

DA Philip Mack Furlow honored with prestigious Michael J. Crowley Award

AUSTIN - The State Bar of Texas Board of Directors has awarded its prestigious Michael J. Crowley Award to 106th Judicial District Attorney Philip Mack Furlow. The Michael J. Crowley Award recognizes meritorious service by a current member of the State Bar of Texas Board of Directors who exemplifies selfless dedication of time and talent to the legal profession.

The award is named in honor of the late Michael J. Crowley, an Austin lawyer and the chair of the State Bar of Texas Board of Directors in 1994-1995 who led a distinguished

professional life. The State Bar Board Policy Manual specifies that the Crowley Award should not be given in just any year, but only in a year that the meritorious service of a board director is extraordinary and benefits more than just a specific segment of the legal community or public. Local racer competes for national spotlight in AMA National Motocross Championship

New Home's Layke Campbell riding dirt bikes since he was 4 just made his dream come true. The 9-year-old dirt bike racer has qualified for the largest amateur motocross race in the world, the 37th Annual Rocky Mountain ATV/MC AMA Amateur National Motocross Championship, presented by Lucas Oil, to be held this August at the historic Loretta Lynn Ranch. Campbell took on over 22,000 hopefuls from across America to earn one of just 1,446 qualifying positions. The race runs July 30th through August 4th.

With the help of sponsors such as: Randall D. Williams Training; Bell Scott; Go Pro; Leatt; Dunlop; Acerbis; Engine Ice; Motocross Vest; Martin Arellano; And Larry/Kay Williams, who help pay his way to the races, Campbell has had the opportunity to pursue his dreams. He has won 30+ races in the last four years and competes nearly every weekend in races across the country.


Layke Campbell is the son of Chris and Mindy Campbell of New Home, and the grandson of Larry and Kay Williams of Matador. Campbell, who attends New Home I.S.D. in the fourth grade, has been

Campbell is just one of the over 20,000 racers across the country who spent the last four months qualifying for the event. The top finishers in Area Qualifiers and Regional Championships earn a gate position in the National Championship race at Loretta Lynn's. Racers may enter a wide variety of classes, from minicycle classes for children as young as four, all the way up to a senior division for riders over 50. There are also classes for women and classes for both stock and modified machines. In total, there are 35 different classes of competition. Campbell will compete in the highly competitive 65cc 7-9 year olds class.

The track is built on a section of Loretta Lynn Ranch and Campground in Hurricane Mills, Tennessee. The course contains a variety of jumps, corners and other obstacles designed to test the skills and stamina of the racers. The motocross track is used only once a year for motorcycles, so there is no hometown advantage.

DPS Warns Texans of safety concerns in summer heat

AUSTIN - The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans to take extra safety precautions as temperatures and heat indices continue to reach 100 degrees and above in many parts of the state.

"We have already experienced extreme heat in most parts of the state this summer, and DPS wants to remind all Texans that the dangers from sustained high temperatures should not be taken lightly," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "Heat-related injuries and deaths are often preventable if we take the necessary steps to protect ourselves and others."

Extreme temperatures place children at greater risk of injury or death if left unattended in a vehicle. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, temperatures inside a car can rise more than 20 degrees in only 10 minutes. Even with an outside temperature of 60 degrees, the temperature inside a car can reach 110 de-

Heatstroke is one of the leading causes of non-crashrelated fatalities among children, and every year, children die from heat-related injuries after being left in a vehicle or by entering a vehicle unnoticed. Leaving windows partially rolled down does not help. A child should never be left unattended in a vehicle.

Additionally, extreme heat events or heat waves are one of the leading causes of weather-related deaths in the United States, according to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention. Periods of severe heat and high humidity tax the body's ability cool itself and can lead to heat exhaustion and heat stroke, which can be fatal.

DPS offers the following tips for staying safe and managing the heat:

· Drink plenty of water throughout the day even if you do not feel thirsty; you may not realize you're dehydrated until it's too late. Also avoid alcohol and beverages high in caffeine or sugar during periods of prolonged outdoor exposure.

body. Heat-related illnesses such as heat exhaustion and heat stroke can develop quickly. Know the warning signs and seek medical attention if necessary.

· Check on others, especially the elderly, sick, very young and those without air conditioning.

· Don't forget pet safety. Animals are also susceptible to heat-related injury or death - don't put your pets in these dangerous conditions.


· Monitor local weather updates and stay aware of any upcoming changes in weath-

· Limit exposure to the sun and stay indoors as much as possible. If possible, avoid strenuous outdoor activity during the hottest part of the

· Light-colored, loosefitting clothing and a hat are recommended while spending time outdoors.

· Wear sunscreen. Sunburns can affect your body's ability to cool down. Protect yourself during periods of sun exposure by putting on sunscreen SPF 15 or higher 30 minutes prior to going outside.

· Be extra careful when cooking outdoors, building campfires or driving off-road to avoid igniting dry vegetation. Also, stay aware of burn bans in your area and always abide by restrictions on outside burning.



RCPP funding still available for irrigation management equipment

LUBBOCK, TX - About \$350,000 in cost-share funding is still available for irrigation management equipment through the USDA-NRCS Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP).

The RCPP funding is for installation of irrigation system monitoring equipment, ter. soil moisture probes, and other irrigation management equipment. The program ends in 2018.

Approximately \$525,397 in RCPP funds have been awarded to date. This represents 119 contracts encom-

passing 44,754 acres. An additional \$15,000 may be awarded in pending applications. Participation in RCPP is entirely voluntary. Interested producers in the Panhandle-South Plains region can sign up for the program at their local USDA-NRCS service cen-

Additional information about RCPP is available at www.tx.nrcs.usda.gov. USDA is an equal opportunity provider, employer, and lender.

In addition, be sure to visit www.hpwd.org/rcpp for information about eligible equipment, estimated payment rates, a contact list of USDA-NRCS Service Centers, and a map illustrating the 29 counties participating in RCPP.

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District (HPWD) in Lubbock serves as the lead RCPP partner. Supporting partners include Hemphill County UWCD in Canadian, Llano Estacado UWCD at Seminole, Mesa UWCD at Lamesa, North Plains GCD at Dumas, Sandy Land UWCD at Plains, and South Plains UWCD at Brownfield.

These groundwater conservation districts do not receive any funding for the program, but provide in-kind services to assist with water conservation efforts.

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

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

Street closure, policies considered at Tahoka City Council session

Tahoka City Council met at 6 p.m. last Tuesday night, July 10, discussing policies regarding mobile food vendors, a proposed yard no-parking ordinance, and social medial policies for city employees, and approving a request to close and abandon a portion of Ave. D.

The council approved a request from Tony Calvillo to close and abandon the portion of Ave. D between South 5th and South 6th Streets. A request from South Plains Implement was also approved for a variance for their storage building, which encroaches on a portion of city right-of-way.

The council discussed, but did not take any action, on several policy issues, including a mobile food vendor policy, a review of the social media policy for city employees, and revisions on a proposed ordinance prohibiting vehicles from parking in residential yards. The food vendor policy and parking orto the council for first and second readings at upcoming seslikely at the August meeting.

Council members approved a \$2 rate increase, from \$32 to \$34 per ton, paid by Republic Services to dump waste material in the Tahoka landfill, and approved authorizing City Administrator Jerry Webster to negotiate a short term loan for the purchase of a tractor and shredder, with a blade for alleys.
