Police confiscate 66 pounds of marijuana worth \$99,000

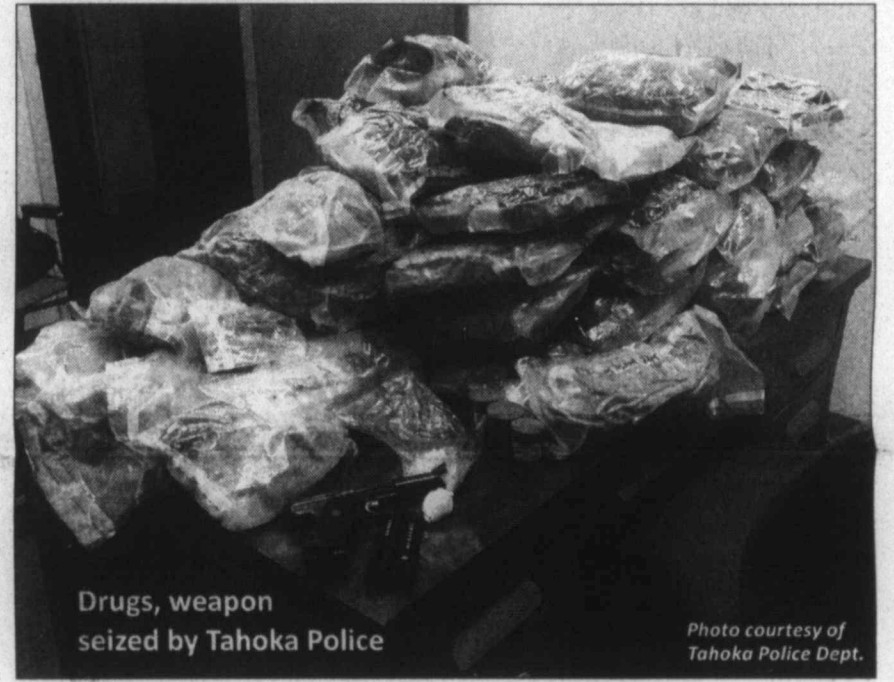
The Tahoka Police Dept. confiscated approximately 66.5 pounds of marijuana, with a street value estimated at more than \$99,000, during what began as a routine traffic stop in Tahoka just before 10 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 6.

The officer followed a 2007 white BMW SUV traveling eastbound on Lockwood Street, which then turned onto Ave. D. The officer stopped the vehicle in the 1600 block of Ave. D in Tahoka, noting in a report that both the driver and passenger appeared nervous and made comments which led the officer to believe there was contraband in the vehicle. When the driver of the vehicle refused to consent to a vehicle search, police requested a K-9 unit, and the dog alerted to contraband in the vehicle. A subsequent search revealed 60 approximately 1-pound vacuum-sealed bags of a green, leafy substance, later confirmed to be marijuana, as well as approximately 16 grams of cocaine, approximately 17 grams of methamphetamine, various drug paraphernalia, and a .22 long rifle pistol in the driver's door panel, with the driver reportedly being a felon.

Both the driver and the passenger, 34-year-old Shawn Steven Strevel and 30-year-old Brandy Lyn Rogers, both of Somerset, CA, were charged with first degree felony charges of Delivery of Marijuana greater than 50 pounds but less than 2,000 pounds, first degree felony charges of Manu-

facture/Delivery of a Controlled Substance greater than 4 grams but less than 200 grams (cocaine), first degree felony charges of Manufacture/Delivery of a Controlled Substance greater than 4 grams but less than 200 grams (methamphetamine), and misdemeanor charges of Possession of Drug Paraphernalia. The male driver was also charged with third degree felony charges of Unlawful Possession of a Firearm by a Felon, and the female passenger was also charged with third degree felony charges of Prohibited Substance/Item in a Correctional Facility (after she was found to have contraband upon her person, revealed in a search during the jail admittance procedures at Lynn County Jail). The vehicle was seized.

Police arrested a 29-year-old

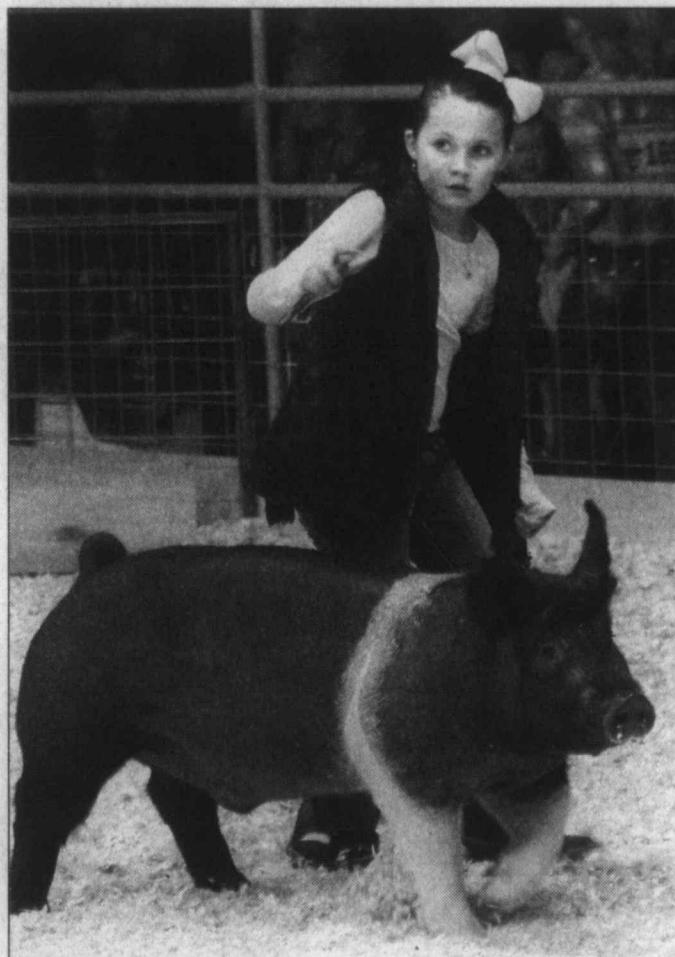

Mary Caffey Brandon

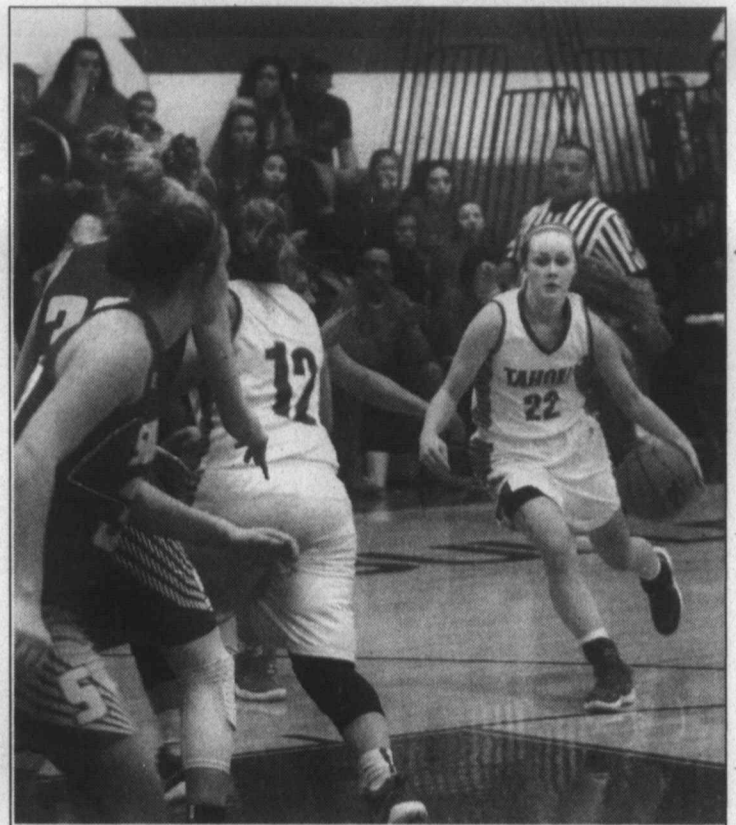

The Tahoka High School Lady Bulldogs basketball team won their district opener on Jan. 5, 52-42 over Plains, led by high-point scorer Natalie Stice with 25 points. Tamy Stroope also scored in double figures, with 10 points. Also scoring were Kylie Steen 5, Elissa Calzoncit 4, Kenzie Parks 3, Nadalie Carrasco 3, and Aly Dotson 2.

On Jan. 9, the Lady Bulldogs lost 40-22 to Morton, bringing their district record to 1-1. Stice scored 7 points, Calzoncit 5, Nahzay Cauley 5, and Carrasco 2.

The Lady Dogs lost a close one to Sundown on Jan. 12, by a mere two points, 38-36, which gave Sundown a 3-0 district record and Tahoka a 1-2 district record. Natalie Stice and Tamy Stroope shared high scorer honors, each with 14 points. Calzoncit added 4, Kenzie Parks 2, and Nahzay Cauley 3.

The Lady Dogs travel to Seagraves on Tuesday, Jan. 16, and have a home game on Friday,

Jan. 19, against Smyer. JV action starts at 4 p.m., and the varsity girls play at 6:30, followed by the varsity boys at 8 p.m.



Area fire departments responded to two fires during the past week. During the high winds on Monday afternoon about 2 p.m., both Wilson and Tahoka Volunteer Fire Departments were called to Texas Star Coop Gin in Wilson, where a module truck had reportedly caught fire in the gin yard, and several nearby cotton modules also caught fire. Gin officials reported a total loss of the truck and 10 cotton modules.

Last Tuesday night about 8 p.m. Tahoka VFD was called to a grass fire in the southern portion of the county, 7 miles south of Hwy 380 near County Road 30 and County Road F.

Lynn County Jail held 44 inmates during the past week, including 15 for Ector County, 4 for Dawson, and 25 for Lynn County. Local charges include two for delivery of marijuana felony charges, four for possession of marijuana, one on a warrant from Starr County, and one for driving with license invalid with previous conviction/no financial restitution child support.

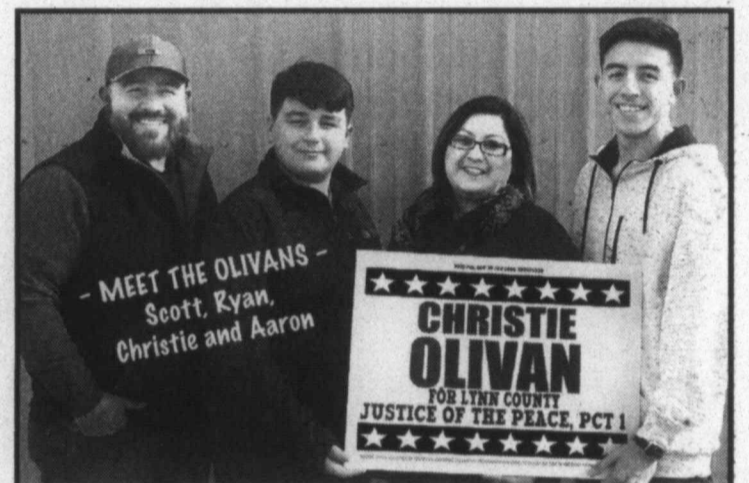

Did you know... about BASEBALL

Alexander Cartwright (1820-1892) organized the first ever baseball team named the Knickerbocker Baseball Club of New York, named after a New York City fire department. He also helped create the first-ever written rules of baseball in 1845 and was the first to draft the baseball diamond. He is one of several people named the "Father of Baseball."

Known (among several others) as the "Father of Baseball," sports-writer Henry Chadwick of the New York Clipper increased baseball's popularity by reporting games and inventing an early version of the box score. He is also the only writer to have been elected into the Baseball Hall of Fame.

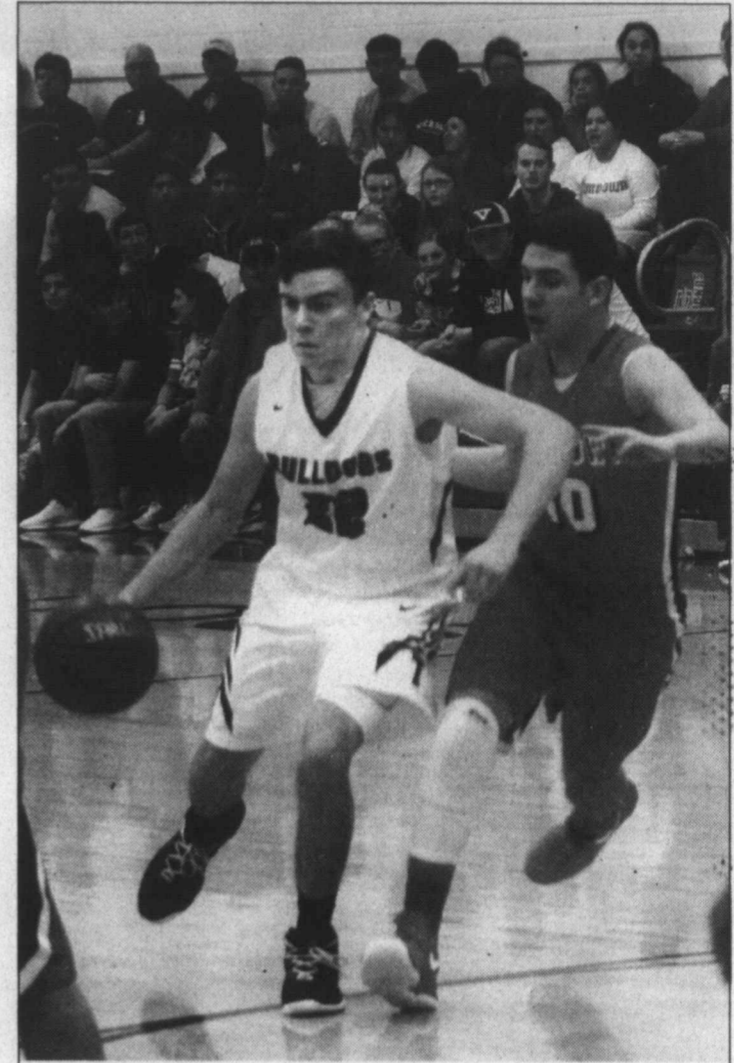

Large crowd attends 80th annual County Stock Show

A large crowd turned out for the 2018 Lynn County Stock Show last week, as county youth demonstrated their showmanship skills in exhibiting pigs, goats, lambs and steers to win awards as well as cash prizes in Saturday's auction sale.

The annual event requires many hours of preparation by the Lynn County Stock Show Association and numerous volunteers to help put on the show, as well as the support of county commissioners and sponsors who generously contribute to the show. This year was the 80th annual County Stock Show, and the 40th annual Auction Sale, which was celebrated with a special venue at Cotton Creek Barn.

Bill Miller and Shiloh Brad-dock shared auctioneering duties at this year's event. Brady Askew and Justin Bass were announcers for the show. The 2018 show was dedicated to Ty and Sharla Askew and family, for their dedication and commitment to the show.

This was the 80th annual county stock show, with the first one held in 1938, but it wasn't until 1978 that the show added the sale to the event. At that first sale, a total of just over \$41,600 was raised, according to stock show records. Last year, the sale brought in \$178,428, and this year's 40th annual sale tally is still being counted as additional add-ons come in.

Grand Champion winners at this year's show included Brook Tyson (Lynn County 4-H), Grand Champion Steer (back-to-back winner from last year); Kirklyn Fulton (New Home FFA), who showed the Grand Champion Barrow; McKinley Clem (Lynn County 4-H), who

showed the Grand Champion Lamb; and Tristan Truhlicka (Lynn County 4-H), who showed the Grand Champion Market Goat.

Reserve Grand Champion winners included Madison Truhlicka (New Home FFA), who showed the Reserve Grand Lamb; Zack Armes (New Home FFA), who showed the Reserve Grand Barrow; Kinlee Rathmann (Lynn County 4-H), who showed the Reserve Grand Steer; and Kyle Gill (New Home FFA), who showed the Reserve Grand Market Goat.

In the Baked Goods division, Emily Smith won the Grand Champion honors, and Bryson Stone was the Reserve Grand Champion.

More complete results, and photos from the show, will be printed when released by show officials.

Jeremy Brown participates in Young Leaders Program

Jeremy Brown of New Home recently learned how Farm Credit uses its cooperative structure and unique funding mechanism to lend support to rural communities and agriculture across the United States. Brown represented his lender, AgTexas Farm Credit Services, at the 2017 Farm Credit Young Leaders Program in Washington, D.C., and New York City.

The 12th annual program began in the nation's capital, where the 23 participants joined Farm Credit representatives from around the country in meetings with U.S. Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue and Sen. Pat Roberts, chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee. Brown also discussed policy issues with USDA officials, House Agriculture Committee Chairman Mike Conaway, Rep. Jodey Arrington, and Sens. John Cornyn and Ted Cruz.

Next the group traveled to the New York area. During visits to the Federal Farm Credit Banks Funding Corporation and a Wall Street brokerage firm, they learned how investors purchase highly rated Farm Credit notes and bonds, supplying steady funding for loans and related services. Together, 74 borrower-owned Farm Credit cooperatives provide \$251.2 billion in financing to farmers, ranchers, rural homeowners, agribusinesses and other eligible borrowers.

Brown started farming on 40 acres at age 15, and today grows peanuts, sesame, wheat, rye, grain sorghum, and both conventional and organic cotton on a 3,000-acre farm in Dawson County. He also has shared agriculture's story with consumers through a guest column in the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, a YouTube channel and the Texas Farm Bureau blog, "Texas Agriculture Talks." He and his wife, Sarah, have been married 10 years and have three young children.

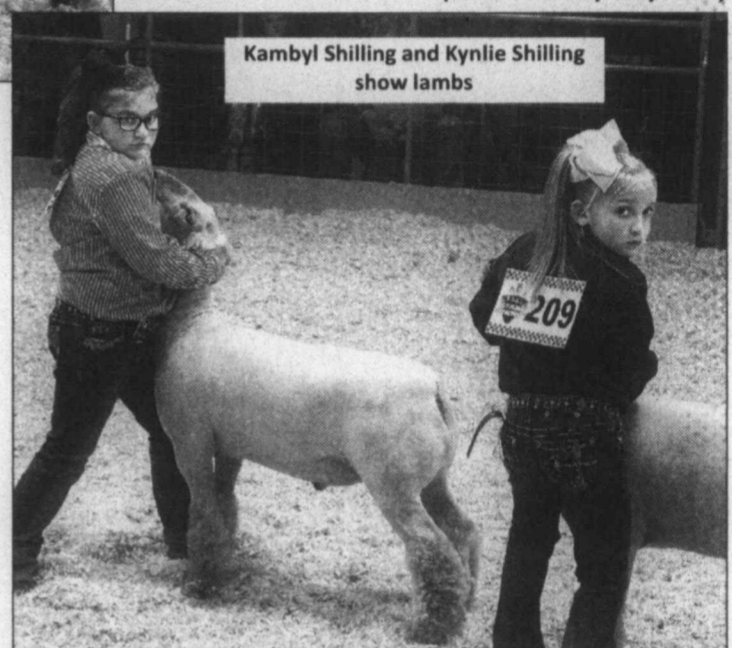
