LCHD CEO Lindauer's contract terminated

In a surprise move by Lynn County Hospital District Board of Directors in a special session at noon Tuesday, the Board voted unanimously to immediately terminate the services of Randy Lindauer, Chief Executive Officer of the hospital.

Lindauer had reportedly planned to resign on May 18 with two months severance, but had asked the board for another month's severance on his contract. The five directors present at the meeting approved the three months severance plus two weeks, in order to end his contract immediately. Voting for the motion were Sharon Isham, Robbie Autry, Della Swartz, and Mary Gayle Raindl. Board President Jannis Childress does not vote except to break a tie. Directors Manuel DeLeon and W. Calloway Huffaker were not present at the meeting.

The Board had already named Dr. Melanie Richburg as the new CEO in a succession plan, with her duties to begin full-time in September, according to the timeline. On Tuesday, directors named Chief Financial Officer Steve Brock to serve as temporary interim CEO.

The next meeting of the LCHD Board of Directors is tonight (Thursday) at 6 p.m., with the location moved to the Tahoka City Hall Community Room.

C atan wants both Christians and non-Christians to be confused about salvation, but for different reasons.

When it comes to unbelievers, the devil's purpose is to have them think they're saved by doing good works-in other words, by being a "good" person. His motive is to keep the lost man or woman lost. This is an all-too-effective strategy, even among many who attend church regularly. Assuming their good deeds will outweigh their bad deeds, they consider themselves heaven-bound when in reality, they're actually on the road to horrifying, irreversible disappointment (Matt. 7:21-23).

The bride-elect is a graduate of Tahoka High School and West Texas A&M University She is a registered nurse at Covenant Children's Hospital in Lubbock.





remain open, LCHD has increased its revenue from just over \$9,000,000 in 2015 to over \$14,750,000 in 2017, that is a 39% increase in two years. If LCHD continues its present course for 2018, revenue will surpass \$18,000,000: that is a doubling of patient revenue over four years. In addition, LCHD has worked diligently with the entire staff to improve the overall culture of the organization, enabling additional efficiencies which have helped reduce costs

and expenses. One might ask, why is this important and how is it going to affect me? Well, the increasing revenues help to ensure the community's taxes will not go up because of services provided by LCHD. Additionally, the improvements that LCHD has made, to include but not limited too; a new radiology suite, new trauma room, new emergency room waiting room, dozens of facilities and securities improvements, and arguably, most importantly, increasing physicians and medical staff, which will ensure that Lynn County Hospital District meets its objective of improving healthcare in the community.

Board Chair, Jannis Childress recently said, "[W] e are very grateful to Randy Lindauer, the great leadership team, and all the staff for the many ways they have improved healthcare in our hospital and community. A lot has changed for the better during my tenure;

It is worth repeating, that no tax revenue from Lynn County will be used when the Board approves the opening of a clinic in Lamesa. There is a need in Lamesa that is not currently being met, which provides LCHD the opportunity to open this clinic. Multiple models have been run to ensure the clinic, will conservatively, make a positive revenue with cash on hand after the first year of operation and expenses between \$200,000 and \$500,000. The two physicians and nurse practitioner that LCHD has been in contact with already have several patients which will provide immediate revenue, that coupled with the support of the Board of Directors and the LCHD leadership team will help to ensure that the new clinic experiences the same success and growth that LCHD has seen. Finally, opening the clinic in Lamesa helps to expand LCHD's revenue and objective of improving healthcare throughout the community, to include our neighbors to the

Additionally, I would like to announce the Board of Directors and I are working towards a strategic plan that could see a major change to LCHD in the next five to eight years. Based on our current revenue and expected increase in revenues; LCHD could build a new hospital and nursing home in the next five to eight years at no cost to the tax payers of Lynn County or the surrounding communities. As the current facility is well past its useful life, the possibility to open a new hospital and nursing home at no cost to the tax payers is an inevitability and virtually unheard of in rural healthcare for a critical access hospital. Although it is an ambitious goal, it is certainly. an achievable goal based on the preliminary numbers LCHD received to build the new, state of the art facility.

Finally, I do recognize that LCHD has continued improvements to make locally, specifically with access and timeliness to care. I can assure you that I, the Board of Directors; and the leadership team are working diligently to find ways to improve aspects of LCHD; while continuing to grow. We at-LCHD, understand our patients, are our neighbors, friends, parents, children, our families. LCHD looks forward to your continued support, now and in the future.

Steve Miller named Outstanding Conservation Farmer for 2017

The Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District Directors recognized Steve Miller of Tahoka as the Outstanding Conservation Farmer for 2017, at their district banquet held last Tuesday. April 17.

Miller started farming at a young age with this father, J.T.

Braddock

Miller, and harvested his first crop of 320 acres of cotton in 1974, the year he graduated from high school. He currently farms 2400 acres of dryland cotton, 800 acres of irrigated cotton, and has 1700 acres of pastureland and cattle.

Miller has been farming and

putting conservation on the land to produce cleaner water, improve soil tilth, enhance wildlife habitat, and improve air quality for 44 years and has been a Lynn County SWCD Cooperator for 28 years. He has worked with the NRCS, Lynn County SWCD, FSA and others to utilize cost share programs as well as technical assistance to install conservation practices.

To make the most efficient use of his ground water through Environmental Quality Incentive Program, (EQIP), Miller installed 1700 feet of underground PVC pipe and currently has 8 center pivots with which he waters 800 acres of crop land. To capture and make maximum use of rainwater, he uses furrow dikes and contour farming on his dryland acres in conjunction with 9,000 feet of

terraces that were constructed with assistance from the NRCS EQIP Program. He also plants turn rows to wheat to prevent wind erosion.

For years Miller planted conventional cotton, but now with the research and increased development in technology, he uses a minimal till system on his irrigated cotton. His system consists of planting wheat that is allowed to put on new growth, the wheat is then terminated and cotton is planted into the terminated stubble. This system protects young cotton from blowing sand, discourages wind erosion, enhances wildlife habitat and improves water quality by reducing runoff.

To maintain his rangeland acres in good condition and ensure good gain on his 80 head of cow/calf operation, Miller sprayed 800 acres of pasture land to eliminate mesquite. This conservation approach on his rangeland improved range conditions, reduced erosion, improved water quality and quan-

tity, and enhanced plant health. Miller currently serves on the Tahoka Farmers Co-Op Gin Board of Directors and Plains Cotton Grower Board of Directors. He served on the High Plains Underground Water District Board for two terms and was on the Tahoka Volunteer

Fire Department for 30 years. He and his wife, Carol, are members of First Baptist Church of Tahoka. They have two children, Chelsey and Cade. Cade lives in Fort Worth, and Chelsey and her husband Lex Gillean live in Lubbock, with their two children, Callie and Caden.



DA says double number of indictments processed in 2017 over previous year

Philip Mack Furlow, District Attorney for the 106th Judicial District, told Lynn County Commissioners this week that he and his staff are working hard to move the docket for the people of Lynn, Garza, Gaines and Dawson counties, processing twice as many cases over the previous year when his predecessor served in the DA's office. Furlow presented information about his office during the Lynn County Commissioners Court meeting held Monday morning in Tahoka.

"Just to give you an update on our numbers, we actually doubled the number of indictments in 2017 over 2016, so we did twice as many new cases as the previous administration." Furlow told commissioners, explaining that this report is based on indictments, cases cleared, and jury trials.

"We actually indicted more and cleared more cases than in recent history, according to our new system of tracking the numbers. In 2017 we filed or indicted 459 cases, we disposed of 424 cases, and we had nine jury trials. Now, Lynn County is, by far, our least crime county. Just to give you an idea, we only indicted 41 cases in Lynn County in 2017, and disposed of 40 – disposed means that it's either by trial, plea bargain, or sometimes dismissal. We did have one case for Lynn County that had been on the books for 20 some-odd years, and this was a capital case - but the guy was already in jail on a life sentence, and he was never going to get out anyway, so we dismissed it," he explained.

Since the beginning of 2018, Furlow said his office had filed 94 new cases, disposed of 102, and has had three jury trials.

"Of the three jury trials we had, all of those resulted in life sentences," Furlow added.

In other business during Monday morning's meeting, commissioners approved an application for property tax abatement submitted by Sage Draw Wind, LLC. County Judge Mike Braddock explained that the motion only approved allowing the wind energy company to submit an application, but that the terms of the property tax abatement had not yet been set. Those terms, he said, would be discussed between the county

and the wind energy company, for consideration of approval at a later meeting.

Braddock mentioned that a concern about the location of the wind energy farm had been brought to his attention, because nearby Tahoka Lake is a roosting area for cranes. He added that the wind energy company representatives are aware of the concern, and in fact are conducting a study on the issue that should be completed by October.


Sage Draw Wind is the second phase of the Staked Plains project, for a 300-megawatt wind energy project situated east of Wilson and north of Tahoka. Seventy percent of the project will be in Lynn County, and the remainder will be in Garza County, and the project also falls under the jurisdiction of Wilson ISD and Southland ISD taxing entities.

Commissioners approved an interlocal agreement between Lynn County and South Plains Public Health District, to establish a preparedness plan for a location in the county where citizens could receive treatment/assistance in the event of a health epidemic or other healthrelated catastrophe. There is no cost to the county in the agreement, and county officials will coordinate with the health district to consider possible locations for such services.

A contract with the City of Tahoka was approved, which basically leases the building containing the animal shelter to the city. The county will retain ownership and provide insurance for the building, but the City will maintain and operate the animal shelter as a city animal shelter.

A county-wide burn ban, which has been ongoing for the past 90 days, was extended for another 90 days, to expire on July 21, 2018. Sheriff Abraham Vega reported on his department's activities, noting there were 33 inmates in Lynn County Jail this week. A tax deed for the City of O'Donnell was approved for property sold for taxes due, and monthly bills were approved as presented.

Judge Braddock presided at the meeting with three of four commissioners present, including John Hawthorne, Larry Durham and Don Blair, and other county officials. Commissioner Matt Woodley was absent.




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Post hands Dogs 5-4 loss

Sales tax holiday slated for emergency supplies, April 28-30

There's no limit on the number of qualifying items you can purchase. These include:

 batteries, fuel containers and flashlights priced at less than \$75;

hurricane shutters and emergency ladders priced at less than \$300; and
portable generators priced

at less than \$3,000.

Purchases that do not qualify include:

 batteries for automobiles, boats and other motorized vehicles;

camping stoves and camping supplies:

ing supplies;
• chainsaws; plywood;

 extension ladders and stepladders; and tents.

A list of emergency preparation supplies that may be purchased tax-free can be found on the Comptroller's website.

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

Woman arrested for shooting pistol during dispute

Four traffic accidents occurred in Lynn County during the past week, and a Lynn County woman was arrested on charges of deadly conduct after she shot a pistol during a domestic disturbance on Saturday night, according to reports from Lynn County Sheriff's Office.

The woman apparently shot a pistol, either shooting up into the air or towards her husband's vehicle during a domestic dispute, but no damage or injuries were caused in the incident. Sheriff's deputies arrested the woman on charges of deadly conduct after they arrived at the scene, from a call that originated at 9 p.m. Saturday from a rural residence on County Road 14.

A one-vehicle rollover occurred at 4:27 p.m. last Tuesday, April 17, on US 380 west of Tahoka, between FM 3112 and FM 1328. Mark Gabriel Landreth of Lubbock was the driver of a 1995 green Ford pickup licensed out of Hobbs, NM. EMS was paged to the scene, but the driver was not transported for treatment.

Another accident occurred at the intersection of 11th and Lumsden Ave. in Wilson, near the RV park there, at 5 p.m. last Wednesday. A 2017 brown F150 pickup and a white Impala were involved in the collision, but no other information was available on the drivers' names. Lynn County EMS was paged to the scene and reportedly transported at least one person to Lynn County Hospital for treatment of injuries.

Another one-vehicle rollover occurred at 2:20 p.m. Friday on US 87, near FM 211, when a vehicle traveling in the northbound lane of US 87 apparently lost control and rolled. No injuries were reported, and no other information was available as to the driver's name or type of vehicle.

Tahoka Police responded to a two-vehicle accident in Tahoka at 1 p.m. Friday, at the intersection of Main Street and N. 2nd

Street. The collision occurred when a black 2004 Ford Ranger driven by Julio Mendez Rodriguez southbound on Main Street attempted to turn left onto N. 2nd, colliding with a 2009 black Cadillac Escalade driven by Michelle Bertreaux-Rodriguez which was northbound on Main. Both drivers refused treatment by EMS, and both vehicles were driven away from the scene by the owners.

O'Donnell Volunteer Fire Dept. responded to a call from Woolam Gin at 4 p.m. last Tuesday, for a report of a transformer on fire at the gin.

Lynn County Jail reported 33 inmates for the week, including 19 for Ector County, 12 for Lynn, and 1 each for Dawson and Crosby counties. Charges included one for assault causes bodily injury, one for deadly conduct, and one for driving with license invalid with previous conviction.
