Lynn County EMS honored with Texas Volunteer Provider Award

Only one volunteer service in the state is chosen from among hundreds statewide for this award each year, and Lynn County's exceptional EMS service was selected for the honor.


"From its original inception, Lynn County EMS has been a great EMS provider, giving excellent patient care. I am glad this group, primarily volunteers, are being recognized for their hard work and service to all of Lynn County," said John Baker, Director of Support Services/EMS at Lynn County Hospital.

Baker heads up a 17-member crew, most of whom are volunteers. Members of the Lynn County EMS include Todd Henry, Bobby Jolly, Traci Jolly, Ginger Henry, Johnna Alvarado, Brent Meyer, Allegra Ramirez, Amanda Bower, Victor Herrera, Jerry Tew, Janis Thomas, Matt Reynolds, Samantha Henderson, Debbie Saldana, Jon Luna, Whitlee Anderson, and Ramiro Cerda. They serve the citizens of Lynn County 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 365-days a year.

Although LCHD EMS does have a few full time employees, they are largely dependent on their 12 certified volunteer members and four volunteer drivers. With three EMS trucks and a service area of 893 square miles, there have been numerous occasions when all three units are out running calls simultaneously.

10-year-old boy bitten by dog near elementary campus

A 10-year-old boy walking home from school Monday afternoon was attacked by a large male Pyrenees mixed breed dog near the Tahoka Elementary school grounds, suffering a bite injury. According to Lynn County-Animal Control Director Lee Mary Rodriguez, there were three dogs the Pyrenees, a pit bill, and a hound mix - running loose from the home of Billy Montez, at 2027 N. 4th, just across the street from the elementary playground. As the boy was walking home from school, the three dogs ran to the boy, and the Pyrenees reportedly bit the child on the left abdomen/ lower back area.

Employees at Tahoka ISD Daycare, which is located on the elementary campus next to the playground, reportedly witnessed the attack and called 9-1-1. After one dog bit the child, all three dogs reportedly ran off.

Lynn County EMS was called to the scene, where the child was treated and released to his parents. Animal Control seized the Pyrenees dog and will quarantine the animal for 10 days to watch for signs of rabies. The dogs'

owners were ticketed by Animal Control for three dogs running loose and for no rabies vaccines, and were also told that they would be responsible for any medical bills incurred in the treatment of the dog-bite victim.

the northwest residential section, with the "Train Depot" inside the church fellowship hall. The train will travel from the church parking lot onto Ave. R, north to N. 4th, turn left, and turn left again on Ave. S to travel south, turning left on N. 1st to go back to the Church of Christ.

Drivers during this time period should take care to be aware of the slower-moving train in the area.

No wonder I tire out so easily. I'm three weeks older than Jesus.


WHILE on a road trip, an elderly couple stopped at a roadside restaurant for lunch. After finishing their meal, they left the restaurant and resumed their trip.


When leaving, the woman unknowingly left her glasses on the table and she didn't miss them until they had been driving about twenty minutes.



Three more file for elections; three-way race set for JP#1

Three more candidates filed for county offices during the past week, including two more for the Justice of Peace Pct. 1 seat, on the ballot in the March 2018 Republican Primary. County Clerk Susan Tipton filed for re-election for another four-year term, and two new candidates are joining the Justice of Peace Pct. 1 race, which now has three candidates. Brenda Dotson and Deana Grissom each filed for the JP1 position, joining candidate Christie Olivan who had filed previously for

the seat. To date, the JP1 position has the only contested race for a county office, with the other seven offices having incumbents currently unopposed as they seek re-election. The filing period continues through Dec. 11, 2017, for all candidates interested in filing for a seat.

Others who filed previously for county offices include the following incumbents seeking re-election for another four-year term: County Judge Mike Braddock, County Treasurer Amy Schuknecht, District Clerk Sandra Laws, Pct. 2 County Commissioner John Hawthorne, Pct 4 County Commissioner Larry Durham as County Commissioner Precinct 4, and Pct. 4 Justice of Peace Ed Follis.

Candidates interested in filing on the Republican ticket may contact Lynn County Republican Party Chairman John Baker, at 806-789-1257.

Currently in Lynn County, there is no County Democratic Party chairman, but candidates interested in filing on the Democratic ticket may contact the Texas Democratic Party, 512-478-9800.

Rodriguez told The News that she is patrolling the school area, especially during the morning and afternoon hours when children are going to and from school, to watch for dogs on the loose.

A one-vehicle rollover and a collision with a deer were in law enforcement reports this week, as well as three reports of theft and several reports of cottonrelated fires.

Rebecca Gomez of Marlin, TX was the driver of a 2006 GMC Yukon involved in the one-vehicle rollover last Thursday. The accident occurred at 7:37 p.m. about 10 miles west of Tahoka on US 380. Lynn County EMS was called to the scene, but no report of injuries was available.

A 2011 GMC pickup hit a deer 3 miles north of Tahoka while traveling southbound on US 87 at 7:35 a.m. Monday. Barry Sheets of Lubbock was the driver. No injuries were reported.

Last Wednesday morning, David Cagle reported theft of tools from a building located on the east side of US 87, at 227 US Hwy 87. He told officers that someone stole several tools from the building within the last two days.

At noon Wednesday, officers received a report of items found in an abandoned house on County Road N, 1.5 miles north of FM 211. Found in the house were pivot parts and a wheel from a pivot.

New Home ISD officials reported theft of several items from the school's ag shop, which had apparently been broken into. The theft was reported at 9 a.m. last Thursday.

Luz Martinez of Tahoka reported theft of items from her storage unit at Tahoka Mini Storage in the 2000 block of the West 87 Access Road, on Saturday, Dec. 2. She told Tahoka Police that sometime within the past month someone had broken the latch to the storage unit and

taken Christmas ornaments, chairs, an air compressor and a box of personal documents.

A report of a reckless driver swerving side-to-side on US 87 at 7:19 p.m. Saturday led officers to the arrest of a Lubbock man on charges of Driving While Intoxicated. Officers stopped a Ford pickup driving southbound on US 87 just south of County Road 3, and transported the man to jail.

Several reports of cotton module fires and cotton stripper fires were called in to the Sheriff's Office this week. Joe Calvillo reported a cotton stripper on fire 5 miles south of Tahoka and 1.5 miles east of US 87 at 1 p.m. Nov. 29, which Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. responded to. Lynn County Jail held 37 inmates during the past week, including 12 for Ector County, 6 for Dawson, and 19 for Lynn County. Local charges included one for DWI, one for possession of marijuana, and one for Motion to Revoke Probation Evading Arrest.


