast ballots from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. at one of four locations, according to voting precinct:

- Tahoka: Life Enrichment Center, 1717 Main St., for Voting Precincts 1/5, 6, 7, 9, 12, 14
- Wilson: Green Museum, 1601 10th St., for Voting Precincts 2, 8
- New Home: New Home Community Center, 109 W. Broadway, for Voting Precincts 4, 11, 13.
- O'Donnell: O'Donnell Community Center, 600 Nassau Rd., for Voting Precincts 3, 10. Both the Constitutional Amendment ballot and liquor election ballot will be available in this location on Election Day.

LCHD Fitness Center offers free membership for SilverSneakers fitness program

Lynn County Hospital District's Fitness Center is now offering free membership for SilverSneakers, a fitness program provided to Medicare-eligible and group retiree programs. At the LCHD gym those that qualify will receive a free membership to the fitness center.

"The SilverSneakers program is a nationwide program that has thousands of participating clinics, including here in Tahoka, and there are four more in Lubbock, and when you become a SilverSneakers member you can visit any of the gyms for a reduced or free price, no contract, no binding membership," says Seth Manly PT, DPT, ATC, LAT, Director of Rehabilitation and Fitness at the LCHD center.

"The SilverSneakers program is a great asset to the community to help encourage fitness and well-being," said Manly.

The American College of Sports Medicine states that working out can:

- Improve heart and lung function
- Reduce Coronary artery disease risk factors
- Decrease Morbidity and Mortality
- Decrease anxiety and depression
- Enhance feelings of well being
- Enhance performance at work, recreational, and sport activities
- Reduce risk from falls in older adults
- Increase bone mineral density (decrease risk for fractures)
- Effective therapy for many chronic diseases in older adults

"This program is something that we are very happy to be able to provide to Lynn County and surrounding communities to help improve everyone's quality of life," said Manly. "At this time we do not have a SilverSneakers certified class instructor but we are looking into getting one to start having low impact classes geared specifically toward our SilverSneakers members," he added.

To sign up or check eligibility for the SilverSneakers program, visit their website www.silversneakers.com for more information and educational videos. Or call 1-888-423-4632 (TTY: 711)

"Along with SilverSneakers we have a new program called Prime that is basically the same concept of SilverSneakers but is for anyone from an age range of 18-64," Manly said. "It is a program again associated with your health insurance carrier. Multiple health insurance carriers help you qualify for Prime (a big one being Blue Cross Blue Shield). This program is sometimes paid for by an employer and other times not. However it is an affordable program that opens the ability to visit any participating gym without the hassle of start-up fees, binding contracts, etc. The best way to see if you qualify is to visit the Prime website at www.primemember.com," he explained.

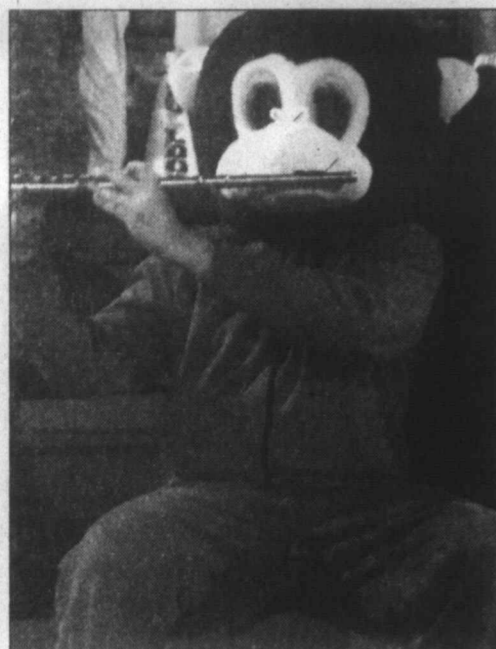

Lynn County 4-H Food Challenge Teams Dominate District Competition

Ten food challenge teams, representing Lynn County, competed at the District 2, 4-H Food Challenge contest held on October 23 at the Mallet Event Center in Levelland.

The senior team of Connor Cook, Darby Sherwood, Riley Stokes and Mackenzie Bolton placed second. In intermediate competition, the team of Ryan Olivan, Nataly Taylor, Axie Allen and Miranda DeLeon placed first in the main dish category. Laine Cook, Kaylee Walker, Reagan Stokes and Nathaniel Valdez placed first in fruits and vegetables. Braxton Beck, Brazos Beck and Brayson Beck also competed.

In junior breads and cereals one, the team of Kelby Burk, Kenny Donald, Remi Donald and Rayna Jo Epley placed third. In main dish one, the team of Kinlee Rathmann, Jaityn Mires and Lincoln Graham placed third. The team of Natalie Valdez, Kaitlynn Smith and Emily Smith placed first in breads and cereals two. In fruit and vegetable two, the team of Denton Moore, Reese Moore, Jordan Pledger and Janelle DeLeon placed second. The team of Laney Scott, Mason Scott, Reed Multer and Chloe Hunt placed first in main dish two. Other competitors were Sawyer May, Klaire Gill and Jady Woodley.

"Sending ten teams to district would not have been possible without the help of our eleven coaches. They spent lots of time preparing these kids for competition. And our thirty-six kids were part of the largest district food challenge contest ever held in District 2. There were 445 competitors that were a part of 111 teams."

The food challenge is a contest that allows 4-H members to demonstrate their culinary knowledge and skills. From a set of predetermined ingredi-

ents provided, teams of 3-5 members must develop a recipe and prepare a dish within 40 minutes. Teams then make a presentation to a judging panel, explaining the preparation steps, serving size, food safety concerns, nutritional value and cost of their dish.

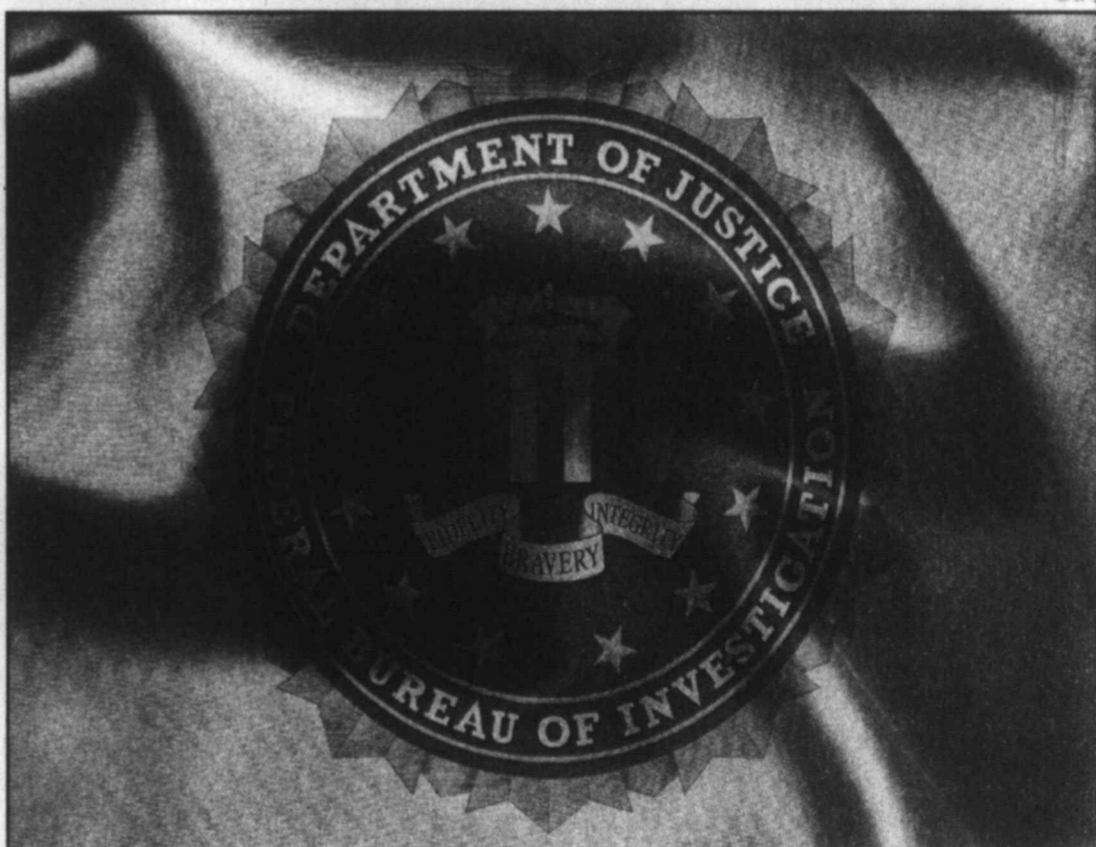

SPAG program offers rebates for new storm cellars/safe rooms

Homeowners in the South Plains region, including Lynn County, who build a new storm cellar or safe room on their residential property can apply for a 50% rebate of the eligible costs (up to a maximum rebate of \$3,000) through a program offered by SPAG.

The safe room rebates are funded through FEMA and the Texas Division of Emergency Management and administered

locally by staff at the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG).

"We believe this is a great opportunity to help better prepare the residents of the South Plains to take shelter from potential storms, however, there are standards and guidelines to apply to participate in this program," said a SPAG representative.

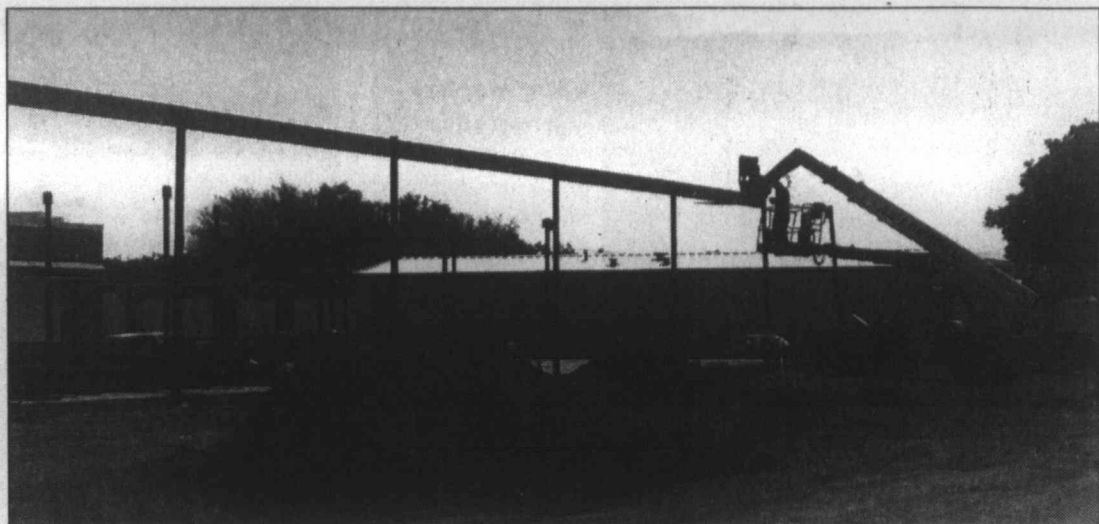
This program is completely voluntary, and is not retroactive. Safe rooms installed prior to being accepted to participate in the SPAG Regional Safe Room Rebate Program are not eligible for a rebate.

Applicants must own their home and must pay the contractor/installer in full (out-of-pocket) to receive a 50% rebate of the eligible costs (up to a maximum rebate of \$3,000).

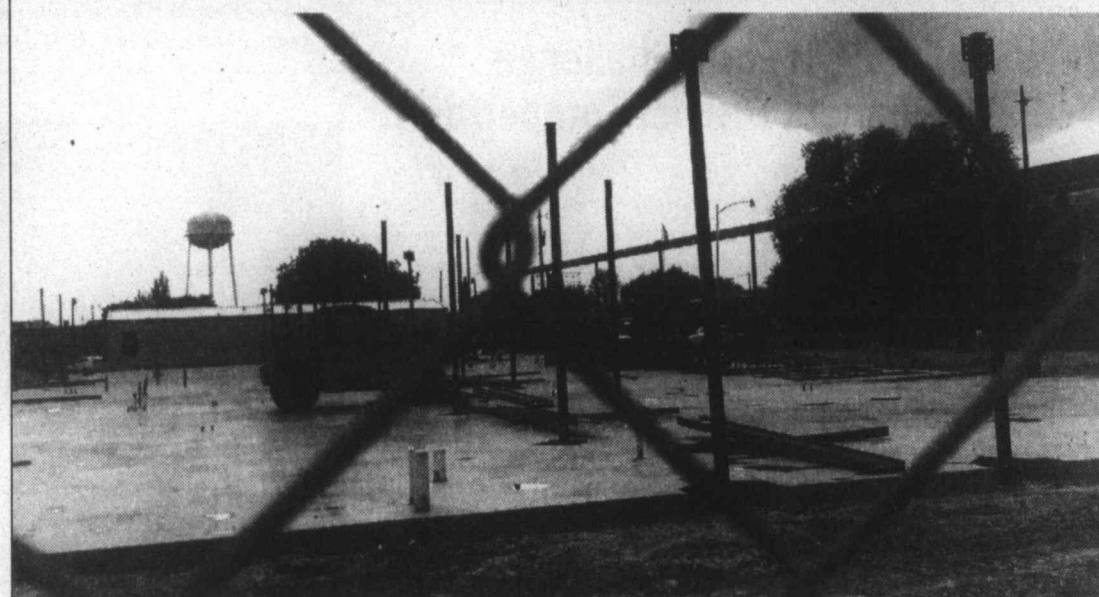
Homeowners who live in any of the 15 counties in the SPAG region are eligible to apply, including Lynn County. Homes located in a local or FEMA-designated floodplain are not eligible for the rebate program.

Safe-rooms may be installed above ground or underground, indoors and/or outdoors, in existing or newly constructed single-family homes, or manufactured homes. Proof of ownership documentation must be submitted along with an application packet to SPAG.

Request a "SPAG Regional Safe Room Rebate Application Packet" online at www.spag.org or contact Belinda Solis by email at bsolis@spag.org. Due to limited funding for this region, this rebate program is based on a first-come, first-serve basis. Builders, installers and manufacturers working on the project must comply with both FEMA guidance and ICC Standards of the Texas Residential Safe Rooms Rebate Program.

Dogs beat Roby on the road, fight good battle against Hamlin

The Bulldogs won one and lost one during the last two Friday night football games, and they are back on the road this week as they travel to Roscoe for their next-to-last district game. Kickoff at Roscoe is at 7 p.m. (not 7:30 as in earlier games), and their final district game will be at home, hosting Plains on Nov. 10, at 7 p.m. The Bulldogs beat Roby 12-6 two weeks ago, gaining their first win on the road, and came from behind and almost closed the gap before bowing out 32-27 to Hamlin here last Friday.

Roby 12-6 Win

"This was a game in which I felt like we had a really good chance to right the ship," said Stephen Overstreet, Athletic Director and Head Coach. "We got Juwan Hamilton back and added a little more firepower to our backfield. He came up huge for us and was the guy who gets credit for both scoring plays. This was a game that our defense did an excellent job of playing with its back to the wall. Our offense struggled early but came away with a huge scoring drive late that sealed the deal."

Overstreet added, "We had to overcome a lot of adversity in Roby that night. I was proud of how our kids responded and found a way to win. Getting that monkey off our back was a huge relief, as we had been unsuccessful in our previous three attempts on the road. I'm proud of our kids and fans for willing us to a victory," said.

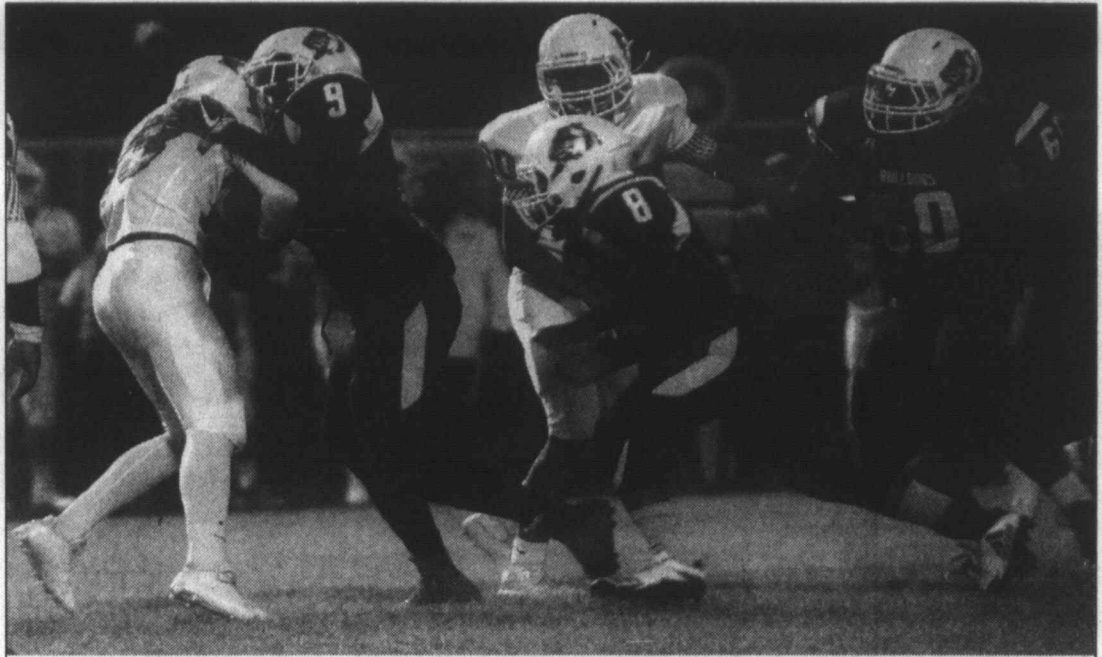
Hamlin 32-27 Loss

Tahoka allowed Hamlin three TD's in the first half, trailing 20-0 before scoring on John Stone's 83-yard return for a touchdown, with just over two minutes left in the half. A 2-point conversion pass by Braden Stone to Tristen Tipton brought the dogs up to 20-8 at the half. The Dogs scored three more TD's in the third period, including a Malik Hamilton run for a 6-yard TD, a 63-yard run by Nick Arce for a TD, and a 21-yard run by Braden Stone, and PAT by Javier Zuniga. Hamlin added another TD and led 26-21 going in to the final quarter, where both Hamlin and Tahoka added another TD. Alexander Herevia ran for a 6-yard TD for the Bulldogs, but Tahoka trailed 32-27 at

the final buzzer.

"If you take away the first quarter this was an excellent ballgame," said Overstreet. "We couldn't get a stop on defense early on and that set us in a hole we weren't able to dig out of. Hamlin has a very good running back in Kyler Gann and he did an excellent job of running the outside zone. We rolled an extra defender down in the box, but they weren't forcing and setting the edge. We figured it out as the night went on but giving a kid like that the edge isn't good."

"Our offense especially in the second half was amazing. I felt like Coach Gorman called a terrific game and made the perfect adjustments at the half. We came out in the second half and really had things rolling. I talk to our kids all the time about playing with juice and they did that. When they got rolling the crowd gets going and things start falling in place. To have the ability to win a game after being down 20-0 says a lot about these kids. Fighting back and having a chance with under 2 minutes in the game is phenomenal. We got a big stop on defense late and forced them

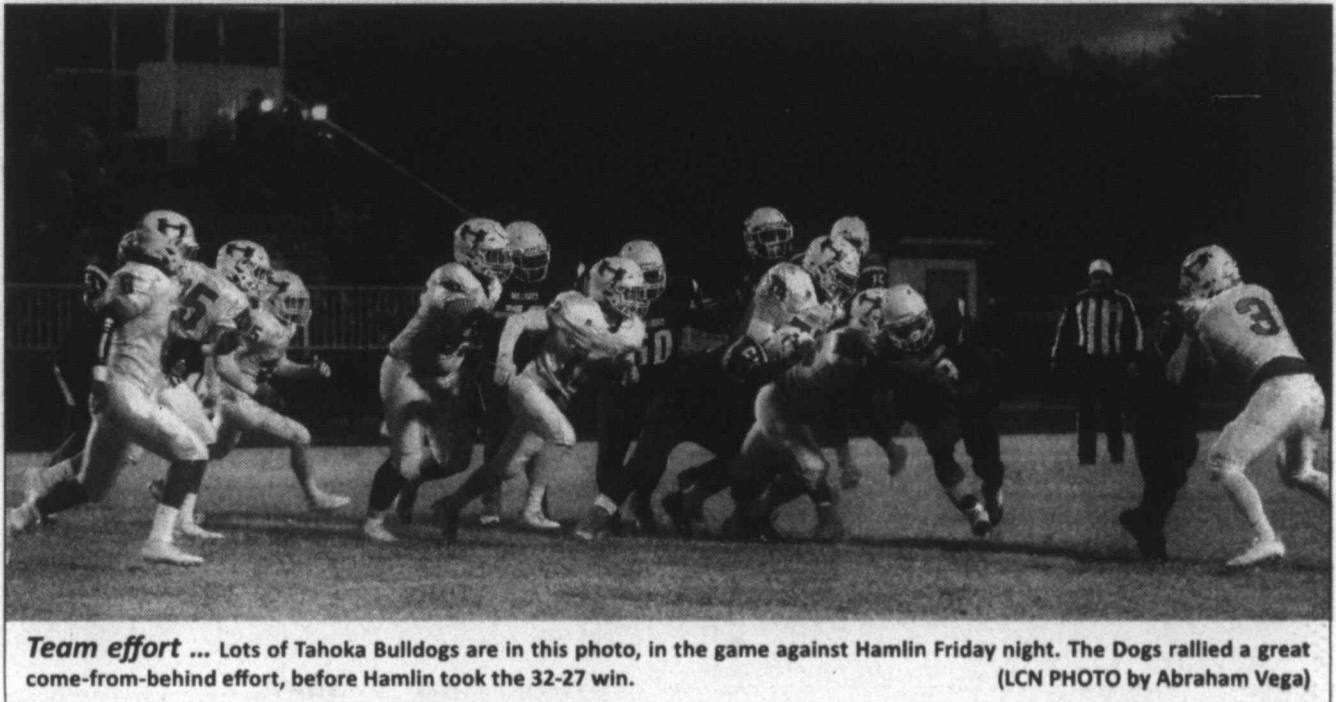
to punt which is what we wanted. They muffed the snap and our offense got the ball back inside the redzone. I know we didn't punch it in but super proud of the effort. I told the kids after the game if we could have gotten a stop earlier in the night that wouldn't have come back to get us.

"We showed Friday night what we are capable of on both sides of the ball. When these kids play with some emotion and make up their minds we can do some really good things. We have two big game left and need to find a way to win at least one to be in the playoffs. We are still right in the thick of the race and have goals in sight of getting to the post season. We

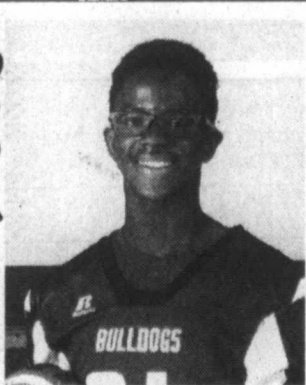

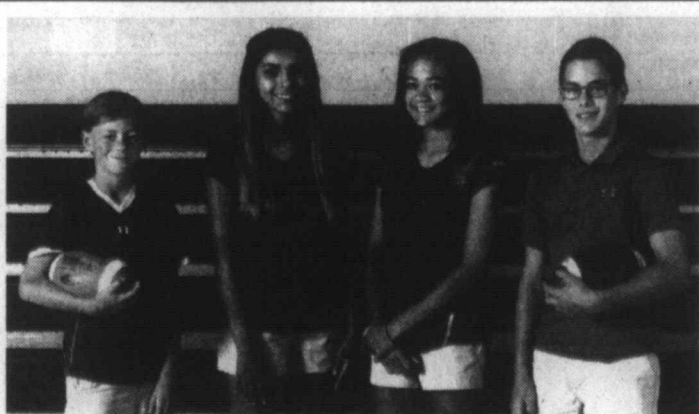

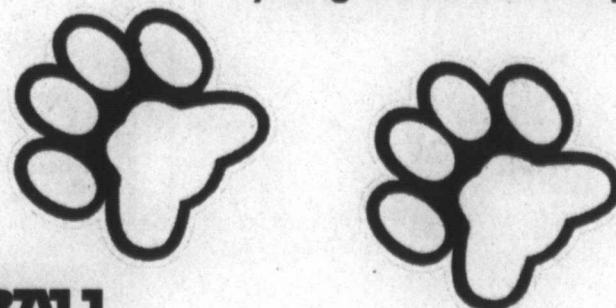
