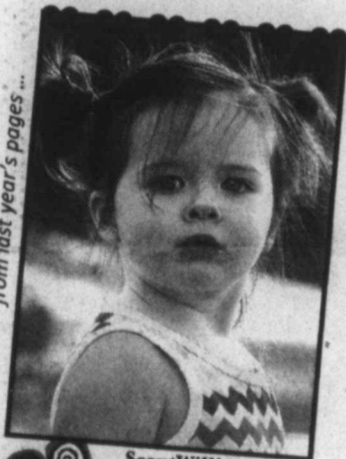

Vehicle chase starts in Lynn County, ends near Happy after spiking tires

A vehicle chase that started just north of Tahoka on US 87 ended up near Happy and involved a pursuit by DPS troopers in vehicles and the DPS helicopter across three counties before bringing the vehicle to a stop last Wednesday, Jan. 17.

According to information from Sergeant John Gonzalez, Media Communications officer with the Texas Dept. Of Public Safety, a Texas State Trooper stopped a vehicle for a violation at approximately 11:40 a.m., on US 87 just north of Tahoka. The trooper had made contact with the driver when the vehicle, which was identified as a 2015 lime-green Dodge Challenger, sped away.

The vehicle that evaded the trooper was visually lost temporarily, when a Lubbock County Sheriff's Office Deputy spotted the vehicle along Martin Luther King Jr. Ave. The vehicle continued north onto east Loop 289 continuing around and exiting onto north I-27.

The vehicle was then spotted by the Texas Department of Public Safety helicopter and pursued along north I-27 into Plainview, then north on I-27 where other units intercepted the vehicle and were able to successfully spike the vehicle's tires just outside of Happy. The vehicle was reportedly clocked at speeds of 147 mph during the chase.

The vehicle finally came to stop

on I-27 without further incident. The driver was taken into custody at 12:54 p.m. without incident. The driver identified as Chez Eugene Weaver, 28, of Lubbock was taken into custody.

According to Sgt. Gonzalez, Weaver was wanted for a parole violation for burglary. He was arrested for two counts of felony evading with a motor vehicle and warrant for parole violation burglary. He was released to Hale County Sheriff's Office Detention Center.

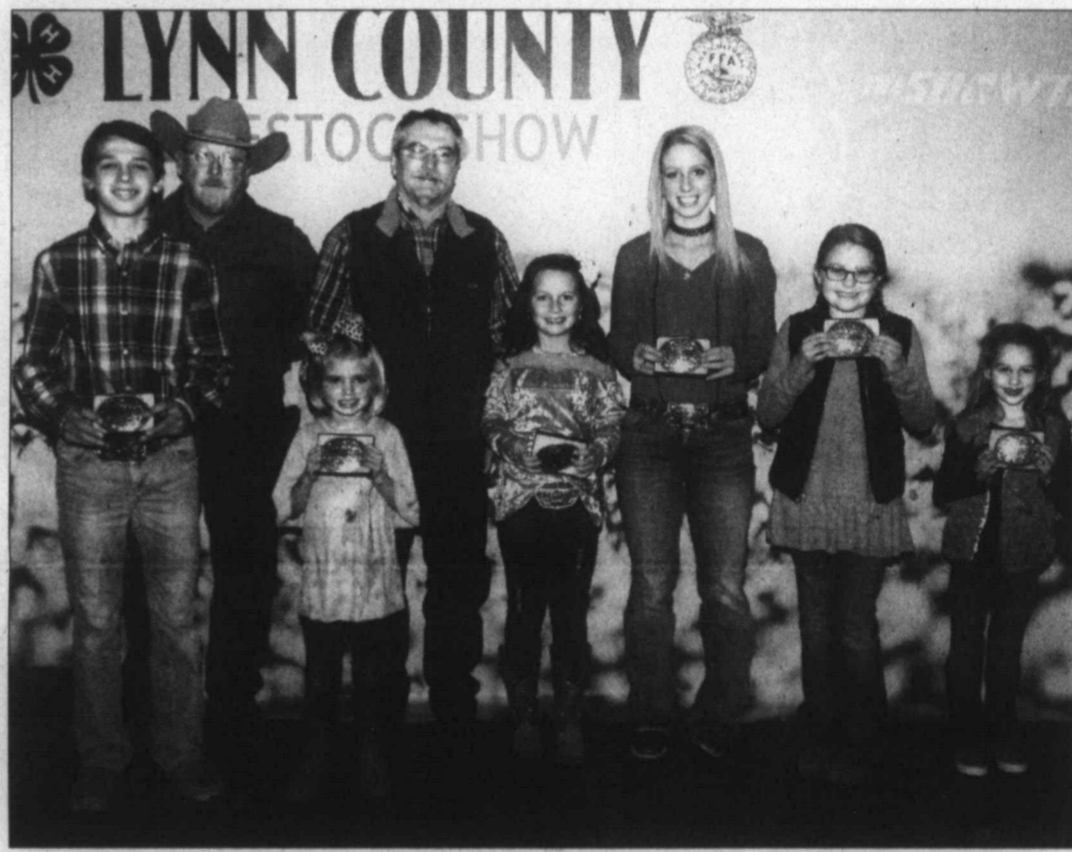
Fire damages Farmers Coop Gin in O'Donnell

The O'Donnell Volunteer Fire Department was paged out at 6:41 a.m. Tuesday, Jan. 23 to Farmers Coop Gin in O'Donnell for a fire reported inside the gin plant. Two O'Donnell VFD units with six men arrived on scene at 6:50 a.m. to find several areas of the gin on fire. The main fire was at the bale press, with smaller fires in several other pieces of equipment throughout the gin, according to a report from the O'Donnell VFD.

Lamesa Fire/Rescue was also on scene with three units and five men.

The main fire was brought under control in about 10 minutes and crews remained on scene for another hour checking for hot spots. The scene was released back to gin crews and all fire units cleared the scene at 7:54 a.m.

No significant damage was reported, and the gin is continuing to operate.

CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION

St. John Lutheran Church to celebrate 100th year Sunday

Friday, Jan. 26, 2018 marks the 100th anniversary of St. John Lutheran Church in Wilson. It was on this date in January 1918, that Rev. Roland Schlueter formally organized a small group of worshipers into a congregation. On Sunday, Jan. 28, 2018 the current members of St. John Lutheran will observe the church's Centennial anniversary with a celebration. Former and current members, and friends, are invited to attend.

The Centennial Celebration will begin with fellowship and refreshments in the Educational Building at 9:30 a.m., followed by a worship service with the Bishop in the sanctuary at 10:45 a.m. A noon meal will be served in the Wilson Junior High Gym, which is located adjacent to the church. At 2:00 p.m. a Centennial Celebration will be held in the church sanctuary, with a reception following. The church is located at 13th and Dickson in Wilson.

Tonda Freitag is the current Parish Lay Minister of the church, serving in this position since 2012, when she was installed as the Synodically Authorized Worship Leader (SAWL).

Church records indicate that seven charter-member families formed the first Lutheran congregation in Lynn County. This group included Anton Ahrens, August Nieman, J.H. Sander, Henry Hillen, Charles Lichey, Fritz Nieman and Emil Nieman, and their families. This congregation became affiliated with the First Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Texas.

In the early days, St. John had no house of worship and services were held in various locations twice a

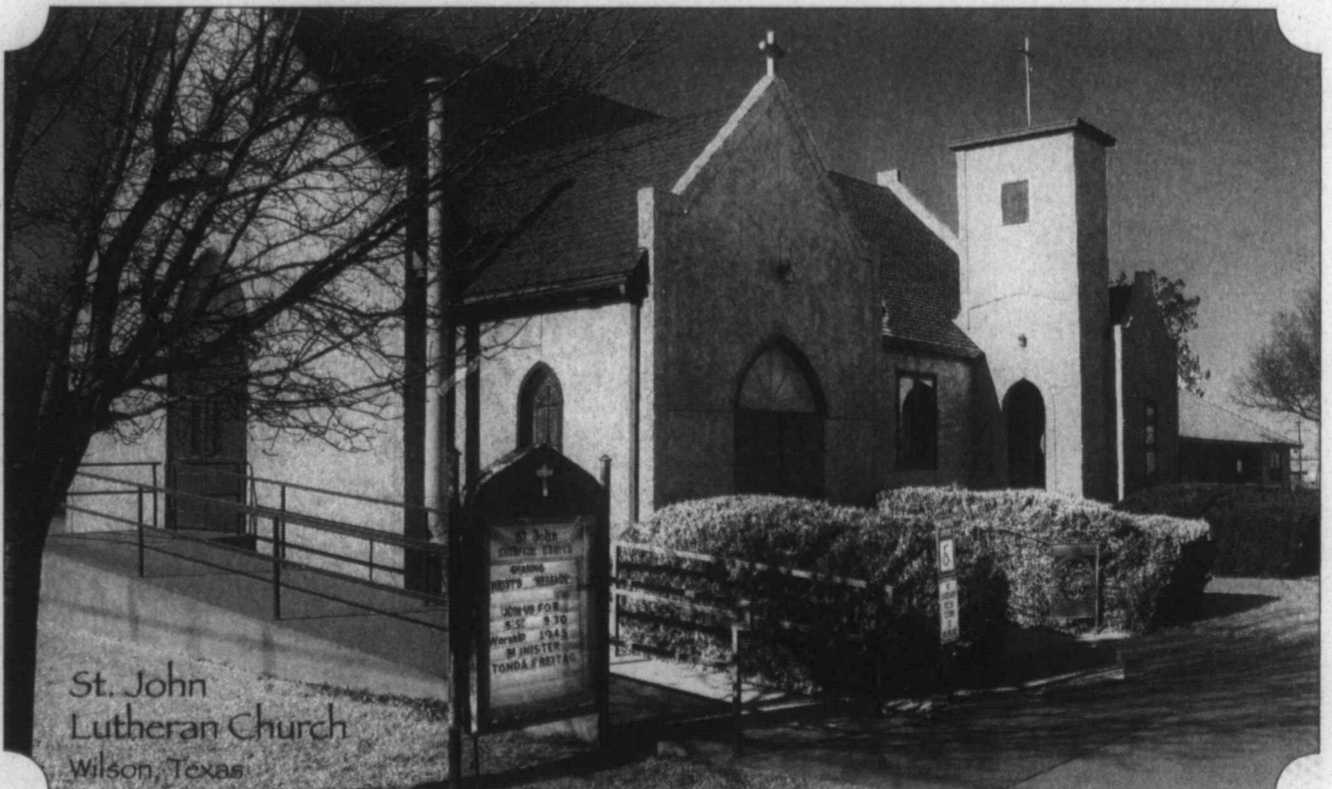
month. The situation changed little for several years, until January of 1925, when an agreement was reached with the Methodist Church to use their building twice a month.

In 1926, the congregation decided to purchase the old Community Church building, which had become the property of the Baptist Church. St. John's members purchased the building, cleaned and repaired it, and on March 7, 1926, the building was dedicated as the first house of worship for St. John Lutheran. Visiting pastors had served the church up until this point. In September 19, 1926 the Rev. Carl N. Roth was ordained and installed as St. John's first resident pastor. Since 1926,

the church has been led by 25 pastors, and PLM Freitag is the 26th leader.

Another major event of 1926 was the inauguration of the English language into the service. Up until Oct. 24, 1926, all services had been held in the German language, but on this date the congregation held their first English language service, and would continue the once-a-month use of the English language until 1938, at which time the congregation agreed to

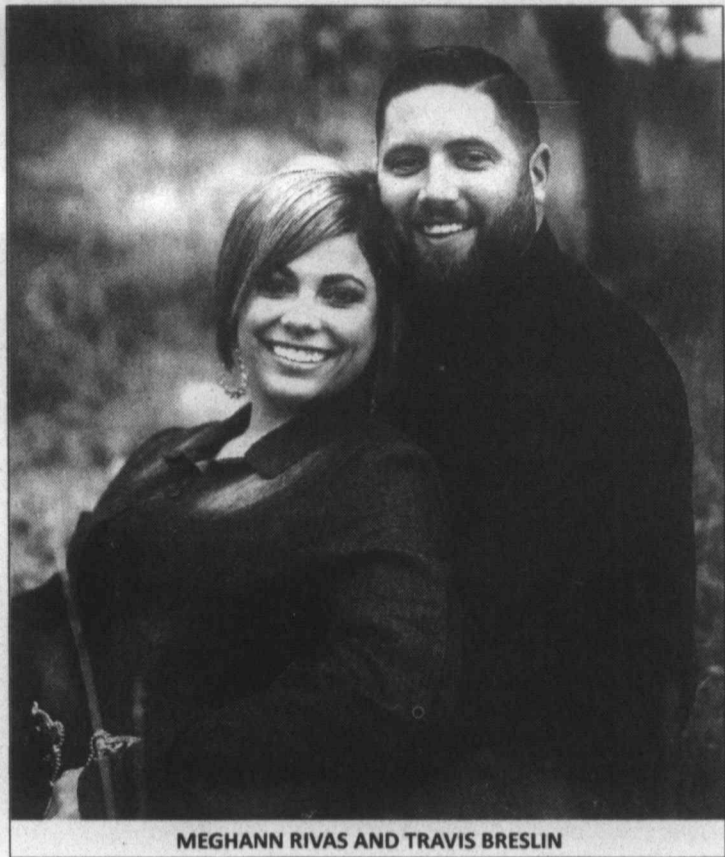

Filing Period opens for May 5 elections

The filing period for city, school and hospital board elections in Lynn County opened last week, with Wednesday, Jan. 17 the official first day to file for a place on the ballot at the main offices of the respective entities. As of early this week, no one has filed, according to reports from each entity. Filing will continue through Feb. 16, with elections to be held on May 5.

Lynn County Hospital District will have an election for three directors, all of whom will have three-year terms. City elections in Lynn County are for two-year terms, and school board trustees serve three-year terms (unless designated as an unexpired term).

Tahoka, O'Donnell and Wilson ISD will each have two trustee positions on the May ballot this year, and the New Home ISD Board election will have their election in November.

The filing period for the November election will be held at a later date.

City elections in the county include four council seats in Tahoka, two council seats and a mayoral term in Wilson, three council seats and mayor in O'Donnell, and one council seat in New Home.

Following is a complete list of terms expiring in the upcoming May 5 elections.

Lynn County Hospital District: Three directors. Terms expiring: Jannis Childress, Robbie Autry, Della Swartz.

City of Tahoka: Four Council members. Terms expiring: Dist. 2 Ronny Jolly, Dist. 4 Jeff Martin, At-Large Dist. 5 Ray Box, all three-year terms; and Dist. 3 for a 1-year unexpired term, Casey McLelland.

Tahoka ISD: Two trustees, both At-Large. Terms expiring: Clay Taylor, Lisa Hawthorne.

City of Wilson: Two council seats and Mayor. Terms expiring: Mayor Donald Klaus, council members Clyde Wilke and David Maldonado.

Wilson ISD: Two trustees. Terms expiring: Bobby Miller, Michael Villarreal.

City of New Home: One Council member. Terms expiring: Ross Fillingim.

New Home ISD: (Election is in November, filing at a later date.)

City of O'Donnell: Three Council seats and Mayor. Terms expiring: Mayor Scott Martinez, council members Kim Parker, Toby Mires, John David Velasquez.

O'Donnell ISD: Two trustees. Terms expiring: Monty Hancock, Mandy Stidham.

reverse the language situation and went to a schedule of three English language services and one German language service per month.

In 1938, funds were raised to erect a new church building, since the older building was in need of so many repairs and was becoming too small. The funds were raised, the old building dismantled, and the new building was built on the same site, with most of the labor donated by the hard working members. On March 17, 1940, two services were held to dedicate the new building, which still serves as the current building for St. John

Lutheran Church. It was about this time when the congregation also decided to conduct all of its services in the English language.

The congregation elected to participate in a stewardship program in the fall of 1949, called Christian Rural Overseas Program (C.R.O.P.). This program was designed to send raw cotton to the needy all over the world. St. John led all congregations in Texas with over \$2,000 worth of cotton being contributed by St. John members.

During the latter part of 1949 and the early part of 1950, St. John participated in a program sponsored by the Lutheran Resettlement

Service of the National Lutheran Council of the Lutheran World Federation. This program was designed to help displaced East-European families to relocate to the United States. These families would be provided with a job and a place to live until they were able to assimilate into American society. There were approximately eight families who came to the South Plains and Wilson/St. John area.

St. John has had a long relationship with Outdoor Ministry programs. In 2015, "Coins for Camp" were collected to purchase memorial bricks at Briarwood Retreat Center in Argyle, TX and Camp Chrysalis in Kerrville, TX. Although many venues were visited, a favorite has been Camp Chrysalis in Kerrville. It is estimated members of St. John have attended that church camp for almost 70 years. There have now been at least three generations of members attending and working at that camp.

A major change for the congregation took place in 2015, when church organists Onita Steinhauer and Mary Wilke retired after serving their church for many years. Mrs. Steinhauer served as organist for 65 years and Mrs. Wilke for 61

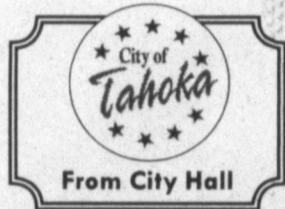

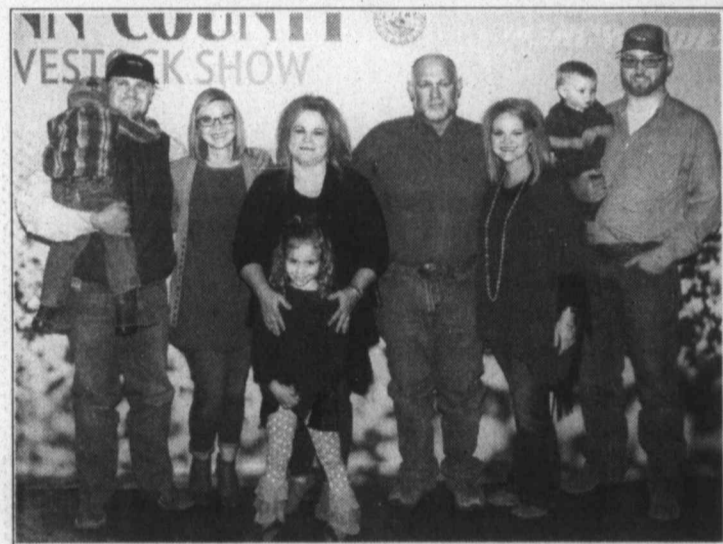

County will no longer manage Animal Control/ Shelter here; City of Tahoka to take over

The City of Tahoka is taking over the management and staffing of the Lynn County Animal Shelter, according to a decision made by the Lynn County Animal Control Board last week.

County officials and representatives from the City of Tahoka and City of Wilson were present at the Animal Control Board session. No representatives from the City of O'Donnell or City of New Home attended the meeting, according to County Judge Mike Braddock, who was in attendance along with Sheriff Abraham Vega.

The Board voted to offer the City of Tahoka the use of the animal shelter, which is built on county-owned property, and to have the City of Tahoka manage the facility as well as hire any staff for the facility, including a City of Tahoka

Animal Control officer. The City is currently accepting applications for a full-time Animal Control officer.

There will no longer be a Lynn County Animal Control Officer. During the interim period until the city takes over the shelter, Judge Braddock told *The News* that the county is continuing to have a county employee tend to the needs of the animals housed at the shelter. It is anticipated that the city will take over the management and staffing of the shelter within the next 60 days.

Under the new arrangement, the City of Tahoka may set a fee schedule to accept animals from other cities within the county on a pay-per-animal basis at the animal shelter, but each city would need to provide their own animal control officer.

Co. Commissioners have routine meeting

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session on Monday, January 22, at 9:00 a.m. in the County Judge's Office located at 1524 Harper Street. Commissioners Matt Woodley, John Hawthorne, Don Blair and Larry Durham were present with County Judge Mike Braddock presiding.

A new contract for the county's postal machines was approved with Pitney Bowes that would increase the monthly rate from \$50.00 to \$52.56 per month. Commissioners also moved to adopt a Resolution on Electioneering that would prohibit any political signs from being posted, displayed, or placed on any property that is owned or controlled by Lynn County, Texas.

Sheriff Abraham Vega gave a report on his office, and informed the court that Lynn County will no longer be in charge of Animal Control or the Animal Shelter.

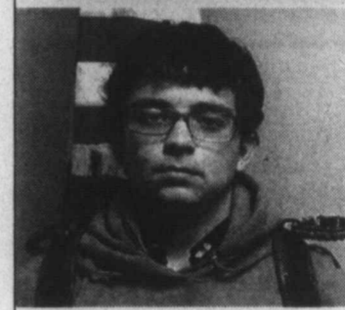
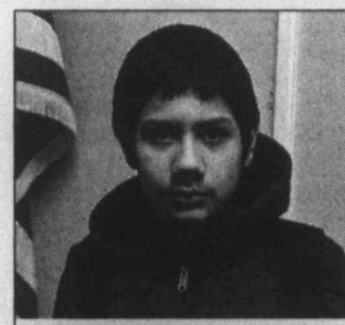

Lynn County FSA announces County Committee Election results

Lynn County U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Rodney Schoppa announced that County Committee elections are over and the ballots have been counted.

Gregg Nieman of New Home, was elected to represent local administrative area (LAA) 1.

"County Committee members are a critical component of FSA day-to-day operations," said Schoppa. "They help deliver programs at the county level and work to serve the needs of local producers. All recently-elected County Committee members took office on January 1, 2018, and joined the existing committee."

Every FSA office is required to have a County Committee, which consists of local farmers elected by local farmers. Nearly 7,800 FSA County Committee members serve FSA offices nationwide. Each committee has three to 11 elected members who serve three-year terms of office. One-third of County Committee seats are up for election each year. County Committee members impact FSA administration within a community by applying their knowledge and judgment to help FSA make important decisions on its commodity support programs, conservation programs, indemnity and disaster programs, emergency programs, and eligibility.

County Committee members impact producers through their decision making and help shape the culture of a local FSA office. They also ensure the fair and equitable administration of FSA farm programs in their counties and are accountable to the Secretary of Agriculture. Members conduct hearings and reviews as requested by the State Committee, ensure socially disadvantaged (SDA) farmers and ranchers are fairly represented, make recommendations to the State Committee on existing programs, monitor changes in farm programs and inform farmers of the purpose and provisions of FSA programs. They also assist with outreach and inform underserved producers such as beginning farmers and ranchers about FSA opportunities.
