County Receives Check From Wildlife Refuge

Refuge Manager, Keith S. Hansen today presented County Judge, Don Cihak, with a check for \$1,764. This presentation was made at the regular weekly meeting of the County Commissioners.

The payment represents the county's share of revenue generated from the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge and is figured on the adjusted cost of the acquired lands within the refuge. This is the second payment to the counties under Public Law 88-523, which set up the procedure now in use for distribution of revenue from the refuge receipts. This law further specifies that funds paid to the county under this act must be used for schools and/or roads. The commissioners voted to split the money in the following manner: County Road and Bridge Fund, \$882: Muleshoe Public Schools, \$442; and \$220 each to the Bula and Three-Way Independent School Districts.



Some property owners may not receive a statement because of recent change in ownership or because owner has not rendered to Tax Assessor. If you do not receive a tax statement by October 5th, give legal description of your property to county Tax office and statement will be sent to you.

Scarbrough said. The general goal is to assist the handicapped individual to find employment "which will provide for his economic and social needs and allow him to move upward in the job market commensurate with his abilities." the TEC manager ex-

Though the basic goals of TEC services to the handicapped velopments have affected employment prospects of the handicapped, according to Scar-

brough. Among these are: . . . Rapidly increasing training opportunities for the mentally retarded have greatly improved employment prospects for many who formerly lacked the work-readiness essential to successful performance of
